Peace and Power! I was delighted to be able to talk with you yesterday. It saved me from going in a rather lengthy letter of explanation and it saved you from reading it - a Christmas present for me and a Hanukkah gift for you!

Except for the Prayer Breakfast and HRD Presentation, the above schedule is a proposal and has not as yet been coordinated. Your comment is invited.

I have enclosed a brief sketch on the background of the Prayer Breakfast and a copy of last years program folder. The structure of events is not fixed. It is merely a sample of what has been done. Your remarks

might range from 10 to 15 minutes on a subject of your choice. Perhaps something along the lines of encouraging a greater national sensitivity/maturity/spritual growth.

The breakfast audience, probably about 400 people, will have a high percentage of our more senior leadership people. By and large, my experience would indicate that most of our people are concerned, sensitive human beings.

The Human Resource block from 3:00 p.m. to 4:45 p.m. might suggest a presentation of 50 or 60 minutes and questions. Format along with topic is, in the final analysis, your option. Since the module itself will be concerned with ethics, something in that area would seem appropriate. One subject among the host of possiblities might be Command Authority and Individual Responsibility - but again, your option.

The HRD presentation will be given in a small auditorium. Audience should range from 20 to 500 people. While you will be primarily concerned with the Staff College student audience, we may open up the session to wives and other interested parties as well.

The Staff College student is generally approaching or in middle management level in his/her career. They have probably served as a company commander and will be heading for critical staff jobs at battalion, brigade and division level. A successive assignment will suggest a battalion command. They are generally quite bright and well motivated. School selection is based on merit/potential. Their age groups is generally about 32-35.

Please advise us of your air transportation arrangements. We will of course meet and return you to Kansas City International, our closest air terminal. As mentioned in our phone conversation, there are at least two flights to Detroit Thursday evening, a TWA flight at 6:00 p.m. and a Branif flight at 7:15. I see no problem, schedule considered, in making the 6:00 p.m. flight.

You should be receiving a contract in the next 30 days in the amount of \$1000.00 to cover expenses and honorarium. I will arrange VIP billeting for you. The cost is generally less than a motel.


The Presidential Prayer Breakfast is sponsored by the U. S. Senate and House Prayer Groups. The purpose of the occasion is to bring together the leadership of the United States in recognition of the moral and spiritual values upon which the nation is founded.

In 1952, members of the Senate and House Prayer Groups established with President Eisenhower the first Presidential Prayer Breakfast. The Breakfast has taken place each year since then. Governors of over 45 states have joined with the President to hold Governors' Prayer Breakfasts in their own state capitals.

Each year, soon after Congress convenes, men in leadership positions from various aspects of our national life meet together for discussion and prayer on the occasion of the Presidential Prayer Breakfast.

The Breakfast normally is attended by the President, the Vice President, the Cabinet, members of the United States Senate and House of Representatives, the Supreme Court, government officials, and other leaders from across the United States.

Since the inauguration of the Breakfast, the idea of men in positions of responsibility meeting together privately and without publicity has spread to every state, scores of cities, and to parliaments and congresses on every continent.

NATIONAL PRAYER BREAKFAST 0700, 14 February 1980, Officers' Open Mess

Guest Speaker: Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum

Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum, National Interreligious Affairs Director of the American Jewish Committee, has been a pioneering leader and thinker in interreligious relations and social justice movements during the past 30 years. New York magazine (January 22, 1979) described Rabbi Tanenbaum as "the foremost Jewish ecumenical leader in the world today." A poll of America's religious newspaper editors, published in the Christian Century in January, 1978, voted Rabbi Tanenbaum one of the ten most respected and influential religious leaders in America.

One of America's most effective and popular lecturers and orators, Rabbi Tanenbaum has lectured at major universities, seminaries, religious and educational bodies in the United States, Europe, and Israel and at numerous national and international conferences. He has served as visiting professor at the Graduate Ecumenical Institute in Bossey, Switzerland, and has lectured at Cambridge University, Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Graduate Theological Union, Notre Dame, Catholic University, Hebrew University in Jerusalem, Hebrew Union College—Jewish Institute of Religion, the U.S. Air Force University and the U.S. Army War College.

Rabbi Tanenbaum has been frequently invited to serve as a Jewish spokesman before various Congressional and Senate Committee hearings—the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee on "Moral Aspects of American Foreign Policy" (Jan. 1976); Senate Special Hearings on World Hunger and America's Food Policy (Dec. 1974); the House Foreign Affairs Committee Hearings on Jerusalem, and the Joint Congressional Hearings on the Helsinki Accords with regard to "Religious Liberty and Minority Rights in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe." He has lectured on moral issues before members of the Joint Chiefs of Staff of the Armed Forces, the U.S. Army, Navy Chaplain Corps, U.S. Marine Corps, and the Air Force Academy. He served on the 1980's Project on Human Rights of the Council on Foreign Relations, and as a

member of the steering committee of the American Revolutionary Bicentennial Committee's Citizen Dialogue. He also helped organize a congress of African leaders on "The Bible and Black Africa" in Jerusalem, and served as co-chairman with Prof. C. Eric Lincoln on the first national consultation on Black-Jewish Relations at Fisk University.

Rabbi Tanenbaum is the author and co-editor of "Speaking of God Today," "The Jerusalem Colloquium," "Our Moral Resources for International Cooperation" (in collaboration with Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr), "Religious Values in an Age of Violence," "Evangelicals and Jews in Conversation," "Scripture, Theology and History," "Greek Orthodox and Jewish Dialogue," "American Religious Values and the Future of America." His essay on the "Holy Year and Its Origins in the Jewish Jubilee Year," published by the Vatican Commission on the Holy Year in 1975 has appeared in French, Italian, Spanish, German, Dutch and Japanese. He is also the interreligious academic consultant to the New Media Bible.
