With regard to the Cabinet meeting scheduled for 11 A.M. on December 11th at the Statler-Hilton Notel in New York, I am enclosing herewith a copy of the agends which we have prepared.

Items 1, 2 and 3 on the Campaign, Cash and Loan Reports are self-explanatory and each report will only take two or three minutes.

Item 0 4 - Campaign Problems - will only be brought up in the event that there are problems. If the problems we foresee at the present time, such as our participation in the campaigns in Baltimore and Boston, are solved before the Cabinet meeting then it may be a very good idea to have Morris Berinstein tell the members of the Cabinet about these problems and how they were solved and also to point out that there are a number of other communities where there may very well be problems in the coming weeks and therefore it will be necessary for the members of the Cabinet to do a great deal of work in connection with pre-campaign budgeting and other meetings.

We will want Neverhoff, at the end, to call on the members of the Cabinet to give very careful consideration to the reports and to the Resolution that is going to come up the following day before the Conference because gifts will have to be announced at the Conference or immediately thereafter.

I am sure that we will have a chance to discuss this agenda and other related items before the Conference Session so that any changes you think ought to be made can be made.

SENT TO CABINET MEMBERS

The UJA Cabinet meeting on Thursday, December 11th, which was extremely well attended, addressed itself vigorously to the doubly significant task of reviewing the 1958 campaign and projecting the campaign for 1959. I feel every Cabinet member, whether or not he was there, will welcome having a summary of what took place.

Sol Luckman reported it was estimated that the 1958 UJA campaign raised about \$51,000,000 in the regular campaign as compared with \$54,000,000 in 1957, and \$15,000,000 through the special fund as compared to \$25,000,000 last year. Sol expressed the hope that 1959, with the recession cloud removed, would bring back to the UJA all the losses it took in 1958 and much more. He also pointed out -- and this created quite a stir -- that while communities have raised approximately two percent less in the regular campaign, the allotments to the UJA were six percent less.

In regard to collections, Sam Daroff said it is hoped we will realize a minimum of \$58,000,000 in cash this year. He called attention to the disturbing fact that even if this sum is reached we will still have accounts receivable of \$37,000,000 from the 1957 and 1958 campaigns plus about \$2,000,000 from all previous years campaigns. He urged everyone to start a very intensive collection campaign in his community to liquidate a really substantial amount of the cash outstanding quickly before 1959 pledges are received.

Through the Loan Project, Al Levin reported, a total of \$35,900,000 has been received to date from 74 communities, and an additional amount is anticipated shortly which will bring the grand total to at least \$37,375,000.

The observations of the Fifth UJA Study Mission to Europe and Israel, and all it noted must be done, were presented by Dave Lowenthal, Max Fisher and Joe Meyerhoff. Dave stressed the excitement even for a frequent visitor to Israel of that country's vast achievements. With our help, he indicated, Israel can be depended upon to continue successfully her remarkable struggle for growth -- and the inspiring spectacle of this should and must evoke a special response now from young leaders as well as the veterans in our cause. Max noted bluntly we've poured a lot of money into Israel, but Israel has an awful lot to show us for it. Yet terrible needs remain -- such as are represented by the 22,000 families still living in miserable maabarot, inadequately stocked farm villages for immigrants, the talents of hundreds of highly qualified professional men from Eastern Europe not yet fully tapped, immigrant children being deprived of urgently needed education and training because of insufficient funds, and much more. A great deal has been accomplished in Israel but the obviously practical thing, Max concluded, is to protect the big investment we have made by assuring the 1959 campaign raises a really substantial sum.

Joe Meyerhoff summed up the reasons for the resolution of the Mission which, based on the needs abroad, called for a special fund in 1959 and a fair consideration of overseas' requirements in Welfare Fund allocations. In addition to the problems cited by Dave and Max, he pointed out that another challenge presents itself in the form of a new wave of immigration from Eastern Europe. Joe called on every Cabinet member to support the resolution by announcing an increased gift for 1959.

The military security of Israel is of course the financial responsibility of Israel alone, but it certainly is of great though indirect concern to us. Israel's security situation could hardly have been presented more authoritatively than it was at the Cabinet meeting by Shimon Peres, Director-General of Israel's Ministry of Defense. Much of what he told us was confidential, but he did make two particularly important general points. One was that Israel has now become a positive factor in the view of the major free world powers rather than a "problem", and her judgments are coming to be regarded with respectful consideration. Partly as a result of this, Israel now for the first time has more political opportunity to buy arms so vitally needed for her security than she has financial means to do so.

I believe that virtually everyone present got up to speak at least once at this point in the meeting to acknowledge that more money just had to be raised in 1959, and it was unanimously resolved that a special fund had to be one of the means for bringing this about. I'm sure that Morris Berinstein expressed the consensus of the meeting when he stated that the adoption of a special fund for 1959 was just a first step, and to make it mean something the UJA National leaders had to set an example in giving that would inspire their communities and their fellow-leaders to follow suit. In addition, it was vital that we see to it that our community Welfare Funds allocate a really fair share of contributions to the UJA for overseas' needs.

A special fund was adopted by the amplified group at the Conference on Friday as a major fund-raising tool for the 1959 campaign. Its effective implementation, and the urgently required general success of the 1959 campaign, now are up to us.



The 21st Annual Conference of the United Jewish Appeal will be held at the Statler Hotel in New York City on December 12th, 13th and 14th.

This Conference, as all previous Conferences, will be an inspiring event. It cannot fall short of this mark because in the true sense, the Annual Conference of the UJA represents the voice of American Jewry on the issue of help to fellow Jews in need. And that voice, to the everlasting credit of the American Jewish community, has been wonderfully eloquent.

The most important function of the Conference will be to determine the type of campaign the UJA should conduct in 1959. This decision will have to be made in the light of what our three-fold objectives for the coming year must be: (1) to supply long overdue housing to about 100,000 Jews in Israel who have been living under unspeakable conditions in maabaroth and other sub-standard dwellings; (2) to meet the unmet needs of tens of thousands of newcomers in Israel who require a minimum of livestock, tools and equipment to put them on the road to self-sufficiency; and (3) to provide for the absorption of the thousands of immigrants who have been streaming out of Poland, North Africa and Iran and of the new wave of immigrants who several months ago started coming out of Rumania. At this point, we cannot chart the course of the migration from Rumania but as long as the doors of Rumania remain open, we have the responsibility -- more accurately, the opportunity -- to rescue another segment of European Jewry for a life of freedom and dignity.

I should point out to you that on September 8th the officers and Campaign Cabinet of the UJA met and expressed the view that because of the great needs, coupled with the fact that Israel could not be expected to contribute financially to the absorption program, at a time when she needs every cent of her own resources to strengthen her defenses, a special UJA fund for 1959 was imperative. The Cabinet asked the Fifth UJA Study Mission, which is leaving for Europe and Israel on October 29th, to survey the situation and bring back its findings to the Conference. Ultimately, it will be up to the Conference to decide for the entire American Jewish community whether a special UJA fund for 1959 should be launched.

Within the Conference proper the major decisions are made by the Steering Committee. The decisions of this Committee will command the respect of the American Jewish community and, as such, will be implemented only if the Committee is fully representative of the individual communities throughout the country. For that reason, it is imperative that your community be well represented on this Committee.

Representation on the Steering Committee is according to the following formula:

If your community has a Jewish population up to 15,000, you may designate one delegate and one alternate to represent it on the Steering Committee.

If your Jewish population is from 15,000 to 40,000 your community is entitled to two delegates and two alternates -- while those with Jewish populations in excess of 40,000 are entitled to three delegates and three alternates.

These, together with 15 delegates from the Greater New York areas, 12 delegates representing the 8 regions of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, 25 delegates representing the country at large, and the national officers of the UJA constitute the Conference Steering Committee.

Please act at once to designate your delegates and alternates. As soon as you notify us of their names, we shall send them their credentials as Steering Committee members.



"TO COMMUNITIES NOT ASSIGNED QUOTAS"

November 3, 1958

On September 12th, our General Chairman, Morris W. Berinstein, wrote you about the great need for cash and asked you to make the maximum effort to help the UJA reach a goal of \$40,000,000 by the time our Annual UJA Conference convenes.

If anything, since Mr. Berinstein wrote you, the situation has become more critical. Added to all the burdens which Mr. Berinstein described -- the reception of the steady stream of new immigrants and the absorption of tens of thousands who still lack housing and other things to make them self-sustaining -- we now have to cope with a completely unanticipated wave of immigration from Rumania. This country, which had not permitted any emigration since 1952, suddely opened its doors and in September alone permitted 2000 Jews to leave. We do not know how long this migration will continue. All we know is that it is now in full swing and that we would never forgive ourselves if any Jew were left behind because of the lack of funds.

For reasons that have baffled us, the remittances to the UJA have been slower than conditions warrant. We consider it most unfortunate that this should happen at a time when the need for cash is the greatest. We cannot afford to ignore the pleas of the Jewish Agency and the JDC for cash to carry on their work in Israel and elsewhere. And, in my judgment, the American Jewish communities cannot afford to enter another year with substantial portions of 1958 pledges uncollected.

The Annual Conference of the UJA will be held at the Statler Hotel in New York City on December 12th, 13th and 14th. This Conference will serve as a great inspiration to all of us and will have practical meaning to our fellow Jews who need our help <u>NOW</u> only if we can announce that we have met and, if possible, exceeded our \$40,000,000 cash goal.

I appeal to you to make every effort between now and the time the Conference convenes to raise as much cash as possible and to remit these sums to us at once.

SUBJECT: \$40,000,000 Cash Drive

The drive to reach a goal of \$40,000,000 cash by the time of our Annual National Conference is now under way. Attached you will find copies of letters which went out on November 3 over the signature of Mr. Samuel H. Daroff, National Cash Chairman, to communities which have been given quotas and to those which have not been given quotas. A list of the assigned quotas is also attached.

Where you have communities which have been assigned quotas please arrange for the acceptance of these quotas immediately. Where no quotas have been assigned your objective should be to get as much cash as possible or, if you feel that it will be helpful, please assign your own quota.

We have barely five weeks left in which to attain our goal. From this point on we must take every possible step to organize an intensive drive for each in every community, large and small. Every possible means should be utilized - organize special cash committees with cash chairmen, set up telephone squads, get out special mailings for cash; in other words try to utilize every means available to stimulate the flow of cash immediately.



I am writing because I know you will want to have some details about the UJA Annual National Conference. It was really a most successful meeting. Not only was the attendance excellent in terms of the numbers involved but the large number of important leaders from all over the country who came to this conference helped make it a success. The pledges of gifts which were made at the Friday afternoon session, many of them representing sizeable increases, were particularly heartening.

We had a Cabinet meeting on Thursday which was attended by some 65 of the top leaders in the country. This was really one of the most successful Cabinet meetings ever held. Here the groundwork for passing the Special Fund resolution was prepared. The session on Friday was devoted to emphasizing the need for a Special Fund in 1959 and during the morning there were addresses by William Rosenwald, Dov Joseph, Senator Herbert Lehman and Morris Berinstein and Herbert Friedman. Dr. Joseph delivered the substantive address of the day on the needs in Israel. During luncheon an important Resolutions Committee met but before the Resolutions Committee adopted a resolution, each of the people there declared the gifts they would make in 1959 in support of it. That afternoon the delegates on the floor had an opportunity to discuss the resolution and to announce their own gifts in support of it.

On Saturday afternoon there was a meeting at which the needs of the JDC were presented. The Saturday night banquet session was attended by about 1,200 people who heard Shimon Peres and Senator Jacob Javits as well as Herbert Friedman. Mr. Warburg and Morris Berinstein also spoke. It was really a brilliant evening. At the concluding session on Sunday morning -- and I was surprised to find some 500 people in the Conference Room at ten o'clock in the morning -- the resolution calling for the Special Fund in 1959 was unanimously adopted. Enclosed herewith, for your information, is a copy of the resolution that was adopted.

I think you should know that all of us here are quite pleased with what happened this weekend. Everyone who attended the Conference came away in very high spirits and there is a mood of optimism with regard to the campaign in 1959.

We have all been terribly busy picking up loose ends after the conference and it is therefore only now that I have an opportunity to let you know what happened.

The conference was really one of the most successful we have ever held in terms of attendance. There were more people present and there were better people present than I have ever seen at a UJA conference. I don't know what the reason for this is except that a certain mood of optimism was apparent with regard to the 1959 campaigns and this may have brought a lot of people out. In addition to that, of course, we have been pounding at the leadership throughout the country regarding the needs in Israel, emigration from Rumania and the importance of a special fund for 1959, and this may have had something to do with bringing them to New York. On the other hand, however, I seem to recall that we pounded the leadership for attendance every year. Be that as it may, the fact is that we had a fine group of people at the Statler.

The Cabinet meeting was held on Thursday and was attended by some 65 of the top leaders in the country. Here, once again, we prepared the groundwork for passing the special fund resolution. We had reports on the Study Mission by Dave Lowenthal, Max Fisher and Joe Meyerhoff, and then Shimon Peres spoke on the security situation in Israel.

The session on Friday was, as always, the most important session of the conference because here we presented the whole basis for having a special fund in 1959, passed the resolution and obtained gifts. Bill Rosenwald, Senator Lehman and Herb Friedman spoke Eriday morning. Dow Joseph presented the one substantive address and really spelled out why additional funds are needed. At the meeting of the Resolutions Committee at lunch a lot of gifts were announced and during the afternoon session more gifts were announced from the floor. These announcements ran all the way from Sam Rubin's increase to \$350,000 and Joe Meyerhoff's increase to \$75,000, through smaller ones down to 4 and \$5,000. Dewey Stone repeated his gift of \$150,000 and Robert Schiff announced \$200,000 and there were a number of others that were very heartening.



An unprecedented number of well over one thousand leaders from Jewish communities throughout the United States turned out for the 21st Annual Conference of the United Jewish Appeal this past weekend. This was a remarkable demonstration of widespread dedication to the great tasks which the UJA must carry out. These leaders further demonstrated their understanding and devotion by passing unanimously the enclosed resolution in response to the terribly urgent needs which were discussed at the Conference

In addition to others, the resolution in brief makes the following three main points:

- 1. That a UJA Special Fund campaign be conducted by American Jewish communities in 1959 to raise a sum of \$100,000,000 beyond that raised in the regular campaign.
- 2. That community campaigns should be started as early and energetically as possible to assure that maximum sums are raised in the regular campaign and for the Special Fund.
- That the leaders of each community meet with UJA in order to arrange that it will receive a fair and equitable share of the proceeds of the 1959 regular campaign.

Because the needs we face are so pressing, and the mandate from the great assembly of the leaders at the Conference is so very strong, we know you will agree that action to implement #7 of the resolution must be taken at the earliest possible moment. I believe the natural first step would be a meeting of your community's appropriately authorized leaders to which the UJA could send representatives to work out such matters as a mutually satisfactory pre-campaign budgeting arrangement for regular campaign proceeds. I would warmly welcome hearing from you soon about a date for such a meeting. Certainly you will recognize with me the necessity for taking this step quickly as a start toward meeting the needs which were considered in detail at the Conference.

With reference to the implementation of #4 of the resolution, the UJA is asking each community to accept for the coming year the same goal as in 1958 as its participation in the \$100,000,000 Special Fund and to implement the other sections of the resolution in the manner and form stated.

From Dr. Dov Joseph, Treasurer of the Jewish Agency, from Senator Herbert H. Lehman, from the Honorable Shimon Peres, Director-General of Israel's Ministry of Defense, from the heads of the Joint Distribution Committee, and many others, the assembled leaders heard about the tremendous scope of the UJA's present responsibilities. They include the tens of thousands of Jews who will be coming to Israel in 1959 principally from Eastern Europe, the several hundred thousand who have not yet been helped to take root fully in Israel partly because of the vast competing cost for the Israel Government of military security requirements, and the JDC programs to alleviate distress among Jews in countries around the world.

In view of all this, I could not appreciate anything more than I would your advising me of the date of your meeting just as soon as you conveniently can. At the same time I want to assure you, on behalf of the UJA, that we shall do everything within our power to assist you with your campaign and help make it as outstandingly successful as it must be next year.

The following points were made by various people sttending the meeting:

 The Friday afternoon session could have been much more interesting if the chairman had called on more people to announce stimulating gifts.

2) - Great care should be taken to see to it that the Friday session does not in the future degenerate into a straight fund-raising meeting. It should not be forgotten that this is a national annual conference of the United Jewish Appeal at which the tone for the entire campaign must be set and therefore the UJA should not go too far in attempting to have too many gifts announced at the conference. Only important and stimulating gifts should be announced.

3) - It is most important that people sttending the conference have a much greater opportunity to participate in the business of the conference. At our conference last week the only opportunity the delegates had to participate in discussion was to a small extent on Friday and for a very short while on Sunday morning. It was suggested, therefore, that next year there definitely be a meeting of the steering committee Saturday afternoon and that great care be taken to permit delegates to discuss matters from the floor at length Sunday morning. This does not mean that the JDC session should be cancelled for Saturday noon but rather that the JDC session be shorter to permit a meeting of the steering committee the same afternoon.

4) - The JDC session was considered to be very good. It was felt, however, that there were too many speakers. It was suggested that there be one speaker for the JDC with a panel of three or four people and that at the end of the speech there be questions from the floor to be answered by the panel.

5) - It was the consensus of those present that the facilities at the Statler were much better than at the Waldorf and that the Statler should be used again. The microphone system should, however, be improved. The seating situation was much improved at the Statler but it was suggested that this be looked into again for possible further improvements.

6) - It was felt that Senator Javits' speech was most impressive and well received.

7) - It would be best if cocktails were not served in the guest of honor room because those who are not invited to the guest of honor room become insulted. If any cocktail party is to be run for the guests of honor then it should be done in a room removed from the banquet hall.

8) - It is most important that the Friday afternoon session open with a stimulating speaker.

9) - The Saturday evening session went off very well but it was the consensus of those present that something be done to break up the line of speeches. Singers or musicians should be introduced to provide some entertain-

I am very sorry that you were unable to attend the UJA Annual National Conference. I know you would have been thrilled by the large and enthusiastic number who attended and by the understanding response to the very pressing needs discussed at the sessions.

The 1,100 leaders at the Conference unanimously passed a resolution calling for an all-out effort including a Special Fund for next year. In substance, this was the same as the resolution adopted by the UJA Study Mission in Israel which was sent to you a little while ago. But most important, the leaders at the Conference demonstrated how much they wanted a really great campaign by pledging increased gifts in support of the resolution.

The Special Fund session on Friday, at which the resolution was discussed, heard addresses by William Rosenwald, Dr. Dov Joseph, Treasurer of the Jewish Agency and Senator Herbert H. Lehman. Dr. Joseph described the upsurge of immigration from East European countries, with which you are familiar, and the problems this poses for Isreal. Herbert Friedman pointed out that we now have an historic opportunity to reunite tens of thousands of Jews with their families in Israel.

At an Oneg Shabbat on Saturday afternoon, the needs of the JDC were presented by the JDC Country Directors under the chairmanship of Moses Leavitt. This was a most interesting session because it provided the delegates with an opportunity to become acquainted with JDC's farflung programs.

Mr. Shimon Peres, the Director-General of Israel's Ministry of Defense, spoke at the Banquet Session Saturday night. He said a series of external and internal changes have improved Israel's position on the international scene and that there are now new opportunities for the future. He presented a vivid picture of a new Israel occupying an important place in the world. Senator Jacob Javits told the delegates that Nasser's movement to take over dictatorial leadership of the Arab world presents the free world with an unparalleled opportunity for taking the initiative in the Middle East. 21st ANNUAL CONFERENCE TO BE HELD IN NEW YORK, DEC. 12-14

U.S. Senator Jacob K. Javits (R.-N.Y.) and two key leaders from Israel, Shimon Peres, Director-General of Israel's Defense Ministry, and Dr. Dov Joseph, Treasurer of the Jewish Agency for Israel, will be guest speakers at the 21st Annual National Conference of the nationwide United Jewish Appeal to be held at the Statler Hilton Hotel in New York on December 12, 13 and 14, it was announced this week by UJA General Chairman Morris W. Berinstein.

"We are most privileged that these outstanding leaders will be with us at the Conference," the UJA head declared. "Sen. Javits has long been prominent in humanitarian endeavors benefitting people of all faiths, in the rescue of Jewish refugees and in championing the freedom-loving people of Israel.

"Mr. Peres, the dynamic 35-year-old administrative chief of Israel's Defense Ministry, helped mold Israel's defense force as a citizen-army and not a military caste. He has also served in many sensitive diplomatic missions as Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion's special envoy and is known to his countrymen as 'the architect of French-Israeli amity.'

"Dr. Joseph, the distinguished Treasurer of the Jewish Agency, maps the needs of the organization responsible for the transfer, reception and resettlement of immigrants to Israel."

Mr. Berinstein stressed that the mounting immigrant absorption problem in Israel will be of major concern to the forthcoming UJA Conference, which will conclude the 1958 campaign, elect new officers and set the objectives for the 1959 drive.

The Conference will consider the recommendation of the UJA Overseas Study Mission for a Special Fund drive to be carried out simultaneously with the regular 1959 UJA campaign. The 100-man Mission led by Mr. Berinstein, UJA Honorary Chairman Edward M. M. Warburg, UJA National Chairman Dewey D. Stone and UJA Executive Vice-Chairman Herbert A. Friedman, recently returned from a survey of UJA-supported aid programs in Europe and Israel and will give their full report to the conferees.

Pointing out that Israel's people cannot maintain their great constructive work and at the same time meet all the needs of the multitudes who found haven in Israel, Mr. Berinstein declared that the Conference must chart a special effort by the American Jewish community to cope with the mounting immigrant absorption crisis in Israel. He said the crisis stems from a new upsurge of immigration from Eastern Europe, adding to the scores of thousands of newcomers who still lack adequate housing and opportunities for productive livelihoods.

The UJA finances the work of the United Israel Appeal, which remits its funds to the Jewish Agency; the Joint Distribution Committee, which aids the aged, ill and handicapped immigrants in Israel and Jews in need in 24 other countries abroad, and the New York Association for New Americans, which provides adjustment services for Jewish immigrants in this country.

MORE THAN 1,000 JEWISH COMMUNITY LEADERS GATHER IN NEW YORK TO ATTEND 21ST ANNUAL NATIONAL UNITED JEWISH APPEAL CONFERENCE

More than 1,000 leaders of American Jewish communities from all over the United States assembled in New York this week for the 21st Annual National Conference of the United Jewish Appeal, at the Statler Hilton Hotel on December 12, 13 and 14. They will consider a recommendation for the raising of a special fund over and above the proceeds of the regular 1959 campaign.

The recommendation was made by the Fifth UJA Overseas Study Mission on the soil of Israel last month to deal with the renewed immigration to Israel of thousands of Jews from Eastern Europe and to tackle the dangerous pile-up of unmet needs for scores of thousands of newcomers who found haven in Israel in recent years.

The Conference will also take up the further recommendation that communities supporting the nationwide United Jewish Appeal revise the scale of their allocations to the UJA, so that a just and fair allotment of funds may be made to the Appeal.

At the same time, the delegates will conclude the 1958 UJA campaign, elect officers and set the objectives for the 1959 drive.

Including aid programs in Israel, the UJA must maintain vital services for more than 600,000 Jews who need help in some 25 countries. Tens of thousands of Jews in North Africa could not survive were it not for daily UJA aid; 21,000 Polish Jews recently repatriated Jews from the Soviet Union must receive welfare aid and vocational training; other thousands of uprooted Jews in European centers must receive assistance while they wait for permanent haven in Israel or other free lands. Guest speakers at the Conference include U.S. Senator Jacob K. Javits (R-NY); Shimon Peres, Director-General of Israel's Defense Ministry; Dr. Nahum Goldmann and Dr. Dov Joseph, respectively Chairman and Treasurer of the Jewish Agency for Israel, the philanthropic body responsible for the transfer, resettlement and initial absorption of immigrants to Israel.

Among national UJA officers who have prominent roles at the Conference are former Senator Herbert H. Lehman, UJA Honorary General Chairman; Edward M.M. Warburg, UJA Honorary Chairman; Morris W. Berinstein, UJA General Chairman; William Rosenwald and Dewey D. Stone, UJA National Chairmen; and Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, UJA Executive Vice-Chairman.

THE U.J.A. CONFERENCE: Everybody knows about the American "three R's"-- Readin', 'Ritin', and 'Rithmetic...But few know of the Jewish "three R's" which are now part and parcel of the United Jewish Appeal.. R's"-- Readin' These are: Relief, Rescue, Rehabilitation...At the nationwide annual conference of the United Jewish Appeal--which is being held this week-end in New York--the Jewish "three R's" will come to the forefront more forcefully than at any time during the last few years...This is because a new situation is developing which requires urgent action on the part of American Jewry ... This situation has been brought about by the sudden flow of immigrants into Israel from countries behind the Iron Curtain ... Nobody knows why some of the Iron Curtain countries suddenly decided to permit Jewish emigration to Israel and for how long they will maintain this policy...This is what makes it imperative to take out as many Jews as possible from these countries while the taking out is permitted...But this also means the mobilization of special funds, and they can come only from American Jewry...At the UJA conference this problem will be the center of all discussions...UJA leaders who recently visited Israel on a study mission saw the ships bringing the wave of new immigrants from the Communist countries, and spoke to these immigrants ... The conclusion to which these leaders came is, that if all Jews who can now come to Israel are not taken out of the Iron Curtain countries, it will be the fault of American Jewry ... This conclusion will be brought to the attention of every Jewish giver in this country...It will be stressed that no American Jew, if he sin-cerely wants to enable Jewish families to leave the Communist lands now, can continue his giving to the UJA on the same rate as hitherto ... The year 1959 starts with opportunities in Jewish rescue work which may not be repeated and which the UJA leaders are anxious to utilize to the fullest extent... The securing of increased contributions in the early part of 1959 is, therefore, a major emergency...

THE TOP LEADER: The person who spends many restless days and weeks carrying the burden of leadership of the United Jewish Appeal is Morris W. Berinstein, UJA General Chairman...He has been a mainstay of the UJA for many years, serving in top-level capacities before he was elected General Chairman last year...Highly respected by Jewish community leaders all over the country, he will be re-elected to this most responsible post in American Jewish communal life for 1959...His devotion to the

UJA knows no end...He practically neglects his private business affairs giving all his time to UJA efforts...There is no community of importance to the UJA that he has not visited to stimulate greater giving...And if there are some communities which have not yet been visited by him, you can be certain that they will.be, sooner or later...He spares no time where UJA interests are involved...As successor to Edward M.M. Warburg and William Rosenwald, who preceded him in the position of General Chairman, Mr. Berinstein keeps the UJA banner high...I have seen him addressing important audiences at all hours of the day and evening, after just a few hours of sleep during the night on an airplane... I have also seen him spending many tiring hours on planes between the United States, Israel and Europe in the cause of the UJA...One of the admiring features about him is that he seels no "koved"...He always prefers to give the frontseat to someone else in the UJA, in the hope that this will stimulate the other person to greater activity, or to making a larger contribution...Undertaking top leadership of the UJA in a year of economic "recession," he novertheless made the 1958 campaign a financial success...His dedication to the cause of needy Jews throughout the world is highly valued not only by Jewish community leaders in this country, but also by the Government of Israel...

<u>LABOR OF LOVE:</u> Another principal driving force in the United Jewish Appeal who knows no rest and is busy even on week-ends is Rabbi Herbert A.Friedman, UJA executive vice-chairman...He is the man behind the wheel in the UJA campaign, and he has to his credit a record of fine achievements...Young, energetic, and a gifted speaker, he is today the youngest among the top executive leaders in all the major national Jewish organizations...To him the UJA is a labor of love, since he could, without doubt, get some of the highest positions in the rabbinate for which he was trained...And there are today high positions in the rabbinate which impose fewer responsibilities on a rabbi than those placed by the UJA on Rabbi Friedman...One of Rabbi Friedman's qualities is that he not only is on the alert on the fund-raising front, but is usually on the spot where the UJA funds are spent...Not to speak of Israel, which he visits frequently for consultations, one could have seen him in Poland last year where he studied Jewish emigration from there to Israel...The film of emigrating Jews which he made during his visit to Poland really confirms the old Chinese proverb that one picture speaks more than 1,000 words...He also went to Vienna last month to witness the constant arrival of Jews from countries behind the Iron Curtain en route to Israel, and to hear their tales... To get acquainted with the position of the Jews in Moslem lands who are being aided by the Joint Distribution Committee with UJA funds, he went to Morocco, Tunis, Algeria, Iran and other countries...As a result of such visits, he was able to bring authentic reports to the Jewish communities in this country about the real needs of Jews in troubled areas...His eye-witness impressions are always stimulating and bring home to American Jewrs the dramatic actualities faced today by Jews in need of American Jewish aid....
