At the request of Steve Kurzman, an officer of the Washington Chapter and former Assistant Secretary of HEW, Hyman Bookbinder and I met with Matthew R. Paratore, Executive Secretary of International Liaison, Inc. Kurzman's contact with Paratore stems from the fact that a theology seminary in Rochester, of which Paratore was Assistant Dean, was a client of Kurzman's law firm.

I am enclosing a set of materials describing the work of International Liaison which can be described as a coordinating mechanism for a number of Roman Catholic organizations engaged in recruitment of full-time volunteers for work abroad and in the United States. There are approximately 1500 full-time volunteers working overseas and another thousand full-time volunteers working in the United States. These 2500 volunteers are recruited and made available to projects through a number of organizations and in the International Liaison which only tries to help them in relating to the bishops, etc. For example, Paratore tells us of a film on volunteers which is quite good.

The Jesuit Volunteer Corp, one of the constituents of International Liaison, is an organization with which I am familiar and from which I have received, for some local projects, at least one-half dozen volunteers over the last three or four years at a cost less than \$3,000 a year for a volunteer. The volunteers receive room, board, insurance, travel, and approximately \$50.00 per month. I assume that other groups have similar arrangements.

Bookie responded to Kurzman's request and has spoken with you. We told Paratore that we would encourage you and/or Jim to meet with him. He is interested in learning what the other interreligious communities are doing.

I don't know whether you want to get in touch with Paratore or

you want us to ask him to get in touch with you. In any event, it would be good to see him.

The Agencies and Missions listed in this booklet are taken from the files of the International Liaison Office.

Each year, this office contacts various Missions and Volunteer Service Groups... Church affiliated, Independent and Governmental... and presents to them a Quota Form which indicates their needs in the way of qualified personnel for the given year. Needs obviously will vary from year to year. 1973 marks the first time this booklet was made available on a national level.

With the expansion of this service to other areas of the Country, it is not possible to project openings at any given time since some of the positions listed may be filled before contact. We also note that change of directorship, completion of given projects, or change in national policies in the areas seeking assistance, may lead to suspension of volunteer recruitment or changes in formats of some of the agencies and missions listed.

CONTACT PROCEDURE

The Following Procedure is Recommended:

- A. Telephone if possible. Mail is not always reliable.
- B. Foreign Placement Contacts—Usually requires weeks for communications. You may have to write several times before receiving a response. If possible, use whatever Stateside Contacts the given Mission or Agency provides.
- C. When writing initially, include all pertinent information, e.g.: Educational Background; Term of Service Available; Work Experience; Age; Two References; Etc.
- D. If possible, the applicant should attempt to undertake some form of training prior to reporting for those Missions not having a Training/Orientation Program. Programs in existence at this time are listed on the last page. Books, maps, research into given area, culture, etc. should be reviewed.
- E. Guidance Counsellor-Staff Psychologist—Local College Campus for interview and the administration of tests (MMPI, Edwards, personal preference are the standard tests given — though requirements for given agency may vary). The results of interview and testing should be forwarded to the Agency/Missions considering application. This covers Agency/Mission not undertaking their own screening procedures.
- F. All Programs — Requirement of physical check-up and references.

In the interest of fairness to the agencies listed, you should:

- I. Indicate whether or not you have contacted more than one project.
- II. Indicate immediately your acceptance by another project.
- III. Indicate your loss of interest in a given project.

Many wheels go into motion when contacts are made, and the possibility of your placement presents itself to various agencies; therefore, it is imperative that the applicant consider this prior to firming up a commitment to a given mission or project.

We would also like to remind you that we are at your service in whatever way we can be of assistance to you throughout your placement procedures. Please feel free to contact us at any time you feel that we may help in establishing proper lines of communication to expedite your investigation into various projects.

NOTE:

The Liaison is also an on-going resource channel for various volunteer missions and agencies, so it is quite possible that other sources of placement will be available, should any of those listed here be phased-out due to change of format, or completion of project or personnel needs.

CATEGORIES OF PLACEMENT: This deals with those most difficult to place and, conversely, those easiest to place. NOTE: There are EXCEPTIONS. THIS IS MERELY TO INDICATE THOSE MOST DIFFICULT TO PLACE and impossibility of placement should not be automatically assumed in these categories unless otherwise noted.

- 1) Under 21: Except in some instances of short-term service, and those who may have a desire to pursue a religious vocation, placement here is difficult.
- 2) Unskilled: In close conjunction with the above since it indicates that placement in such service should normally be for response to felt needs. The so-called "generalist" can frequently be found on a local level (indigenous) thereby providing opportunity for them to become involved in their own problem-solving situations in cooperation with their parishes and alleviating the expense of bringing in expatriate personnel.
- 3) Less than one year domestic - two or more overseas: As with all instances of various projects and programs, there are some exceptions as is the case with medical personnel who are frequently needed for short-term placements. Summer opportunities are also fairly frequent, but such programs vary greatly from year to year, frequently enough indicating temporary response to a given need. Occasionally this office receives requests for short-termers; some for those who express a desire to enter religious life.
- 4) Incomplete studies: Those who have begun but not finished given courses toward a degree.
- 5) Escapism: Potential volunteers can well have mixed motives for entering such work; however, it has to be clearly ascertained that they are not seeking this as a last alternative toward facing personal problems. This should also be viewed as including the "unemployed" who seek in this work more of a job situation than a form of service.
- 6) Excessive expectations: Overt interest in given climate preferences, or countries because of a "desire to travel", which has been known, makes placement difficult. Of course, health factors do enter here and are always considered.
- 7) Over 65: While these people have been placed, for reasons of health, insurance, ability to adjust to new cultures, etc., it is difficult.
- 8) Married couples with dependents: In the case of married couples the "team" concept is an imperative. The age and number of dependents is also a consideration. Overseas particularly, the health and educational factors are a real concern to accepting agencies. In some instances projects will hope that the married couples, with families, will think in terms of a longer commitment than one year for the States. (eg: Group 7, Glenmary)
- 9) Outstanding debts to be cleared up.
- 10) Unchurched: While recognized that some may no longer be affiliated with a given denomination, or may never have been, and that their motivation can still be for the work of the Lord as they experience Him, it is nevertheless a consideration prior to placement with any Church mission. Development of

"peoples" is involved and that is a TOTAL approach to the people of the world; spiritual and temporal, not development for its own sake (we see what that has accomplished in many so-called "developed nations").

- 11) Serious physical handicaps: Health is an important factor to be considered. Physical checkups should always precede placement.
- 12) Past history of mental or emotional disturbances: Even with subsequent professional clearance, these people would be hard to place. The reason that this is difficult is that the tensions that you may often be called upon to experience can cause relapse or do greater harm to such individuals.
- 13) Employment-Volunteer: Those seeking a position. Sometimes there will be recruitment of persons on a salary basis commensurate with those within a given area, but for the most part this should be seen as "voluntary".
- 14) Overspecialized: Frequently, mission areas have no facilities for the performance of such personnel. In such cases, there are agencies that may be able to utilize these services, but this will require research.
- 15) Liberal Arts Majors: In many cases will fall under "generalist" category and extra-curricular training, experience, skills, etc. would be required. Most placements in this category domestic.
- 16) Foreign placement no specified training or skills: Almost impossible.

THE COALITION — What is it?

The International Liaison Office for volunteer lay ministry (or service) was founded in the Archdiocese of Newark in June 1963 as the direct result of the service of a lay volunteer from Newark who served with the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart in Farmville, North Carolina.

In the course of its first ten years, five hundred twenty-five Newark volunteers were recruited and placed worldwide. The office expanded in 1973 to extend its services to the laity of every diocese. In June of 1975 a further step was taken with the incorporation of the Liaison Office as the national Catholic clearing center for volunteer services. Later in 1975, as the work continued to expand and more missions became aware of its service to them in the way of providing qualified expertise (teachers, nurses, carpenters, agronomists, etc.) several regional meetings of the various sending and receiving societies were held throughout the States, culminating in the formation of a coalition of these agencies in November of 1976.

The purposes of the coalition were delineated as follows:

- a. communication vehicle to allow greater sharing of available resources.
- b. re-referral of personnel and informational expertise.
- c. collaboration of efforts.
- d. assistance in development of projects to eliminate repetition of past mistakes by sharing of experiences regarding both personnel and projects.
- e. training program coordination.
- f. on-going evaluation of projects, recommendations; evaluation of projects and orientation to them.
- g. to assist volunteers in relocation upon completion of service and to tap their experiences.
- h. to promulgate the need and opportunity for service to the laity.

In addition to the major sending and receiving groups and missions, those engaged in or proximate to those who may be interested in such service are included in the coalition. Such would be campus ministry, vocation, diocesan mission offices, Propagation of the Faith, and other forms of mission endeavor as they relate to lay volunteer ministry.

Members in the coalition are requested to contribute from their resources towards its efforts on their behalf, and on behalf of the Church as Mission, to the extent and degree they are able to do so. Their input at regional meetings and national assemblies regarding every facet of this work of lay volunteer service is welcomed, and they are eligible to stand for nomination and election to its Board of Directors.

If you are interested in associating your mission, diocesan agency or office with this coordinated effort, please feel free to contact us. You will be placed on our mailing list, and receive updated reports as to the progress and recommendations of the coalition.

Volunteers In Diocesan Action Pueblo, Colorado

VIDA BEGINS SECOND HALF OF THE VOLUNTEER YEAR. . .

August 15th seems long gone, but reflecting, it seems like it was only yesterday that we worried about and anticipated the work of the coming year. Like other volunteer organizations, VIDA is diversified in its work throughout Southern Colorado. The main thrust of our organization is to recruit teachers for the parochial school system, people who coordinate and teach in the religious education programs, and nurses and other medical personnel to work in the remote and smaller hospitals and clinics.

Our year began with a four day orientation program, held in the majestic Rocy Mountains. It's a time of getting acquainted with fellow volunteers as well as a time of preparation for the assignments. Problems that may arise are presented to the new volunteers, not to scare them but to show them VIDA is not a Eutopian society. The acknowledgement that there will be times of frustration and apprehension is indicative of the openness of VIDA. We are asked to be patient, accepting the failures along with the successes.

Because of the vast area that the Diocese of Pueblo covers (approximately 52,000 sq. miles), volunteers don't get to meet socially too often. For this reason two other major meetings are held during the year. In October, as a follow up to the August orientation, a mini-orientation is held in Pueblo, Colorado. After two and one-half months of work, a new volunteer is better able to discuss achievements, problems, ways of strengthening VIDA, as well as to meet again as a group. Many of the ideas of this weekend mini-orientation have been implemented into the policies of VIDA.

At this time VIDA would like to thank International Liaison for the opportunity to express our happenings. We would also like to congratulate Mr. Paratore for achieving his new position and to wish him God's speed in his work.

To this end, the East Coast Migrant Projects asserts its role as agents of social change to enable the farmworkers to claim and to achieve their just place in society.

In the Smelter City

New York Woman Finds A Learning Experience

Monica Robinson, a 22-year-old effervescent and congenial New York woman, is spending 10 months in Anaconda doing social ministry work with Sister Gilmory Vaughan before she returns back east to enter law school.

"I want to get some real world experience, rather than theoretical learning," Ms. Robinson explains.

She arrives in the Smelter City, a participant in a unique national program called Apostolic Volunteers under auspices of the Dominican Order of Nuns, headquarters out of Sinsinawa, Wis.

Robinson, from Staten Island, N.Y., graduated last May from State University at New York, earning a degree in business administration.

Twenty-six young women from throughout the nation are involved in the lay service program, and Ms. Robinson is the first in the program's existence to choose Anaconda.

Among many duties, she is doing secretarial filing, bookkeeping, paperwork, and financial affairs for the Diocesan Commission on Social Action and Human Development of which Sister Gilmory Vaughan is a member of the commission, Helena Diocese.

She is working with several students in the adult education program who are seeking GED certificates.

She is, moreover, assisting with senior citizens including the meals on wheels program, delivering noon meals to elderly shut-ins, persons unable to get out of their homes and unable to prepare food.

"I felt I wanted to work with people for at least a year," Robinson says. "I started looking around for volunteer programs of which to affiliate myself."

Robinson's special area of concern is legal problems of the elderly. "I really enjoy older people," she adds.

"I had no idea what to expect coming here," she continues. "But I'm crazy about the mountains, and I traveled to Glacier Park."

"I find myself doing more diverse things, whatever needs come up."

Her late father was an attorney, and she finds herself naturally having an interest in the legal profession.

Law schools are accepting more women, she explains, and more women are making applications to law schools.

Law firm employers have a new trend of thought toward women attorneys.

"And they (women) feel they have to work much harder" to prove themselves in law schools, Ms. Robinson says.

"Most Apostolic Volunteers chose other areas of the nation, and most are in teaching.

Ms. Robinson finds Anaconda an enjoyable, pleasurable experience, being involved in a spectrum of activities and credits Sister Gilmory Vaughan and her programs an ideal teacher and educational opportunity.

"I even joined the racquetball league," she adds.

And she writes her mother, brothers and sisters in New York, giving them mental concepts of what life in Montana is really like.

Volunteers for Educational & Social Services

Austin, Texas

Volunteers for Educational and Social Services recently began its fifth year of providing teachers, religious education coordinators and social workers for low-income Catholic schools, parishes and social service agencies in Texas.

In February, VESS announced the availability of summer scholarships that will be given to VESS members returning for another year of service. Last summer, 23 scholarships of \$500 each were awarded to volunteers and Fr. Walter J. Dalton, (VESS co-director, estimates that an equal number will be awarded this year.)

Although the majority of the 91 VESS members are teachers, there are a number who are in unique positions. Jim Assenheimer of New Orleans, Louisiana, is the principal of a Floresville school where eight other volunteers also teach. Susan Kinane of Bay Shore, New York, is the new director of campus ministry at Victoria Junior College. She is the only full-time female director in that position in Texas.

VESS members are also involved in a variety of social ministries. Pat O'Brien of Springfield, Missouri, is assistant director of a halfway house for women in Houston; Mark Wise of San Luis Obispo, California is a social worker at the county jail in San Antonio and Norah Nolan of Rochester, New York, is a community developer for the Diocese of San Angelo.

This year's in-service training program has provided volunteers an opportunity to participate in Genesis 2, a widely acclaimed program of adult education in spirituality, and a Behavior Modification workshop given by a team of graduate students from the University of Texas. VESS volunteers also attended a weekend of contemplative prayer and meditation. Primary teachers observed and then attended a seminar on Montessori methods.

It's been a busy year for VESS. However, as the VESS Theme Song written by Jim Cavanaugh of

Buffalo, New York, states, "We spread a lot of love, we're trying awful hard for heaven above and we wait with cheer for the Lord to bring us home. So on we go with lots of poise we always make a joyful noise with strength in numbers on and on we go."

Answering Questions/Questioning Answers

(Some reflections on training and orientation for lay ministry)

With the growing reality of lay ministry and involvement in Mission, we dare not proclaim that the Kingdom has arrived. If we did, what would be proclaimed would not be the Kingdom at all, but an empire. There is a difference. We must neither trumpet nor shout. Lay Mission deserves no headlines or spotlights, for too often they miss their mark, and focus only on the one whose luxury it is to be able to go elsewhere.

What is our context?

There are several.

To pretend that we exist in isolation, perfect and apart, is not the nature of our times.

That age is past.

We live and operate in context and with connections, or we live not at all.

Churchwise, we operate in a struggling, post conciliar time, in a U.S. Church,

as lay men and lay women

in a new forum of possibility for Mission.

To recognize and deal with this context is vital.

We must know from whom and where we have come, to provide a real, and not an imagined or wishful direction.

Context helps to ground us

in this world and church as *they are*.

Who and how we are

must constantly be scrutinized by the spirit of the Gospel.

We must not be about building monuments to ourselves, however subtle or small.

The point is not to glory in our achievements and successes, or even in our crosses.

To pretend that every light is green is folly.

There are flashing yellows and reds as well.

They too are part of the signs of the times.

We are not seeking supermen or superwomen.

Lay Mission has nothing to do with supemen or superwomen, for such people could not possibly relate to a broken world.

While none of us is 100% whole,

we must insist on a basic wholeness amidst the brokenness.

Honesty must permeate all aspects of lay mission, including recruitment and orientation.

Along with answering questions,

we are obliged to question our answers,

and go beyond 'good intentions',

constantly calling ourselves to task.

An orientation period is *not* a time for an applicant to 'get it together'.

That is a luxury we and those we go to live and work with can ill afford.

We have but three things to do:

be simple, honest, and true,

in our participation in the call to Mission.

It is an attempt. It is not *The* answer, nor *The* way.

Arturo Paoli perhaps says it best when he writes:

"We do not have to be many or few;
we do have to be true and authentic."

Enough said.

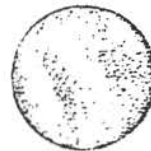

Please allow me to introduce or re-introduce the International Liaison, the U. S. Catholic Coordinating Center for Lay Volunteer Ministries. The purpose of the International Liaison is to coordinate and facilitate the effort of Catholic lay volunteer organizations for the U.S. Catholic Church. The nature of the work is within the context of the Christian mission, specifically Catholic with interdenominational ties.

The International Liaison office is endeavoring to ascertain the needs of various missions and volunteer agencies throughout the world in the way of qualified lay personnel. It then proceeds to recruit potential personnel to fill those needs.

The Liaison office is an affiliate of the United States Catholic Conference and is co-sponsored by the various missions serviced. International Liaison has established communications with dioceses throughout the United States in an effort to present the needs and opportunities for service to the laity of this country.

The International Liaison is the national Catholic Church agency in the United States undertaking this task of placement of qualified personnel including agronomists, teachers, doctors, nurses, catechists, printers, carpenters, co-op and credit union organizers, community developers, secretaries and many others.

We are not a receiving agency or a sending agency in the strict sense. We serve as a center of reference, a switchboard operation between various agencies and the personnel they endeavor to recruit.

The International Liaison was founded in the Archdiocese of Newark, NJ in June of 1963. The office expanded in 1973 to extend its services to the laity of every diocese. In June of 1975 the Liaison became incorporated as the national Catholic clearing center for the lay volunteer ministries. In November of 1976, the International Liaison Coalition was formed. Membership in the Coalition is based upon the various roles that missions and agencies have in relationship to the many and varied forms of volunteer lay ministry. These include sending agencies, that is those who recruit and place, and receiving agencies, those who have specific projects.

In addition to these sending and receiving missions, such offices as Campus Ministry, Vocations, Diocesan Mission, Propagation of the Faith are members of the International Liaison Coalition.

Missions and agencies associated with the Coalition are listed in the publication, THE RESPONSE, a booklet which lists the various missions and their needs each year. These would include missions as well as other receiving agencies such as local parishes and areas of development and evangelization throughout the United States and overseas. Members of the Coalition are requested to contribute their resources to the extent and degree that they are able to do so. Coalition members also pay annual membership dues. Among the many members of the Coalition there are:


