MR. HOSENWALD stressed the importance of exploring every new avenue of raising cash between now and the end of the year and noted that any new ideas that might come out of this meeting could be applied to the smaller communities not represented at the meeting today. He suggested two devices to draw on 1952 money for use in 1951. First, borrowing from banks in anticipation of the 1952 campaigns. Second, undertaking an intensive drive to get individual contributors to make payments in 1951 on account of their 1952 pledges. Mr. Rosenwald called upon those present to suggest other means whereby extra cash could be obtained between now and the end of the year.

MR. WEILER said that in New York he has called on individuals who owe \$5,000 or \$10,000 on their pledges and requested a ben of \$50,000 for a period of six months. This usually induces the contributor to pay the amount due on his pledge. Mr. Weiler also suggested that individuals be approached to make loans and this would result in a sizeable amount for 1952. MR. HENRY BERNSTEIN felt that because of the tax situation and other problems it would be better to borrow money from individuals. MR. BERNSTEIN said that the amounts received in a campaign year

in New York as an advance on the following year vary between \$750,000 and \$1,500,000.

MR. ABE KASLE (Detroit), whilst not against this policy, felt that approaching contributors this year for advances on 1952 contributions would be overdoing it since it is likely that we would have to call again on the same people who always give generously. DR. SCHWARTZ replied it is not intended to approach all big givers, but rather a small group of people and it is left to the judgment of each community to decide where it should be done and with whom. Until the grant-in-aid becomes available it is urgent to get in as much money as possible.

MR. M.M. GOTTLIEB (Allentown) referred to the situation in Baltimore and thought other communities might follow the same pattern. If all communities could pay off their allocations in full for 1951 we would be assured at least \$20 million by the end of the year and if, in addition, communities would make borrowings from their banks against 1952, it would be fruitful to discuss this.

MR. JOSEPH MEYERHOFF (Baltimore) referred to the difficulties he envisages returning to the same people because of the continuing emergency.

MR. JOSEPH HOLTZMAN (Detroit) replied this is a problem that has to be faced until the immigration phase is over. He said he had always said, "This is the last time", but he now said, "This is the first time that I have said that this is not the last time". There are many sympathetic Jews in America and those are the people who will have to carry the load and they must be apprised of the situation.

MR. NISSELSON suggested that communities borrow from banks to pay up this 1951 allocation.

MR. ABE KASLE (Detroit) said that Detroit is almost paid up and will pay its 1951 balance before the end of the year.

MR. ELKAN MYERS (Baltimore) said that when Baltimore borrowed a million dollars last year twenty men signed notes for the money. This was pledged by these people against the next year's drive.

MR. BERINSTEIN, in summing up the discussion, said that he thought Harry Greenstein struck on something very important. The important thing is that the communities must be made aware of why the cash is needed and it is also necessary to realize that each community is different and will raise the cash in a different way. But Mr. Berinstein felt that amounts due for 1951 must be paid and there is no reason why UJA cannot be put on a current basis. In addition to that, however, when a community has paid its 1951 allocation in full it should, wherever possible, borrow at least a small portion of its 1952 allocation for payment to UJA.

MR. MAX OSMOS (Detroit) questioned whether, if the money isn't collected, people will think Israel is going bankrupt and bond purchasers will grow anxious. In Detroit the State of Israel has been borrowing money from individuals so that it isn't possible to borrow money from these people for the UJA.

MR. HENRY ZUCKER (Cleveland) referred to a very successful telephone campaign held in Cleveland and thought others might try it.

MR. ROSKIN (Hartford) said that if Hartford does not have enough money it will borrow on its 1952 campaign.

RABBI ISIDORE ERESLAW (Washington, D.C.) said there are many people in

SETTER SENT FROM ISRAEL TO WF PRESIDENTS AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS AND TO NON-WELFARE FUND CHAIRMAN IN COMMUNITIES WHO GAVE \$25,000 AND OVER IN 1950

We have been in Israel for several days now and it is already apparent that the inadequacy of cash receipts has created a far more critical situation than we had anticipated, familiar as we were with the general picture.

The amazing thing to us is that the people of Israel can continue to carry the burden of receiving and absorbing one newcomer every two minutes. In the first six months of 1951 alone Israel took in 130,000 immigrants from danger areas in Eastern Europe and the Near East despite unimaginable difficulties.

As officers of the United Jewish Appeal, we feel a responsibility which we share with you to act immediately lest the burden become so great that thousands of Jewish men, women and children will be doomed to despair, instead of restored to hope.

It is our considered estimate that within the next twelve to fifteen weeks the United Jewish Appeal must receive a minimum of \$35,000,000 to prevent what might be a catastrophe for tens of thousands of endangered Jews waiting their chance to come to Israel.

This is not an unrealistic sum to expect and it is the minimum amount necessary to meet the emergency we find here. However, we will not be able to get such a sum together merely by understanding that it is needed and hoping that it will come in. Instead, all of us must begin to do the most intensive job of collection we have ever done, and we must be prepared to borrow from the banks wherever necessary to meet such demands as cannot be taken care of by immediate collections.

You have already been advised of the National Report Conference of the United Jewish Appeal which will take place in New York on Saturday evening, October 27th and Sunday, October 28th.

It is our most earnest hope that you will do everything in your power to bring to this conference the largest possible sum you can gather in your community toward the required \$35,000,000 along with a pledge that, between the date of the conference and the end of 1951, you will continue to devote yourself to the task in hand until it is carried through to success.

We cannot say it too often or too strongly -- all of us serving in the United Jewish Appeal must bring together \$35,000,000 before the end of the year.

We look forward to reporting our findings to you in detail at the conference in October. In the meantime, we plead with you to mobilize your entire community in the effort to secure \$35,000,000 in cash by the end of the year.




I hope, therefore, that you will set these dates aside and refrain from arranging any other meetings so that a representative delegation from your community can attend with you.
