Dear Sidney:

I have just received your letter of 19 January and look forward to seeing you when you arrive in New York to start your speaking tour at the end of next month.

Between now and then, however, I think there are a few things you could do with regard to your "relocation problem." I do not know whether you are interested in a position as Executive Director of a community, but a game of musical chairs is about to open up, because jobs are now available in Chicago, Baltimore and St. Paul. As these jobs are filled other jobs open up, and executives move around from city to city in this game, which I call musical chairs. It would seem to me that the best thing for you to do would be to throw your hat in the ring immediately with Phil Bernstein of the CJFWF. The communities go to the Council for recommendations for candidates and if the Gouncil knows that you are available and wish to be recommended, I am sure they would cooperate. For instance, I have heard, although I do not know this personally for a fact because I have not spoken to him, that Jimmy Rice was interested in the Chicago job and was recommended by the Council for it. He is not the only candidate, of course.

I would suggest that you write immediately to Philip Bernstein, Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, 729 Seventh Avenue, New York, 19, N.Y., send him your curriculm vitae, and let him put you on their list. Also, if you wish, I will talk to Phil personally and tell him what I know about you and give him a very strong push to recommend you for any of the openings. Let me know if you want me to do this and I will be happy to speak to him immediately upon hearing from you.

Dear Rabbi and Mrs. Friedman,

The construction of our new Israel Museum here in Jerusalem is in its final stages and we have set the date for a gala opening. May I suggest that you put Tuesday, May 11, 1965 on your calendar, and consider this a preliminary invitation.

As Israel's 17th Independence Day falls a few days earlier - May 6th - you might plan your visit to include both events.

The Museum site is already one of the beauty spots of the capital with its pavilions clinging to the hillside. They blend well with the structures of the University to the west and the new Knesset building to the immediate north. At the foot of the Museum hill lies the ancient Valley of the Cross with its magnificent Byzantine and Crusader Monastery. Recently, it has been decided to convert this valley into a National Park, appropriately landscaped, to add enchantment to the Museum setting.

A cluster of wooded embankments, retained by revetments of huge boulders, has taken shape as the Billy Rose Art Garden. In conceiving this scenic layout for the great sculpture collection we have been given, Isamu Noguchi may well have produced his most imaginative artistic creation.

For the inauguration of the Museum, buildings and settings are themselves the principal exhibit. Yet we have decided to mark the event with a special exhibition befitting the opening of a great new museum in Jerusalem - a display of "Works of Faith" inspired by the Bible. The central feature will be a collection of some seventy artistic treasures on the theme of the Old Testament loaned to us by noted museums and private collectors from the United States, Canada, Britain, France, Belgium, Holland, Austria, Germany, and Italy. We shall also be showing a collection of fifty Rembrandt drawings and prints of Old Testament subjects, and a joint Marc Chagall-Jaques Lipchitz exhibition on the same theme.

On exhibition in the Samuel Bronfman Biblical and Archaeological Museum will be the most dramatic of the finds from the latest excavations in the country. The Shrine of the Book will show the seven Dead Sea Scrolls as well as the scroll discoveries from recent archaeological expeditions.

We are planning a number of events for our distinguished guests, in addition to the inaugural ceremonies beginning on the night of May 10th and continuing on the 11th and 12th. It would help us greatly if we knew how many will be accompanying you so that we may send you the requisite invitations.

We have appointed Travex Ltd., Jerusalem, as our official travel agents and have asked them to contact you regarding any assistance you may require with hotel and other arrangements.

We look forward to welcoming you here in May.

Dear Friend, Dr. Herbert Friedman, and your dear wife -- may you be well!

A few months ago I happened to visit Chayim Vinitzky and he told me that he is traveling to Europe to see you. I just couldn't manage then, standing on one foot, to write you a few words. Writing is a God-given thing, not always can one say, especially in brief, what the heart dictates. This only great poets can do in their most fortunate moments. But I had with me a small gift, which I had made for my daughter, and I sent it for the dear young woman (or wife?), who had greeted me with a flow of warmth when I came to the King David Hotel -- I still feel the warmth of this meeting to this day. The gift itself is of no real value, but I knitted it with deep affection for the one who would wear it and wove into it all motherly blessings. And this I sent instead of a letter.

Chayim Vinitzky said that you will be in Israel in the spring. Don't forget, I ask of you, to please visit Lachish. Today you have here many good friends, besides me, whom you know from my book, and Lachish is planning a celebration of its 10th anniversary. About my Spanish book, there was a big article by Yakov Glantz in "Der Veg" of January 23, 1965. To this day I get many letters from readers, not only from Jews. Only a week ago I unexpectedly received a letter from Dr. Israel Goldstein, whom I happened not to have sent a book. But you, dear Dr. Friedman, have been the true godfather of my simple book. And like a godfather who blesses "Lemaasim tovim" (for good deeds), I hope that the book will arouse good sentiments and concurrence with the great historic event, the rebirth of Israel.

We are approaching great holidays: Purim and Pesach. I wish that you spend them in peace, and hope to see you both with us. A hearty greeting from my husband.

All that happened a long time ago: before my administrative assignments, my writings which became books and pamphlets, my numbrous speaking engagements and just contacts with Jews and non-Jews in all stations. I could do a good job for almost any Jewish agencey.

You have many contacts with Jewish organizations. Your recommendation would count heavily with them.I, on the other hand, have really been out of touch with the figures who make important decisions in the Jewish community. If you could be helpful, you will be glad you did. Best wishes for a happy Passover.

Dear Phil:

In answer to your several letters, let me take up the items seriatim:

(1) Herman Cohn - I really have no idea what to suggest for his \$5000. I do not know anything about the Ruppin Institute. Perhaps you should write to Michael Arnon, the new Consul General in New York, who was formerly Ambassador to Ghana and who might have some suggestion for Mr. Cohn.

(2) I received the article you wrote about Sharatt and it was very interesting, warm and sentimental. I want you to know that we are going to build a tremendous school in his name, high on a hill in Upper Nazareth. I selected that location because, somehow, he seemed to have an interest in and understanding for the Arab mentality as well as the Christian. While the school at Nazareth will obviously be primarily for Jewish children, nevertheless, as the years go on, it is equally obvious that Arab and Christian children from the lower town will find their way to the high school in the upper town. I am not taking the time to develop this theme, and as I have stated it, it may sound rather crude, but I think you have a glimmering of what I am driving at. We have already found three people who are willing to contribute \$100,000 each in Sharett's memory because of the feeling they had for him.

I know how you felt about him, and if there is anyone you can think of who should be approached for this project, I would love to hear about it now. We are working on this currently and would like to complete it fast.

(3) With regard to the stones, I had a long talk with Avraham Biran, the head of the Department of Antiquities in Israel, without whose permission nothing from Caesarea can be touched. He is very reluctant to grant permission for a Roman column or capital to leave the country. I pressed hard and he is thinking about it. Let's see what happens.

With regard to large stones from Jerusalern or the Dead Sea or King Solomon's Mines, there is really no problem. It is simply a technical one of finding a company with heavy equipment to handle packing and shipping. I am having some inquiries made as to what this might cost and as soon as I hear, I will let you know. I am making my inquiries on the basis of pieces 2 metres square, wide and high. Were you thinking of something larger than this?

(4) The article for the Zeitschrift is almot finished. Frankly, it was rough going. I had to extract myself from current preoccupations and bring back to mind the fabulous years of 1946-47. But, once I started the article, I enjoyed writing it. The more so, because the time we spent in Europe were the best years of our lives. The article gave me an opportunity to say coherently what I think of you personally and of the role you played in the unique period of our history.

Thanks very much for your letter of the 6th and all the interesting and helpful items contained in it. Let me respond seriatim:

It appears that the Director General of the Department of Agriculture in Israel is a chap who worked on Herman's farm when he was doing some studying at Cornell. Herman got to know him quite well and liked him very much, and has heard from him. He will undoubtedly be able to exercise considerable influence with him when the Cohns are in Israel. I will let you know more about their plans when I get back after Labor Day. Dear Charles Jordan,

All my best wishes for a happy new year. I am sure it will be full of problems for you and for Joint, but I hope it will also be a year of pleasure and satisfaction and success for your work.

You remember the visit we made together to Professor Folke Lindberg in Stockholm asking him to find one of his students willing to write about the Swedish help work for nazi victims.

To day I got a telephone call from Mrs Ann Louise Zetterberg in Stockholm. She is the wife of Pastor Primarius Zetterberg in Stockholm, not young but now making advanced studies in history at the University. She was advised to contact me by a collegue of professor Lindberg, professor Westin, with whom she studies and who had been asked by Lindberg to recommend a suitable person.

Her husband has a high position in the Swedish clergy, both are very interested in jewish matters. I have met them at the Israel Embassy. She will write a thesis for what we call the licentiat (N.A.), and she was extremely interested in the subject of Swedish humanitarian work during the nazi time. I think she has good qualifications for this task.

She asked me about more details. I don't remember however all what we said to professor Lindberg. I would therefor appreciate very much to get some informations which I could forward to her.

What is the subject of the publication ? The Swedish humanitarian help to Nazi victims ? The Bernadotte action, the Unrra action, the Norwegian and Danish refugees, the Hungarians ? Should it be only the jewish victims or should it be - which I would think the best - the general help given by Sweden, in which the jewish question is a part. The Swedish immigration policy ?

Where should the book be published ? What would be the salary to the author ? When must it be ready ?

I am sorry to trouble you with all these questions, but I want of course to give Mrs. Zetterberg all informations possible. She is now going to Israel with a group of theological people and will be back in the middle of October. I have asked her to contact Mrs Lena Yahil in Jerusalem.

Dear Charlie:

I have read and re-read your letter of 7 October concerning Norway and Sweden, and must confess a certain amount of confusion.

When we spoke in Copenhagen, and you suggested that perhaps you would look into the question of whether the Norwegians and the Swedes had not also done something outstanding for Jewish survival, I had no idea that you were talking about entering into any full scale research projects. I thought you simply meant that you would investigate, in quite personal terms, by having conversations with various people, what the background story might be.

As for full scale research involving a book, a salary, and all the subsequent problems of publishing and selling, I had nothing of the sort in mind and I think this has been carried far beyond our simple Copenhagen conversation.

Isn't fundamental research of this sort more in the interests of the World Jewish Congress or the American Jewish Committee? I certainly do not want to embarrass you, but it does seem to me that this is not a matter on which I can spend UJA money.

We can talk about this some more in person when we next see each other.

When you told us at the last meeting of the publicity group that you were considering a full hour tour of Israel by an important star under the direction of Carl Foreman. I was concerned because it sounded as if it was already a fait accompli. My concern is with several aspects of such a tv show - most importantly with the fact that it would hardly be a new show or one which had not already been played and played by the stations over the country. I list here several such shows which were made, with better or worse production and direction: A half hour by Bonds for Israel starring Edw. G. Robinson and written and directed by Leon Uris (at the time "Exodus" was a number one best seller).

A half hour starring Frank Sinatra touring Israel under the sponsorship of the Histadruth - Sinatra sand and narrated in this film. The production was a Hollywood unit he carried with him for just such a job.

An hour titled "THE PEOPLE OF THE BOOK" produced under the joint sponsorship of NBC and the Jewish Theological **Semimory**. I saw this film and the one which follows and it was excellent - Don't forget that it was NBC that did the film on the Kremlin and on the Louvre .. They do these things well.

A second hour to follow the previous one mentioned: "THE LAND OF THE BOOK". Together these two hours were the most comprehensive and entertaining hours about Israel to date. What was important, because NBC made them, was that they got <u>network</u> exposure - something we can never hope for. The networks will not take an outside package for national showing - it can only get exposure on a local basis.

The Jewish National Fund has made some seven or eight films, in color, which are splendid tours of different areas - if these were strung together they'd make as good an hour as anything someone else might attempt. HIMAN BROWN

The Israel Tourist Bureau has also made several films of high quality showing Israel, the people and the institutions.

I realize that what you mentioned might be different because of the star's personality and because of Carl Foreman. I want you to know that over the years I have never had any luck with so-called name writers or producers because they come to their Jewishness as "Johnny-come-latelys" .. what will beem fresh and new to a man like Foreman will be old hat to those of us who have been at since 1940. I also seriously doubt that a man like Foreman can produce anything under \$100,000 .. This is not only out of the question in my world but hardly in the UJA budget (this I will submit to the committee). Such an hour should come in considerably under \$50,000 and even then I feel it is an exhorbitant sum to spend for just a kind of traveloque.

Regardless of how you felt about "Memo To Parebts" my experience has proven that only by relating to people can we achieve any solid identification with the audiences we are trying to move. I have done my own checking on the effect of "Memo" and I know that it made a tremendous impact on the lay audiences. The people to whom UJA gives help, hope and money are the ones we should direct our film efforts to-with stars or without stars.

Remember that Sophia Loren's tour of Rome or Liz Taylor's tour of London were very special - I need not go into the use of a single city versus the use of a country or the fact that both were born in the areas they described - or the costs involved.

I feel that the TV effort needs a great deal more thought - which, hopefully, we will give it at our committee deliberations.

I have your letter regarding the Israel Bond chairmanship. I think it is an honor and I do agree with the viewpoint that your taking it would be to the benefit of the UJA. It will project you throughout the community with an even larger image. You must sumply make certain that in all biographical releases about you, your UJA connection and titles are spelled out very prominently.

My only feeling in the matter is that if you have a choice, let Mitchell take it first, and you take it the year after. My reason for saying that is that if you follow Mitchell, you would not lay yourself open to the accusation of being only a red hot, pro-Israel zealot (which nobody would accuse Mitchell of being) and therefore if you took it after him, you would simply be following in the line of good community leadership responsibility.

On the other hand, perhaps that is not too important, because Carter is also an all-around community leader.

As you can see, I do not have passionately strong feelings one way or the other. I think it would be good for the UJA if you took it and while it might be better if you took it a year from now, perhaps it is just as well for you to make any deal with Mitchell that you and he are both comfortable with.
