THE 1975 CAMPAIGN LINE

THE 1975 CAMPAIGN LINE

It seems clear that for 1975 there is no single line, no single message, and no single slogan which will capsulize the campaign. What is required is an approach, rather than a line.

This campaign is not based on war or Soviet Jewish immigration, or human needs -- but encompasses all of these issues and more. It is academic to talk about the budget. We know that the needs are far greater than they were on October 6th. Therefore, it is inappropriate to talk about campaign levels below that of Yom Kippur 1973.

We must realize that the 1975 campaign is not just another campaign. It is different from any other:

- * For the first time in Israel's 26-year history, Israel did not win a war decisively. The Yom Kippur War may have been won militarily, but certainly not psychologically as far as the rest of the world is concerned.
- * For the first time in 26 years, there is not only Arab unity, but there is an Arab economic and political power that never existed before.
- * There is an insensitivity to Jews that was not prevalent prior to October 1973. For example, Ma'alot was described in the St. Louis

 Post Dispatch, with the headline, "Arabs, Israelis Clash." Another is the release of Arab terrorists from Germany and Greece without the world murmuring any protest.
- * Finally, the Jewish people have never been as isolated as they are at present.

Can anyone say then, that the needs facing the Jewish people aren't greater today, than they were on October 6th, the day the war started?

How do we respond to this problem? We respond through unity. Only in unity will we find strength, and only through strength will we gain the confidence we need to raise more money in disengagement than we did in war.

Strength is essential not only for our campaign, but for Israel itself.

If Israel is to negotiate with friends and enemies, she must be strong. If

Israel is to resolve the explosive forgotten problems we saw at Kiryat Shemona
and Ma'alot and Safed, she must be strong. And if Israel some day will have
to say no to her only friend, the United States, she certainly will have to
be strong.

If we accept this approach -- which is an approach and not a line, then leadership must set the example.

But inherent in this approach, there is also a course of action. It has been tested and found to work. The idea is simply to begin the 1975 campaign early, and to build momentum with regular on-going activity. For example, in April, in meetings with community professional and lay leadership it was agreed to solicit pace setting gifts early to begin planning the 1975 campaign immediately. At the May Annual Executive Retreat, most of UJA's leaders gave more than they previously gave -- providing exemplary leadership necessary to ask others to give more too. In June, at the Jewish Agency Assembly, leadership of world Jewish communities supported the goal with giving as well as with moral support.

In July, there will be meetings throughout the country between community leaders and Israeli leadership -- for a dialogue on the dimension of the need, and to give community leadership the basis for understanding that the needs are greater today than they were on October 6th.

In August, a meeting is scheduled at the home of Israel's Ambassador and a Prime Minister's Mission is scheduled, and in September, it is hoped that communities will establish their Campaign goals.

In October a Million Dollar meeting is scheduled in London. In November a \$250,000 minimum meeting is also scheduled in London. In addition, 80 communities raising more than one million dollars will each take leadership fundraising missions to Israel in October and November. In November, a National Big Gifts Meeting will be held in Chicago on November 13, on the eve of the CJFWF General Assembly.

In December, UJA hopes to honor that great lady, Golda Meir, at its annual National Conference.

In January, UJA is going to call a meeting of 1,000 people in Israel. This meeting will attempt to keep in the 1975 campaign all the new people who were drawn in during the war and are not included in other major events.

In sum, 1975 is a challenge for Jews. We must make it very clear that we are not talking about the survival of Israel. Israel will survive no matter what we do. But what we are talking about is the quality of Israel's survival, the quality of life in Israel, and the quality of the Jewish people and the quality of Judaism around the world.

If we are strong, and if we are united, and we have confidence, we will meet the challenge. A single slogan is not being recommended, but there is one that epitomizes the need for 1975 -- "We Are One."

In 1975, we must act as one, and do as one, and if we do, then, we will give Israel and our communities the strength both will need.

STATUS REPORT

AMERICAN IEWISH

- The cities participating are: Boston, New York, Washington, Miami, and Chicago. Following the P R committee meetings (June 27th and 28th) Cleveland, New Orleans, St. Louis, Columbus and Milwaukee expressed varying degrees of interest in future participation.
- II. The basic concern of this first phase of testing will be to determine qualitatively the mail responsiveness of the under \$100 contributor.
 - A. Some cities will give the names of all under \$100 contributors while others will not supply those who contributed to the 1974 campaign.
 - There is the possibility that this can effect results as it is generally felt that anyone who did not contribute in 1974 probably will not contribute under any circumstances.
 - 2. It was felt that contributions of under \$100 did not represent, in many instances, a valid response to the call for making a sacrifice in order to help. Therefore, all under \$100 contributors' names should be supplied for the tests.
- III. The tests will be divided into two groups.
 - A. Contributors as defined by each federation.
 - B. Non-contributors defined as those who have never given and newly identified manner provided by the AFRS' name selection programs.

- All names identified by this process will be submitted to the federations so that they can remove known contributors.
- IV. The mailing package will consist of an original monarch size letter, mailed for in home arrival between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, a "carbon copy" follow-up mailed thirty days later, and an action format mailed thirty days after the carbon. All mailings will be accompanied by a "contribution slip" and the first by a folder specially designed to accompany the mailing.
 - A. The mailings will be individualized by the use of local federation identification.
 - B. All contributions will go back to the local federation.
 - C. Persons responding to one mailing in the series will not be mailed subsequent appeals.
 - V. Basic copy approaches were discussed and all present felt that the theme of "one year later" is the strongest. This agrees with AFRS' Program Planning Board's recommendation.
 - A. It was felt that the fall mailing series should probably not be tied to any specific year's campaign.
- VI. Mailing quantities have not been determined at this point because the tapes have not been received from the federations.
