

Dear Rabbi Tannenbaum:

I am an associate director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine Office of Chicago in charge of elementary religious education. In recent years we have cosponsored with the Chicago Catholic School Office, a lecture series entitled TOMORROW TALKS. This year the theme of the series will be COMMUNITY. In the five talks which are planned, the speakers will be requested to address specific dimensions of the general topic, for example, the community celebrates, the community teaches, the community ministers, and the community heals.


Drawing from your religious perspective and strong scriptural background we ask you to speak of building the church community here in Chicago. The theme of community is very broad and we would like to refine the title according to what you think will be most valuable for an audience of professional teachers from elementary and secondary schools, catechists of out-of-school religious programs, parents, and clergy.

This talk would be held on January 27, a Thursday evening. The program would consist of a 45 to 60 minute presentation, followed by a period of questions and comments from the audience. If possible, we would tape an interview the next morning for CTN/C, the closed circuit television system of the Archdiocese.

Our offices will pay for transportation, lodging, and a speaker's fee of \$500. The date can be adjusted if your schedule demands.

I would appreciate an answer as soon as possible.

Prayer service for Christian Unity set Sunday

The annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity will be observed with an ecumenical service of prayer at 5 p.m. Sunday in the Cathedral of St. James, Wabash and Huron.

The main address will be given by the Very Rev. Alcuin Coyle, president of the Catholic Theological Union. Other worship leaders include the Rev. Charles Spivey, executive director of the Church Federation of Greater Chicago, and the Very Rev. James E. Carroll, dean of the Episcopal cathedral.

Some 30 Protestant and Roman Catholic parishes will sponsor ecumenical rites at 8 p.m. Sunday at Savior Divine Lutheran Church in Palos Hills. Dr. John Tietjen, president of Concordia Seminary in Exile in St. Louis, will give the sermon.

This year's observances will be especially noteworthy as a result of the major breakthrough that occurred this week in the relationship between the Anglican Communion and the Roman Catholic Church. Anglican and Catholic

theologians on an international commission disclosed they had reached an agreement recognizing the primacy of the papacy.

BUDDHIST BLESSING. His Holiness, Gyalwa Karmapa, head of the Kagyu order of Tibetan Buddhism, is scheduled to perform the ceremony of the Vajra Crown during a four-day visit to Chicago starting Jan. 29. Leaders of the Dharmadhatu Buddhist Meditation Center, 640 N. State Street, said the Tibetan leader is the "second highest ranking living lama after the Dalai Lama."

SO TO SPEAK. The Rev. Avery Dulles, professor of systematic theology at Catholic University in Washington, will give the sermon at 11 a.m. Sunday at Rockefeller Memorial Chapel on the University of Chicago campus. . . .

Pauline Frederick, former NBC correspondent at the United Nations, will speak at 11 a.m. Sunday at Chicago Sinai Congregation, 5350 S. Shore Dr. . . . Rabbi Marc Tanenbaum, director of inter-religious affairs for the American Jewish Committee, will speak on "The Community in Dialog" at 8 p.m. Thursday at Trinity High School in River Forest.

COUNTDOWN. The new edition of the American Jewish Year Book reports that the world Jewish population now totals 14,145,000, a drop of 86,000 from the previous year.

With 5,845,000 Jews, the United States has the world's largest Jewish population. The Year Book lists 253,000 Jews in the Chicago area.

SEEK ATONEMENT. To mark the fourth anniversary of the Supreme Court ruling on abortion, John Cardinal Cody, Roman Catholic archbishop of Chicago, will officiate at a Liturgy of Atonement at 3 p.m. Saturday in Holy Name Cathedral, State and Superior.

ON THE MOVE. Makom, an experimental Jewish congregation for young adults, has moved its headquarters to 2636 N. Clark. . . . The Catholic

Guild for the Blind has moved its offices to 180 N. Michigan.

ALCOHOL AWARENESS. St. Chrysostom Church, 1424 N. Dearborn, will sponsor a four-week series on "alcohol-

ism, the nation's No. 1 health problem." First session will be at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday when the speaker will be Richard Weedman, director of alcoholism programs at Grant Hospital.
