Please pick up your airline tickets at the airport. If there are any difficulties, please contact us immediately (315-781-2426). Transportation will be waiting for you at the airport.


We would also like to confirm our arrangements for an honorarium of \$800 for your participation in this symposium. We look forward to meeting you in the near future.

Dear Rabbi Tannenbaum:

During recent months many issues have filtered through the media that suggest a radical change in popular American thought. The dominant issue that manifests itself in nearly every aspect of today's society (politics, culture, religion, business) is undoubtedly the fundamental reevaluation of morality in our American democracy. Our objective is to create a forum wherein the principle components of this topic can be elucidated. This spring we will be conducting a symposium dealing with "Religion, Politics and the New American Morality."

It has been brought to our attention that you have contributed a great deal of thought, time and effort to this issue. Consequently, on behalf of a coalition of students and faculty who are working on the formation of this symposium, we would like to invite you to participate. We are hopeful that with a positive response from you we will be able to maintain the high caliber of our endeavor.

Our colleges are located in the picturesque Finger Lakes region of Upstate New York. We are situated 45 minutes from three major New York metropolitan areas (Ithaca, Rochester, Syracuse). In the past our symposia have drawn audiences from each of these areas. Consequently, we can assure you that the value of this symposium lies not only in the exposition of a serious issue, but also in the number of individuals that will be confronted with this topic. We believe, as we hope you do, that for true understanding of any contemporary issue, it is imperative that we go beyond the mass media and deal rigorously with the issue at hand. To do this our approach will be multifaceted, presenting both sides of the issue in a three-day series of lectures, leading to a panel discussion.

At the present time we have already had a very positive response from the faculty and administration of Hobart and William Smith Colleges. Although they will be giving us a great deal of support, we would like to emphasize

that this is a student initiated and administered function. Although at this time our financial standing is indeterminate, we can guarantee that airfare, accommodations and meals, plus a reasonable honorarium will be granted. We have tentatively scheduled the symposium for the final weekend in March, although it is very possible that this date may be changed to the second week in April. We would like to know your availability for either of these dates so we can finalize your particular role in this symposium.
