

I appreciate your letting me know of the availability of the complete set of Chagall windows. If I had the money I would buy it myself.


Should I hear of anyone who is interested in this I will, of course, let you know.



The award also includes a stipend of DM 3,000.- (\$ 750.-)



It is my pleasure to support the candidacy of Dr. Herman Weil for the 1964 Leo Baeck Award which is given by the Zentralrat.

I am able to write this letter of recommendation, not in the usual perfunctory way in which such letters are written, but from the deepest personal knowledge and professional association with Dr. Weil. This occurred during the years when I was the Rabbi of Congregation B'nai Jeshurun in Milwaukee and he served as the director of our religious school. It was a very large school with more than 1000 students and a faculty of 45 teachers. He was the director of the complete operation, responsible directly to me. Through the course of these years of close cooperation, I could see the depth of his Jewish feeling, the strength of his own Jewish background, which enabled him to be not simply an administrator but also an inspiring teacher, and the general devotion which he gave to the youth whose minds and spirits he was attempting to influence. As I think back on it now, I realize more and more how invaluable he was.

There was another thing about him which impressed me -- namely, the number of hours he was willing to work each day. After all, being the director of our school was not his main occupation. He had a full time academic position with the University. His position with us was supposed to be part time. 


Dear Herb:

My dear Herb,

I was away in Israel for nearly a month and upon my return I found your two communications. One, the announcement of the happy event of the birth of your son:

מיטב ברכות ואחולים מקרב לב להולדת הבן.
תזכר לגדלו לתורה לחופה ולמעשים טובים.

Please give my greetings and best wishes also to your wife.

Secondly, I found your letter of 1st April, concerning your brother-in-law. I have been thinking over all the possibilities and I discussed it also with our Aliyah people and I must confess that the solution is not an easy one. If we would still live in the exciting times of Aliyah "B", it would be easy, but today everything is 'departmentalised'; there are shlichim and local staff and bureaucracy, and organisational framework; and then there is of course outside criticism, claiming we have too many shlichim and too big a staff, and so on and so on. This is one aspect.

Apart from all this, there is another problem: You mention, and rightly so, the possibilities of the three immigrant centres of Marseilles, Vienna and Naples. Marseilles is on the downgrade as far as movement is concerned and there we are seriously contemplating reducing our staff. The influx from the east comes through Vienna, Naples and Athens. During the last few weeks, Vienna was slack and most of the flow came through Naples. So consequently, Naples would be the only place that could eventually be contemplated. But we don't have a camp in Naples; the people are being housed in different hotels.

Then we come up against the language question, which you can visualise. The official language is of course Italian and the language spoken by the immigrants themselves is Yiddish, if not Rumanian, Hungarian or Polish. That is why we have in all of the three transit points mentioned, shlichim speaking these languages. A further language barrier is the fact that the whole internal administration and correspondence of our offices is carried out in Hebrew.

After having explained to you all this, I think you will be able to give yourself the answer. I could, of course, have made it easier for myself, saying: "Let him come and we shall see what we can do for him and with him", but I think that would have been inconsiderate, because he could become disappointed and unhappy.

17th April, 1964.

Nevertheless, as I shall be in Paris in a few days' time, where on the occasion of the presence of Mr. Shragai, we shall have discussions of several aspects of the work in Europe, I shall take up this question again, and maybe somebody cleverer than I will come up with a constructive idea.



AMERICAN JEWISH

Although I realize that you are still in the midst of a very important campaign, I am going to take advantage of an offer you made to me last November with the hope that you can oblige whenever you find the time to fill my request. I had mentioned to you that my wife and I, and a very good friend and his wife, from Philadelphia, are planning a trip to Africa, probably in January and part of February next year. These are the same two people with whom we spent a month in India in 1962 and had a most interesting experience.

You had suggested that if we really wanted to see Africa that one of the avenues of approach might be through contacting some of the Israelies who have been invited to a number of African countries to lend assistance and technical aid in a variety of ways. I would agree that talking with some of these people might give us a most interesting insight into the life and times of current Africa.

Our trip will probably be four weeks minimum and six weeks maximum and, although this is not a very long period of time, perhaps we can do in Africa what we did in India, which was to get a broad view of the country without scratching too much beneath the surface in any one spot.

I may have mentioned to you that our traveling companions are Quakers with the man, Tom Harvey, being a Director of the American Friends Service Committee. I would imagine we would be visiting some of the Service Committee projects in Africa.

We will be talking to various people in Cincinnati who have made trips to Africa and try to get some idea of those things that we should see that have proven of interest to traditional travelers. We found in India that it was not so much what we saw compared with the people with whom we spoke, and I rather imagine that the same will be true even more so in Africa. Therefore, we certainly are interested in having as many good contacts as we can, even though we may not be able to see each of them.

In Africa, unlike India, there is an opportunity to visit animal preserves as well as a number of spots with scenic beauty. Right now we are just beginning to work out an itinerary which will depend upon what there is to see in certain spots and, just as important, with whom there is to talk at these same spots or others.


While it is not fair to look upon you as a travel agency, perhaps you will find it interesting to help us plan our trip and at a somewhat later date make certain contacts which would make that trip much more interesting.

With this brief introduction, please drop me a very short note, when it is convenient, indicating the way that we should proceed in planning this trip. If this is an unfair request, then perhaps you will substitute one which makes more sense. I plan to be in New York from time to time to make arrangements to visit with you and, in the meantime, I would be glad to discuss our problems with you over the telephone so that whatever course of action we plan makes the most sense. At this point, let's neither of us get too involved with my problem, until we both understand the best way to attack it.

The Welfare Fund has been a challenge for us here in Cincinnati and, as of the moment, I think we are moving ahead somewhere between eight and ten percent over last year. If it keeps up this way until the end, which is not too far away, I will be satisfied in the main. With reference to our phone conversation I wrote at once to the City Police of Fuerstenfeld. Two days ago an official of the Town Hall of Fuerstenfeld came to our office and told me, that Anthony C. Lenz actually lives in Fuerstenfeld, Hamerlinggasse 2. He is a highschool-pupil of not quite 16 years of age, son of very honorable and respected residents of Fuerstenfeld. His father is an official of the Catholic Party, and of the borough council of Fuerstenfeld. The son was at once interrogated by the police, admitted to having written the letter and to having forged the 10 other signatures in the letter himself. The father was so shocked by his son's deed that he thought of committing suicide, the family is strictly catholic, the father is a St. George's scout, and has been a delegate of a large-scale Scout Meeting in New York some years ago. The letter written by Anthony Lenz is said to be nothing but boyish mischief, and the public authorities beg you to take no further steps. The boy was punished by the City Police of Fuerstenfeld by being forbidden to leave his home.

I would be grateful if you could send us a photocopy of the letter written by Anthony, the Community Fuerstenfeld asked us for it.






Dear Herb:

I have your letter of 30 November regarding Harold Stern.

It is absolutely incorrect for him to allege that I refused to come to see him. His wife called me, explained that he was in the hospital, and asked if I would come to visit him.

As I recall it, this occurred at the height of the spring campaign when I was travelling frantically all over the country and was out of New York much more often than I was in it. I talked to her several times on the telephone indicating to her my desire to come down to see him, but was unable to fit it in due to the fact that I was almost never in New York. As I recall it, I spoke with her on the telephone at least three times.

I am sorry that I did not get to see him. I wanted to, and it would have been the normal courtesy, as well as an act of friendship to an old parishioner. It does not seem to me, however, that he has any moral right whatsoever to refuse to undertake his Jewish responsibility to the Welfare Fund because of some imagined failure of performance on my part. If he was so eager to see a rabbi at a time of stress, then he should be equally eager to support the Jewish community in its time of need.


I am sure you will receive official thanks for your being with us at the JWB-UJA dinner, but I did want to write you a personal note.
