



felt that the NOTES ON STAFF MEETING HELD THURSDAY, DECEMBER 18th, 1958 RELATING TO NATIONAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE The following points were made by various people attending the meeting: 1) - The Friday afternoon session could have been much more interesting if the chairman had called on more people to announce stimulating gifts. 2) - Great care should be taken to see to it that the Friday session does not in the future degenerate into a straight fund-raising meeting. It should not be forgotten that this is a national annual conference of the United Jewish Appeal at which the tone for the entire campaign must be set and therefore the UJA should not go too far in attempting to have too many gifts announced at the conference. Only important and stimulating gifts should be announced. 3) - It is most important that people attending the conference have a much greater opportunity to participate in the business of the conference. At our conference last week the only opportunity the delegates had to participate in discussion was to a small extent on Friday and for a very short while on Sunday morning. It was suggested, therefore, that next year there definitely be a meeting of the steering committee Saturday afternoon and that great care be taken to permit delegates to discuss matters from the floor at length Sunday morning. This does not mean that the JDC session should be cancelled for Satwinday noon but rather that the JDC session be shorter to permit a meeting of the steering committee the same afternoon. 4) - The JDC session was considered to be very good. It was felt, however, that there were too many speakers. It was suggested that there be one speaker for the JDC with a panel of three or four people and that at the end of the speech there be questions from the floor to be answered by the panel. 5) - It was the consensus of those present that the facilities at the Statler were much better than at the Waldorf and that the Statler should be used again. The microphone system should, however, be improved. The seating situation was much improved at the Statler but it was suggested that this be looked into again for possible further improvements. 6) - It was felt that Senator Javits' speech was most impressive and well received. 7) - It would be best if cocktails were not served in the guest of honor room because those who are not invited to the guest of honor room become insulted. If any cocktail party is to be run for the guests of honor then it should be done in a room removed from the banquet hall. 8) - It is most important that the Friday afternoon session open with a stimulating speaker. 9) - The Saturday evening session went off very well but it was the consensus of those present that something be done to break up the line of speeches. Singers or musicians should be introduced to provide some entertain-21 ---

TO CABINET MEMBERS NOT AT 12/10 MEETING

very important UJA Cabinet Meeting on Thursday, December 10th, was extremely well attended. Your presence was very much missed, and I know you will want to have a summary of what occurred.

The meeting addressed itself to the doubly significant task of reviewing the 1959 campaign and projecting the campaign for 1960. Concerning the 1959 UJA campaign, Herbert Friedman reported it was estimated that the UJA would realize \$51,500,000 in the regular campaign this year as compared with \$50,000,000 in 1958, and \$16,500,000 through the 1959 Special Fund as compared to \$13,000,000 last year. This will represent an increase of 3% in the regular campaign and 27% in the Special Fund. Herb called special attention to the substantial size of the increase being realized through the Special Fund as compared to the increase in the amount raised in the regular campaign. All told, the United Jewish Appeal will receive about \$5,000,000 more from the 1959 campaign than it did from the 1958 campaign, representing an over-all increase of 8%.

regard to collections, Melvin Dubinsky said that through the month of Novemr, the UJA had received \$60,219,299 for the year 1959, representing an increase of \$11,521,361 over the amount of \$48,697,938 collected in 1958 through
the month of November. Last year the final total collected came to \$55,754,000.
With the way that collections are still going this year, it is anticipated that
finally somewhat better than \$69,000,000 will be realized. Mel Dubinsky declared it is still possible to achieve the announced goal of a \$70,000,000 cash
collection figure by the end of this year if every leader does everything possible in his community between now and December 31st to obtain every available
dollar. It was the unanimous feeling at the meeting that Mel has done a tremendously effective and marvelous job this year as UJA Cash Chairman.

I am sure you have learned by now that a Special Fund was adopted by the large group of delegates at the UJA Annual Conference on Friday as an indispensable fund-raising tool for the 1960 campaign. The matter of the Special Fund was previously placed before the Cabinet for final discussion at the meeting on

Thursday. It was pointed out that the matter had been elaborately discussed by the Cabinet at the meeting held on September 28th. Since then, the Sixth UJA Study Mission had gone to Israel. At the conclusion of its tour of the country, during which the great backlog of unmet immigration needs had been painfully noted, the Mission unanimously passed a resolution recommending a Special Fund for 1960.

Once again the points that have been expressed both in favor and against having a Special Fund next year were set out, and there was a final round of discussion on it. This discussion concluded with the unanimous recommendation to the Conference delegates that they adopt in some suitable form for 1960 the principle of extra giving to the work in Israel "over and above" the regular campaign. This recommendation represented the consensus of the Cabinet that the UJA simply cannot do without such an extra fund-raising tool next year in the face of the great need that exists in Israel to take care of thousands of immigrants in conditions of distress who could not be properly assisted in previous years because of the heavy flow of continuing immigration.

a result of its adoption at the Conference, a Special Fund will now officially be part of the 1960 campaign. Its fully effective utilization to help clear up the great backlog of needs in Israel, as well as to help maintain continuing immigration to Israel at a figure of at least 25,000 people a year, is now in large part up to us.

The Cabinet in 1960 is going to have a new Chairman -- namely, Melvin Dubinsky. It is a pleasure to turn over my instruments of office to such a thoroughly capable and devoted and altogether wonderful individual. On my part, I can say that these two years as Cabinet Chairman have been most delightful as well as inspiring ones for me and I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart for helping to make them so.



I am writing to call your special attention to the 22nd Annual Conference of the United Jewish Appeal, which will be held in the Statler Hilton Hotel in New York City on December 11th, 12th and 13th. This conference traditionally is the most important event in the calendar of regularly scheduled UJA national functions, and once again this year it can be counted upon to be a tremendously stimulating meeting.

The conference program will include addresses by Avraham Harman, Israel's new Ambassador to the United States; Leon Uris, author of the best-seller "Exodus"; and reports by leaders of the Jewish Agency, the Joint Distribution Committee and the UJA. All of this should make for a very exciting and informative program -- but, as usual, the most thrilling aspect surely will be the presence of hundreds of leading representatives of American Jewish communities all over the country who will be there to rededicate themselves to the great cause of helping their fellow Jews in need.

To carry out this purpose most effectively, it will be the function of the conference to shape a campaign for the UJA in 1960 that will be proportionate to the massive needs that must be met. The most pressing of these needs are as follows:

- (1) To provide improved dwellings, long over-due, for some 90,000 Jews in Israel who still live in the miserable shacks of the ma'abaroth and other woefully inadequate housing;
- (2) To provide the means so that immigrants can at long-last make themselves self-sufficient in hundreds of farm settlements where appropriate roads, irrigation, livestock as well as various kinds of tools and equipment are still required;
  - (3) To provide additional training facilities for thousands still

awaiting the opportunity to acquire new skills with which they can make a positive contribution to Israel's economy;

(4) To provide for the transportation and absorption of new immigrants continuing to come to Israel from Poland, Iran and other countries. It is also essential that we be prepared to help cope at once with any upsurge in immigration resulting from the sudden lifting of gates that are presently barred.

It will be up to the conference also to make the final determination for the entire Jewish community as to whether a special UJA fund for 1960 should be launched. Attention was given to this matter at a meeting of the Campaign Cabinet of the UJA on September 28th, where there was considerable frank discussion pro and con on the matter. It was decided that the Sixth UJA Study Mission, which will be in Europe and Israel during the early part of November, should consider the matter of the special fund in the light of what it observes abroad and bring back its findings to the conference.

Within the conference proper the major decisions are made by the Steering Committee. The decisions of this Committee will command the respect of the American Jewish community and, as such, will be implemented only if the Committee is fully representative of the individual communities throughout the country. For that reason, it is imperative that your community be well represented on this Committee.

Representation on the Steering Committee is according to the following formula:

If your community has a Jewish population up to 15,000, you may designate one delegate and one alternate to represent it on the Steering Committee.

If your Jewish population is from 15,000 to 40,000 your community is entitled to two delegates and two alternates -- while those with Jewish populations in excess of 40,000 are entitled to three delegates and three alternates.

These, together with 15 delegates from the Greater New York areas, 12 delegates representing the 8 regions of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, 25 delegates representing the country at large, and the national officers of the UJA constitute the Conference Steering Committee.

Please act at once to designate your delegates and alternates. As soon as you notify us of their names, we shall send them their credentials as Steering Committee members.

I know that you will extend every cooperation to assure that the forthcoming conference is as effective and successful as it must be.





The 22nd Annual National Conference of the United Jewish Appeal will be held at the Statler-Hilton Hotel in New York City from Friday, December 11th through Sunday, December 13th, 1959.

The Conference will be addressed by such distinguished personalities as Avraham Harman, Israel's Ambassador to the United States and Leon Uris, noted author of the best-selling novel "Exodus." Three outstanding leaders of American Jewry, Morris W. Berinstein, General Chairman of the UJA, Edward M.M. Warburg, Honorary Chairman of the UJA and Chairman of the American Joint Distribution Committee and Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, Executive Vice-Chairman of the UJA, who are currently leading a 115-man UJA Overseas Study Mission, will report on their findings and conclusions.

An attraction on the Conference program will also be a performance by the 14-year-old, polio-stricken Itzhak Perlman, Israel's youthful violin virtuoso.

Among other problems, the Conference will consider what American Jewry must do to meet the tremendous backlog of unmet needs in Israel. These unmet needs include:

- Replacing the ma'abarot and substandard shelters with decent housing for some 60,000 persons.
- 2) Equipping of over 400 incomplete farm settlements to make them independently productive.
- 3) Providing full-time jobs to over 40,000 immigrants who are underemployed and who are now engaged in made-work projects.
- 4) Completing the absorption and integration of tens of thousands of newcomers, who reached Israel in recent years.

Because the needs have always been greater than the ability to meet them - Israel's open-door policy brought tens of thousands of immigrants to its shores, many with no more than the clothes on their backs - this backlog has been accumulating since 1948, and must be met.

I understand that both Morris Bernstein and Rabbi Friedman are out of the country. Will you let them know that because of the continued uncertainty I have not communicated with them.



Dear Friend:

On October 15th I wrote to call your special attention to the 22nd Annual Conference of the United Jewish Appeal, which will take place in New York City on December 11th, 12th and 13th at the Statler Hilton Hotel, and requested that you select leaders who would represent your community on the Conference Steering Committee. I am writing again to stress the importance of having your reply in regard to this.

For this great annual meeting to be the success that it should be, we must count upon the participation of the leading representatives of American Jewish communities all over the country. Decisions will be made at this time which will affect the 1960 drives in communities everywhere, and surely it is fitting that your community should be suitably represented in making them.

I am preparing this letter to you immediately upon my return from abroad with the Sixth UJA Study Mission. Those of us on the Mission have observed both in Europe and Israel a great deal that will be very significant in next year's campaign. The Mission members have seen much that inspired them, and many things requiring careful consideration in mapping out the campaign in 1960.

The observations of the Mission will of course play an important role in the Annual Conference, when the kind of campaign to be conducted next year will be discussed in relation to it. They certainly can be expected to bear a major part in helping the Conference make the final determination for the entire American Jewish community as to whether a Special UJA Fund for 1960 should be launched.

It is already apparent that the unmet needs overseas call for the fullest mobilization of the resources of the American Jewish community in the year ahead. I cannot over-emphasize how significant it would be to have the participation of delegates from your community in the Conference to assure that the proper attention is given to planning the steps for meeting these needs.

To recapitulate from my previous letter, within the Conference proper the major decisions are made by the Steering Committee. Representation on the Steering Committee is according to the following formula:

If your community has a Jewish population up to 15,000, you may designate one delegate and one alternate to represent it on the Steering Committee.

NEEDED: \$35,000,000 IN CASH FOR LAST HALF 1959

in time for UJA Annual National Conference, Dec. 11-13, Statler Hilton Hotel, N.Y.C.

If your Jewish population is from 15,000 to 40,000, your community is entitled to two delegates and two alternates -- while those with Jewish populations in excess of 40,000 are entitled to three delegates and three alternates.

These, together with 15 delegates from the Greater New York area, 12 delegates representing the 8 regions of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, 25 delegates representing the country at large, and the national officers of the UJA constitute the Conference Steering Committee.

I hope very much that you will write to me now naming the leaders who will represent your community on the Conference Steering Committee. I will deeply appreciate having your understanding and cooperation in this regard. In replying, incidentally, it will be most helpful if you would advise us in regard to each delegate you name the number of plates that should be reserved for the luncheon on December 11th, the dinner on December 12th and the breakfast on December 13th. Please also let us know in the case of each delegate whether and from what date hotel reservations may be required, as well as whether these should include single or double room accommodations. We would also welcome being informed of the estimated time of arrival of each delegate.

We have been particularly counting on your participation in the 22nd Annual National Conference of the United Jewish Appeal at the Statler Hilton Hotel in New York City, and for this reason I was sorry to note we have not yet heard from you to the effect that you will attend. The actions of the Conference must be embodied in resolutions that will properly convey its decisions to the whole American Jewish community. In this regard, it is our strong hope that you will serve with a small group of other outstanding leaders as a member of the very vital Conference Resolutions Committee.

Actually, the full meaning and spirit of the Conference, which is certainly the most important event in the entire UJA annual calendar, has to be summed up in the resolutions which it passes. I think you will want to know that Mr. Max Fisher, President of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Detroit, has already agreed to act as Chairman of the Resolutions Committee. Mr. Fisher and I have recently returned from abroad with the Sixth UJA Study Mission. On the Mission we observed both in Europe and Israel a great deal that inspired us, and in addition many situations which will require careful attention at the Conference.

The Mission will offer its report to the Resolutions Committee in particular and to the Conference in general, where it can be expected to play an important role in the discussion of the kind of campaign to be conducted next year. It will bear a major part in helping the Conference to decide whether to resolve that a Special UJA Fund for 1960 should be launched.

It is vital for the entire Conference, and for the Resolutions Committee, to be as fully representative as possible in order to make them as thoroughly meaningful as they should be. The unmet needs overseas, as we have observed them on the Study Mission, call for the mobilization of the maximum resources of the American Jewish communities in the year ahead. This most important fact can be communicated from the Conference to the community-at-large with the requisite feeling and conviction only through the participation of leaders like yourself, I cannot, therefore, urge you too strongly to come.

#### Dear Friend:

The UJA 22nd Annual National Conference of December 11th, 12th and 13th really was an outstanding event both in terms of the inspiration it provided and the record number of people who attended. There were about 1500 there. We were very sorry that you could not be with us, and I think now you may be interested in having a summary of some of the highlights of what occurred.

The stirring all-day first session of the Conference on Friday was climaxed by the passage by unanimous vote of a resolution calling on American Jewry in 1960 to raise a multi-million dollar fund in addition to that raised in the regular UJA campaign to help accelerate the distressingly lagging processes of integration for some 400,000 unabsorbed immigrants of recent years to Israel. A copy of this resolution is enclosed herewith.

In a tremendously moving address, Senator Herbert Lehman, on Friday morning, told about the achievements he had noted during his recent visit to Israel, praising particularly Israel's acceptance of nearly 1,000,000 refugees in eleven years. He emphasized the importance of continuing to provide the kind of help that will enable Israel to go on being "the casis in the vast desert of world indifference in the plight of refugees." Dr. Dov Joseph, Treasurer of the Jewish Agency, told the audience that because of insufficient funds, an enormous backlog of unmet responsibilities has accumulated in the area of immigrant absorption. The unmet needs in Israel include the provision of better dwellings for the 60,000 immigrants still miserably housed in the maabarot, and also the provision of the various kinds of assistance required by many on inadequately equipped farms and in the slums of cities to give them some personal dignity at long last and to make them finally self-sufficient.

Melvin Dubinsky reported on the visit in Eastern Europe he had made with Herbert Friedman following the Study Mission. He noted that there is still a flow of emigration from certain countries in Europe, and that American Jews must supply the funds, through the UJA, to help transfer to Israel and other lands all those who want and are able to go. Herbert Friedman pointed out that the total UJA effort in 1960 calls for aiding more than 600,000 Jewish men, women and children in 25 countries elsewhere throughout the world as well as in Israel, through the programs of the UJA's beneficiary agencies.

At an Oneg Shabat on Saturday afternoon, during an informal session presided over by UJA National Chairman William Rosenwald, conference delegates heard reports on the work of the JDC from Moses A. Leavitt, JDC Executive Vice-Chairman; Charles H. Jordan, Director-General of JDC's overseas operations; Louis D. Horwitz, Director-General of Malben, JDC's welfare organization in

PHILIP ZINMAN Israel; and Samuel Haber of JDC's Geneva headquarters. Summing up at this session, Moses Leavitt noted that "in 26 overseas countries where JDC works there are some 250,000 persons for whom JDC is the future, their hope for life itself. For these -- those halfway to their destination, and all the others -- the sick, the aged, the children, the needy and helpless -- JDC will require a minimum of \$29,142,000 in 1960."

The Saturday evening Banquet Session was addressed by Avraham Harman, Israel's Ambassador to the United States; Leon Uris, author of "Exodus"; Morris W. Berinstein, UJA General Chairman; and Edward M. M. Warburg, UJA Honorary Chairman, who was Chairman for the evening. Ambassador Harman stressed that in accepting a million refugees in the past eleven years, Israel has permitted the entrance of thousands of persons who would normally be rejected elsewhere as immigrants, including active tuberculosis cases, physically handicapped and aged people. He pointed out the need for maintaining the special programs for the social 'cases' which such immigrants continue to represent, as well as meeting other massive needs such as that which exists in the area of housing for thousands of normal immigrants. Leon Uris told of the inspiration he had derived from observing what the people of Israel are able to accomplish with the help given them. Morris Berinstein noted that in the year just completed the UJA, through its beneficiary agencies, had helped a total of 600,000 persons of whom 391,000 were in Israel, 105,000 in Moslem countries, 57,000 in Europe, 5,000 in the United States and 5,000 others in various other countries around the world. In the course of the evening special mounted silver Menorahs were presented for outstanding service to Fred Forman of Rochester, who has been Chairman of the UJA National Campaign Cabinet for two years, and to Sol Luckman of Cincinnati, a 1959 National Chairman and a long-time leader in our cause.

At the Business Session on Sunday morning, delegates to the Conference presented checks representing millions of dellars in community contributions, and Cash Chairman Melvin Dubinsky of St. Louis was able to announce that a total of \$69,300,000 in cash had been received up to that date by the United Jewish Appeal in 1959. At this session, Mrs. Jack Goodman, National Women's Division Chairman presented an inspiring report on the accomplishments of the Women's Division in 1959. The delegates re-elected Morris Berinstein as General Chairman to lead the UJA's 22nd yearly campaign. Sol Luckman was named Honorary National Chairman, Fred Forman and Philip Klutznick were named National Chairmen and Melvin Dubinsky was named Chairman of the National Campaign Cabinet. The other officers were re-elected.

Mr. Chairman, Ambassador Harmen, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen:

Thanks much for that nice introduction. Back in the University of Pennsylvania when I am trying to get 5 bucks from a fellow student for our UJA drive which this student has budgeted for a heavy date, I am not treated that kindly.

There is a Hebrew expression which is found over many of the arks in the synagogue which says: Da lifney me ato omaid -- know before whom you stand. While in appearing before you I do not have the aresome feeling that this phrase is meant to inspire, I want you to know that I know before whom I stand. I know that I stand before men and women -- leaders of American Jewry -- who have given much of their lives so that other Jews might live.

To many of you it may be news that we the Jewish students at the universities conduct campaigns among ourselves in behalf of the UJA. We do this under the auspices of the Hillel Foundations. Of course, we do not deal in the astronomical figures that you do and that we hear about. For example, by us a \$15 gift is considered a pace-setting gift, but that does not matter. What is important is that through these campaigns we succeed in impressing our fallow students that

they have a responsibility to other Jews no less deserving, only less fortunate, than they are.

Many of the Jewish students at the universities do not avail themselves of the rich cultural and religioud programs provided for us by the Hillel Foundations. You may recall your own rebellious days when you felt that to stay away from religious services was the mark of an emancipated person.

Well, we who conduct the student campaigns do precisely what you do in the communities. We pay no attention as to whether a student is observing or non-observing. If he is a Jew we feel that it is our right, if not, indeed, our obligation, to approach him for a gift to the UJA. We feel that the least a student who calls himself a Jew can do is show that he has a concern for our noble tradition and heritage of caring for our own.

It is not easy to conduct UJA campaigns among students. Jewish students,
like all other students, are preoccupied with studies and with plans for careers.

Moreover, many of us have very limited funds. But even more important than
these considerations is the fact that the undergraduates now at the universities
are students who have hardly any personal knowledge of the pre-war period, of
Hitlerism, and of all the other things that have shaped your thinking and your

reactions. We have to learn these things through the cold print of books. I must say that Leon Uris's Exodus helped a great deal in filling the gap in our knowledge both as to the great tragedy which overtook the Jewish people and as to the great opportunities provided by Israel for solving the problem of Jews who are homeless. But even with the help this great dramatic work has provided, we still have a job on our hands convincing our fellow students as to the needs the UJA must meet and as to the importance of meeting these needs.

I really came here to tell you that the Jewish students at the universities are not living in ivory towers, above the scene of life's battles. Many of us are deeply aware of the problems the UJA is trying to solve and we know that these problems will not be solved in one generation. I, for one -- and I am confident that I speak for all of us who are active in UJA campaigns in the universities -- welcome the interest the UJA is displaying in the Jewish students. I interpret the invitation you have extended me to appear before you not as an invitation to me personally but as symbolic of your increased interest in us students. That interest is fully justified because, inevitably, out of today's and tomorrow's campuses will come the future leaders of American Jewry.

I am confident that in a few years you will find us among your ranks pulling our weight in the great mission American Jewry has undertaken. I feel that basically we on the campuses are dedicated to the principle that American Jewry

will not only survive but that the American Jewish community will grow in quality and with an ever-deepening sense of responsibility to itself and to Jews all over the world.

All of us here, men and women together, helped write another exciting chapter of that story in 1959, and it is well to have that chapter summed up for us as we get ready to move shead into 1960.

I really get a great deal of pleasure out of doing this. It gives me a chance to express some of the affectionate and good feelings that keep welling up inside me all through the year as a result of being associated with these very fine people in the work of the UJA.

The year shead, a Presidential Year in the United States, will see a great deal of so-called horse trading in smoke filled rooms in the selection of candidates. All of that is good American politics, but it is not the way we can or want to go about it in the UJA. Instead, the nominations I am about to announce are the result of well-ventilated reflection on who can best serve to advance our great cause.

First I wish to place in nomination the names of a group of men to serve as Honorary Officers of the UJA. All but one of these men served in the same capacity last year.

At the head of this distinguished list to serve you as

Honorary General Chairman, is the beloved friend of all of us, a great

American, a great Jew and a truly great human being -- the Honorable Herbert

H. Lehman.

Next to be named for re-election as Honorary Chairman is a man
we all love and respect -- a man who by his dedicated services has given
increased lustre to a name synonymous with humanitarian service -- Edward M.M.Warburg.

For the office of Honorary Chairman of the Special Fund, we give you the name of one who served with great distinction as Chairman of the Emergency Rescue Fund for 1957, and as Honorary Chairman of the Rescue and Special Funds in 1958 and 1959. He has amply demonstrated, by word and deed, his dedication to the UJA and all it stands for in Jewish life. He is our friend and fine co-worker, Samuel Rubin.

For re-election as one of two Honorary National Chairmen for 1960, I present the name of a tremendous worker for the UJA, one who has participated in every major decision right from the beginning. His contributions to the UJA always have shown that he has a big heart, and this year he was sadly called upon to demonstrate the strength of this heart in a new way. Badly injured in a motor accident while abroad early in 1959, he has had to make the great fight of his life to get back on his feet again. The man I have in mind is the wonderful Joseph Holtzman.

For election as a new Honorary National Chairman we nominate

Sol Luckman. It was a very happy thing to see him honored last night.upon
his retirement from the post of National Chairman. Sol certainly has given
of himself tirelessly on behalf of the UJA ever since it all started.

Everything that the UJA has accomplished is marked by his influence and
effectiveness. His travels for the UJA have taken him everywhere, and he
is universally admired and respected. It is a great pleasure to name
Sol Luckman for this post.

For the positions of National Chairmen we place in nomination four men who held this position in 1959 and are being asked to serve again. In addition, two other men are being asked to accept positions as National Chairmen for the first time.

First of all, we re-nominate Samuel H. Daroff, admired throughout

the country for his high sense of dedication to Jewish causes, and honored many times in his home community of Philadelphia for all he has done there. Sam was taken rather ill this year, and we are all glad that he is getting his strength back again.

Next is a man who has given an inestimable amount of his time and energy to the UJA. A couple of years back, tribute was paid to him as the man who had travelled the most on the UJA's behalf. He has since worked up so much travel momentum that at this very moment he is on his way around the world. I am referring to Albert A. Levin of Cleveland.

Thirdly, we re-nominate Joseph Mayerhoff. He is a great force in his community of Baltimore and his most effective wholehearted devotion to the UjA and to Israel could not be mofe well known.

There is nobody like the next gentleman we want to re-name, and indeed he is famous for his uniqueness. This man is Jack Wiler, and he is he shows in the Strvice special for the great feeling as well as effectiveness of his fellow Jews in distress.

National Chairman is Fred Forman, who has served so ably for the past two years as Chairman of the UJA National Campaign Cabinet. It gave us all a lot pleasure last night to honor him. We have come to love and admire Fred even more than ever as Cabinet Chairman, and we want to continue to benefit from the wise force and find inspiration he exerts. Fred gives tremendous leadership in his community of Rochester in addition to the long and immeasurably meaningful service he has given to the UJA nationally.

The second new National Chairman we are naming is certainly one of America's most distinguished communal leaders. Though still a comparatively young man, he has well earned the great respect we all have for him for his varied leadership in Jewish causes. He was President of B'nai B'rith for two terms, beginning in 1953, and is currently its Honorary President. As Chairman of the Conference of Presidents, which brought together the heads of 16 large American Jewish agencies, he helped magnificently to co-ordinate organizational activities on behalf of Jewish causes, and particularly the UJA. He also is currently a ranking member of the UJA National Campaign Cabinet. I am delighted to submit to you the name of Philip Klutznick.

Now we come to the officers of the National Chairman representing the United Israel Appeal, we are delighted to name someone who has served for the past five years in this post -- someone who has devoted himself utterly to the fullest development of Israel's cultural and economic life, and one of the strongest forces in the UJA. His name is linked with every great Jewish cause, and it is Dewey D. Stone.

As National Chairman representing the JDC, we are very happy to give you the name of someone who helped lay the very foundations of the UJA. He served us in this capacity last year and the year before, and during the three years before that exerted the most sterling leadership and grandest devotion as our General Chairman. He certainly has earned a permanent niche of honor in American Jewry, and we are all proud to be associated with him in our common cause. I am referring to the beloved and distinguished William Rosenwald.

For Chairman of the National Campaign Cabinet we nominate one who the past year served very dynamically and wonderfully as the UJA National Cash Chairman. He is a man who in the past was Chairman of the St. Louis Jewish Welfare Federation, and who through the years has proved his devotion to the UJA again and again. He is most articulate and never fails to respond to any call on his time and energy in the service of the UJA. Of course I refer to our good friend; Melvin Dubinsky.

A very much deserved special tribute was paid at our Conference last year to our next nomines. An award from Prime Minister Ben Guion of Israel was presented to him at that time. He has absolutely identified himself with the cause of the UJA and, has shown his vital interest in the upbuilding of Israel in ways too numerous to mention. He is a wonderful human being. He is Adolph Kiesler, and we would like to nominate him once again for Chairman of the UJA National Campaign Committee.

The actress Sarah Bernhardt was known as the Divine Sarah, and our nomines for re-election as Chairman of the National Women's Division is equally deserving of that title. Mrs. Jack A. Goodman, whom we all know as Sarah, has served spiritedly and tirelessly as the Women's Division National Chairman for the past three years. Sarah is admired and loved most deservedly by the women in our cause throughout the country -- and (I am sure you will understand the spirit in which I say this) she is equally well loved by all the men who know her. It is good to present her name to you.

The position of General Chairman of the UJA is not only a position of honor, but it is one of almost terrifying responsibility. The exceptional meaning that this office has come to hold is the result of a tradition set by such men as Henry Morganthau, Eddie Warburg and Bill Rosenwald.

Great as it already was, Morris Berinstein has even managed to add further stature to this office during the two years he has already served in it.

Many man in our cause and in the American Jewish community are deserving of the high@est honors but few have both the experience of long years of debotion as well as, frankly, the virtually limitless strength and energy required to bear the burdens of the General Chairmanship. He has rightly demanded a lot from others, but what he has asked in no way compares with all that he has demanded from himself. He has led a great campaign this year, and we know that we can count on his giving of his full energies and great talents to do it again.

We are happy and proud to present to you for re-election as General Chairman our grand and wonderful and utterly dedicated colleague. Morris W. Berinstein.

#### THREE OUTSTANDING UJA LEADERS TO ADDRESS

22nd ANNUAL NATIONAL CONFERENCE, DEC. 11-13

Berinstein, Friedman and Warburg Join Israel's Ambassedor Harman and Leon Uris, "Exodus" Author, on Program at Statler-Hilton

\* \* \* \*

Three outstanding members of the American Jewish community will be featured on the program of the 22nd Annual National Conference of the nationwide United Jewish Appeal, which will be at the Statler-Hilton Hotel, from Friday, December 11 through Sunday, December 13, 1959.

They include: Morris W. Berinstein, General Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, Executive Vice Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, and Edward M.M. Warburg, Honorary Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal and Chairman of the American Joint Distribution Committee, a beneficiary agency of the UJA.

The three UJA leaders are currently heading the 110-man 1959 UJA Overseas Study Mission, which since November 7 has been making a survey of Jewish needs in Europe, the Middle East and Israel. They will return with the Mission about November 25 well in time to deliver reports on what the UJA Mission saw, heard and concluded while abroad.

Avraham Harman, Israel's Ambassador to the United States and Leon Uris, noted author of the best-selling novel about Israel, "Exodus," are featured on the program of the 22nd Annual National UJA Conference, also. Both guests are intimately familiar with the situation in Israel and widely known to the American Jewish community.

One of the great attractions on the Conference program will be the performance of 14-year-old Itzhak Perlman, Israel's youthful violin virtuoso. Stricken with polio in 1949, when he was three, young Perlman has been playing the violin since the age of six. He gave his first radio recital at 10 and was accepted as a student at the Tel Aviv Academy of Music at 11. He has won three prizes in Israel musical competitions, and has been acclaimed for his skill by Yehudi Mnuhin, Zino Francescati, Leonard Bernstein, Paul Kletzki, and Isler Salomon. He has appeared on the Ed Sullivan show in 1958 and 1959.

The Conference will consider American Jewry's role in doing away with a tremendous backlog of unmet human needs in Israel. These unmet needs include: provision of adequate housing through tearing down malabarot and substandard shelters and constructing decent housing for some 60,000 persons; finishing the equipping of farm settlements so that they can be productive units, and the elimination of underemployment — which involves part-time projects — through the provision of productive full-time jobs. In addition, the Conference will conclude the 1959 Campaign, elect new officers and set the objectives for the 1960 drive.

The Mission's report on the situation of Jewish men, women and children in Europe, North Africa, the Middle East and Israel, as well as other parts of the world, will provide the material on which Conference delegates will make their decisions about the 1960 Campaign.

Tens of thousands of immigrants have come to Israel in recent years because of that country's open door policy of permitting any Jewish person to come and settle there. The newcomers, many of whom arrived in Israel with but the clothes on their backs, need help in being absorbed into Israel's social, economic and political life. Since the need has been greater than the ability to meet it, a backlog of requirements has grown up in the past few years.

The United Jewish Appeal finances the work of the United Israel Appeal,

which remits its funds to the Jewish Agency, the philanthropic organization responsible for the reception and absorption of immigrants to Israel; the Joint Distribution Committee, which aids the aged, ill and handicapped immigrants in Israel — and Jewish men, women and children in need in 24 other countries outside of Israel, and the New York Association for New Americans, which provides adjustment services for Jewish immigrants in this country.

Avraham Harman, Israel's Ambassador to the United States, and

will be the principal speakers at the 22nd Annual National Conference of
the Nationwide United Jewish Appeal to be held at the Statler Hilton
Hotel in New York from Friday, December 11 through Sunday, December 13,
it was announced today by Morris W. Berinstein, General Chairman of the
United Jewish Appeal.

"We are most fortunate," Mr. Berinstein said, "that Mr. Harman and Mr. Uris will be with us. Mr. Harman is one of Israel's outstanding young leaders, a member of the dynamic generation of young men and women who have been in the forefront of Israel's astonishingly rapid development as a nation. Members of the 1959 UJA Overseas Study Mission will make their report to the Conference, which will make its decisions on the basis of the Mission's recommendations. The 110-man Mission recently went abroad to undertake a survey of UJA-supported programs in Europe and Israel, and will return to the United States about November 25.

UNITED JEWISH APPEAL ANNUAL NATIONAL CONFERENCE

December 11 to 13th Sessions to Hear 1959 Overseas Mission Report, Set 1960 Goals; Harman, Uris, Berinstein And Others Featured

More than 1,000 delegates representing hundreds of American-Jewish communities across the country plan to attend the twenty-second Annual National Conference of the United Jewish Appeal which opens at the Hotel Statler-Hilton, New York City, on Friday morning, December 11th, it was announced by Morris W. Berinstein, UJA General Chairman.

The Conference, beginning with the morning session on Friday, will extend through Sunday afternoon, December 13th, Mr. Berinstein said. Recently returned from the Sixth Annual Study Mission conducted under the auspices of the United Jewish Appeal in Israel from November 9-22nd, he said that reports on conditions in Israel would serve to set the pace for the 1960 fund-raising drive. The goal for the forthcoming campaign, opening in January, will be announced at the Conference, he declared.

Prominent representatives of Israel and the United States are slated to be guests at the Conference. These include: Avreham Harman, Israel's Ambassador to the United States; Leon Uris, author of the year's best-selling novel, "Exodus". Itzhak Perlman, 14-year-old Israeli violinist who has won international acclaim for his performances here and in Israel, will be the guest soloist.

Besides Mr. Berinstein, UJA officers who will address the gathering are Edward M.M. Warburg, Honorary Chairman of the UJA and Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, UJA Executive Vice-Chairman. All were members of the 1959 Overseas Study Mission, and will present eye-witness accounts to the delegates on their visit to Israel.

The Study Mission, which has been conducted by the UJA for the past six years, provides leaders of the American Jewish community with an opportunity to make direct observations and gain first-hand knowledge of the situation of Jewish men, women and children overseas, and of the unmet needs in Israel arising from the immigration in recent years of tens of thousands of Jewish men, women and children.

Based on the material in these reports, delegates will set the 1960 campaign goals and objectives. It is anticipated that their reactions to the reports will help to determine the future of 600,000 Jewish men, women and children in Israel, Europe, North Africa and Moslem nations.

The delegates, who have been participating in the 1959 UJA Fall Cash Drive to convert pledges made to this year's UJA campaign into cash contributions, will bring in totals from their respective communities. Melvin Dubinsky, young St. Louis businessman, has been serving as Chairman of the Cash Drive. He heads a committee of 54 community leaders from all parts of the United States. The full amount raised in the Fall Cash Drive will be announced at the Sonference.

The United Jewish Appeal finances the work of the United Israel Appeal; the Joint Distribution Committee, which cares for the aged, ill and handicapped immigrants in Israel as well as Jewish men, women and children in 24 other countries outside of Israel, and the New York Association for New Americans, which helps in the adjustment of Jewish immigrants in this country.

At the final Sunday afternoon session of the Conference on December 13th, new officers of the United Jewish Appeal for a one-year term will be elected.

THREE-DAY SESSION OF UNITED JEWISH APPEAL ANNUAL NATIONAL CONFERENCE STARTS TODAY (FRIDAY) AT STATLER-HILTON HOTEL

The three-day meeting of the United Jewish Appeal's 22nd Annual National Conference, which will bring together 1500 Jewish communal leaders from all parts of the United States, opens at the Statler-Hilton Hotel today (Friday) with a business session considering reports on major problems facing the Appeal in 1960. The UJA is the major American agency raising funds for newcomers to Israel, distressed Jews overseas, and refugees to the United States.

Today's session will deal with the necessity for greatly expanded support from American Jews to cope with the vast unmet needs of nearly 400,000 unabsorbed immigrants of the nearly 1,000,000 who have come to Israel since 1948. These immigrants need decent housing, farm aid, employment aid, youth service programs and expanded welfare programs for the aged, physically handicapped and sick.

The delegates will hear the findings of the Sixth UJA Overseas Mission composed of 115 outstanding American Jewish leaders which returned at the end of November from a survey of UJA-financed operations abroad.

Today's sessions are scheduled to hear reports from Dr. Dov Joseph,

Treasurer of the Jewish Agency, the philanthropic organization responsible for
the transfer, resettlement and initial absorption of immigrants to Israel,

Melvin Dubinsky, of St. Louis, UJA National Cash Chairman, Herbert A. Friedman,

UJA Executive Vice-Chairman, Dewey D. Stone, of Boston, a UJA National Chairman,
and other leaders.

A dinner meeting in the Grand Ballroom of the Statler-Hilton Hotel on Saturday evening will hear Israel's Ambassador to the United States, Avraham Harman; Leon Uris, author of the best-selling novel about Israel, "Exodus," and Morris W. Berinstein, UJA General Chairman. Closing business sessions will be held on Sunday.

The more than 1,500, Jewish community leaders from all parts of the nation are attending the UJA conference to conclude the 1959 drive, elect new officers and set the objectives for the 1959 nationwide UJA campaign.
