MISSION NEWS

DEFENSE MINISTER MOSHE DAYAN TOLD TWO HUNDRED AND TWENTY FIVE UNITED JEWISH APPEAL CAMPAIGNERS SATURDAY NIGHT IN TEL-AVIV, THAT 'MILITARILY, ISRAEL CAN HOLD THE LINE. ECONOMICALLY, FINANCIALLY, WE CANT DO IT ALONE. BUT THE JEWISH PEOPLE OF THE WORLD AND ISRAEL TOGETHER CAN HOLD THE WHOLE FIELD.' DAYAN SAID THE DEFENSE MINISTRY SPENDS TEN MILLION POUNDS OR THREE MILLION DOLLARS A DAY. FRIDAY, THE UJA MISSION WAS INFORMED BY JEWISH AGENCY TREASURER ARYE DULTZIN THAT THE COST OF ABSORBING SIXTY THOUSAND IMMIGRANTS IN NINETEEN SEVENTY WILL AVERAGE ONE MILLION DOLLARS A DAY. MISSION CHAIRMAN LEONARD STRELITZ OF NORFOLK, VIRGINIA SAID THE UJA OBLIGATION IS TO CARRY THIS LOAD OF ONE MILLION DOLLARS A DAY FOR IMMIGRANT ABSORPTION, HOUSING, SETTLEMENT, EDUCATION, SOCIAL WELFARE ETC. DAYAN SAID ISRAEL'S AIM IN BOMBING MILITARY TARGETS CLOSE TO CAIRO IS NOT TO TOPPLE PRESIDENT NASSER ALTHOUGH DAYAN SAID 'I WOULDNT CRY IF NASSER FALLS.' ISRAEL AIM, HE EXPLAINED, IS TO CONDUCT A STATIC STRATEGY WITH DYNAMIC TACTICS, TO STRIKE BACK AT EGYPT, AND TRY TO FORCE EGYPT TO NEGOTIATE FOR PEACE OR OBSERVE THE CEASE FIRE WHICH NASSER ABOLISHED IN APRIL 1969. DAYAN DOUBTED IF A SUCCESSOR REGIME, AFTER NASSER, WOULD SEND THE RUSSIANS HOME OR MAKE PEACE WITH ISRAEL. DAYAN SAID ISRAEL'S WITHDRAWAL FROM SHADWAN ISLAND IN THE GULF OF SUEZ JAN. 23, AFTER CLEARING OUT THE EGYPTIANS THERE, PROVES THAT ISRAEL DOES NOT WANT TO TAKE AND HOLD ADDITIONAL EGYPTIAN TERRITORY.

DAYAN SAID HE WAS SURE THE HUNDRED FRENCH MIRAGE PLANES SOLD TO LIBYA WOULD BE USED AGAINST ISRAEL. HE STOOD PUT ON ISRAEL'S INSISTENCE UPON DELIVERY OF THE FIFTY FRENCH MIRAGEES WHICH ISRAEL ORDERED, BOUGHT AND PAID FOR. DAYAN SAID HE WOULD LIKE TO SEE U.S. JEWS 'HAVE FAITH IN OUR WAY, FULL COMPLETE FAITH THAT WE ARE DOING THE RIGHT THING. WE FEEL BADLY IF JEWS DOUBT WHAT ISRAEL DOES. I WOULD LIKE JEWS TO FEEL LIKE WE FEEL, TO SHARE OUR FEELING.' HE ADDED THAT IF THE AMERICAN PUBLIC, PRESS, TV AND RADIO FEELS THAT ISRAEL IS DOING THE RIGHT THING, THE US GOVERNMENT WILL BE FRIENDLY TO ISRAEL AND ANSWER POSITIVELY TO OUR REQUESTS. EXPLAINING THE BLOWING UP OF ARAB TERRORISTS' HOUSES IN OCCUPIED TERRITORY, DAYAN SAID

THIS FORM OF PUNISHMENT 'IS THE MAIN ELEMENT THAT GIVES US A CHANCE TO STAY IN THE OCCUPIED TERRITORIES AND TO NEGOTIATE PEACE.' DAYAN TOLD OF VISITING SUEZ CANAL POSITIONS WITH HERBERT FRIEDMAN LAST WEEK, FINDING MANY VOLUNTEER OFFICERS SERVING BEYOND THEIR RESERVE CALL OF DUTY BECAUSE THEY FELT THEY WERE NEEDED THERE. ONE OFFICER WAS SERVING SIX MONTHS RESERVE SERVICE VOLUNTARILY. STRELITZ SAID THE SUCCESS OF HIS MISSION, RAISING TWO MILLION FOUR HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS WITH SEVENTY PER CENT OVERALL INCREASES, WILL HAVE A POWERFUL IMPACT UPON SCORES OF COMMUNITIES IN TWENTY ONE STATES. 'TOGETHER WITH ALL THE WEEKLY MISSIONS THAT COME TO ISRAEL DURING THIS CAMPAIGN, THE TOTAL EFFECT WILL BE TO CHANGE THE WHOLE UJA CAMPAIGN IN THE UNITED STATES. BESIDES, THE GREAT NUMBER OF YOUNG MEN WHO ARE COMING ON THESE MISSIONS WILL PROVIDE A GREAT BUILD-UP OF FUTURE, DYNAMIC, INFORMED LEADERSHIP FOR THE AMERICAN JEWISH COMMUNITIES.' DULTZIN TOLD THE UJA MISSION THE STARK, DARK REALITY OF ISRAEL'S FINANCIAL BALANCE SHEET. ISRAEL'S DEFENSE BUDGET HAS SWOLLEN FROM ONE POINT TWO BILLION ISRAELI POUNDS IN 1967, TO THREE POINT THREE BILLION POUNDS IN 1968 TO FOUR POINT THREE BILLION POUNDS, OR ONE POINT TWO BILLION DOLLARS IN THE CURRENT FISCAL YEAR. THIS IS EIGHTY FIVE PER CENT OF NATIONAL INCOME: OF FIVE BILLION POUNDS, AND TWENTY FIVE PER CENT OF GROSS NATIONAL PRODUCT.

THE JEWISH AGENCY SPENT LAST YEAR A QUARTER BILLION DOLLARS, (DLRS250,000,000) ON HUMANITARIAN SERVICES, BUT WAS NINETY MILLION DOLLARS SHORT. WE NEED TWO HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS TO A QUARTER BILLION DOLLARS ADDITIONAL IN 1970 THAN WE RECEIVED IN 1969, DULTZIN SAID.

THE OTHER FRONT - TWO THOUSAND NEW HOUSING UNITS IN UPPER NAZARETH WERE APPROVED BY THE HOUSING MINISTRY. BUILDING WILL START IN 1971, MAYOR MORDECHAI ALLON SAID. SIX HUNDRED AND FIFTY HOUSING UNITS TO BE BUILT THIS YEAR WONT BE ENOUGH, IN VIEW OF THE INCREASED IMMIGRANT ABSORPTION.

SHORTAGE OF FUNDS FORCED A CUT IN SCHOLARSHIPS AND ALLOCATIONS FOR UNIVERSITY STUDENTS FROM ABROAD. ALLOCATIONS WILL BE CUT FOR STUDENTS WHO ARE TEMPORARY RESIDENTS OR POTENTIAL IMMIGRANTS BUT NOT FOR IMMIGRANT STUDENTS. THE STUDENT'S AUTHORITY PAYS TUITION FEES FOR FIVE THOUSAND FOREIGN STUDENTS AND GIVES LIVING ALLOWANCES IN SOME CASES UP TO TWO THOUSAND POUNDS PER YEAR. HALF OF THESE AIDED STUDENTS ARE NEW

NEWS IN BRIEF - THE TEL-AVIV NEWSPAPER HAAREZ SAID THAT PRESIDENT NIXON'S PROMISE NOT TO HESITATE TO SUPPLY ARMS TO FRIENDLY COUNTRIES, INCLUDING ISRAEL, ACCORDING TO THEIR NEEDS, IS NO EMPTY PROMISE. NIXON EXPLICITLY MENTIONED THAT THE RUSSIANS ARE SUPPLYING THE ARABS WITH ARMS AND THE FRENCH 'AGAINST THE WISHES OF THE US' PLANS TO SELL PLANES TO LIBYA. PRESIDENT NIXON MENTIONED ISRAEL AS ONE OF THE FRIENDLY STATES ENTITLED TO RECEIVE ARMS FROM THE US TO DEFEND THE SECURITY OF ITS PEOPLE. HAAREZ NOTED THAT THE U.S. WOULD NOT IMPOSE PEACE CONDITIONS, STRESSING THAT THE ONLY WAY TO PEACE IN THE MIDDLE EAST WAS NEGOTIATIONS. NIXON SPOKE ABOUT SECURE BORDERS TO BE FIXED IN NEGOTIATIONS, HAAREZ SAID.

PRESIDENT NIXON REFRAINED FROM MENTIONING 'DIRECT NEGOTIATIONS' AND DID NOT ELABORATE ON THE KINDS AND QUANTITIES OF ARMS HE IS READY TO SUPPLY. BUT EVEN THE GENERAL OUTLINES OF HIS MESSAGE WAS OF UTMOST IMPORTANCE. THERE IS MUCH IN IT, TO ENCOURAGE US AND WE MAY UNDERSTAND FROM IT THAT ISRAEL'S REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL ARMS WILL BE VIEWED FAVOURABLY, BECAUSE ISRAEL IS RECOGNIZED AS A FRIENDLY STATE, HAAREZ SAID.

BEIRUT GOVERNMENT TURNED DOWN AN OFFER BY IRAQ TO SEND SEVEN THOUSAND TROOPS TO HELP LEBANON DEFEND ITS SOUTHERN BORDER WITH ISRAEL.

JORDAN RECEIVED FROM SAUDI ARABIA TEN MILLION AND SEVEN HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS, AS PART PAYMENTS IN THE UNITED ARAB APPEAL.

THE FRENCH GOVERNMENT, UNRUFFLED BY THE OUTCRY OVER ITS MASSIVE SALE OF WARPLANES TO LIBYA, STARTED TALKS WITH IRAQ. GEORGE SEGUY, SECRETARY GENERAL OF THE FRENCH COMMUNIST-LED C.G.T TRADE UNION FEDERATION SAID THE C.G.T WAS 'RESOLUTELY ON THE SIDE OF THE ARAB PEOPLE AND WORKERS'.

FORTY FOUR MEN WERE EXECUTED SO FAR IN IRAQ BLOOD BATH. THE PRICE ISRAEL PAYS - ISRAEL MOURNED THE DEATH OF TWENTY IN ADDITION TO FORTY ONE INJURIES IN SATURDAY'S ACCIDENTAL AMMUNITION TRUCK BLAST IN EILAT. FUNERALS OF VICTIMS WERE HELD IN VARIOUS PARTS OF THE COUNTRY SUNDAY. IT IS BELIEVED THAT AN ARMED SHELL OR LANDMINE IN THE TRUCK HAD ITS DETONATOR TOUCHED OFF WHEN THE TRUCK WAS JOSTLED DRIVING OFF THE TRANSPORT VESSEL IN THE MILITARY PORT. THE EXPLOSIVES WERE BEING SHIPPED BACK FROM SHADWAN. MUNITIONS AND MINES ARE DESIGNED FOR ROUGH HANDLING TRANSPORTATION WITHOUT THEIR SENSITIVE FUSES

AND DETONATORS. AS A MARK OF MOURNING, THE KNESSET
CANCELLED ITS TWENTY FIRST ANNIVERSARY RECEPTION TONIGHT.

INSERT - AFTER EILAT EXPLOSION - CHIEF OF STAFF

EXPLOSION. THE MAGNITUDE OF THE DISASTER TO ISRAEL CAN

ISRAELI PLANES ATTACKED EGYPTIAN ARMY POSITIONS ON THE SUEZ CANAL SUNDAY, FOR FORTY MINUTES. ALL ISRAEL PLANES RETURNED SAFELY.

EGYPTIAN OFFICIALS CHARGED THAT THE ISRAELIS' RAID ON SHADWAN WAS TO DESTROY THE MORALE OF THE EGYPTIAN PEOPLE, AP REPORTS.

ISRAELI FORCES WERE UNDER STRICT ORDERS NOT TO STRIKE AT ANY CIVILIAN SHIPS, AND THAT THESE ORDERS WERE CAREFULLY OBSERVED, SAID THE ISRAEL ARMY SPOKESMAN.

Teaneck UJA Dinner Opens Campaign

Teaneck United Jewish Appeal Inaugural Dinner at Tammy Brook Country Club, Tuesday evening, was summed up by its chairman, Howard Reinert, in one sentence:

"The outpouring of gifts was greater than the downpour of rain." "If tonight is an indication of what we may hope to achieve in this year's appeal," said David Follender general chairman, then we are on our way toward a level of response such as was exceeded only in the war of 1967."

Rabbi Herbert Friedman, executive chairman of National UJA spoke to a hushed audience in describing the needs which face Israel and world Judaism today. "They are our responsibility, yours and mine. They are all that is left to us in these terrible days of wars and attrition. You and I and all Jews throughout our land are the mightiest weapon which they possess. Without us they will suffer. ... They will survive, because they have learned through deprivation, through hardship and through death to persevere. They choose life. But, with us they will walk taller and we will walk taller

To Fight Anti-Semitism In Latin America

NEW YORK (JTA) - The World Jewish Congress has launched a special effort to counteract anti-Semitism and mounting Arab propaganda campaigns in Latin America, according to a report by Marc Turkow, secretary-general of the Latin American Jewish Congress, whose headquarters is in Buenos Aires.

He reported that the Arab propaganda campaign had received considerable financial support from agents of the Arab League and from Arab embassies.

"While Arab propaganda focused ostensibly on Zionism and Israel, it tried in reality to undermine the existing friendly

Grenades Miss Dayan's Son In Munich Killed, 23 Hurt, 3 Arabs Seized

An apparent attempt on the life of Asaf Dayan, son of Israel's defense minister, by three grenade-throwing Arabs, killed one Israeli and wounded 23 on a bus and in a lounge at Munich Airport.

Moshe Dayan's son, who was unhurt, was already aboard the El Al plane when the attack took place in the lounge. The flight was from Tel Aviv to London with stop at Munich.

A grenade explosion killed Ari Katzenstein, 32-year-old engineer from Haifa, and wounded Hanna Maron, an Israeli actress, the pilot and co-pilot.

One of the Arabs was wounded when a grenade went off in his hand. All three were seized by police after a short gun battle.

Shortly after noon, Tuesday, two suspects joined 19 El Al passengers on the bus going to the terminal. They pulled pistols and order the driver to open the door. Uriel Cohen, the El Al pilot,

SURVIVAL AT STAKE

Center Fund Drive Ends Sunday With 'Stockholders Meeting'

"High noon" for the Jewish Community Center of Jersey City will be this Sunday.

At that hour, the Jewish community of this city will discover whether or not its central institution will be able to keep its doors open and its programs functioning.

The drive to pay off \$75,000 in accrued indebtedness - started less than two months ago - will culminate at that time with a "Stockholders Meeting," in the Jewish Community Center, 604 Bergen Ave.

Said the campaign's co-chairmen, George Clott and Charles Krieger:

"We are calling this a Stockholders Meeting because in a very real sense every member of the Jewish community here is a stockholder in the Center.

"At this session, we hope for a final outpouring of contributions to put this drive over the top, and our target is a stockholders report announcing success."

They noted that the Center is close to its goal, but has not reached it yet.

"If we are to hit our campaign target," said the co-chairmen, "it is absolutely vital that every person interested in the survival of the Center attend this meeting

and contribute as generously as possible."

Committees and campaign workers have mounted an intensive effort this week to insure a maximum turnout for the Sunday meeting.

Solons Ask Pompidou Boycott

WASHINGTON (JTA) - Rep. Bertram L. Podell of New York, New York Congressmen Frank J. Brasco and Marion Biaggi, and Rep. Roman Pucinski of Illinois, sent a jointly signed "Dear Colleague" letter to members of Congress urging them to boycott a planned joint session of Congress for French President Georges Pompidou.

The letter charged that France had inflamed Middle East tensions and displayed contempt for U.S.-Israel ties by supplying arms and aircraft to the "radical Arab" cause.

"We have mixed feelings about protesting against a President of

MOUNTING DIPLOMATIC ACTIVITY

Conflicting Reports On American Jet Aid As Battles Escalate

WASHINGTON (JTA) - The State Department officially denied a report that appeared in the New York Times that the Nixon administration has decided to sell Israel the Phantom jet and Skyhawk aircraft and other weapons it has requested. Department spokesman John King described the Times' report as "inaccurate." White House spokesmen said they had nothing to add to President Nixon's statement at his Jan. 30 press conference that he would decide within 30 days whether or not to supply Israel with the military aid requested by Premier Golda Meir when she visited Washington last September. American and Israeli diplomats here expressed "concern" at the Times' claim. King said "No decision has been made on the matter. The Israeli request is under study."

The report and its denial came during a week-end of mounting diplomatic activity over the Middle East and a major escalation of fighting in that region. In Cairo, President Gamal Abdel Nasser of Egypt held a war council with King Hussein, of Jordan, President Nouruddin Al-Atassi of Syria and representatives of the Iraqi and Sudanese governments as Israeli bombers pounded Egyptian Army camps and ammunition dumps as close as 16 miles away.

PRESIDENT GEORGES POMPIDOU of France reportedly proposed in a note to Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin, that the Four Powers call immediately for the restoration of the cease-fire agreements in the

EXPANDING WORLD PROGRAMS

ORT Starts 90th Year With Top Budget, Aims

NEW YORK — Dr. William Haber, president of the American ORT Federation, now starting its 90th year, announced a 1970 budget of \$19,173,000, an increase of \$1,500,000 and the largest in ORT history, at the organization's National Conference here. The increase is expected to go largely for education in Israel, France, Iran and India.

President Nixon, in a message sent to the Conference, said that "through your rehabilitation and training programs you have lifted hearts and lives, thus restoring dignity and opportunity to the impoverished and to refugees the world over."

Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir sent a message lauding ORT for its work in "preparing the youth of Israel and Jewish youth abroad for the tasks which our people have been called upon to shoulder."

Eugene Abrams, former official of the U.S. Agency for International Development and now head of the ORT Technical Assistance Department said the 12 ORT educational and manpower development projects had been activated in nine countries of Latin America and Africa.

ORT Director-General Max Braude told the conference that there had been a "radical change" in the Jewish occupational spectrum in the last few decades, and that ORT was responding to this by innovating such science-based studies as automation, nuclear technology and computer technology.

DR. SAMUEL RUBERT, President of Chicago Men's ORT was named "Man-of-the-Year." Alvin Mermin of New Haven and William Wolpert of New York received ORT "Achievement" awards.

ORT, Organization for Rehabilitation through Training, operates programs in 24 countries and 87 cities. There are 623 trade and technical education projects with 91 different occupational skills being taught.

Paul Bernick, executive director of the American ORT Federation, was elected chairman of the American Council of Voluntary Agencies in Foreign Service. The Council is the coordinating service unit for 43 voluntary agencies registered with the U.S. State Department for their service operations abroad.

Executive Director of American ORT for more than 15 years, Bernick is regarded as one of the outstanding "Jewish civil servants" on the American scene.

He has been chief coordinator for U.S. government sponsored ORT technical education projects in developing nations. He was primarily responsible for organizing the International ORT Congress in Montreal in 1968.

DECADES BEFORE the idea of technical assistance for small nations was born in the United States, ORT had embarked on a program of such assistance for Jews. It was founded in Russia in 1880 to give skilled training in handicraft and agriculture to the vast numbers of poor and unskilled Jews in the country.

With its record of having trained hundreds of thousands of Jews in useful professions during its 90 years of existence, ORT enjoys great respect of governments, including the government of the United States.

The high opinion which the U.S. Government maintains for ORT's training program can best be judged from the fact that Washington has, in recent years concluded a number of agreements with ORT for operation of programs of U.S. technical aid in a number of underdeveloped countries. The

operations run into millions of dollars in countries like Mali and Guinea, and in smaller sums in Kenya, Gabon, the Ivory Coast, and others.

Instructors from these countries — as well as members of the American Peace Corps — receive intensive vocational training in the Institute for Higher Technical Education which ORT maintains in Switzerland. In this Institute, there are today instructors-in-training from 18 lands. The Swiss Government has given full recognition to this institution by granting it the authority to issue diplomas to the graduates.

A major supporter of ORT is the Joint Distribution Committee which allocated \$2,400,000 last year for ORT activities. The 85,000 members of the Women's American ORT raise about \$2,000,000 a year. The American ORT Federation also has men's chapters throughout the United States.

AJC Blasts JDL Tactics

NEW YORK, (JTA) — The American Jewish Conference on Soviet Jewry sharply condemned this week "misguided zealots" who have disrupted concerts of Soviet artists and defaced property while ostensibly acting on behalf of the rights of Soviet Jews. The Conference is a representative body of 26 national Jewish organizations and community councils actively seeking full religious and cultural right for Soviet Jewry.

A spokesman for the group said its denunciation was directed primarily at the Jewish Defense League and several independent student groups which have created disturbances at concerts given by visiting Soviet artists in New York and Washington. The JDL has demanded an end to U.S.-Soviet cultural exchanges and has threatened to disrupt all Soviet performances in this country.

The Conference said that it has always encouraged militant action on behalf of Soviet Jews but it believes that such action must be responsible. "Acts of vandalism and rowdiness serve no constructive purpose and in fact have harmful and self-defeating results," the statement said.

In his closing statement Rabbi Friedman quoted his own teacher, the late Stephen Wise, who said, "True redemption comes to the Jew only if he bears his name and all of the burdens imposed upon him by destiny, with gleaming courage and with radiant nobleness, which, whether or not they evoke the love of the world without, shall justify him in his own sight and hallow him anew in the presence of the Eternal to whom alone he is ultimately accountable."

1970 Fund Campaign Tops \$4 Million!

Unprecedented Total
Announced by Colburn;

"Not Finished Yet!"

Capacity Crowd of More Than 500 Attends Annual Meeting; Rabbi Friedman Praises Community for Spectacular Rise and Success

In an exuberant mood to celebrate an unprecedented attainment, more than 500 persons, who crowded Siegel Hall of Congregation Beth Israel to capacity last Wednesday evening, heard Campaign Chairman Gerald S. Colburn declare that "though I cannot give you a final report until the last contributor has been solicited," announce that the 1970 Campaign of the Jewish Welfare Fund had exceeded \$4,000,000. Despite a resounding applause that spontaneously broke from the audience with this revelation, Mr. Colburn persisted that "The campaign is not yet over, we still have work to do!"

Obviously, work — dedicated, unstinting and inspired — had been done. Mr. Colburn traced the escalation of giving in the Milwaukee Jewish community. He recited figures, beginning with 1967, when \$3,400,000 had been raised — in a year and at a time of historic importance; duplicated in 1968, and up to a new high in 1969, when gifts rose to \$3,800,000. "But in 1970," Mr. Colburn said, "we have topped \$4,000,000." He said that he expected there would be tens of thousands of dollars more to add to this total. He concluded by saying "We should all take pride in what we have thus far accomplished. We hope to serve as an example in the United States, and yet, I cannot but hope, too, that other cities will do even better!"

Friedman "Welcomed Home"

In recognition for what the Milwaukee Jewish community had accomplished, Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, national executive vice-chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, former spiritual leader of Congregation Emanu-El B'nai Jeshurun here, was "welcomed home." He spared no words, in his well-intoned rhetoric, in praising Milwaukee. Recalling that 15 years ago, when he left this city for his executive post in New York, "this community was at the bottom. It has risen in a most spectacular way. It is an unbelievable story of success. I carry great pride in my heart about this community when I go all over the country and tell them of what you have accomplished!" He predicted that "if you keep going this way there is no reason why you can't become a \$6 or \$7 million dollar community!"

In one of the finest annual reports rendered to the community in years, Albert B. Adelman, president of the Federation, reviewed the entire panorama of services and accomplishments of the Federation. He touched all bases, in a perspective and prospective evaluation of the Federation's programs. Noting the tenor of the times, of a world in flux and combustion, Mr. Adelman declared that "your presence here is evidence of your interest and sense of responsibility for what the Federation is doing." He praised the "great spirit in Milwaukee which has been manifest in many ways." He said that the "pledge cards you signed represent not only money, but a way of life." He observed that "We have built together; we should thank heaven for the magnificent leadership the Federation has brought forth and developed." He expressed thanks to all, that included not only the campaign leaders and workers but the office staff, and paid particular praise to Melvin S. Zane, executive vice-president, as "one of the very best in the United States."

Praises Israel's Unity

Rabbi Friedman's address was in the brilliant style of eloquence and composition which brought him his fame in his early days in the pastorate here, and has since

extended through Jewish communities in the world. He noted that "We are going through dangerous days, and we shall probably be going through even more dangerous times." He praised Israel's unity, and said it was the factor which preserved it in its 22 years of assault. He was most pessimistic about Israel's chances of attaining peace. Peace, he stated, "was hopelessly out of reality. There is no reason to think that way; it is self-delusion to believe otherwise. There are few, if any, options open to us to direct events on the path to peace. Only to withdraw, and then to see if the Arabs would seek peace. But this would be quite risky," he warned. "Events prove it would be foolhardy."

He declared that the best option was to have the enemy return to the cease-fire lines, and there was very small possibility of that — in his opinion.

Turning to the entry of Russia as a new combat factor in the Middle East, Rabbi Friedman said "We will have an accelerated war now that the Soviets have entered into it. They have committed a blunder." He estimated that "the USSR's participation in new phases, that there were 20,000 Russians in Egypt — enough for an armored brigade." Though he said that Israel had made the decision not to engage Russian pilots so long as they were flying operational missions around Cairo and the Aswan Dam, he said that if Soviet fliers rose in the areas where Israel was bombing Egyptian missile sites, Israel pilots would engage them. He compared this with the same threat that Soviet Russia posed to the U.S. at the time the USSR was warned by Pres. Kennedy to stay out of Cuba.

Egypt Now a Vassal State

Nasser, Rabbi Friedman stated, was no longer an independent ruler, and he declared that Egypt was now a vassal state of Russia. "The Soviets now have more ships in the Mediterranean than the U.S.," he said. The Russians have great ambitions in the Mediterranean and predicted that they would not stop there, but would seek the same status in the Indian Ocean.

The UJA executive deplored Sec. Rogers' answer to Foreign Minister Abba Eban in Washington that the U.S. had not come to a decision in selling jet planes to Israel. "That means 'No!'" he said. "Russia will read that and they will take it as a clear signal to push, push, push. Israel must take it as a sign that once again Jews stand alone." He assailed the United Nations whose "sterility becomes more apparent everytime something happens." The UN Security Council had once again condemned Israel the day before.

In other things, Rabbi Friedman noted the tremendous response which Jewish communities across the U.S. were showing in their campaigns. "Jews will stand solid," he said, "despite anything the stock market may do." He spoke glowingly of immigration to and absorption in Israel. "Planes and ships come in every day, every week, bringing newcomers. They are not from the moon. They read papers, but they come anyway!" He said that in 1969, more doctors and engineers came to Israel to live than all the schools in Israel had graduated. He said that it was a costly operation; "the war costs \$4 million a day, immigration one million; but nobody is saying, 'stop immigration!'"

In conclusion, asking "Where's the hope?" he answered by saying that "Hope was in the facts of life and growth in Israel. 'You live, you grow, you get stronger and you get older,' he philosophized. "I am sorry that we are wasting blood and treasure, but we have faith and we have a glorious future. I am hardboiled and realistic; as we have born the past, with the same strength we face the future. Today, we celebrate another year of life, which means another year of victory."

Awards were presented during the evening and elections were held for the boards of the Women's Division and the Federation. (Due to the press of deadline, a full list of elected members and awards will be published in The Chronicle in the next issue.)

The inaugural of the 1970 Allied Jewish Appeal - Israel Emergency Fund has been rescheduled for May 6th. Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, Executive Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, and one of the most sought after speakers on the American scene will deliver an address which will provide an up-to-date and off-the-record analysis of Israel's current situation.

Israel Denies Mistreatment Of Prisoners

JERUSALEM (JTA) -- The Israel Government reacted angrily to a report published by Amnesty International in London stating that it had prima facie evidence of mistreatment of Arab prisoners undergoing interrogation in Israeli jails. Amnesty International is a private organization active on behalf of political prisoners. It conceded that in all the cases reported, the evidence came from the prisoners themselves, but claimed that "the serious nature" of the charges warranted an immediate investigation by a committee of inquiry empowered to call for documents and subpoena witnesses.

The Israel Foreign Ministry expressed "astonishment" that the organization "has permitted itself to be the vehicle for spreading unfounded allegations, having their origin in a campaign of atrocity propaganda carried on by the Arab states and their supporters."

Rabbi Friedman is one of the most authoritative persons on the American scene about Israel's situation.

Wives Welcome

For the first time in history, and based upon popular request, the men to whom the invitations will be addressed may bring their wives to the dinner.

The annual Community Service Award will also be presented at the Inaugural Dinner. A special committee of past Presidents and officers of the Jewish Federation have been entrusted with responsibility to make the selection and the recipient will be announced shortly before the dinner.

In view of the unprecedented goal adopted by the Jewish community of Camden in face of similarly unprecedented needs and the seriousness of the situation in Israel, it is expected that all men present will make a minimum contribution to the 1970 Allied Jewish Appeal - Israel Emergency Fund of \$200 for the year 1970. It was explained that those who have previously made their contribution in that amount or more are welcome to come and are not required to make an additional

France Urges Cooperation With 'Big-4'

PARIS (JTA) -- Foreign Minister Maurice Schumann said that before Franco-Israel relations can "improve and revert to normal" Israel must cooperate with the Four Power Mideast consultations in New York and agree to implement the United Nations Security Council's Nov. 22, 1967 Mideast resolution. Mr. Schumann spoke at a Foreign Press Association luncheon in his honor. He denied that anyone "asks for an unconditional surrender by Israel of the occupied territories." He said what the Four Powers want and what is a "must" for any settlement, is "a withdrawal accompanied by guarantees of the right of all countries to existence within just and safe borders."

Replying to a question by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent, the French Foreign Minister said the Big Four consultations were "not a substitute for a more direct form of talks between the two sides (Arabs and Israelis) but only a means to make such a step easier."

Rabbis Debate on 'Authentic Judaism'

Three rabbis opened a debate quietly and built it to a heated pitch, early this month at Beth El Synagogue in Cherry Hill. "Authentic Judaism -- Which?" was the theme.

Each rabbi defined his own branch of Judaism. Then the host, Rabbi Howard Khan, posed questions for round-robin response.

Rabbi Morris Dombowitz, Conservative, of Philadelphia, said Judaism is ever maturing. "We cannot define it and thereby put it in a straitjacket. . . . Our greatest achievement has been to update the Bible and then the Talmud. . . . We must endeavor to make the finest elements of religious Judaism work in society today."

Rabbi Charles B. Mintz, Reform, also of Philadelphia, said Judaism

must enunciate "universal values." Our willingness to do this "in new and dramatic ways . . . can make these values meaningful to our own Jews, and thereby to other peoples. . . ."

Rabbi David B. Hollander of New York upheld the Orthodox as wedded to the Torah, and "we would rather fight than switch." Rejecting Reform's mission to all mankind, he held the Torah way of life to be the only protection against assimilation and loss of self-respect. "We have chosen not to be popular and to be 'like others'."

Rabbi Kahn's most penetrating question was: "Suppose your daughter were married in a civil ceremony to a non-Jewish young man who refused to convert. How would you react?"

lies and half truths. Like when they approached the Wait Whitman Bridge, and Harry paid the toll, George wanted to know if all the bridges in America were privately owned.

I met George at the Center and we communicated in Yiddish, bad German and pigeon English - it was a little hard, but we made it. I always said one Jewish heart knows another.

George comes from a small Polish town, Dzerszenov, near Wroclaw, where his mother, father and 16 year old brother now reside. Before the holocaust, there were 20,000 Jews in the town; today, there are only 4 families.

War Years

The older Binder spent the war years in a Russian labor camp in Siberia. Mrs. Binder, who is from Germany escaped to Poland and lived on the Aryan side, when her father was taken to a concentration camp from which he never returned. After the war, the couple met and married in Poland.

Those years in Siberia have left their mark on the older Binder. He is an invalid with a serious heart condition. He cannot work and lives on a small union pension.

George is a graduate of a Technical School and has worked in a Radio and Television factory as a Boss Mechanic. Bu life is dull and bitter in Poland, especially for a Jew. Since the 6 Day War of Israel, the Communists have whipped up a campaign of hate and terror against the "Zionists" and they have made life intolerable for the Polish Jews.

Jews Leaving

Since so many Jews are leaving the country, George decided this

was his opportunity, for there is no future for Jewish Youth in Poland.

There are those among us who keep insisting that we must forget about that most devastating period of our history - that it is past and should be forgotten. But we seem to be destined in every generation to see the fruits of persecution and anti-semitism and we try to answer the silent cries for help, where we can.

While there is nothing really new or startling in George Binder's story, it certainly does reiterate a fact of life for our community.

Poor Conditions

Because of the plight of the Polish Jews and because the Polish Jews are begging for visas to leave the country, our community has been asked again, to accept a quota of these families. George is one of the first.

Our community has assured the United Hias Service if we raise sufficient funds, we will definitely do our share, as we have done in the past.

We are now in the midst of our Allied Jewish Appeal campaign and the funds are urgently needed to help deliver as many Jews as pos-

sible from Poland and the other Iron Curtain countries, wherever they can leave.

We must help the Georges and their brothers to begin a new life; to live as Jews, but it depends on the funds collected here. We must do our share. We cannot let "George" do it.

Big Four Try Again To Seek Means For Peace Discussions

UNITED NATIONS (JTA) -- The Big Four talks resumed their Middle East talks amid speculation by diplomatic sources that the discussions may include an effort to draw up a "catalog" of agree-

ments and disagreements. A spokesman for the United States said he would "not deny" that this catalog would be part of the discussions. At their last meeting, the Four Power representatives tried

to draw up such a catalog but were unable to come to any agreement, because some of them were prepared to discuss only what they had agreed on while others wanted to discuss both the agreements and disagreements.

Late afternoon the Big Four representatives concluded their discussion on the Middle East, with United States Ambassador Charles W. Yost, the host, announcing that Four Power deputies had been asked to prepare a memo on the talks so far on implementation of the Security Council ceasefire. The deputies, he said, would meet Thursday, and were expected to submit their memo in time for the next meeting of the ambassadors on April 15, at the residence of the new French representative.

The Big Four talks were cancelled, the regular day for the talks, at the request of Lord Caradon, the British representative, who said he had a speaking engagement in Canada. The announcement of the cancellation came just before Secretary of State William P. Rogers and Soviet Ambassador Anatoli Dobrynin were scheduled to meet in Washington to confer on the possibility of resuming the Two Power talks. Diplomatic sources in New York contended that cancellations of the Big Four talks was prompted by the meeting in Washington. The sources observed that the Four Power representatives wanted to assess the Rogers-Dobrynin Conference. A UN spokesman announced that Ambassador Gunnar V. Jarring, special UN representative to the Middle East, would leave his New York headquarters to return to Moscow. He had come to New York on March 10 to confer with representatives of the Big Four and other "interested parties."

According to diplomatic sources, Dr. Jarring's return to Moscow was partially due to the hard-line attitude adopted by the Soviet representative at the Four Power talks in rejecting a catalog that would spell out agreements and disagreements with the other three powers on Mideast guidelines. Now, diplomats are saying, that Dr. Jarring has returned, the Russians, are showing a greater willingness to discuss a full catalog and ready to make procedural compromises to show that they are not responsible for any roadblocks in the continuing talks. The spokesman for the American Delegation said there is no way of judging at this time whether the projected bilateral talks in Washington would act as a substitute for the Big Four talks. Sources have stated that the Big Four talks which have been taking place weekly, may take place less frequently. The U.S. spokesman said that less frequent meetings may occur but may not be directly motivated by the Two Power talks, but by other, practical considerations.

Rabbi Lester Hering, spiritual leader of Beth Jacob Synagogue, will be honored by his congregation for his 10 years of service to the community and Judaism, according to Edward A. Kasloff, dinner chairman.

Kasloff said the theme of the evening will be a "Decade of Service." The event will be held on May 23.

NEW YORK (JTA) -- President Nixon was urged by the chairman of the American Zionist Council to reappraise as quickly as possible the military balance in the Middle East in light of the new Soviet build-up of Arab armaments and to follow through with "appropriate action so that the Arabs are convinced.... that they cannot and will not achieve military superiority over Israel." Rabbi Israel Miller, in a letter to the President, said the decision to hold in abeyance Israel's request for more Phantom and Skyhawk jets is "disappointing and most unfair to Israel." He claimed that the U.S. decision "also weakens America's position in that strategic part of the world vis-a-vis the Russian build-up in the area."

WASHINGTON (JTA) -- Informal sources confirmed reports here

that the Soviet Union has agreed to resume bilateral talks on the Middle East. They are expected to begin in April between Joseph Sisco, Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs and Soviet Ambassador Anatoli F. Dobrynin. The sources said the Soviets had agreed "in principle" to the new talks because of the failure of the Four Power deliberations conducted in New York

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (JTA) -- Dr. Gunnar V. Jarring, the United Nations special envoy for the Middle East, has completed nearly two weeks of consultations here on the possibility of resuming his peace-seeking mission in the Middle East without finding any basis for renewed action or any change in the situation that offered any hopes that a renewed effort at this time, would be productive.

"An extra special treat is in store in addition to having the opportunity of hearing Rabbi Friedman," Dr. Rubin stated, "Ilka Raveh, world renowned Israeli folksinger, will present a program of music as an added hors d'oeuvres."

Norfolk is currently the number one community of its size in support of the United Jewish Appeal. With the dramatic events of the Six Day War, Norfolk set the pace in fund raising in behalf of Israel before any other community in the country. Since that time, Norfolk has raised its fund raising achievement significantly each year: 1967 and 1968, \$919,000; 1969, \$1,193,000; and in 1970 hopefully \$1,300,000.

Washington Drug Expert For JFS, May 13

Dr. Perlman received his doctorate in education, counseling and psychology from Penn State University. He has lectured there and at Maryland University. He is in charge of a five state region plus Washington D.C., Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Dr. Perlman is now actively engaged in the development of rehabilitation programs for drug abusers at the community level.

Federation President Issues Proclamation For "Founders Day"

WHEREAS, it has been demonstrated in many ways that our Jewish community confronts from time to time unforeseen and demanding situations over and above those provided for by the annual United Jewish Fund Campaign, and in many cases verging on a critical time element;

WHEREAS, it has therefore been resolved by the Board of Directors of the United Jewish Federation, Inc., of Norfolk and Virginia Beach, that an Endowment Fund be established;

THEREFORE, I, Joseph Strelitz, President, to accomplish the purposes for which the Endowment Fund is established, hereby proclaim the month of May 1970 as Founders Month, and herewith urge and implore Jews sympathetic to our general well-being to join with their fellows as Founders of the program of the Endowment Funds.

President Joseph Strelitz has established the month of May, 1970 as "Founders Month" for the Endowment Fund of the United Jewish Federation. A "Founder" is one, who, during the first year of the existence of the Endowment Program, has completed a "Letter of Intent," indication of his or her intention to make a gift to the Fund, whether during lifetime or by will. The fiscal year of the Endowment Program ends June 30, and the names of the Founders will be inscribed and prominently displayed in the Federation offices.

The principal purposes of the United Jewish Federation Endowment program are to create a fund for the organized Jewish community and to encourage gifts and bequests for general and charitable purposes. Norfolk and Virginia Beach, along with other central Jewish community organizations throughout the country, are looking to endowment funds to provide financial underpinning for existing programs, not now adequately financed and to support new programs.

The Endowment Fund is necessary as insurance that the Jewish com-

munity can rely upon against reverses, were other instrumentalities of fund raising to have difficulties as a result of economic conditions.

An illustration of the value of an Endowment program occurred during the Six-Day War when communications with long-time portfolios, were able to appropriate large sums for this emergency, without the delay of a financial campaign, and thus lending support to the freedom of the State of Israel.

Our own Center provides another example of large scale need which could have been met by a large sum established Endowment plan. The Hillier House at Old Dominion University will need help as enrollment grows — the Tidewater Jewish Youth Council will undoubtedly want to undertake special worthwhile projects — an Endowment Fund, established — could finance them in whole or in part.

Endowment Fund Chairman, Harry Pincus, Jr., stated that as of April 1, all of the officers of the Federation and over fifty other additional donors executed "Letters of Intent," thus giving the Founders list a good start.

New Center Almost Here

The new Center building contractor reports that finished work is now being completed in many areas of the building. The dome has been completed, as well as connecting work to the swimming pool mechanical system. Installation of the doors is expected shortly.

Grading work is finished around the building; sidewalks and pathways are now being laid. Site work has been completed on the new tennis courts and are expected to be completed by May.

The contractor has assured the

Building Committee that the pool and locker room areas will be completed, and operational in time for swimming and Day Camp. Installation of the protective fencing around the pool should be completed by the first of May.

Interior work on the building is moving at a very rapid pace. Ceilings will be installed and floor tile is expected shortly. Mechanical and electrical work is proceeding at a good pace.

Jack Barr, chairman of the Building Committee, wants to assure the

community that the pool and swimming facilities will be available for summer. Completion of the building will be on time, either the late spring or early summer. Furnishings for the new building are now on order. Chairman of the Furnishings Committee, Mrs. Martin Rosen, has indicated that the building will be tastefully and properly furnished, with the latest in equipment and furnishings. Deliveries are expected during the summer and into the fall. Bright attractive colors will be used throughout the building to make it an appealing community institution.

"He Happened When We Needed Him Most"

Who Is Herbert Friedman?

When anyone asks me, "Who is Rabbi Herbert Friedman?" I answer, "If Nasser heard one of Herb Friedman's speeches he would contribute to the UJA."

Herbert Friedman officially is the executive chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, but to describe the effect that he has upon others might be defined in the vernacular as "a happening." Once you have met the man, he will not be forgotten.

This Mid-Western born, rabbi of the world, commutes between the United States and Israel, where he and his wife maintain a second home. When in Israel, he travels from one end of the country to another, talking with Americans visiting the country under the auspices of the UJA. Dressed in his usual attire of flowered pants and brightly colored shirts, one could hardly miss this striking figure, whose handsome tanned face and white hair reflect the days spent in the hot, Israeli sun.

Herbert Friedman happened to us when we were in Israel last summer, and if I were to select a single personality who stood out among the people we met, high officials of government included, it would be this exciting, flamboyant, brilliant, non-conformist rabbi.

As a matter of fact, he happened to us several times during the trip. The first time occurred at the beautiful Accadia Hotel on the Mediterranean Sea where he was to brief us on Israel's condition. While waiting for his talk we ate our third, delicious breakfast scanning the headlines of the Hebrew and American press. The news of the daily fighting was treated routinely in Israel, but the American press reported it in major, front page stories. Rabbi Friedman opened his remarks with, "Look at you! Think of your poor families worrying about you in the foxholes." After our laughter subsided, he went on to tell us about Israel, as we have never heard it told before. For two hours he spoke, his words sharply intelligent, often sprinkled with wry humor and irony, portraying a vivid picture of life in the Jewish state that we were to view in the coming days. When he finished we clamored for more, but he told us, "See the country now for yourselves, make your own judgements and in ten days I will meet you again in the Negev, where we will prepare to climb Masada, then we will talk again.

Ten days later, true to his word, we met at the Desert Inn in the heart of the Negev. That night we sat outside in the chilling desert air, his rich, warm voice enveloping us, forcing us to listen, to understand our relationship to this country and its people. We talked about the kids, the taxi drivers, about our country and their country. He told us the story of Masada, one of the most dramatic and painful episodes in Jewish history, and why we must climb the great rock in the morning.

At 6 a.m. on the following day we stood together on top of the great excavation 13,000 feet above the Dead Sea. In this place of grand and majestic beauty, he bridged the past and present for us, merging the two worlds of Judaism: The Jewish people and the State of Israel.

Herbert Friedman will be in Norfolk on May 3, at the Admiralty Motel to speak at brunch, if you are not there you will miss hearing one of the great Jewish orators of our time. Most of all, you will miss this extraordinary personality who happened to us, to the Jewish people, just when we needed him most.

Arab Refugees Causes, Solutions

Behind the facade of propaganda from Christian missionaries, American consular officials, and the Middle East oil magnates on behalf of the Arab refugees, lie three important factors: The cause, the present status, and some suggested solutions. Unless these are considered, the average person has a distorted view of the problem.

When Israel, by vote of the United Nations General Assembly and the brave initiative of the Palestinian Jews, was established in Mid-May of 1948, the surrounding Arab states, seven in number, launched a ruthless attack on the fledgling state and urged the Palestinian Arabs to flee the land, lest the onslaught of the Arab nations' armies be impeded. The Israelis, especially in Haifa and along the coast, implored the Arabs to stay, but to no avail. Altogether about half a million Arabs fled from the area now known as Israel; and after the 1948 War of Independence, they settled in refugee camps in four places: Lebanon, Syria, Jordan and the Gaza Strip (under Egyptian control). For the following 22 years they received food, medicine, housing and schooling from UNRWA (the United Nations Relief and Works Administration) with the United States paying 70% of the expenses. The living standards and circumstances were so far superior to what the Arab refugees had experienced in earlier years that the infant mortality rate dropped sharply and births exceeded deaths by 25,000 to 30,000 per year. No wonder the estimated numbers went beyond a million! Add to that figure the number of deaths which went unreported and the frequent occasions when births were multiply-reported, and it is understandable why Arab refugees reached an exaggerated total of almost 1,500,000.

During all this time, from 1948 until the present, the Arab States contributed scarcely anything to the relief of their kinfolk for whose plight they were basically responsible. The only funds forthcoming were hidden subsidies to such Arab "liberation" groups as El Faah's terrorists and the several hundred million dollars given each year by the oil-rich lands of Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and Bahrain to Nasser's so-called "United Arab Republic" to wage war, covert or overt, on tiny Israel.

The Arab governments have used the Arab refugees as a political weapon against the Israelis. At no time have the Arabs shown any awareness that there is a sharp, harsh contrast between their cynical use of the homelessness of their fellow-Arabs for their own selfish political ends and the extraordinary way in which the Israelis, aided by the singular generosity and compassion of world Jewry, have made possible the integration of a million and a half Jewish refugees into the economy of Israel in the past 22 years.

To talk of repatriating Arab refugees into modern Israel is wholly unrealistic partly because the Israelis would open their gates to a flood of fifth columnists bent on destroying the new Jewish state, and partly because these displaced Arabs would really be more at home in Arab lands where they have ethnic ties, linguistic links and historic associations.

The Arab countries, now 18 in number and extending over 5,600,000 square miles in the vast Mediterranean region, have ample space and resources. The money that the Arabs have realized during the past two decades from their confiscation of property belonging to the several hundred thousand Jews they have expelled, would aid in the relocation and rehabilitation of the Arab-refugees. May that day swiftly come.

Letter from Israel to Mr. Spivek

Information On Russian Jews

Dear Fri:

I'll try to keep my promise and convey to you some information and impressions about our Russian Jews. We are not inclined to disclose exact numbers of arrivals. They are only a negligible fraction of those that strive to come.

After the war of 1967 and the rupture of Soviet-Israel relations, the Aliyah (the use of this term instead of immigration is more than a semantic trick) had been hermetically stopped. The renewal occurred in October 1968. It is very sporadic, not thousands but a few hundreds are coming every month. Nobody knows the intricacies and the motives of Soviet politics.

There is, however, one cardinal change on our side. Our Russian Jews began speaking openly and demanding vigorously with determination, the right to leave Russia and go to Israel. They have "decided to stop fearing" (a phrase of their own coinage). They ask, they demand, they write, they approach the highest authorities. They even venture to contact world Jewry, the Government of Israel and various international bodies. Jacob Kasakov gained international fame by denouncing his Soviet citizenship and declaring himself a citizen of Israel. He is not the only one. He is now here and has just recently returned from a journey to the U.S., where he and his friend Sperling have told their tale to both Jews and non-Jews. The letter of the 18 Jewish families from Georgia has by now become a pathetic world-known document. But you may be interested to know that prior to the publishing of that letter, about 300 Georgian olim have come here from a provincial town, Kulashoo. They are primitive homely Jews, not versed in ideology or scholarship, but burning with the desire to come and live here. May I mention here a curious point. They all belong to the Hassidic group of Habbad. It is a subject of psycho-sociological study to explain how these humble souls devoid of Jewish learning have become Habbad. The other members of that community are waiting for their turn to

leave. Nobody can tell of the affect that letter of the eighteen will speed up or retard the Aliyah from K.

In passing from the general to the specific, I have picked at random a few cases. For obvious reasons, the names are not to be made public:

Boris W.—from Vilna. Musically gifted. Before leaving Vilna, he had been awarded the Chopin prize in music. All roads were open to him. He could not explain the force that drove him to Israel. He and his brother live on the meager earnings of their mother. He arrived penniless, where he was sent to a Kibbutz Nespan, where he had to devote one half of the day to Hebrew and the second, to manual labor. This labor had a damaging effect on his delicate hands of a musician. On his delicate hands of a musician. We brought him to the city provided him with meals and a place of learning and other necessities, and procured for him an excellent piano. He is now completing his studies at the Academy of Music. His master and guide, Professor Klein, says: if there is going to be a world known Israeli pianist, it will be Boris W.

Dr. M. W. and her husband from Moscow. Both are experienced physicians. They have found employment in their field. Live and work in Natania. Their daughter came with them. A student of medicine at the Jerusalem University. As many others of her kind, she has language difficulties. She has to learn and use two new languages—Hebrew and English (most textbooks and reference books have not been translated yet into Hebrew). She was on the verge of failure, and this would have been a failure to the whole family. Due to our intervention with the authorities of the University, she was given another chance and the danger was over. The family was relieved, and the mother is continuing her "hobby"—sending packages via London (this cannot be done from an "aggressor" country) to relatives and friends. These packages are a material as well as a moral support.



CONGREGATION AND READER

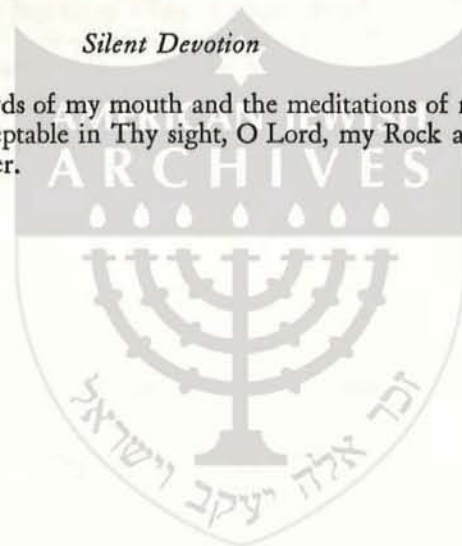

HERBERT A. FRIEDMAN, UJA EXECUTIVE CHAIRMAN,

AWARDED HONORARY DEGREE

BY HEBREW UNION COLLEGE-JEWISH INSTITUTE OF RELIGION

NEW YORK - Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, Executive Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity at Commencement Exercises of the New York School of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, the American Seminary of Reform Judaism. Dr. Nelson Glueck, president of the College-Institute, conferred the degree today, Sunday, June 7.

Rabbi Friedman, a graduate of Yale University, was ordained by the College-Institute in 1944. He was elected to the pulpit of Temple Emanuel in Denver, Colo., where he served until 1952, and was then called to Temple Emanu-El B'ne Jeshurun of Milwaukee, Wis. During his ministry in Denver and Milwaukee, he was actively involved in many Jewish and civic agencies.

Rabbi Friedman has been officially affiliated with the United Jewish Appeal since 1955, but served in various capacities in its behalf prior to that time. He was National Chairman of its Speakers Bureau, making frequent visits to Israel and other countries.

During his service as a chaplain in the U.S. Army, he was the recipient of the Commendation Award. He has also been honored by the State of Israel for his participation in activities before 1948 which contributed to statehood.

Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, oldest rabbinical school in existence, has campuses in Cincinnati, New York, Los Angeles and Jerusalem, Israel.

חירי הנצח של המגבית

למגבית היהודית המאוחדת דרת בארצות הברית כמה דיוקנאות, המשלוי מים זה את זה, ביאות למה שאפשר לבנות חי אירגון היהודי הגדול ביותר בארצות הברית, ומעולם כולו.

ראשית, זהו אירגון וולנטארי שהגדרתו הרשמית ויעדו הם איסוף כספים לצדקה, סעד, שיקום, חינוך ולכל מטרה המוכר דרת כהומאניטרית. אירגון זה מושתת על הבסיס הקהילתי, וגם פועל באמצעותו. מרכזה של המגבית מצוי בניו יורק, כי שדרה השנית, בלב רובע מאנהטן הסואן. הוא מארגן ומשומן היטב, למנגנון יעיל, הוא מצוייד במיטב אמצעי התקשורת וחיידושים. הוא מאויש במנהלים מנוסים, במארגנים בעלי יוזמה, בצוות פקידותי ניכר ובנציגים המוסקרים על אודיש'אור רים בכל החבי ארצות הברית. צוותים אלה, מראשי המנהלים והמארגנים ועד למזכירות ולנציגי השדה, מונים כחמש



מאות איש, שכולם מקבלים משכורת מאירגון המגבית.

ראשי המגבית טוענים — וודאי להצי דקת יעילותם — כי תרפועלו של אירגון זה אינו עולה על 6% מכלל הכנסותיו, כל בעל עסק וודאי יסכים שזהו שיעור סביר בהחלט. אך אם נזכור כי הכנסה תיה של המגבית בשנת האחרונה הגיעו ליותר מ-200 מיליון דולאר (כ-700 מילי יון ל"י), הרי שהוצאותיה עברו-גלשו מעל ל-12 מיליון דולאר (כ-45 מיליון ל"י), ואין זה דבר של מה בכך.

העבודה העיקרית של המגבית, נצי שית על ידי גרודים רבים של מתנדבים ומתנדבות, המצויים בכל מקום, בכל קהילה, הם מדרבנים, מאיצים איש כי שכנו, והם נהנים מסיבורים ודברי הלל, לרוב בהמשכות בלתי מקוטעת. המרכז בניו יורק קשור ישירות עם שלוש מאות קהילות יהודיות ברחבי ארצות הברית (מאתיים מתן קשורות בטלסר ישרי עם מרכז המגבית בניו יורק, מאה הקהילות הקטנות יותר מקיימות את הקשר הקבוע באמצעות הטלפונים והדואר). קשר — פירושו הורמת אינפורמציה שוטפת על הנעשה במגבית, על משימות חדשות, על מובצעים מיוחדים, ובראש וראשונה — על הנעשה בישראל, יום יום ושעה שעה. קשר זה פירושו, כמובן, גם דיווח שוטף מהקהילה וראשי המגבית בה אל המרכז — על קשיים, בעיות, צרכים, הצעות וכי מובן הצלחות.

למגבית גם דיוקן אחר: זהו אירגון קהילתי מובהק, וכאן כדאי להבחיר כמה מושגים. ראשית — המגבית, במישור חי מקומי, מבוססת על האירגון הקהילתי, ומכאן שמה: היא מאוחדת משום שכי

למתיחת העינה, האירוע המרכזי של המגבית, מוזמן תמיד אורח רסי מעלה מישראל, בתמונה: האירוע בהשתתפות לני אשכול המנוח.

בשעה ארבע, ביום שני, נתקיימה ההלוויה. התעצבונו ובכל זאת אנו זוכרים אותה עד היום ולא נשכח אותה לעולם.

צפורה אוחנה, כיתה ה', בית-ספר מעיינות. מנהל בית הספר, דוד אלבו, מראה לנו את המקום בהצר בית-הספר שבו נחתה פצצת הקאטיושה, ואת פגיעות הרסיסים בקיר. "הנה, תראה", הוא אומר, "פה ישבתי בשעת ההפגזה ופה נכנסו הרסיסים. ניצלנו בנס. כולנו ניצלנו בנס. היום קשה. קשה מאד. אבל נתגבר. זה נשמע כציונות, אלא שזו המציאות — אין לנו ברירה".

ילדים קשה ללמוד. קשה להתרכז. ימי ההפגזות האחרונים היו קשים במיוחד. הפגיעות היו דווקא בבתי ספר, ההרוגים — דווקא ילדים.
— לא קשה ללמד בימים כאלה? אנו שואלים את אחת המורות.
"קשה", היא משיבה לאחר שהות קצרה. "קשה, אבל ללמוד קשה יותר".

שלושה ארונות ברחבה

ב ית שאן לקראת הצהריים, המתיחות באוויר פגה. החיים חוזרים לסלולם. הרחובות, שהיו שוממים כמעט בשעות הבוקר, הומים עובדי אורה. עקרות-בית עורכות את קניות השבת כדרכן. המרכז המסחרי, עורק-החיים של העיר, הומה אנשים, הכל כמימים ימימה. פרט לבימת העץ הגדולה, שהוצבה ברחבת הי מועצה, גדולה כדי שתוכל לשאת שלושה ארונות: של שתי ילדות ושל הייל בן העירייה, שנפל בתעלה.

כל העובר ליד הרחבה מוריד עיניו בעצב. בית-שאן, על בעיותיה וצרותיה הנה משפחה אחת גדולה, לטוב ולרע.

ישכנו במזנון של ויקטור שביט כשהודיע קריין הרדיו על נפילת הייל בתעלה — יונה דוד, בן 19, תושב בית-שאן.

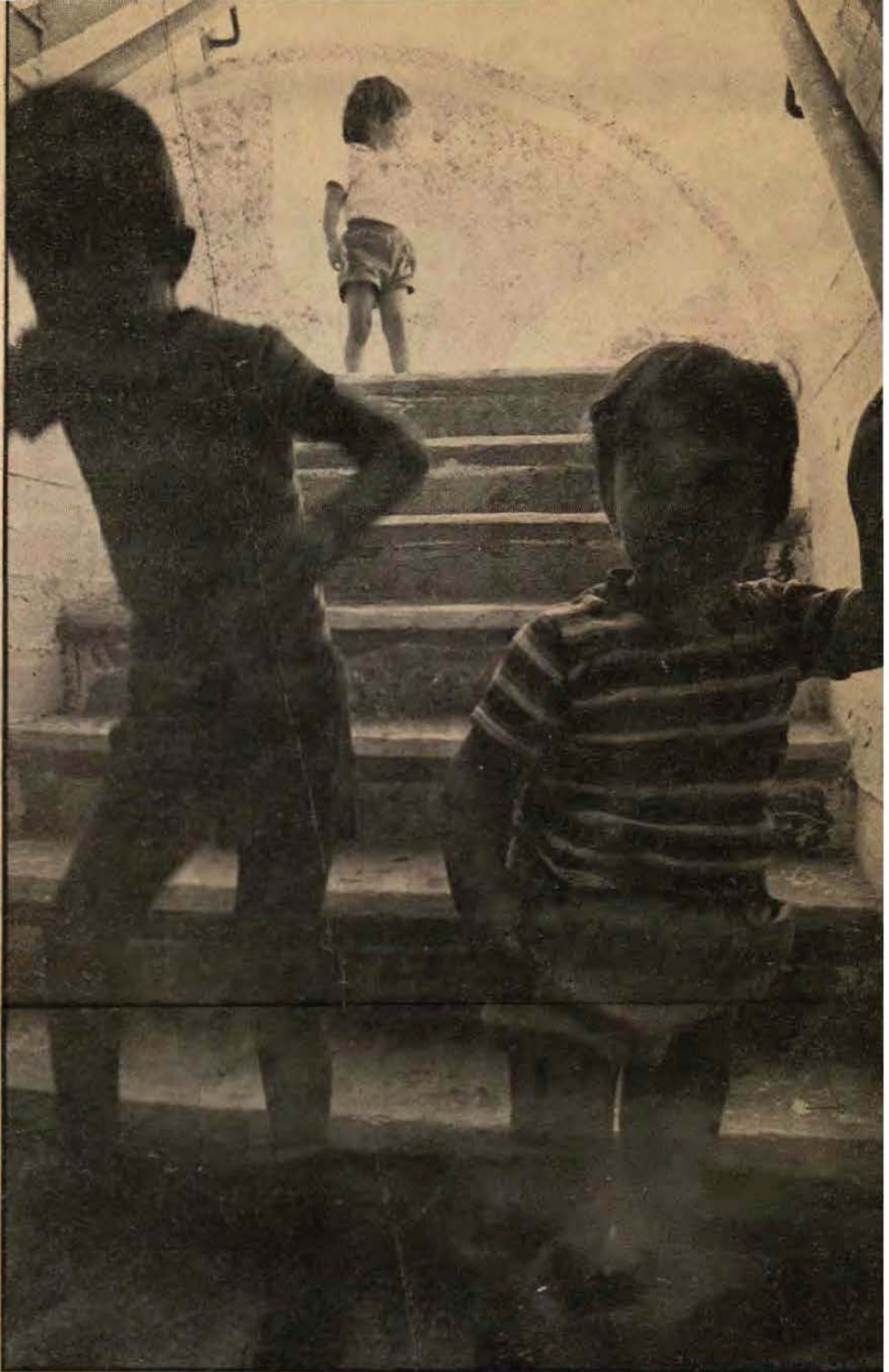
בשניה אחת פסקה התמונה. נאלמו שיתות הרכילות סביב השולחנות במזנון. דממה. דממה של כאב ושל הרון.

"תראה", אומר ויקטור, "לא מספיק לנו מה שיש כאן וקיבלנו את התוספת הזו".

ויקטור הוא טברייני. לבית-שאן הגיע לפני חודש ימים בלבד. להקים עסק, אשתו חרדה לשלום הבת בת שבעת החודשים ולשלום משפחתה בטבריה, ויקטור מנסה לשמור על שלווה רוחו. הוא מלא זעם, אבל על דבר אחד לחלוטין: "אני לא מסוגל להבין מה קורה כאן. באתי לבית-שאן מרצוני שלי. עובתי בית ועסק בטבריה. השקעתי חמישים אלף לירות ברכישת המקום הזה ואחרי כל זה לא נותנים לי שיכון במקום ואני צריך לחיות בדירה שכורה! איפה נשמע דבר כזה?!"

טוב שיש גם בעיות כאלה.
בהוצן נשמעת שירה רוסית אדירה. דוד לרנר, המתנדב מחלק-הסוכריות, מגיע. "היי, ויקטור, תן לי לבן."
כפי שאמרנו — משפחה אחת גדולה.

דוד לרנר — קורפורל באג'למייזן ואיש הג'א מחתרב.



אבישלוה, בן, כמעט שנתיים, עם חבריו בפתח המקלט. חנה, השכנה שהגיחה עליו, השתדלה להישאר ליד המקלט.

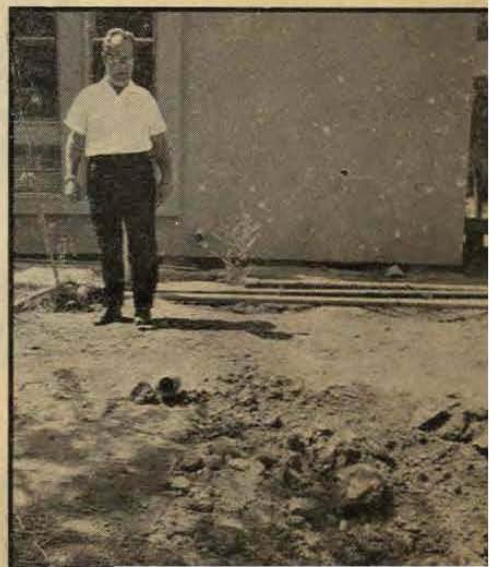
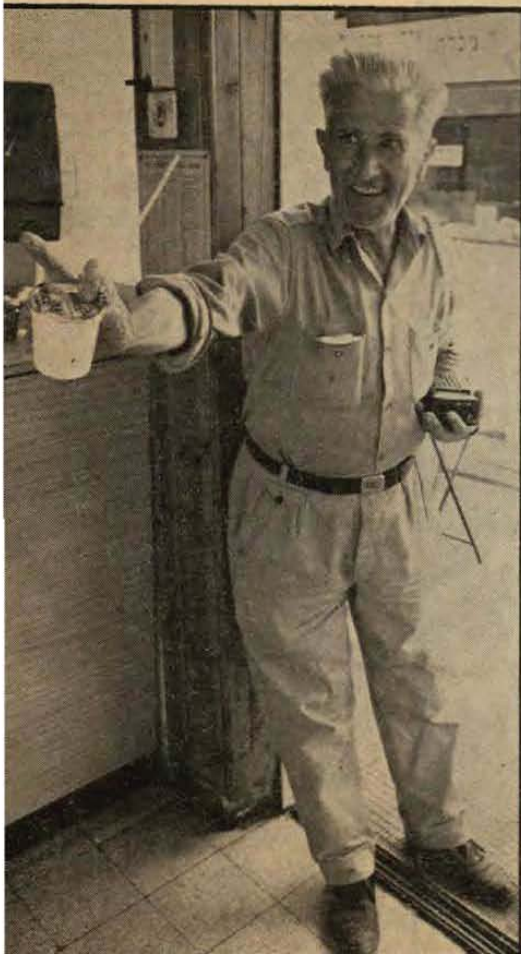

כותבת צפורה:
צילצל הפעמון. התישבנו בספסלים. לפתע נשמעה הפגזה. הסתדרנו בונות ונכנסנו לחקלט. התפרצנו בבכי המורות הרגיעו אותנו. שרנו כמה שירים. המנהל אמר לנו: אתם יכולים לצאת מן המקלט בשקט. קיבלנו שוקו ושקענו במחשבות. נאנחתי מבכי. נשמעה אזעקה הרגעה המנהל אמר: אבקש לא לצאת משטח בית ספרנו, אנו נמצאים במצב כוננות. העוזנאים בקרו במקומות הפגועים. לפתע נודע שנפצעו חמישה. מצבם קשה. הצמעתי שנפצעו חמישה קשה. אני מקווה ש' יחזרו ברפואה שלימה.

נכנסנו לכיתה. קיבלנו דבר מה לאכול. האזנו לחד" שות. פתאום, משחו מזון — ילדה בבית ספרנו נהרגה. והיא מרים קדוש.

הכיתה התחילה בוכה. אחרי כן באה המורה צביה ואמרה: אל נא תבכו, ילדות טובות. בואו ונכין זר. ילדות כיתה ה', ז' ז' הכינו את הוד כפי שהמורה צביה אמרה.

מנהל בית-ספר מעיינות, דוד אלבו, ליד פגיעת הקטיושה.



המיוזמי מכל רחבי ארצות הברית, עם אורה בכיר ביותר מישראל (שר הבטחון, שר החוץ, הרמטכ"ל לשעבר כיבדו בעבר מעמד זה בנוכחותם ובנאומויהם), ומשפט — התפסות על פני היבשת כולה, במהלך העונה מוזמנים לאירועי המגן בית נאמיס-אורחים שונים, לרבות קציני צבא בכירים המודמנים לארה"ב; תכניות טלוויזיות מיוחדות, המוסרטות בארץ, מוקדנות בסעודות ערב הגיגיות לעשרות ולי מאות הנערות במלוא ההדר המקובל, לכל קהילה נשלח מכשיר הקרנת מיוחד, והוא נועד לניצול באירועי כל ימות העונות של המגבית. סרטים מסופקים בי שפע, מפעם לפעם מבוצעות הופעות "ספישל" — כמו סרט טלוויזיה מיוחד עם גולדה מאיר ומשה דיין, אשר הוקרן באמצעות לווין-תקשורת בין-לאומי בו זמנית לארבעים וחמש התכנסויות של תורמי-מגבית גדולים, שערכו בחריבי היריבשת האמריקאית. דומה שאין אביור סכני שאינו מנוצל, ואין חידוש סכני שלא נוסח בשירותיה של המגבית.

סירים בישראל

כנגד חורמת המידע השוטף, בדמותם של מרצים ואוהדים נכבדים בישראל, אל נתיביה של מפת המגבית, הפורשת מחוץ לחוף, מתבצעת פעולה מואצת גם מכיוון הנגדי, במיוחד מאז מלחמת ששת הימים, מיד עם ראשיתה של העונה מופעלת תכנית ביקורים בישראל לקבוצות נבחרות של תורמים, כל קבוצה מונה כ-100 גברים (בלבד), המוטסים מדי שבוע לישראל בקבוצה מאורגנת, מסירים בי מאורגן, רואים ובוהלים ושומעים הכל מן מקור ראשון, וזוכים לטיפול מירבי מצד כל הרשויות בארץ. אלה חוזרים לבתיהם ולקהילותיהם טעונים בחוויות וברשימים, ונרתמים מיד לפעילות אישית נלהבת למען המגבית. בעונה האחרונה עברו בי תהליך זה כ-1500 תורמים נבחרים וכבדי כנס, ביניהם ביט המספר הפועה של בני הדור הצעיר של העסקים התורמים, מצליחים בעסקים ונדירים בתרומות.

ליגה מיוחדת היא זו של קבוצות-הסקר המיוחדות, כל אחת בת כ-200-300 תורמי, מים המגיעות לביקור עם פתיחת העונה, הן מקבוצות, כמובן, שיפול מיוחד של אחים (אנשים חשובים מאד), ומטוס מיר אחד מנחית אותן בביקורים במקומות שרבים נים בארץ, כולל ביקור בסיני, ייחודן של קבוצות אלה הוא, שכל מי שנכלל בהן חורם לפחות רבבת דולארים לשנה, תוכנית זו כבר הוכיחה את הצלחתה: תוך כדי סיור של שבועיים התחייבו מבקרים אלה, בעונה הקודמת, לתרום 10 מיליון דולאר במשך העונה השוטפת.

האם הצליחה המגבית להגיע ממש אל ביטו של היהודי בעל האמצעים בארצות הברית? יתכן שהצלחה כזו יותר מכל אירגון אחר, ויותר מאשר בעבר, אך — לדברי מומחה של המגבית — היא הגיעה רק אל פתחו של היטס היהודי. הרבה יהודים טרם תרמו, ואלה שהתרמו יכולים לתרום הרבה יותר. "החוק האמריקאי מתיר לכל אורה, התורם מכסף למטרות צדקה, להפריש למטרות זו 15 אחוז מן הכנסתו המוצמדת למס-ההכנסה. רבים רבים עדיין לא ניצלו אפילו תקנה זו, סיפר לי אחד מראשי המגבית.

התרומות הרבות, המורמות למגבית, אינן במזומנים, הן בגדר התחייבויות שניתיות, המועברות לרוב מדי רבע שנה אל קופת המגבית, על-פי רוב — בהמח"ארה. לעתים — בהעברת רכוש של המגבית, לעתים גם בהעברת יחידות ערך ליד המגבית, לעתים (לא מוזמנות) גם במתכונת של צוואות של קשישים וקשישות בעלי אמצעים.

התחומים, שפדק לאחרונה את בורגם של נתיבות הערך של ניויורק, עולו לפגוע גם בהכנסות המגבית. יהודים רבים, תורמים ותיקים ותורמים פוטנציאליים, השקיעו שם כסף רב, שחלקו עולל לברוח מכיסים. אך משית המגבית לשנה השנייה טפח לשנים הבאות היא: לזכות בסכר מיט יותד גדולים מיטו של היהודי הי אמריקאי, הרב הערב פרידמן שואג הי פי התורמים-בעבר-בהווה-ובעתיד. "שר" אל זוקקה לכם ולסיועכם לפחות בעשרים השנים הקרובות." יהודים תורמים רבים מודים ומתוודים, כי הם מרוצים ממעורבותם עם המגבית, משני טעמים: משום שיש להם אמצעים והם נותנים, ומשום שכאשר הם נותנים — הם מחזיקים את הודהותם היהודית.

מיליון דולאר ב-1967; 130 מיליון דולאר ב-1968; 160 מיליון דולאר ב-1969. אירגון הנשים הגדול "הדסה" אוסף כ-10 מיליון דולאר בשנה, מגבית ההסדרות — 7-8 מיליון דולאר, ואחריהם הם באים אירגונים אוספיקספים אחרים כמגרות השורשים של האוניברסיטה בי ירושלים, האוניברסיטה בתל-אביב, הסניף, מגן-דוד-אדום ואחרים.

כרמסת ומחשב

כרמסת ומחשב להגיע לסכומים אדירים כאלה, ולנבחים יותר בעתיד, מפעילה המגבית היהודית המאוחדת מערכת מתוכננת ומסופת, המתרכזת ב"עונה הבעורת" שלה, לאמור מאוקטובר ועד יוני (לפי הסכם נתונים הודשי הקיץ, הסתיו והחורף בידו אירגון אירגות מילוח העצמאות). הנשיא הנבחר של המגבית הוא אד גינבורג, כי העיר קליבלנד, דמות פעילה זה מכבר במנהיגות היהודית בארה"ב. בראש המע"ר לכה היוזמית עומד הרב הרפורמי הר"ר ברט ("האר"ר"), פרידמן, הנושא את הי תואר יו"ר המגבית, מנסה, בוטה, נואם מלהיב ותוקפני כלפי שומעיו, מאז חור

קהילה נאספת התרומות השנתיות למגן בית אחת כללית בלבד, מחצית מסכום התרומות השנתי מנוכה דרך-קבע על-ידי קהילה לצרכי מוסדותיה המקומיים כי סעד, הינוך, החקיקת בתי אבות וכדומה, ורק מחצית הסכום מורמת אל מרכז הי מגבית בניו-יורק, וממנו לישראל (בחלקן גם באמצעות מלכ"ן ו"ארי"ס). את היכרות עם המגבית עשיתי, במשך השנים האחרונות, באמצעות השתתפות באירועים המאורגנים על-ידי המגבית כי קהילות שונות, במדינות שונות בחריבי ארצות-הברית, כמה תמונות חורו ונישנו העסקנות ולמען המגבית, שנעשה בידי יהודים ויהודיות טובים, נעשה בכל לב, היענות לאירועים כאלה יהיה לרוב גדר לה, וההיענות להתרומות — לא פחותה מזו, מעניין לציין שגם מגביות לא-יהודיות אינן מעטות, אולם תנובתן דלה, הלא-יהודי הממוצע אינו יוצא מגדרו לר התנדב ולנדב את כספו, וגם אם יעשה זאת, על הרוב יתן סכום פשוט. יהודי לא יעלה בדעתו, שאפשר לתרום דולאר או שניים מבלי להיכלם בעוני חברו ובעני עצמו.

המגבית, בתקופה הקהילה היהודית, היא גם עניין חברתי שרבים אהבים להיות מעורבים בו. העניין דורש, תובע

כמו זו: בא יהודי אל חברו, כשהוא רוטן על שחוזרים ופונים אליו מדי שנה בשנה לתרום למגבית, "כמה זמן יישך הדבר — לתת ולתת כסף כל הזמן?", משיב לו חברו, בטפחות תפת: "אני מאחל לך שאהא תאריך ימים ושנים, כפי שתאריך ימים המגבית."

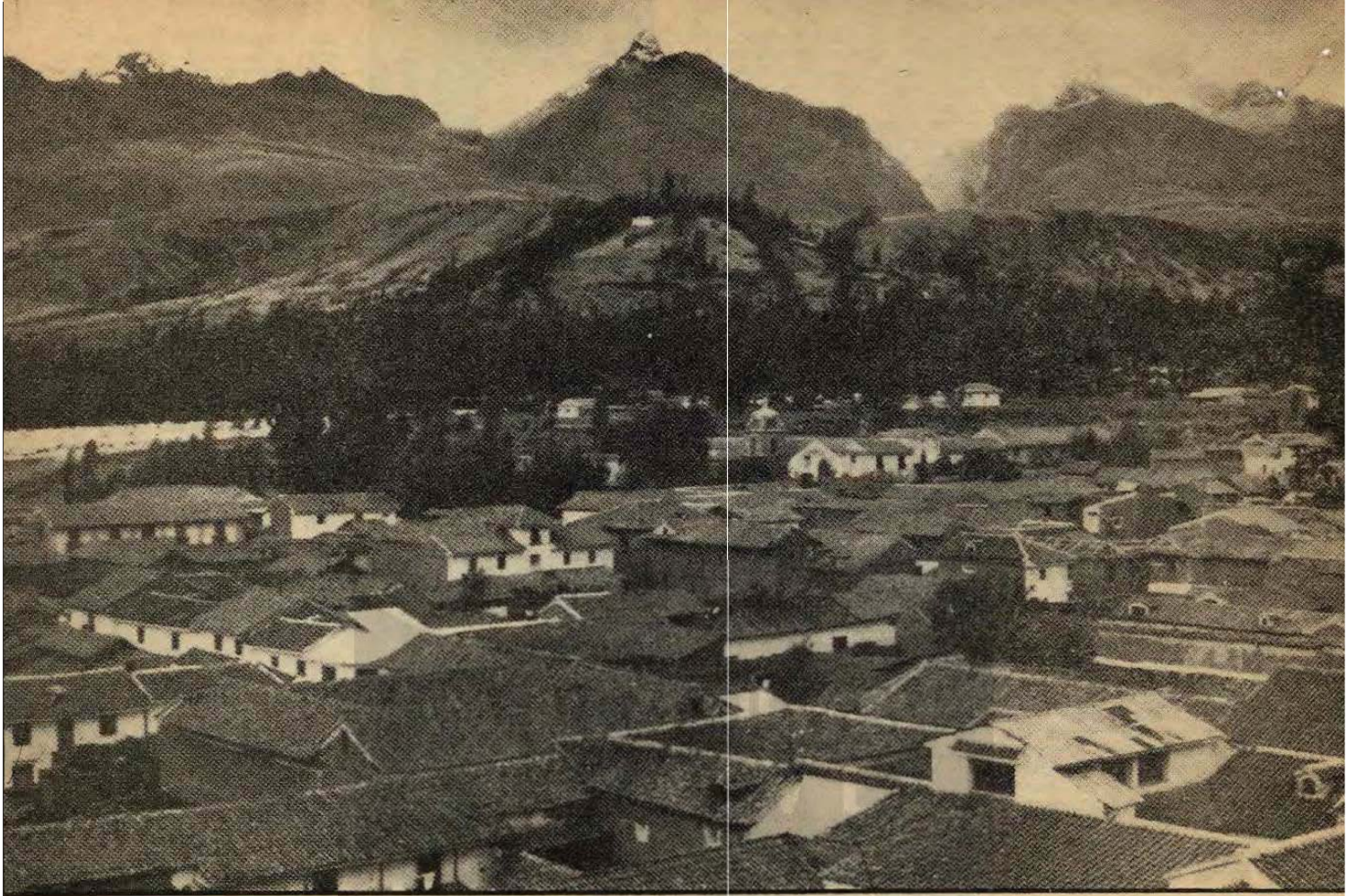
דיוקנה המרכזי של המגבית הוא של אירגון תרמים, ובכך אין שני לו: בחוקף, באמצעים, ובתוצאות. ראו נא: עד לי מלחמת ששת הימים, כלומר עד לשנת 1967, הגיע הממוצע השנתי של הכנסות המגבית ל-65 מיליון דולאר בקירוב, ואז בא הינוק הגדול. את שנת 1967 סיימה המגבית עם 250 מיליון דולאר; בשנת 1968 חלה ירידה, אך עדיין היה הי סכום השנתי גבוה — 180 מיליון דולאר סיומה של 1969 הביא למגבית כ-215 מיליון דולאר, ואילו עד תום 1970 מקוים ראשי המגבית להגיע ל-200 מיליון דולאר (בהשוואה: הכנסות המגבית וקרן היסוד בכל שאר ארצות העולם יחד, חוץ מארצות הברית, הגיע לסכום השנתי הי גבוה ביותר של 100 מיליון דולאר בקירוב).

לשם השלמת תמונת המגבית וההתדרות בארצות-הברית, ברצוני להוסיף כי מדי אירגון אירגות מילוח העצמאות של מדינת ישראל, השני למגבית בגודלו, בתי קפו ובהכנסותיו, הצליח להגיע ל-215

את מחיר העסקנות והתרומות: אך הוא גם מניב תמלוגים חברתיים מרתקים: מעמד ווקרה בקהילה, כיבודים אישיים, פירסום אישי, אהדת הצטיינות ותעודות הוקרה, שיפור תדמית, אפילו שיפור ניכר בכוסר הנאום הפומבי, יש בקיאים ומנוי סים, המעידים כי המעורבות האישית של יהודים בפעילות המגבית הביאה להם אפילו שנינו בתכונות האישיות, שיפרה יחסי אנוש ושכנים, ואפילו הקנתה להם מידה הרבה יותר גדולה של בטחון עצמי.

מאתיים מיליון

כמורשת הזמן נתגבשו בקהילה כללים מקובלים בלתי-רשמיים, שכמעט ואין מסירים אותם. איש אינו מרשה לעצמו לנהוג זלזול בכל האמור להתקשרות אל המגבית, כלל שתקהילה קטנה ומגובשת יותר, לא נעלם דבר מעיני הוולת, לגבי היקף העסקים וההכנסות, וממילא פועלת ההרדיות גם בתרומות ובפעילות האישית למען המגבית, חווייה זו הפכה לחלק מטרות בחיי הקהילה. קהילה בלי מגבית אינה ראויה לתואר קהילה — יאמרו לך אפילו יהודים שאינם בשורה הראשונה של התורמים והעסקים, חווייה זו יצרה גם שובל של מעשיות.



העיר הוזרוא, ששכנה כ־400 ק"מ מצפון ללימה, הבירה. בנובה 3,020 מ' מעל פני הים — כפי שנראתה לפני שנהרסה כלייל ברעידת האדמה, שפקדה את פרו בשבוע שעבר.

הארץ רבת-הניגודים, בעלת האוצרות שטרם-התגלו ורמת-חיים מהנמוכות בעולם, שהוכתה השבוע ברעידת אדמה מהקטלניות שארעו אי-פעם

אותו הכדורגל בפרו לקראת שריקת ה' פתיחה במשחק הבכורה של נבחרתם. אולם, יום לפני המשחק, פקד את פרו האסון הנורא. עשרות אלפי אנשים, קיפ' דו את חייהם באחת מרעידות האדמה, הפוקדות את פרו מדי מספר שנים. הניחודים, שלא קיבלו כמעט, פרטים על האסון הנורא היו שחקני הכדורגל, שהיו אחת שעה במכסיקו. הם ידעו, כי ארצם ככלה מרעידת אדמה נוספת. נצחונם ה' מפתיע על בולגריה היותה מוקד לשיחות בקרב מומחי הספורט בעולם כולו. מעטים בלבד התייחסו אליו בפרו עצמה. ישם היו האנשים עסוקים בנסיון כושף להחליף מההלם האיום שפקד אותם, כאשר הוברר, שלמעלה משלושים אלף נפש נקבזו חיים מתחת למפלול האדירות תוך שניות ספר' רות.

פרו, השוכנת לחופי האוקיינוס ה' שקט, במערב היבשת הדרום-אמריק' אית, היא ארץ למדת נסיון באסונות ופגעי טבע. ארץ מקסימה זו, הגאה ב' מסורת המפוארת של מאות שנות תרבות אינקית, טובלת ממהזוירות כמעט קבועה של רעידות אדמה. עוד בשנת 1746 נהר' כה בילתה, לימה, ברעש אדמה כבד. במאה העשרים נרשמו רעשים בסדר כמעט קבוע. בשנת 1940, לאחר-למכן בסוף שנות הארבעים ושנ' 1958 וזארי-כך ב'1965, פגעו בארץ אומללה זו רעשים חזקים.

מים רבים התכוננו שחקני נבחרת הכדורגל הלאומית של פרו למשחקי הגביע ה' עולמי בכדורגל. מטרותם ה' ברורה היתה — להפתיע את מומחי הספורט ולהפריך את התחויות המוקדמות לגבי סיכויי זכייתם בגביע. מוכן מאלו, שלא יכלו לחזות מראש את שואת ה' טבע האיומה, אשר תתחולל כי ארצם עם פתיחת המשחקים.

לאחד הודשים ארוכים של אימונים מפרסיים, מלווים בהתלהבות אדירה של בני-צעם ובברכות אישיות מראש הממש' לה ונשיא המדינה — הגיעו שחקניה שהומי העור של כרו למכסיקו, עם מאמ' גם הברזילי, ידיד, כשהם נחושי החלטה. בדרום-אמריקה בכלל, מהות הכדורגל נשא לגאווה לאומית. השיבותו של משר חק זה, מבחינת התעניינות הציבור בו מומהשת מדי פעם מחדש, בצורות שר' גות (כך, למשל, החליטה ממשלת ברזיל לשנות את מועדי ושיבותיה בחודש זה. רק משום שהמיניסטרס ונשיא המדינה ביקשו להיות מעודכנים לגבי מהלך משח' קיה של נבחרתם, המועמדת הרצינית ל' זכייה בגביע).

UNITED JEWISH APPEAL - by Dan Patir

The United Jewish Appeal has a number of profiles which complete each other, as befits the largest Jewish organization in the US and in the whole world.

First of all this is a voluntary organization whose official ~~definition is~~ aim it is to collect money for charity, welfare, rehabilitation, education and any other aim which ~~is~~ defined as humanitarian.

This organization ~~is~~ works on a community basis and works through it.

The center of UJA is in New York, on Sixth Avenue in the heart of Manhattan. It is a well-oiled, well organized efficient organization, equipped with the best and most modern means of communications and manned by experienced directors, ~~and~~ administrators as well as by a considerable team of officials and representatives who are in charge of various districts all over the United States.

Those teams, starting from ~~the~~ top directors and administrators and down to secretaries and representatives in small communities, come up to about 500 people, all of whom receive their pay from the United Jewish Appeal.

Heads of UJA maintain ~~-justifying their efficiency-~~ in justification of their efficiency, that operating this organization ~~is~~ does not surpass 6% of its income. Every businessman will agree that this is a reasonable rate. But if we remember that the income of UJA last year came up to over 200 million dollars (about 700 million pounds) then we see that expenses were over twelve million dollars (about 45 million pounds), which is not a small matter.

The main work of UJA is carried out by many 'battalions' of volunteers, which can be found in every place, in every community. They encourage and push each other and they also enjoy honours and words of praise.

The center in New York is directly connected with 300 Jewish communities all over the US (200 of them are connected by Telex directly with the center in N.Y. and 100 smaller communities maintain constant connection by telephone or post). Connection- means a constant flow of information about what is going on in UJA, about new tasks, ~~and~~ special operations, and mainly about what is going on in Israel, day by day, hour by hour. This also means current reports from communities and UJA leaders there, to headquarters, about difficulties, problems, needs, proposals and of course successes.

UJA has another profile: It is a definite community organization. ~~UJA-in the local field is based on community organizations. That is also the meaning of the name. It is united.~~

The community collects the annual donations for one general purpose. Half of the sum is deducted regularly by the community for its own local institutions like welfare, education, old-age homes etc, and only the other half is sent to UJA Headquarters in N.Y, and from there to Israel (in part also through Malben and ORT).

I have made my acquaintance with UJA in the last few years, by attending various ceremonies and festivities arranged by UJA in various communities in the US. The picture was always the same: Activity for UJA, which was done by good Jews was always done from all the heart.

Response to those festivities was always great and the response to requests ~~of~~ for contributions no less so.

It must be noted that there are many non-Jewish drives in the US, but their incomes are ~~much~~ small. Non-Jews do not tend to exaggerate in their contributions. A Jew will not think it possible to pay one or two dollars without feeling shame.

UJA is also a social matter in which many like to be involved, in the communities. True, it demands efforts and contributions, but it also gives exciting social 'royalties': A standing in the community, personal honours, publicity, certificates of valour, an improved image, even improved oratory powers. Some people say that personal involvement of Jews in UJA activity has even brought changes in their personal characteristics, has improved relations between people and neighbours and has even given some of them greater self assurance.

In the course of time, general rules have been accepted in the community, which in spite of not being written down, are hardly ever violated. No one would allow himself to show disrespect to anything connected with UJA. The smaller the community the less can anything be kept secret. The size of ~~the~~ ~~business~~ business transactions and incomes ~~which~~ ~~is~~ ~~not~~ ~~connected~~ as well as contributions and personal work for UJA. This matter has become part of community life. A community without UJA, is not worth to be called a community - this you may hear even from Jews who are not big donors or leaders.

UJA's main profile is that of an organization which collects contributions. In this, it has no rivals in size, means and results. Until the Six Day War, namely till 1967, annual average of UJA income came to about 65 million dollars. In 1967, the income came up to 250 million dollars, in 1968, there was a slight fall, yet annual income was still 180 million dollars. 1969 brought UJA about 215 million dollars and it is hoped that by the end of 1970 UJA income will reach 200 million dollars. (In comparison, income of UJA and Keren ~~ayessed~~ ~~in~~ ~~all~~ ~~other~~ ~~countries~~ in the world together, apart from the US, came up to an annual income of 100 million dollars at the most).

Hadassah, collects about ten million dollars per year, the Histadrut drive-about 7-8 million dollars. After those there are a number of small organizations like the friends of Jerusalem, Tel-Aviv and Haifa Universities and Magen David Adom.

In order to reach those huge sums, and higher ones in future, UJA puts into action a planned and widespread system which centers around the burning season between October and June. (~~according to~~
~~an agreement, the~~)

The elected President of UJA is Ed Ginsberg, of Cleveland who has been active for ~~UJA~~ in US Jewish leadership for a long time. At the head of day to day operations is Rabbi Herbert (Herb) Friedman, who is a Reform rabbi and is Chairman of UJA. He is experienced, sure of himself, an inspiring orator and aggressive towards his audience. Since his return to the US, after having served as army chaplain in World War II with American forces in Europe, Friedman has started his activity ~~for Jewish~~ for the Jewish cause, first as Rabbi in Denver and Milwaukee and later at UJA headquarters. From there he goes on constant tours in the US where he gives lectures, meets people and activates them. He visits Israel a number of times every year and maintains constant communication. Together with him, operates his deputy Irving Bernstein, who has been in charge of the administration of the organization ever since he came from Los Angeles where he, for many years organized UJA activities on the Western Coast.

~~The~~ UJA Headquarters in N.Y., equipped with the best means of communication and office machines, including a computer, up-to-date files containing all data about UJA activities and every donor to UJA, even if he changed addresses etc, direct activities in two main directions: From Israel to the US and from the US to Israel. The main target of all this: To reach the pockets of every Jew.

There are many ways, varied and sophisticated. Current community activity is divided into three ~~main~~ main categories: Big donors, Medium donors and small donors. The beginning of season is directed at the big donors. The opening of the General Campaign, usually in New York, ~~is~~ takes place, as a matter of tradition in mid-December, with all leaders and dignitaries from all over the States and with a very important guest from Israel (The Defence Minister, Foreign Minister, ex-Chief of Staff have in the past honoured this occasion with their presence). Throughout the season, various guest speakers are invited, including high ranking Israeli officers from Israel. There are special TV programmes, prepared in Israel which are shown at festive dinners to hundreds of ~~attend~~ guests. Every community receives a special projector, who is used throughout occasions during the season. Films are supplied and once in a while there is a special TV show ~~with~~ like the one with Golda Meir and Moshe Dayan which was shown to 45 communities and which was transmitted by Telestar. It seems that no technical device has not been used or tried by UJA.

Apart from receiving current news ~~in~~ by way of lecturers and distinguished guests from Israel, there is great activity ~~in~~ the opposite direction, especially since the Six Day War. At the beginning of the season, visits of groups of contributors are arranged in Israel.

Every group is of about 100-200 people who come to Israel for one week and tour the country. They see everything by themselves and receive special care from all local authorities in the country. Members of the group return to their communities loaded with impressions and continue their activity for UJA with renewed vigour and better understanding. Last season, about 1500 contributors came here, among them a large number of young leaders.

A special mention has to be made of the special Study Mission composed of 200-300 ~~members~~ contributors, who come to Israel at the beginning of the season. They receive VIP treatment and a special plane takes them to the various places they visit, including Sinai. The group is made up of people who have contributed at least 10,000 dollars a year.

This plan has proved itself already. Within a two week tour, ~~the~~ last year's group have pledged to contribute 10 million dollars during the current season.

Has UJA succeeded in reaching the Jews with means in the US? It probably succeeded more than any other organization and more than in the past, but according to UJA experts, many Jews have not contributed yet, and those who did, could contribute much more.

The American law allows every person who contributed to charity to set aside 15% of his ~~income~~ declared income for such purposes. Many, many have not even taken advantage of this ceiling, ~~said~~ I was told by one of UJA's leaders.

~~The~~ Contributions to UJA are not in cash. They are annual pledges which are then transferred every quarter of a year to UJA, mostly by check, sometimes by the transfer of property or valuables. Sometimes, not often through legacies.

The bad crisis on the N.Y. Stock Exchange may hit UJA incomes too. Many Jews, who have been contributors for years, as well as potential contributors, have much money invested at the stock exchange which may be lost. Yet the aim of UJA for the current year, and for future years is to receive larger sums from American Jewry.

Rabbi Friedman roars at ~~the~~ past-present and future contributors: 'Israel needs you and your aid at least for the next twenty years.' Many contributors admit that they are satisfied with their involvement with UJA for two reasons: Because they have the means and they contribute and by contributing they strengthen their Jewish identification.

המגבית הציבה לעצמה אתגר של הגברת פעילותה גם לשנת 1971, ב-10 אחוזים נוספים (דהיינו — להגיע לחוספת של 50 אחוז יום במשך שלוש שנים). פעילות בוחום אחר הוא — המ' שרת מנהיגות צעירה למגבית. ה.
