### RABBI TANENBAUM TO SPEAK IN NEW JERSEY

Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum, National Interreligious Affairs Director of AJC who has been a pioneering leader and thinker in interreligious relations for nearly 25 years, will be the guest speaker at the Annual Meeting of the Metropolitan New Jersey Chapter on May 2. A modern historian writing in <u>Commentary</u> magazine characterized Rabbi Tanenbaum as "the leading figure among Jewish ecumenists" in the field of interreligious relations and social justice. In an interview, <u>Newsweek</u> described Rabbi Tanenbaum "as the American Jewish community's foremost apostle to the gentiles .... who has been able to solicit support from all factions of the Jewish community."

A religious historian and authority on Judaism and Jewish-Christian relations, Rabbi Tanenbaum has written and lectured extensively on the history, theology and sociology of Judaism and Christianity.

Among his varied activities, he is a founder of the joint Vatican-International Jewish Consultative Committee and of a similar body working with the World Council of Churches. Widely consulted by Catholic and Protestant authorities, he was the only rabbi at Vatican Council II during deliberations that led to the Declaration on Non-Christian Relations which repudiated anti-Semitism. He has been in the forefront of movements to encourage fraternal dialogue between Christians and Jews. Much in demand as a lecturer before Christian as well as Jewish groups, Rabbi Tanenbaum is a frequent guest on television and radio programs.

### ANNUAL MEETING MAY 2 MARKS 30TH ANNIVERSARY OF CHAPTER

The Annual Meeting of the Metropolitan New Jersey Chapter on Sunday, May 2, will mark its 30th anniversary. Formerly known as the Essex County Chapter, it was founded by the late Julius H. Cohn and was one of the first chapters established by the American Jewish Committee. Today, there are more than a hundred chapters and units in communities around the country.

### AJC TO HONOR SYDNEY KELLNER ON RETIREMENT

Sydney Kellner, New Jersey Director of the American Jewish Committee, will be honored at the Annual Meeting on Sunday evening, May 2. The event will mark his retirement after having served since 1952 as AJC's executive in this area.

Among those participating in the tributes will be Rev. Paul L. Stagg, General Secretary of the New Jersey Council of Churches and Dean John F. X. Irving of the Seton Hall University Law School.

Mr. Kellner, a community relations specialist and educator, has been involved in many major intergroup relations activities in New Jersey and he has coordinated broad-based coalitions dealing with a variety of social issues. He was an organizer of the New Jersey Conference on Religion and Race; served as chairman of the first statewide New Jersey Conference on Fair Housing held at Rutgers University; and was initiator of the movement for a New Jersey "Ombudsman" to facilitate communications and resolve grievances between citizens and the state government. He is also a consultant to the Human Rights Committee of the New Jersey Education Association.

Over the years Mr. Kellner has worked closely with Catholic and Protestant leaders in an effort to improve Christian-Jewish relationships. He arranged the all-day Consultation at Princeton on "Catholic-Jewish Relations: The Unfinished Agenda" sponsored by the Ecumenical Commission of the Diocese of Trenton and the Greater Trenton Chapter of the American Jewish Committee in observance of the Eighth Anniversary of the Vatican Council Declaration on Jews.

In cooperation with the Newark Archdiocesan Commission for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs and the New Jersey Council of Churches, he coordinated the New Jersey Conference on Interfaith Dialogue at Seton Hall University which was designed as a springboard for developing better understanding among Catholics, Protestants and Jews.

Recently, Mr. Kellner was invited to present "testimony" on Jewish concerns to the United States Catholic Bishops during their three-day public "hearings" in New Jersey as part of the Church's Bicentennial observance keyed to the theme of "Liberty and Justice for All."

For his efforts in coordinating the Interfaith Ausinessmen's Dialogue Group, Sydney Kellner was named by the National Conference of Catholic Employers and Managers to receive the "Coronat Award" presented by St. Edward's University, Austin, Texas, a Catholic college which encourages intercreedal cooperation in community affairs. The award is presented "in recognition of high standards of ethical service to society, business, the arts and professions."

Mr. Kellner is also well known as a lecturer on Jewish art and archeology of Israel. A member of the Israel Exploration Society and of the American Schools of Oriental Research, he served as leader of the Interreligious Archeological Tour of the Land of Israel sponsored by the American Jewish Committee.

I cannot thank you enough for the warm sentiments you expressed and for the wonderful presentations that you made at the Annual Meeting of the Metropolitan New Jersey Chapter on May 2.

I am sure your message made a deep impact on Dean John Irving, Rev. Paul L. Stagg and the many other Christians who were present. In fact, on the very next day at the dedication of the Seton Hall Law Center at which Justice Thurgood Marshall was the guest of honor, Dean Irving in presiding and opening the proceedings started with the statement, "Last night I heard a great rabbi describe this as an Age of Violence". He went on to point out that the law center, which was at that moment being dedicated in the presence of the entire Supreme Court of New Jersey, distinguished jurists, hundreds of members of the Bar, representatives of various other law schools, universities, Archbishop Gerety and other clergy as well as a large number of students, was designed to be an institution which would generate moral, social and legal means of dealing with the violence and corruption which you pointed out pervades the nation and the world. Your presence here and your message made an impact which went far beyond those in attendance at our chapter meeting.

There is a certain sadness in retiring from the American Jewish Committee. The experience has been rewarding and the association with colleagues like yourself most enriching. I appreciate deeply the lessons you taught me, directly or indirectly, because your wisdom and guidance have remained a constant factor in any constructive efforts I may have made in the field of interreligious relations.

If I had to do it over again, I would still choose the American Jewish Committee. I have been happy with the agency and it has been a privilege for me to be part of it.

In my next "career" I expect to do a good deal of lecturing on the archeology of Israel and to share with others some of the magnificent discoveries unearthed in Eretz Israel which casts new and dramatic light on the history of our people.

Eleanor joins me in extending to you and your family our very best wishes with the hope that our paths will cross again many times.



I recall at our planning meeting recently, the suggestion that some reference be made to the bicentennial. You might be interested in a communication sent by Rabbi Tanenbaum recently to Christian clergy across the country in which he said:

"The Bicentennial Year offers an occasion for the serious examination of the relationship of our religious and democratic values to our human condition."

You can be certain that there will be considerable emphasis on this theme by Rabbi Tanenbaum as it pertains to the significance and present status of interreligious relationships.

## Will Hear Tanenbaum

Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum, national director of inter-religious affairs of the American Jewish Committee, will be guest speaker at the 30th annual

meeting of the Metropolitan New Jersey Chapter, Sunday evening, May 2, at Temple B'nai Jeshurun, Short Hills.

The annual meeting will honor Sydney Kellner on his retirement as New Jersey director of the Committee.

Waldron Kraemer of Maplewood is chapter chairman.

Rabbi Tanenbaum has been a pioneering leader and thinker in inter-religious relations for the past 25 years. A modern historian, writing in Commentary magazine, characterized Rabbi Tanenbaum as "the leading figure among Jewish ecumenists" in the fields of inter-religious relations and social justice.

Newsweek magazine described him "as the American Jewish community's foremost apostleto the gentiles."

A religious historian and

authority on Judaism and Jewish-Christian relations, he has written and lectured extensively on the history, theology and sociology of Judaism and Christianity. –

Rabbi Tanenbaum is a founder and co-secretary of the joint Vatican — International Jewish Consultative Committee and of a similar liaison body with the World Council of Churches.

He was the only rabbi at Vatican Council II, where he was consulted by Catholic and Protestant authorities during the deliberations that led to the Vatican Declaration on Non-Christian Relations which repudiated anti-Semitism and called for fraternal dialogue between Christians and Jews.

He also helped organize

and served as co-chairman of the first International Colloquium involving Christians, Jews, Buddhists, Hindus and Moslems from the five continents that was held at Hebrew University in Jerusalem, in November 1970.

He also helped organize a conference of African leaders on "The Bible and Black Africa" in Jerusalem, and served as cochairman of the first national consultation on Black-Jewish relations at Fisk University.
