

Algerian Jews are threatened with the loss of their factories and rms in Algeria if they do not return there within one month of a sw decree to be published in the Algerian Official Gazette. Several ousand Jews are believed to be immediately involved and the value their property must run into many millions of pounds, though exact estimate is available.

The threat came this week in the form of an ultimatum from e Provisional Algerian Executive in Algiers, which announced at unless industrial plants, businesses and farms considered essential the national economy were put into working order by their owners ithin the next four weeks, then the authorities would themselves ke control.

M. Bolaid Abdesselam, a Member of the Executive, said that the Government did take control the rights of the property owners ould be respected. But the belief here is that this assurance is ducless and was given only to obtain the consent of the French

Kaufman and Seigal) would not take the case to the Lords.

Mr. Kaufman stated that once Dr. Soblen was deported to the United States there would be no petition to President Kennedy for the granting of a pardon, as was originally intended. He said: "Dr. Soblen is against such a petition, as this would imply in a sense an admission of world." sense an admission of guilt.

Dr. Soblen prepared the memorandum himself in Brixton Prison hospital (where he has been detained since the beginning of July), with the assistance of his British and American lawyers.

In it Dr. Soblen admits that his In it Dr. Soblen admits that his political opinions were Left-wing, but categorically denies that he ever engaged in espionage for Russia. He points out that although the alleged espionage offences related to the years 1944-45 they were brought before the courts some 16 years later.

Dr. Soblen, who is now 61 and suffering from leukemia, states that he escaped from the United States because he wanted to establish his innocence.

Will you please be good enough to let us know whether we can expect your attendance.



For some intuitive reason, I have a feeling that it has been en route from the United States from some time. If so, I apologise, because there has been some 'snafoo' in the transmission of mail from New York to Jerusalem.

I do not really know how to respond to your letter. It is obvious that you are motivated by deep idealism. On the other hand I am not clear as to whether you are saying that you want to move to Israel. These are two different considerations.

I think the most practical suggestion I can make is to refer you to Mr. Irving Bernstein at our national headquarters in New York:

Dear Rabbi Friedman:

For many, many months I have been stewing about the expenditures of the UJA with reference to its brochures, news releases, news letters and so forth. I assume that your reprints of news items and publicity letters, as well as reports, are being sent to the various chairmen of the UJA throughout the country and am wondering why. Representing the Appeal in the various localities throughout the country, I am sure we are all familiar with what is going on in Israel and believe we are all reasonably educated to the extent that we can follow the news as it comes out in the daily press. If you wish us to pass this information on to the general public, I am sure that the public also is educated to the extent that it too can follow the news in the morning or afternoon papers.

The Arab League has multimillions of dollars at its disposal and has used these funds over the years to buy support of the United Nations and to subsidize the press, not only of the rest of the world, but in particular the United States. The United Jewish Appeal and its affiliated organizations do not have this kind of money and should be more selective on how its funds are spent. The money that is wasted in trying to "educate" the UJA leaders of the country through volumnous press releases, letters and brochures can be better spent in the public relations field. Our funds should be used to buy off the prostitutes who sit in the United Nations and who control the press of this country. I realize that our organization does not have sufficient funds to take care of all the handouts necessary, but surely it can make some start to better our image with the world.

I have more than the usual interest in the existence of the State of Israel—I have a son who has been serving in the Israeli Army since

Dear Mr. Hunter:

I have read your letter of 8 January with sincere interest, and deeply appreciate both your motivation and viewpoint. Your comments written as the father of an Israeli soldier, have a very special significance; they represent to me the informed view of a man who has given not just of his time and money, but of the very essence of his being, to assure the survival of the Jewish homeland.

In the course of extensive travels over the years to garner increased support for the needs of the people of Israel, I have noted with dismay the widespread reliance on local media for news pertinent to our interests as Jews. I assume that as a resident of Olean you are aware that the small, local newspaper neither has the opportunity nor the inclination to provide in-depth coverage of events in the middle-east within the limited space allocated to international news.

Perhaps the most common plea I have heard among the leaders of the American-Jewish community has been for UJA to provide a continuing source of cogent information to motivate greater understanding of the needs of our people, and in turn to generate greater response to our annual campaign. To meet this demand, we began a modest communications program simed at bringing vital news, commentary and analysis to our key leadership.

The response to this initial program was overwhelming and the weekly circulation of our main news publication, the "FYI" has increased from 1400 just a few years ago to over 20,000 currently. The enclosed letter, received on the same day as yours and coincidentally, also from an attorney, is typical of the favorable responses we receive daily. Similar correspondence from Rabbis, educators and laymen throughout the country have been received in quantity, further attesting to the continuing need for informational services. Were it otherwise, the program would be ended without delay.

With regard to your comments on the Arab League's virulent propaganda campaign, it is perhaps extraneous to say that I share your disdain with vigor equal to your own. As an attorney you are no doubt aware that activities within this sphere by tax-exempt philanthropic organizations

Mr. Herry B. Hunter -2-15 January 1969 are limited by law. The UJA has in the past and will continue in the future to do everything possible to counteract the publication of misinformation within the prescribed legal limits. It is my sincere hope that this letter will serve to clarify the purpose and sims of our communications program. I do want to assure you that the expenditures involved are minimal when compared to the response they generate, and that the survival of the people of Israel is indeed in the forefront of our thoughts and actions.
