Famed rabbi boosts Rudy

Rabbi Marc Tanenbaum, one of the city's preeminent Jewish leaders, yesterday staunchly defended embattled Republican mayoral candidate Rudolph Giuliani against allegations that he mistreated Auschwitz survivor Simon Berger.

"It's absolutely scandalous that anyone would give even the appearance
that somehow Rudy could behave in a
Nazi-like fashion," Tanenbaum told
the Daily News yesterday. "I've seldom met anyone who is more free of
bias and more opposed to racism and
anti-Semitism than he is."

For many years, Tanenbaum, 63, was one of the ranking staff leaders of the American Jewish Committee, a major Jewish organization. He is now retired but still serves as a consultant to the committee on fostering better relations between Jews and Christians.

Tanenbaum said he is a personal friend of both Giuliani and his wife, anchorwoman Donna Hanover.

"He is very stalwart in his moral beliefs," Tanenbaum said of Giuliani.

Tanenbaum initially defended Gluliani in an interview taped Thursday, night for airing tomorrow on Channel 7's Eyewitness News Conference. "Look at his record and what he has done to chase down Nazis and deport them," Tanenbaum urged.

Giuliani has been under fire for

more than a week because of alleged mistreatment of Berger, a Long Island man arrested on kickback charges in 1986 and later acquitted. Giuliani was then the Manhattan U.S. attorney.

According to Berger, Giuliani's investigators had treated him in a "Nazi-like" fashion by making him sit in front of a blackboard on which someone had scrawled the German slogan, "Arbeit Macht Frei" ("Work Shall Set You Free"). That slogan was above the gates of Auschwitz, which Berger survived as a youth.

Giuliani has disclaimed knowledge of the incident.

Scrawled on the blackboard, amid a sea of doo-dles, were the words "AR-BEIT MACHT FREI German for "Work shall set you free." Berger's head began to swim. The words were precisely those that "greeted" arrivals to the infamous Auschwitz concentration camp.

Berger had Simon walked out of Auschwitz. A younger sister and a brother did not. Berger's mother and two other sisters were murdered in other concentration camps and his father was beaten to death by Nazis in the Lodz ghetto.

As he stared at the words, the years and his composure dissolved. Berger spoke to the agent guarding him.

"Officer, do you see this on the wall? This is German. This is the second time in my life I am in chains — when I was taken to Auschwitz and now. Both times I saw the same words [Arbeit macht frei] and I want you to take note of that."

In an interview yesterday in The Post's newsroom, now-mayoral candi-

Giuliani termed the incident "reprehensible" and said, "If we found the per-son who did it, and that person was with a federal agency, I'm sure we would have fired them. I think the government did precisely what it should have done: Preserve the evidence and turn it over to the defense counsel.

Then-assistant U.S. At torney David Zornow told The Post yesterday he treated the "Arbeit macht incident seriously and launched an immediate investigation back in 1986

He, in fact, ordered a pic ture taken of the black-board after the initial complaint by Berger and his then-attorney Barry SlotBut the investigation within the U.S. attorney's office produced "no evi-dence that anyone had uni-laterally written words or showed them to Berger in an effort to coerce or har-

In court papers and ex-tensive interviews with The Post, Berger quotes Zornow as saying: "This is the most important day of your life."

He claims Zornow warned him that 57 people had been arrested or ac-cused in the on-going in-vestigation and that 44 had pleaded guilty to reduced charges. The other 13, Zornow allegedly told Berger, would all be going to jail since the office's conviction rate was "a thousand percent.

FLAP OVER JEWISH GROUP'S PROBE of Nazi Slogai

Anti-Defamation League of B'Nai B'rith said yesterday it has concluded that Auschwitz has concluded that Auschwise survivor Simon Berger was not the target of the Nazi slogan he was made to face at the office of former U.S. Attorney Rudolph Chiliani Giuliani.

But the ADL investigation, sparked by a Post story, was conducted without interviewing Berger or his lawyers, who promptly questioned the fairness of the probe.

An ADL spokesman refused to explain why Berger was not given a chance to be heard.

explain why Berger wa given a chance to be heard.

"I'd rather not go into detail as to what we've done," said ADL lawyer Steven Freeman. Berger has accused Giuliani of using "Nazi tactics" in an effort to scare him into confessing to a crime.

ADL National Director Abra-ADL National Director Abraham Foxman said the ADL had found "the Nazi phrase 'ARBEIT MACHT FREI' [Work shall make you free] was written on a blackboard in the U.S. attorney's office several weeks before Simon Berger was arrested and was not directed at him."

Foxman, who previously called

Foxman, who previously called the Berger incident "anti-Semi-tism at worst and insensitivity at best," also said the ADL had not

determined how the Nazi slogan got on the blackboard. For that determination, said Foxman, he's awaiting the outcome of an in-house probe being conducted in-house probe being conducted by Giuliani's successor, current U.S. Attorney Benito Romano.

Giuliani has repeatedly said he didn't know in advance about the incident, which he strongly condemned

The 62-year-old Berger, who lost his mother, brother and two sisters in the Holocaust, was arrested on bribery charges at his home at 7 a.m. on a Sunday in 1986, brought in handcuffs to the U.S. attorney's office, and placed in a chair facing a blackboard on which the Nazi death-camp slogan was written.

One of Giuliani's top deputies contended at the time that Ber-ger was made to face the blackger was made to f board by accident.

Berger, a Lido Beach, L.I., lockcompany owner, said through his son, Mark, that he was sur-prised and disappointed that he wasn't contacted as part of the ADL probe.

"My father is shocked that the ADL didn't contact him to dis-cuss what happened to him. He's been [an ADL] member for 20 years," Mark said.

he years Rudolph Giuliani has spent as a prosecutor, especially his tenure as the U.S. attorney for the Southern District of New York, have been marked by energy, imagination and impressive accomplishments. Ironically, this single-minded dedication to his work has meant that the Republican candidate for mayor hasn't become an expert on New York City, its neighborhoods and its people, its busi-ness and economy. Despite the strides that Mr. Giu-

liani has been making in recent months, there can be little doubt that he would enter the mayor's office with more to learn than any occupant in modern his-

Nevertheless, we

endorse Mr. Giuliani for mayor. We do so

because his positions on business-related issues economic de-

velopment, commer-cial rent control,

community. We do so because his intelli-

gence and commitment suggest that he

will, in a reasonable amount of time, learn the job, and because we believe he will provide the necessary leadership. We also do so because we have deep philosophical

differences with his opponent, Democrat David Din-kins. And we believe Mr. Dinkins' style of governing

will lead to years of inaction and paralysis.

Choosing which of these two men is best suited to helping business prosper in New York and to governing this diverse city has been difficult. Having to make such a choice at a time when New York needs a knowledgeable and decisive mayor because of the city's painful financial squeeze and frustrating social

problems is discouraging.
On specific issues, Mr. Giuliani is the preferable candidate. He opposes commercial rent control, a fundamental issue about whether an administration



believes in a free market. Mr. Dinkins supports both the principle of such government interference and specific and distasteful legislation. Mr. Giuliani has said he is committed to major efforts to keep large employers in New York. Despite clarifications, Mr. Dinkins' economic development program remains saddled with attitudes that suggest he won't fight as hard to retain big companies here.

We do agree with Mr. Dinkins' call for continued efforts to shore up our manufacturing base, to offer more loans to small companies, to increase money for convention promotion. We support his plans to strengthen city programs directed at minority-owned

Neither candidate satisfies us on tax issues. Both say they understand higher taxes could imperil the city's economic base; neither is willing to pledge implementation of already-approved reductions in city income and energy taxes.

Fundamentally, however, we are convinced Mr. Dinkins' vision of managing the city through study, consultation and accommodation is flawed. A mayor must make hundreds—maybe thousands—of tough decisions every year. He must provide tough-minded and thoughtful leadership. We fear greatly that Mr. Dinkins isn't up to the task.

Just last week, for example, he renewed his commitment to halt a resource-recovery plant at the Brooklyn Navy Yard. This issue has been studied for years, and this facility is a critical part of solving a pressing—and very costly—garbage crisis. To pla-cate a small, if honorable, minority of nearby residents, Mr. Dinkins would delay the plant.

What he fails to understand, we think, is that there is no acceptable compromise here to those who oppose the plant except putting parochial interests above those of the city at large.

We believe David Dinkins has grown during the

I disagree with your Oct. 9 editorial endorsing NYNEX Corp.'s position on health costs in its negotiations with unionized workers.

What NYNEX pays in health insurance is a deduction from its profits, so actually, costs are 36% less. What an individual pays is in net dollars, which

may mean gross earnings of 40% more.

Medical expenses are only deductible over 7.5% of gross income from federal and state income tax. Medical expenses are probably the only thing a person cannot control, in most cases. Car loans, credit loans and home loans are controllable. I realize that business has to pay all these expenses, but isn't that the cost of doing business?
Your statement that "telephone con-

sumers should not have to pay for health-care benefits" is correct, but what about stockholders? Or is this another LILCO situation, in which investors shouldn't have to lose, only the consumers or the workers?

Maybe the solution would be to ne-

gotiate salary and benefits as a whole package. Or maybe the IRS has to re-alize that medical expenses should be totally deductible. Or is the answer

Reformulations of gasoline, including oxygenated fuels, are also being examined for their benefit as a

clean-air strategy.

Clean air and energy security are important issues. We are always willing to learn from, and share our experience with, other urban areas.
