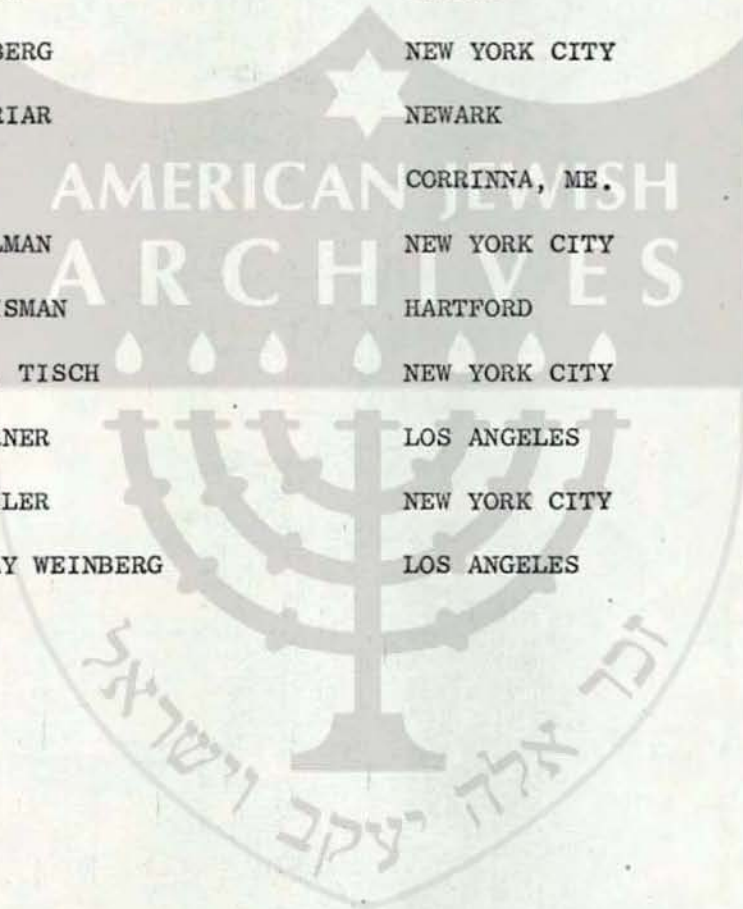

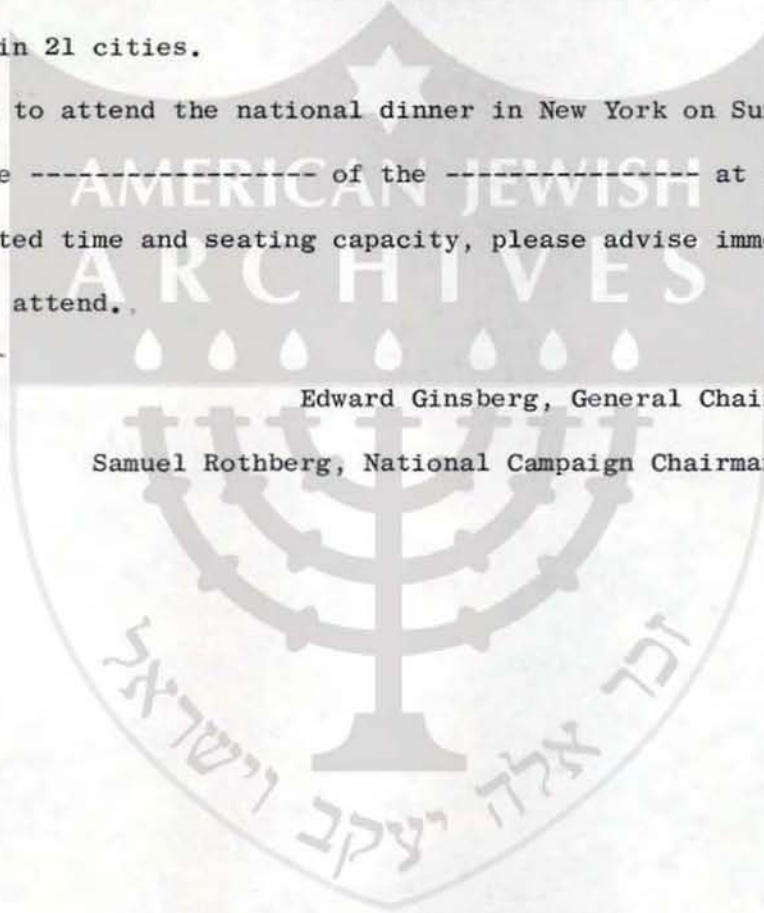

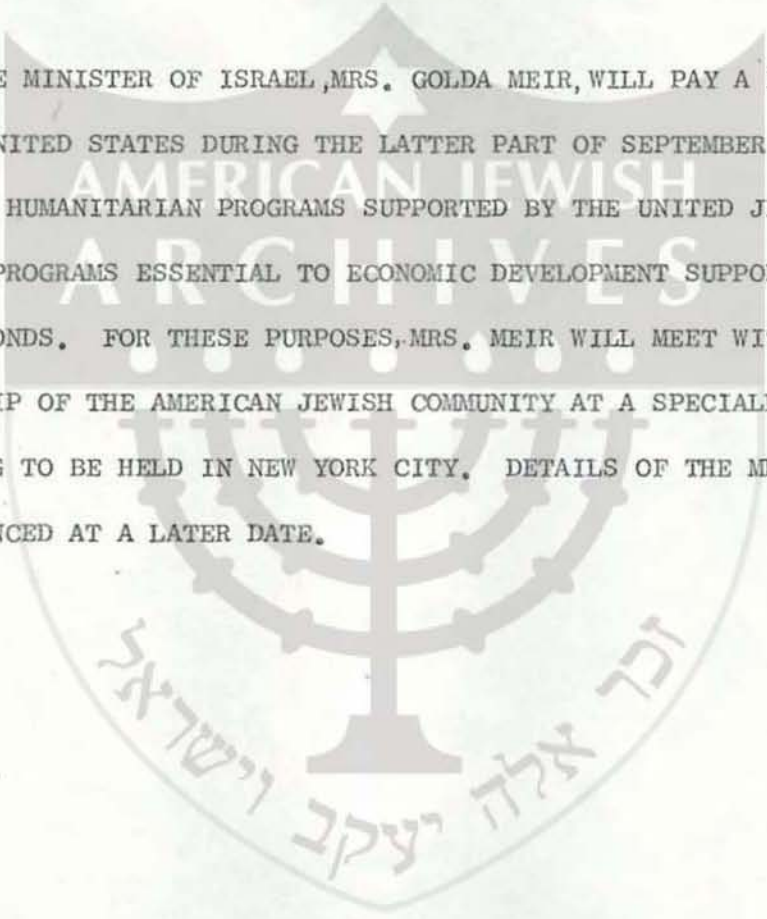

We have reached a point in the project for the September 20th UJA closed-circuit telecast where the following specifications have been indicated.

A network of twenty-one cities originating in New York with large screen color exhibitions in:

Atlanta	Los Angeles
Baltimore	Miami
Boston	Milwaukee
Chicago	Minneapolis
Cincinnati	Newark
Cleveland	Philadelphia
Dallas	Pittsburgh
Detroit	St. Louis
Hartford	San Francisco

The exhibition places are largely hotels and other community type centers. Some locations may require extra micro-wave special construction charges, which will be handled in the procedure agreed upon for the last UJA telecast. For costing purposes, we would include one hour of network time to originate at 9:00 P.M. New York time, to be carried live in our network everywhere.

The origination itself has not yet jelled in all details which might affect cost. However, we are assuming a three color camera mobile unit and personnel, special lighting of featured speakers, appropriate color TV draping background,

videotaping of program, and of course, our complete producing and directing staff. At this point we have not included prompting because the extent of the services is not yet defined and we think it is preferable not to include film or slide graphic facilities until the need for them is more clearly defined.


We would provide all TV facilities and services required for this important UJA telecast with the quality and safety standards that are the hallmark of our leadership in closed-circuit television. We propose to follow the plan of our standard contract, which was utilized recently by the UJA for its February 3, 1970 telecast. The time elements are very tight for the September 20th telecast and there will necessarily be a considerable amount of overtime incurred by our company. We have also determined that it is preferable to have the telephone companies install their TV lines before the last weekend, thereby increasing some of our costs, but protecting the safety of our telecast.

For all of the above facilities and services, our price will be \$92,000. If the UJA wishes to have the option of cancellation on or before September 10th, our price would increase by an additional \$12,000.

Although we have begun working on the project already, I would appreciate a letter of authorization from you to proceed with the work, pending completion of the contract itself.

Subject September 20 Closed Circuit Network

- c. On September 13 Bonds has a major affair in Philadelphia and the same people to be invited on the 20th will attend on the 13th.
- d. The United Fund is failing and all the top leadership are involved in that and cannot be diverted.
- e. They have the largest delegation ever on the Study Mission and they do not want any diversions before the Study Mission.

2. Baltimore - They have quota meetings the same morning and Bob Hiller strongly against telecast - we are trying to get him to accept the telecast for top leadership only.

3. Atlanta - Atlanta is also against, but I have spoken to Nate Lipson and I believe they will come along. *OK - accepted -*

Subject Golda Meir meeting

1. Attached is the suggested wire. Rabin does not want the wire to go before Tuesday. MT is working on the lists and will be ready for Tuesday. Western Union is alerted. *Wire Approved by Rabin - Alexandroni - Ross -*
2. The Embassy wanted the release out today. They prepared, we edited and sent out with their approval. Attached for your information. *Approved by Rabin - Alexandroni - Ross*
3. Meeting room still unresolved for the 20th. See notes on bottom.
4. We have developed a problem with Bonds which we are trying to resolve.
 - a. Leo has to settle the problem of Abe Feinberg in order to give us approval of two names on wire.
 - b. Leo's insistence on parity and equity will be annoying and time consuming in the limited time we have available to us.
 - c. He takes the position that the telecast in the local communities be sponsored in a similar way as the national meetings, even if it means cancellation if the communities do not go along. Although Rabin does not want to cancel, he urges the local meetings to be done on the same basis as national meetings. We are calling all communities back Friday morning in an effort to try to work out cooperative ventures. I reached Sudran tonight who is willing to do the Essex County telecast on the same basis as our national meeting. I don't know, however, how the others will react.
5. Leo and Alexandroni prefer meetings open to the press. Ginsberg, you and I prefer closed meetings. Rabin is not sure and will advise us, but at this moment, he will not make a decision.
6. Network - Mel Bloom is handling the network with TNT. We started early enough and Mel has all the technical problems under control. *See memo*

My dear Mr. :

I am writing to you as one of Israel's proven friends. I am sure you understand that we are passing through difficult days, attempting to carry on in the face of the enmity which surrounds us. In spite of the war, we are working every day to fulfill our destiny as a nation and a land worthy of our people's needs. We continue to welcome new immigrants and do everything possible to provide a warm reception.

The challenges of this moment are enormous and the strain sometimes unbelievable - but not unbearable, because we know that you will listen.

If it were possible for you to come to Jerusalem, I would be delighted to receive you in person and tell you in detail the problems we face. Since that might not be feasible, and time is urgent, I am sending to you, within the next few weeks, my personal emissaries to explain in depth, with new confidential material, some of these problems. I want you to listen to them with open hearts and minds, as though you were listening to me.

Within a few days after you receive this letter, you will receive a telephone call from a member of the Israeli diplomatic staff in the United States, informing you of the time and place where you will meet with my associates.

The solidarity of the Jewish people will enable us to surmount present difficulties and face the future unafraid.

PREFACE

There are approximately 440 gifts throughout the country, and 110 gifts in New York City, for a total of 550 gifts, which might involve approximately 750 persons, in the category described above, and who should be approached personally, and solicited, as individually as possible, for their 1970 gifts. The success of the recent Prime Minister's invitational group indicates the correctness of the tactical approach - i. e. directly from Israel, and by Israelis, with the UJA left out, insofar as possible. There is no doubt in my mind that this tactic was the single most significant factor in achieving success.

The people responded to the letter of the Prime Minister, to the telephone call from the Prime Minister's emissary. They would not so have responded to any American UJA lay leader.

I. INVITATION

This operation must be planned the same way. The initial approach is the most important. It must be made in the form of a letter from the Prime Minister, stating that she is sending a team to the United States and wants to invite the individual to a private, confidential meeting with that team.

Immediately after the letter is received, the individual must be contacted by someone from the Israel Embassy or Consulate in the nearest town. It is not necessary to bring anyone from Israel to do the follow up. If the Ambassador here is requested to provide the necessary personnel, he will do so and the follow up can be managed locally.

II. TEAMS

Because of the number of locations (list attached), two teams are required. Each team must consist of four persons: a junior military officer, to give a briefing on the border situation with maps and slides; an official, to give a briefing on the current immigration situation, also with slides and charts; a General of Zahal, to give an over-all description of the long military conflict ahead; and a member of the Cabinet, to provide an over-all economic picture plus a statement of what is required from world Jewry.

I have no names to suggest for the military briefing officer. The official describing immigration should be Yehuda Dominitz of the Jewish Agency and one other of his ability, knowledge and experience. The I. D. F. General should be Aluf M. Hod for one team and Aluf S. Lahat for the other team. The Cabinet rank officer should be Mr. Z. Sharef for one team and Mr. M. Beigen for the other team.

III. LOCATIONS

There are 20 primary locations. That means that each team would have to visit 10 places. This could be done in 10 days easily and perhaps less. The attached list shows the primary locations plus the nearby places, with only a few gifts, whose contributors are invited to the main location. In those cities where there is an Israeli Consulate, it is recommended that the meeting be held right in the Consulate. Where there is none, a suitable location will be obtained in the home or office of an individual.

IV. PROGRAM OF THE MEETING

1. Chairman - Wherever possible this should be the Israeli Consul General or some other official. Where not possible, the host acts as the chairman.
2. Presentation of military facts.

3. Presentation of immigration facts.

4. Speech by army general.

5. Speech by Cabinet officer.

6. Questions and answers.

7. Raising of funds, under guidance of a UJA National Chairman, or, better yet, one of the \$1 million or \$500,000 contributors from the Prime Minister's flight.

The entire meeting should take no more than 2 - 2-1/2 hours. It should not be held in connection with a meal, because too much time is lost eating and drinking and even more important, there is a subtle difference of mood when the meeting is taut and devoted exclusively to business. I recommend either 10:00 a.m. or 4:00 p.m. Furthermore, this timetable would even permit the team to make two cities in one day, travelling by jet.

V. NEW YORK

This is the 21st location, but contains one-fourth as many gifts as the entire nation. Therefore, the team coming to New York might have to do more than just handle one meeting. This remains to be seen.

VI. TIMETABLE

1. The invitation from the Prime Minister should be received by 10 December.

2. Follow up calls by Consular personnel should begin within two days after letters are received.

3. The schedule of meetings must be set for the period Monday through Friday, 5 - 9 January, and Monday through Friday, 12 - 16 January. If for some reason it is impossible to work during the first week of January (because of the proximity of the holidays), then the timetable will be revised for work the second and third week of January. This fact will become known within one week of the time that follow up calls are started - i.e. 15 December.

4. Teams should plan to arrive by Friday, 2 January, or Sunday, 4 January, for intensive briefing, if we are to start on Monday the 5th.

VII. DECISIONS

1. The Prime Minister must agree to send the invitation. There is no adequate substitute, except possibly a cable from her, instead of a personal letter, to each individual.

2. The Ambassador in Washington must be instructed to provide sufficient personnel for hundreds and hundreds of follow up telephone calls.

3. The proper teams must be provided, according to the names indicated above.

VIII. CONCLUSIONS

It must be clearly understood that the objective of this operation is to try to bring a strong Israeli impact to every \$50,000 contributor. In practically every city, except New York, these people will already have been approached by January and will already have given some indication of their 1970 commitment. From all indications apparent to us now, most of them are prepared to accept the gravity of the Israel situation and to increase their gifts. The whole question - How much? Normal fund raising pressures and techniques can produce modest increases. The object of this operation is to provide extraordinary increases.

In order to be successful, all the conditions must prevail. The prestige of the Prime Minister must be involved. Embassy and Consular personnel must be involved. The teams from Israel must make the strongest possible presentations. The stakes are very high and much can be won.

IX. ADDENDUM

We are planning another Prime Minister's flight for February. This will also require her letter of invitation to the group to be invited. I have no idea of numbers at this time because we are still working on lists, but it does not seem to me that it could possibly be any larger than the one just completed.

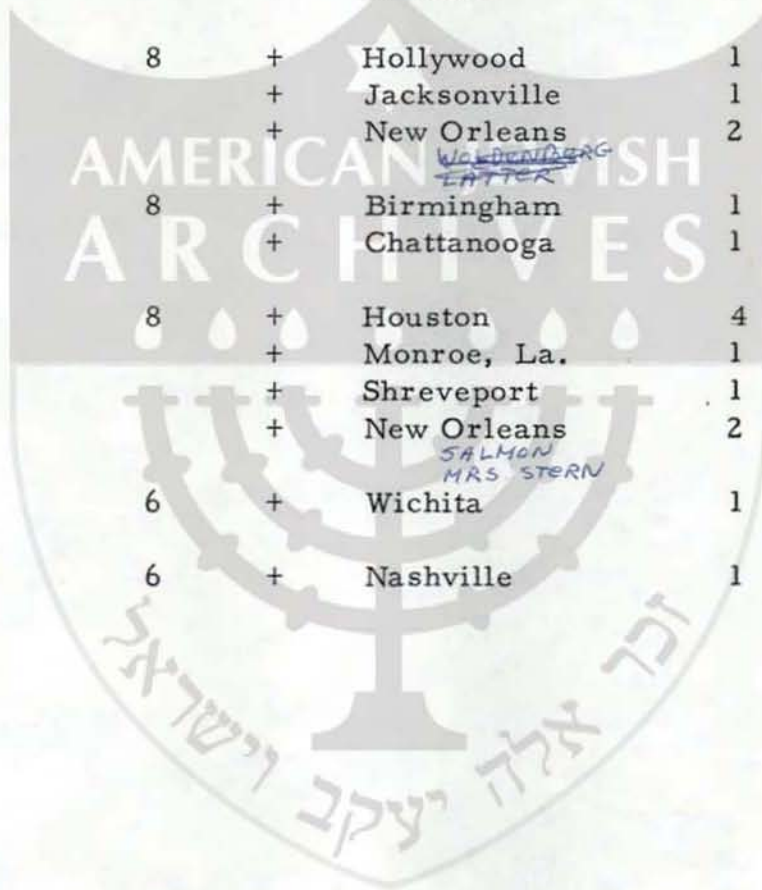
Here again, having learned so much from experience, we know the conditions which guarantee success. El Al must again be requested to cooperate with a special plane. The I. D. F. must again be requested to cooperate with a similar program in the field. The key ministers, Defense, Foreign Affairs, and Treasury, must again be asked to cooperate. The Prime Minister must be asked to receive the people in small private groups.

In other words, we feel that the format of the first flight group was so successful that we wish to duplicate it exactly.

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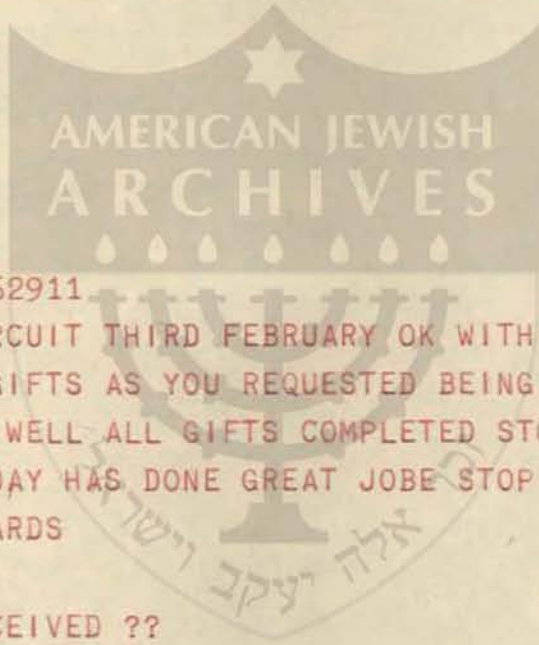

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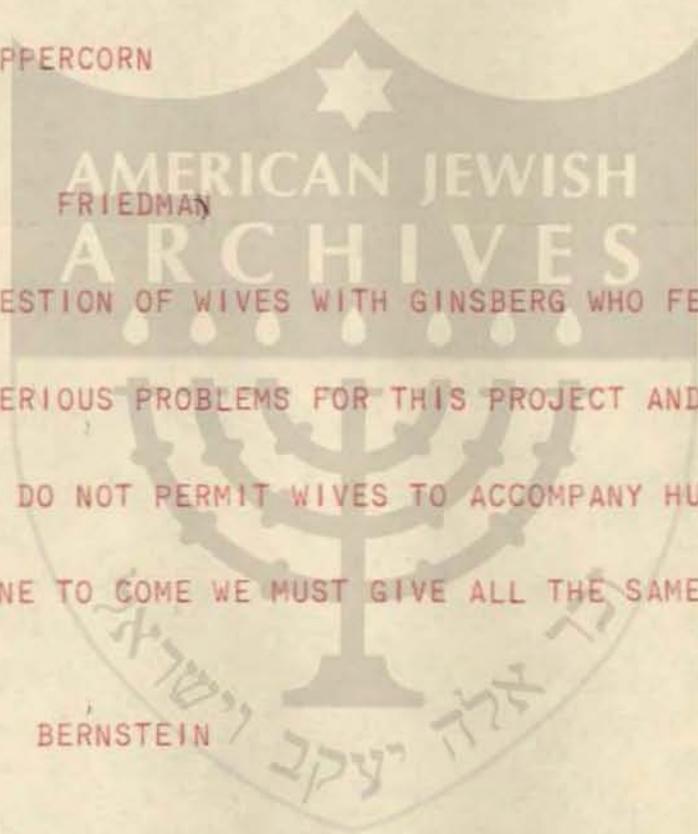

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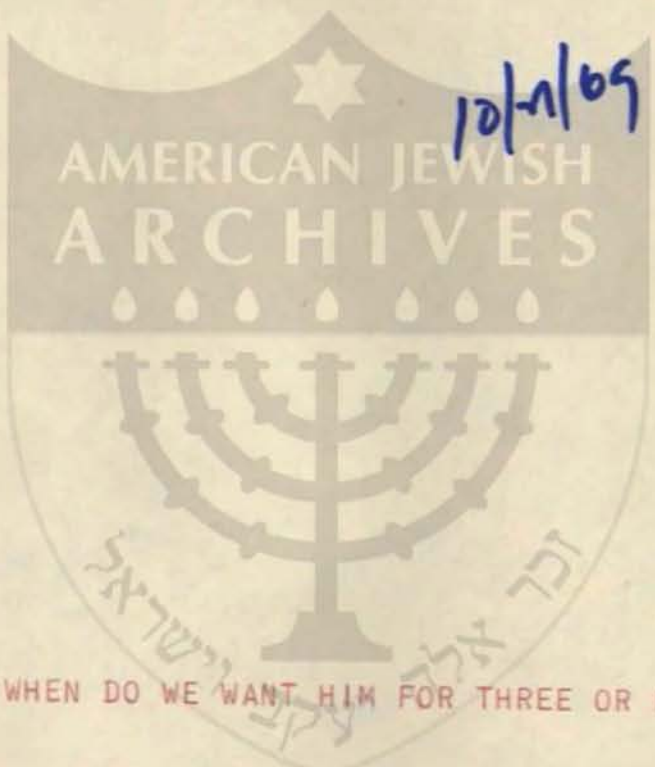

The January project was set up to bring together contributors of \$50,000 and over and potentials throughout the country at 17 central cities during the period January 19 - 27. Invitations were sent out over the signature of the Prime Minister and follow-up telephone calls for attendance were made by members of the staff of the New York Consulate of Israel.

The Israelis who participated in the program were:

They visited Columbus, Philadelphia, Miami, Washington, Pittsburgh, Boston, Hartford, Newark, Milwaukee, St. Louis, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Dallas, Memphis, Chicago, Detroit, and New York City.

With the exception of Washington, D. C., all of the meetings took place. The Washington meeting did not materialize due to a severe snow storm on the afternoon of January 20th, which prevented anyone from reaching the Embassy where the meeting was to be held. In addition, icy roads in the area affected the attendance at the Columbus meeting.

Lay leaders who participated on the first Prime Minister's Mission in November participated in these meetings as the fifth man whose responsibility it was to convert the meeting from one of education and indoctrination to fund raising. Those who participated were:

The meetings were attended by 228 individuals representing 43 cities and 191 gifts.

Attached are lists, meeting by meeting, showing the names of those who attended; their giving records from 1967 and 1969; a column indicating 1970 announcements made prior to the Mission visit and a column showing the announcement, if any, made at the meeting itself.

Reports from the 5th Men, the participants from Israeli lay leadership in the communities and those who attended the meetings, indicated that by and large the meetings were worthwhile. Almost everyone agreed that the concept was imaginative and effective. However, many felt that the program would have been more productive had it been held in November before the participants had made their commitments. In addition, it was also felt that the importance of this project was somewhat diminished by the community fund raising schedule and the Pinchas Sapir tour for Israel Bonds, since both brought the Minister and high Israeli officials into the communities almost simultaneously.

Following are facts with regard to the Prime Minister's Mission. Mrs. Meir was most encouraged with her experience in 1971 with two community missions. She, therefore, expressed her desire to repeat the invitation for 1972 but requested that only one mission be invited this year due to the current pressures on her and other government and agency officials.

The Prime Minister has asked El Al to make available its only Boeing 747 for this mission. Although the 747 seats 400, it is planned to take less than 250 on the flight in order to assure comfort for all.

The mission invitation is extended to the Executive Director, the 1972 Campaign Chairman and two other campaign leaders in each of the 56 communities which raised more than \$1,000,000 in 1971.

Marty Peppercorn and Hank Rosen will be in contact with the communities regarding this program. At present the plans are as follows, although the flight schedule and program may change between now and August 29:

There are those who take the catastrophic view that every month that passes without a settlement brings us nearer to some catastrophe, and therefore a settlement must be reached urgently and impatiently at the expense of perfectionism -- in short, those who take this view that time is running out find themselves spontaneously advising Israel to cut losses and to accept a settlement short of its desires.

On the other hand, there are those who say that while Israel would be willing to conclude a peace treaty immediately with any Arab states... if the time is not right for a peace settlement, then it is possible to make a creative and a constructive use of time in such a manner as will strengthen Israel and keep intact the principles for a stable and enduring peace. I believe that we should be urgent in seizing any opportunities for peace, but I do not accept the doctrine that the passage of time imposes (action) upon us.

The cease fire which was accepted by the Israeli government on August 7 in response to an initiative made by the government of the US has now been in operation for 12 months. The cease fire is the central concern of Israel and of world opinion in relation to Israel. I need hardly tell this audience what the cease fire has meant in terms of human values, of lives that have been spared, of resources that have been accumulated. So therefore the cease fire in itself is of very major value in terms of our Israeli and Jewish outlook on life. It is also being used for consolidation, because if you have heard something from our security authorities, you will know that the cease fire has been accompanied by a dramatic growth of Israel's strength. Never in any single year has this nation received such a powerful reinforcement of its defensive, physical and deterrent strength as that which it has received in the last 12 months.

The point of the Suez Canal cease fireline is that it is different in category from the other cease fire lines. The conflict between Israel and Jordan and Israel and Syria, grave and tense as they are, do not involve the destiny of mankind. They are parochial conflicts...and the conflict between Israel and Egypt, which finds its arena at the Suez Canal, is an international tension in the full meaning of the word, because facing us across that narrow water obstacle are not the forces of an Arab country alone. The fact is that during the latter period of the day-to-day fighting before the cease fire, the prospect of great power involvement was growing graver every day. The Egyptians almost removed themselves through technical incapacity from the arena, and the confrontation that was beginning to develop was between Israel and one of the major nuclear powers. Therefore there was always the danger that the exchange of fire across the Suez Canal would escalate into a broader conflict. It is because of this special nature of the Suez Canal front that I still believe that the place at which to begin any peace-making effort must be at the place where the absence of peace is the most dangerous.

So there has been 12 months of cease fire. There has been consolidation of our defenses. There has been a removal of the daily threat of great power confrontation. There is a fourth change...the decline of Arab radicalism. Many people said that they (the terrorist movements) were the wave of the future, that they couldn't be resisted. The terrorist movement is resistable, for one thing we have resisted it, Jordan has resisted it, and other governments have successfully resisted it.

Insofar as there is a movement for ideas in the Arab world, it is towards realism and not towards radicalism. . . . This is the authentic confirmation of the Israeli thesis. We have been right. We have said that if we had patience and tenacity and perseverance, .. while keeping the peace options open, the Arabs would finally reach the conclusion that we were not going to be swept away...and that they would have to come face to face with concepts they had never previously accepted such as the concept of Israel's permanence or the concept of inevitable peace between Israel and the Arab states. The last year has proved that there is a process of awakening realism but it is not yet viable. It hasn't led to a situation at which a settlement is in view because although Egypt has enunciated the concept of a peace agreement with Israel it has then vitiated that concept by what it has added.

There are at work in the minds of our neighbours two concepts about how to bring about Israel's downfall...the revolutionary concept and what I call the long term historical concept. The revolutionary concept is one in which Israel is swept out of existence by a military triumph. Alas, our neighbours celebrate this triumph in the rich world of fantasy. Therefore, there are others who take refuge in the second, more patient concept. Yes, Israel will be destroyed ..through the steady attrition of hostile pressure. Israel will collapse not through military defeat but through the sheer weight of the burdens which it carries on its shoulders, the financial burden, the economic burden, the administrative burden, the burden of maintaining its international relations in a context of regional conflict. The object here then is to cause Israel to collapse and to surrender through a process of seige.

My own feeling is that we are unlikely to pass from the present situation of total deadlock to a situation of total peace. (But) there has to be some kind of transition and that is why we have accepted the concept of...the Suez Canal settlement, even involving a partial withdrawal from the Suez Canal, if that were done in conditions compatible with our security. I am convinced that if such a condition were reached, a momentum would be created for other agreements and the peace structure would arise not in a magic total way but in a way that one does a jigsaw puzzle--the pieces are fitted in one by one until the total design emerges.

What has now happened is that the Middle East is the only area in which there is no contact between the partners to a conflict.

Our peacemaking must be careful and precise, but if there is a chance we can take it. It is not whether we can maintain the long haul--it is not a question that I want you to ask me, it is a question that I want to ask you, can Israel maintain another year or two or three consolidating itself towards the final peace? I tell you quite frankly that if you ask me whether Israel can do that alone, the answer is a triumphant and an assertive yes, we can do it with you. So the question of whether we can conserve what we have achieved, not waste our resources, consolidate ourselves for the eventual peace prospects, not collapse under the burdens, that is really the question that you have come here not to put to Israel but to hear from Israel. What is your answer? That in brief is the reason for inviting you here.

The Presidential message to the Congress in February 1970 was an important turning point. It was the first time in which a great power had said that Israel's strength is a function of its own interests, not of our interest, not a matter of our indulgence and generosity and chivalry... but that it is a matter of the international balance, and therefore the funds for last year came not out of foreign aid--I think this is spiritually important--it came out of the defense budget of the United States. Not that you were helping somebody else and you can afford, if you like, not to help him, but out of the budget that expresses the concept of defending yourself. It was out of that framework that the \$500 million for Israel was drawn. I think there is more than technical significance in this fact.

We have an obsession about our security, and we are entitled to our obsessions. We are entitled to our obsession because our people have not had security--witness 6 million dead--and because our State has not had security--witness 23 years of seige.

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THE PRICE OF DEFENCE
HISTORIC SURVEY AND FACT SHEET

Almost 13 months of cease fire have - apart from saving many lives on both sides of the Suez Canal - enabled both forces to become much stronger than they were at the beginning of August 1970. Furthermore, the sophistication, and therefore the price, of the additional equipment grow almost daily.

We hope that the changes in currency values round the world - including our devaluation of 20 per cent last week - will not cause greater difficulties. The figures presented here, however, have been adjusted to the new rate of exchange.

- I. SOVIET SUPPORT TO EGYPT, in arms and men, on operational duties, as well as advisory, has increased continuously since January 1970.
- 1) Soviet arms and equipment supplied to Egypt since the Six Day War - whether given as outright grants, as replacement for destroyed material, or sold on long term favorable credit terms - total at least \$2 billion, 300 million.
 - 2) Soviet Personnel - nobody really knows exact numbers, but with full MIG operational squadrons, SA-2 and SA-3 missile sites, radar installations, plus all previously known advisors, there are at least 15,000 Russians in Egypt.
 - 3) Soviet Missiles and Anti-Aircraft.
 - (a) The Russians have become deeply involved in Egyptian air defence. They have brought about 40 SA-2 batteries (6 launchers each); also a number of SA-3 batteries (4 launchers each - with 2 missiles to each launcher) into the area close to the Canal. The missile sites are interspersed - SA-2 and SA-3 covering each other. They have also brought fighter squadrons to air-fields close to the Canal.

- (b) With the missiles in their present position the Russians pose a great threat to Israeli planes flying over the Canal. After inflicting serious losses upon the Israeli Air Force, they will move artillery forward and hammer Israeli ground defenses, make it hard to rebuild, cause many casualties, and finally try to cross. Even to take only a few kilometers on the east bank of the Canal would be worthwhile for them.
- (c) Israel has some electronic and other defenses against the missiles. Several Phantoms were lost last year owing to to these missiles. Each missile costs approximately \$ 100,000 and the Russians have been known to fire as many as 60 on one day - or \$ 6 million worth.

II EXPANSION OF ARAB MILITARY STRENGTH.

- 1) The Israeli forces are outmanned and outgunned by the Egyptians in the ratio of 12:1 and 24:1 respectively.
- 2) Syria maintains an army of 60,000 men in the area between Kuneitra and Damascus (approximately 40 miles) with more than 1,000 tanks, which was larger than the entire Egyptian force in the Sinai desert threatening Israel in May 1967.

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III. ANALYSIS OF ISRAELI DEFENCE.

- 1) The original defence budget for 1967 (year of actual war) was IL 1.25 billion (approx. \$ 300 million). The defence budget for 1970/71 was IL 5.51 billion (approx. \$ 1.31 billion) - or 4 times as much as the year of the Six Day War. The 1971/72 budget is 6.4 billion (or \$ 1.52 billion) - or 5 times as much as the year of the Six Day war.

4) Current developments and their impact on defence costs.

The Arabs are arming very rapidly and continue voicing their threats almost daily. Last week Egypt, Syria and Libya signed a Federation agreement and proclaimed a return to the policy of Khartoum, namely, "No peace, no negotiation and no recognition of Israel." In the face of this development Israel must be prepared more than ever for these contingencies.

It is therefore necessary to:

- (a) strengthen fortifications on all fronts;
- (b) increase inventories of air bombs, heavy and light ammunition, spare parts, etc;
- (c) in general to build up Israel's strength, so that the Arabs will be deterred from breaking the cease-fire, or if attacked Israel must be capable of meeting the possibility of all out war.

5) The present 1971/72 budget calls for the import of approximately \$ 850 million worth of arms and supplies. This includes Phantom and Skyhawk planes, tanks, heavy guns, troop carriers, anti-aircraft, hawk batteries, and other sophisticated equipment.

6) The arms must be paid for. The U.S. Congress did act affirmatively upon President Nixon's request and \$ 500 million were allocated for the fiscal year 1971 to provide credits to finance Israel arms purchases from the U.S. Government. The credits were fully utilized leaving an unpaid balance of about \$ 175 million. These are credits not grants and must be repaid by Israel.

7) In the face of the continuing Arab military build-up and because of increased indebtedness Israel has no choice but to ask for additional support from the U.S. including grants. For the fiscal year 1972 Israel has requested a loan of \$ 300 million and a grant-in-aid of \$ 200 million since, despite all assistance in dollars from our regular sources, we will still have a very substantial, unmanageable deficit. Israel's requests for 1972 are still under review, and concerning grants the U.S. Government has not even included Israel in its program for foreign military assistance for the fiscal year 1972.

In this connection it must be noted that Israel's foreign currency debt, which is a heavy mortgage on the next generation, has already passed the \$ 3 billion mark and the debt per capita is \$ 1,100, the highest in the world, and seven times higher than the country with the second highest foreign currency debt.

In 1971, \$300 million of principal as well as some \$200 million of interest have to be paid by Israel to service its external debt

Of this amount \$ 820 million was directly attributable to the defence purchases; in 1971 the figures are \$ 1,460 million and \$ 850 million accordingly.

In other words, by the end of 1970, the dollar reserve dropped to the dangerous point of being able to cover less than 1/7, or 7 to 8 weeks worth, of imports. In 1971, although the reserves have grown slightly - they are able to cover an even lower share of our annual imports.

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CONCLUSIONS

In the fiscal year 1971/72 Israel's defence costs are five times more than they were during the year of the Six^Day War.

If the de facto cease fire on the Suez Canal is maintained, defence expenditures will increase only marginally, because of the Arab arms build-up, and the need to purchase sophisticated equipment from the United States.

The Israeli citizen, bearing the heaviest tax burden in the entire world, will produce just enough revenue to cover the defence costs, and not enough to cover debt service. As immigration continues at an annual rate of 40,000 to 50,000, the full responsibility for the philanthropic burden as well as the financing of the economic development of Israel must be met by the free world Jewry.

To enable Israel to stand firm against Arab intransigence; to bolster Israel's economic growth; to maintain Israel's Home Front; it is vital that higher goals be reached in 1972.

THE DEFENCE BUDGET

(Main points of the lecture given by the Assistant Minister of Defence,
General Zvi Zur, on August 31, 1971, before U.J.A. members)

1. BASIC PRECEPTS:

- A) Israel shall hold on to all territories until a lasting peace agreement.
- B) The chances for a peace settlement in the near future are slim.
- C) Terrorists strikes might continue.
- D) Fire along the border might be renewed, mainly in the Suez Canal.

Therefore, the I.D.F. must be prepared for:

- A) War initiated by the Arab countries.
- B) Border incidents on various levels along all fronts.
- C) Acts of sabotage in and out of the administrative areas.

I.D.F. main purposes and priorities:

- A) To keep developing the Air Force, in order to maintain its aerial superiority and initiation.
- B) Development of the armored forces, having preventive and decisive capabilities.
- C) Improving the Intelligence's prewarning system.
- D) Maintaining current defence security.

2. In the financial year 1967/68, we had a budget of 1.96 billion Israeli Pounds, out of which \$200 million ^{was in} Dollars, whereas in the financial year 1971/72, we have a budget of ^{6.4}5.2 billion Israeli Pounds, out of which ^{is in} \$680 million Dollars, ^{spent directly by Ministry of Defense,} plus \$170 million ~~of indirect expense, such as new weapons spent by the Ministry~~
- The reasons for the above increase are:

- A) Strengthening of the enemy: as a result of this, the need for maintaining the balance.
- B) Problems of current security.
- C) Cost of sophisticated systems.

3. For a structure build-up:

The Air Force receives the greater part	48%
Ground Forces	28.4%
Navy	4.4%
Various projects	16.1%
Research and Development	3.1%

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4. The distribution of the Defence Procurement:

The budget is divided into: current consumption: 2,235 billion Israeli Pounds, and structure build-up: 2,960 billion Israeli Pounds.

5. Growth of the budget in the years 1972 - 1975:

It is important to mention in particular that the defence budget will also grow in the coming years and will reach in 1975, the level of ^{7,3}~~6,1~~ billion Isr. Pounds.

The reasons for the budget increase in the coming years (1971-1975):

A) Budget increase derives from the Arab reinforcement.

We will acquire, among other equipment, more tanks and more planes.

B) There is a rise in prices process.

C) There is an increase in the current security expenses.

6. Prices of Weapon Systems:

The prices of the modern weapon systems are without compare with similar ones in the past.

Examples:

The future tank will cost ^{\$} 343,000 thousand dollars, compared with the Sherman (^{\$}70,000 dollars) and the Centurion (165,000 dollars).

The Phantom aircraft costs ^{\$} 5,75 million dollars, compared with the Mirage III - ^{\$} 1.3 million dollars.

The Skyhawk N aircraft costs ^{\$} 2,8 million dollars, compared with the Ouragan - ^{\$} 125,000 thousand dollars.

The helicopter ^{C-53} costs ^{\$} 4,3 million dollars, compared with the S/58 - ^{\$} 270,000 thousand dollars.

A missile boat costs ^{\$} 6 million dollars, compared with the torpedo boat - ^{\$} 1.3 million million dollars.

7. Expenditure on Frontline Military Operations:

The current expenses - ammunition, tanks, wages and others - were in 1967/1968 68 million Israeli Pounds and have reached in 1970/71 827 million Israeli Pounds.

8. Procurement Problems:

In 1971, we spent for procurement according to the following distribution:

2 billion Israeli Pounds in the USA

500 million Israeli Pounds in Europe

1,5 billion Israeli Pounds for self-production.

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On the other hand, in 1976, we shall spend for equipping according to the following distribution:

1,5 - 2 billion Israeli Pounds in the USA

500 million Israeli Pounds in Europe

2,5 - 3 billion Israeli Pounds for self-production, with a clear tendency to increase as much as possible the local production and to reduce the dependence on foreign procurement.

9. Implications from the defence budget foreseen for the 5 coming years:

- A) Annual growth of 7,7% in National Gross Product.
- B) Freezing of the consumption increase per capita at a level of 2,5% per year.
- C) Freezing of social services at their present level.
- D) Risk of inflation resulting from full employment throughout the whole period.
- E) Increase in the National Debt from 3.1 billion dollars to 6.5 billion dollars.
- F) These implications are based on the assumption that during the said period, there will be an increase in the volume of receipts (financial support, ^{restitutions} personal compensations, and mainly ^{contributions} income from the ^{Jewish communities abroad} ~~United Jewish Appeal~~) which will attain a few billion dollars.



Mr. Ginsberg

First of all, on behalf of you I'd like to thank General and Mrs. Dayan for asking us here tonight. I'm sure that few have had the opportunity to sit in this most beautiful garden to see the things that are here - this opportunity isn't afforded many, so you have to understand that he regards you as something special.

Tonight, the General will speak to you ~~taxx~~ and the format of the evening will be that he will make a short address after which he will answer questions. There's another person here tonight who is in his own right one of the greats of Israel - he is General Aharon Yariv, known to most of you as Arala who's Chief of Intelligence and he'll be here to answer questions too. General Yariv.

You know, it seems like we've been going for days and just think that you just left New York Sunday night and here it's only Tuesday - I didn't happen to tell you which week - but it's Tuesday of the same week - and you know the Jews have gone from strength to strength - we've gone from great things to greater things and with that theme tonight, we are privileged to listen to a great man.

I have had the privilege to introduce him on many occasions. It's very difficult, because how do you become original when the subject is so unique that it's difficult to dream up new phrases and new slogans, because he doesn't change and over the years that I have had that privilege of introducing him, I had said and I say again, that there are great people in great moments in history and this man happens to be a great man who has been in the right place at the right moment. Throughout his history - 1948, 1956, 1967 he has played such a major role in securing the State - in

guaranteeing its independence and now has the responsibility of making sure that this land is secure, that this land remains free and that this land will remain so and will grow and grow into the great State and fulfil its potential. So we are indeed fortunate as Jews that there is such a man - that he has this responsibility and with the knowledge that it is he that has this responsibility, we know that Israel is safe and secure and therefore it's a double pleasure to be here and an extreme pleasure to present to you now General Moshe Dayan.

General Moshe Dayan

Ladies and Gentlemen, on behalf of my wife and myself, welcome to our garden. I believe in other gardens there are signs - don't step on the flowers - there aren't any flowers so I think here I have to warn you take care of yourselves not to break your neck on our stones here.

I know that we spend a lot of money and lately we were asked - now there is a cease-fire, what do you want money now for? Well, just as a matter of fact, when the cease-fire started on the 7th August last year, right away I think we started spending more money than we spent before because we wanted to use the opportunity and the time to build fortifications along the Suez Canal and the road and installations and just as a matter of budget, I think, that we spent less by shells and fire and what not during the fire than we spent since then by building installations and constructions.

I wanted to speak for our army, for our troops to say a few words, because all of you are acquainted with other countries, with other forces and with other wars. We do spend a lot of money - your money - I believe there's no corruption here and I'm not mentioning Vietnam, but there is no corruption here - every cent that is given to the Security Budget, you will not find it in the Black Market - I haven't heard any complaints in this respect.

And I don't know about anything that we did and then we found out that it wasn't really necessary and I should say that during wars and in all countries, the generals and forces built fortifications that later on are found to be unnecessary and buy equipment which later on was found to be the wrong one - I do think that if we look back, we cannot point out anything, absolutely anything which we invested money in and wasn't really essential. Moreover, we do spend a lot of money on development. There are some ladies and gentlemen here from England - we haven't stopped any development scheme in the middle and just came and said - we are sorry, we can't go on with that - and all the millions or billions are just wasted, because it was wrong to start in this field of development.

It is true that whatever we started ultimately costs more than what we really thought, but I should say that all our projects ended up successfully - those that we have finished. Some of them are still in the making, but those that we started, even if they lasted longer than expected and cost much more than anticipated, but I wouldn't say that we wasted the money or that we had to stop or to drop it or to change it. We were very selective about it.

Now I feel that I have to explain about the present situation now - about the fact that we had to change from firing shells and bombs and rounds of ammunition into constructing roads and fortifications, but also in the political field. If we do go now into negotiations, which I do hope that we will - I don't know what forms and under what titles it will be - like in term arrangements or Warring talks, but all these are means and ways to end the war and to find some arrangement, solution, lasting one. If we do go into something like that as we have been for the last year or so, then it will not be done in the vacuum, without any pressure. On the contrary, the other party is pressing on the trigger and in a way pushing the gun and saying - unless you agree to what we ask, then, at the beginning it was within a month we open fire,

Now we have two partners on the other side that are certaining with the resumption of the fighting - the Arabs and their supporters, the Russians. About the Arabs, they say and there is something in it - that they are ready, almost willing, to sacrifice millions of soldiers but to get some achievement. It is sad, because they know that we are a small people and of course, we can't say - alright, it will be your million and our million - but we don't want to have any heavy casualties. We can't help that there will be a war without any casualties, but we don't want heavy casualties. We didn't have heavy casualties - during the War of Attrition and during the Six Day War we didn't have heavy casualties - we are very careful about it.

In order, not only to plan the war, but to conduct the war without suffering real heavy casualties, one has to make a lot of preparation - not only to be careful during the fighting - fortifications and roads and installations and I could go on and on and say - ladies and gentlemen, the money that we are spending and investing now, part of it is in order that we shall not have to give in under the pressure of negotiations - that we shall be not only safe, but we shall be in the position to say that if you resume the war and fighting and even if you are ready to lose million soldiers, we are not going to give in during negotiations and if we have to resume the war, we will be ready for that and it's your business if you are going to sacrifice one million. We shall take great care, not only not to lose the war, but not to lose many of our soldiers. But these are not only words - they have to be interpreted into deeds and all of them cost money - equipment and installations and constructions - everything costs money whether it's in the villages that you make shelters or on the front line - whether it's just a fortification or armed ~~xx~~ cars - everything that you

want to protect your people with, costs money.

Then we have the Russians. Now we do not pretend that we can win a war with Russia - we don't want anything like that, but we certainly cannot pretend that. And I'm not quite sure that the Russians really want to go all out into this war. As a matter of fact, I think they don't and up to now they have not, but I do think that they will feel obliged to help the Egyptian - or at least to prevent the Egyptian from suffering a major defeat. So as long as the Egyptian will be doing well, the Russian will not be under any pressure to interfere or intervene. But if the Egyptian will be losing, I am afraid that the Russian will feel that they have to give them a hand and to prevent another colossal defeat by the Egyptians. So we have to take that into consideration one way or the other.

The only thing that we can say about it is that we shall not run away - if we will have to, then we will fight back - even if on the other side it will be some Russian soldiers or pilots - we have no alternative. If the other alternative is to run away, then we would rather fight back. But we do want to be in the position not to have inferior arms and equipment if we can - if we can we would like our soldiers and our pilots to have, if we can, the same standards of airplanes, the same standards of electronic equipment and other installations. So we hope that we shall not have to fight the Russian forces or troops or even individuals, but we do have to take into consideration such a possibility - that they will feel obliged to help the Egyptians in one way or another and we want to have the best equipment that we can for this case.

Now how do you say in English - Lehavdil Elef Havdalot - with all the differences in the world, we have to take into consideration pressure by our friends the Americans too - certainly not fighting us, but not being very helpful and very quick and fast in providing us with Phantoms or whatever it is. And we cannot rely on ourselves entirely - that I have to say right away and because they are helpful, then it costs you a lot of money - I want you to know, because whenever they release something, whether it's equipment or just helping us to use things by ourselves, right away we have to approach you - perhaps you would have been in a better position if we had a total embargo by the Americans, but we haven't - there's no chance for that, I hope to tell you.

But we do want to be independent as much as we can with production of critical weapons and arms. Now naturally I cannot go into details about this, but let me put it like this. If you hear that we produce tanks or airplanes, you can say - it can't be - but never say - don't believe it - don't do that. Say it can't be and I'll be happy. But when it comes to believe, I don't think Jews ever should say about anything - don't believe it - I don't know where we would be. So just now we are not only busy, but we are stuck with three kinds of spending money and time and ammunition and everything. The actual fighting when it comes which just now almost no shooting takes place - what we call short term planning which has to do with all this manufacturing - when we say short-term planning we mean now and the coming five years. Just like running business - if you have to do what you do now and the next year and the year after - but you know what you are producing - it is not development schemes, but real production, so we call it short term and we have to go on with it. With the items that I mentioned and with others and with installations and fortifications and roads and this and that. It costs a lot

of money and we have to be prepared for that, even if the cease-fire goes on, to keep strong and to be able to, during the negotiations, stand on our own and not to give in. Negotiation is just another way of struggle and you have to be strong. We really, really have to be ready for the war to be resumed, otherwise you are lost in the negotiations.

But we also have long range planning. We have to have in mind the next generation of weapon. It so happened that five years and on - ten years and fifteen years - we have to think about the future - about airplanes and tanks and electronics and all the others - by the time that the present ones will be obsolete, that we have to think and go on developing. Just now the United States of America is very helpful to us in extending to us the knowledge about development and we have to use it, we have to exploit it - because we have to make the best of it.

So we have to go on with our everyday life - we have to get on with the actual production for this year, next year, the year after and we have to develop and lay foundations for the next generation of workmen. When you sum up all this, it's a lot of money. The only thing I can suggest is that in order to meet all this, besides what you can do now and on your short-term - that is to say, the five years, you will also lay the foundations for the next generation of the U.J.A. Thank you.

Mr. Ginsberg

Right, this is the opportunity. You have a change here now, because, I don't know if General Dayan is willing to answer

questions, but you have the Chief of Intelligence - you can ask about security - you can ask about the Arabs - anything you want - I'm not guaranteeing you'll get the answers, but you can ask it - and if you'll excuse the expression - fire away.

Question - General, the opening of the Suez Canal and the drawback for some distance which is somewhat obscure - can you tell us how you go about that.

General Dayan

When you address your question to General, then I look at Yariv - I'm not in uniform. We feel that we should not draw back from the Suez Canal which is our best line, unless we are sure that the war will not be resumed. There is no logic and it is not only a matter of logic - it's a matter of more than interest.

I should say there is no excuse for us to just drop and walk back from the Suez Canal line as a thing which they did not manage to get through their fighting, just as a favour - unless we know, we are sure that shooting is over - no more fire. Now if we talk along lines of peace-time, then it can be negotiated, but firstly we have to be sure - no more shooting - and if this is not promised, then there is no excuse, there is no reason and if you ask me how I feel about it - I would feel very bad - but I have no reason to feel bad, because I don't think that our Government will take such a decision to withdraw from the Suez Canal, from our positions on the Suez Canal - unless and until we are sure that there will be no more shooting.

Question - Does it make sense to have a neutral power such as Sweden or Switzerland open the Canal and operate it? First of all, would it help and secondly, is it feasible?

Aharon Yadiy ?

I wanted to ask - can you sell it to the Egyptians?

Question - How can you trust the Arabs, even if they sign a peace-treaty or formal document agreeing to peace - their word isn't very good, the paper isn't worth anything and therefore why accept it?

Aharon Yariy

Before I answer your question, I think I owe an apology to the gentleman who asked the question about Switzerland undertaking the opening of the Canal - maybe it would be a good idea - I would like to add that it would be a good idea if Switzerland could really open the Canal for the passage of all ships, including Israeli ships and us staying where we are - but it is just too good to be true.

As far as your question is concerned Sam, it is not so much a question of believing, of trusting the Arabs when they sign on the dotted line. It is more a question of taking a certain risk, but on the other hand there are things that are minimizing the risk. If the Suez Canal is open to ships - if population comes back to Suez, Ismalia and Port Said, all this happens, then the chances for the resumption of fighting are being minimized, because the interest in the resumption of fighting as far as the Egyptians are concerned for they have returned the population to these cities - when the Suez Canal is opened - when trade is going on - there is no major interest for them to resume the fighting.

But even so, it is still possible that logic is there and their decisions are on the other side - not on the side of logic. Very often in political life, decisions are not based on pure logic and this is legitimate in politics. In this case we, of course, under such an agreement or arrangement, I presume will take all the necessary steps including the line we are going to occupy so as to minimize the risks should they not abide by the agreement. So it is not something which we take upon ourselves lightly.

the non-resumption of fighting and the non-resumption of fire. Of course, nothing is certain or safe in this world - you have to take a certain risk. I think the risk is a legitimate and reasonable one. If we insist on certain conditions and I know it has been stated publicly by the Government of Israel - the conditions have been stated and I think that the risk in the case of an arrangement being implemented, I think is a reasonable risk.

Question - Up to about six eight months ago we used to read in the paper about commercial development of the Arava - is the commercial development of these things continuing.

General Dayan

Yes, I'm happy to say that the jet commander is already in regular production and the President of Uganda was here and ~~she~~ went with the jet commander to London and I think it's a good plan. The Arava is not in this stage, but I'm more than hopeful that it's going to turn out a very good plan.

Question - In going back over history, the United States occupied Japan for many years, I believe it was nine or eleven years General, and they stayed there and did whatever they had to do until they proved that they could take care of their own affairs. I know that the Israeli Government is in the Sinai and Gaza and in going about their business and doing great things for the people there which has been shown in the response that the people have given, I would feel that in all due respect, for everybody's safety, wouldn't it be best that they proved themselves, regardless of world opinion and at that time give back whatever land is necessary?

Aharon Yariv

I don't think there is any reason for us to be at loggerheads about this problem - I think we agree with you - I think we agree with you that ~~in~~ in certain areas, on certain lines, the Israeli Government will stand fast - unless - until - if and when, etc. etc. etc. things change, but for the time being, we stand fast to make sure that the problem that has beset us for such a long time, the problem of our security is taken care of and it is not the economic riches of the territory, it is the strategic advances that security entail in these strategic advantages - and therefore I think we have no reason to quarrel - we are in agreement.

General Dayan

If I may add just two words about it - as you, Sir, started your question by saying - going back in history - I feel that I have also to say - going back in history for 10 years ago in 1957 we, France and England were engaged in war in Sinai and then the United States of America and Russia were against it - and not only Israel - France and England went back, not after 11 years, but before they even managed to take their first objective, because they were not the United States of America. What America could do in Japan, France and England, your best allies at that time, couldn't do, despite the will of the United States of America and America and Russia together. So the comparison is not right - and we at that time managed to stay for three months and then we have to leave - and we didn't have the word Prime Minister at that time - I'm not so sure about the Chief of Staff at that time, but I'm sure about the Prime Minister - and Ben Gurion said, well, we Israel cannot stand against the demands and the policy of America and Russia at that time. So England and France had to withdraw even before they managed to take Port Said which was their first objective

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months there and we withdrew from the
... because we are not the United States of America
and what your Government, what your country can do in Japan,
Israel cannot do against the entire world and certainly not
against the combination of the States and Russia - so now we
feel that after four years we are sticking to the present lines -
we haven't gone back one inch and you know very well that we do
not enjoy the support of the entire world - I shouldn't say that -
still I think we are doing better than we did 14 years ago even
then we had big countries like France and England with us and
both of them had the right of veto in the Security Council
which they did use at that time and now we are alone - and that's
a fact - still, we are there and as General Yariv said, we
plan to stay where we think it's very essential for us.

Question - Having Talked to Sisco and Rogers, can you tell us -
General Dayan - I listened to them.

Question - They must have given you some very important reasons
why they are so insistent on opening the Suez Canal at the
earliest possible time, while on the surface it would seem
that it would not be in the immediate interests of the United
States.

General Dayan

The reasons that were given was that this war has to be finished
and even though it would be to the advantage of Russia and the
disadvantages of not only America, but of the Free World, it's
better, it's more advantageous even for America to have this
war finished and concluded and changed into a peace agreement.
Then with the Suez Canal operating, the war going on and the
Suez Canal closing. So as far as Secretary Rogers is concerned,

he would rather have the war over at the cost of the opening of the Suez Canal than the Suez Canal closed which is to the advantage of America right now - but the war going on.

Question - There was a report of 100 Egyptian planes lost in training - would you comment on that? Also there used to be a technological gap in the quality of the Egyptian forces - is that technological gap closing - does it remain - would you comment on this?

Aharon Yariv

As far as the plane accidents are concerned, I don't think I recall the exact number by heart, but they did lose and are still losing an important number of planes by accident. Well, every air-force loses planes by accident, but the rate of accidents in the Egyptian airforce is very high. This is already an indication as to their standard of performance, but I would like to make a general observation, because it was also asked about the technological gap. It is not a technological gap - it's a human gap. The difficulty our neighbours have in mastering technology. They can master techniques, but they have a difficulty in mastering systems - in integrating systems - in exploiting a weapon system to the utmost.

Let us say, you take an Israeli pilot and an Egyptian pilot and they fly the same plane - Phantom or Mirage. The Egyptian pilot will fly the Mirage and Phantom after he has been trained according to the normal standards of any airforce, but I'm sure that under the stress of combat, the average Israeli pilot will be able to exploit this weapon system to its utmost under the most adverse conditions whereas the average Egyptian pilot or Syrian pilot, etc won't be able to do it.

...
...there aren't any average Israeli pilots.

Aharon Yariv

I would like to add, this is of course a very important point, because what we make up for the difference in quantity of manpower, not speaking about quantities of hardware^{ware} - also for that we are making up quantity of hardware - but also by quality of hardware - by quality of manpower. And this question, of course, is very important to us. We had about 400 Egyptian Officers here in Israel after the Six Day War and we conducted very serious and sophisticated tests with them - Professors from the universities and the outcome of these tests was that they have no chance of a change in the human factor, Within the future we can see, and I'm not talking about two or three years - four years have passed and I can assure you there has been no change - but there is no chance even when we talk about a generation or perhaps two, unless there is a total upheaval in the Arab society and one does not see this total upheaval - I would never recommend to under-estimate quantity - but there is no need to panic because of quantity and we can rely for a long period ahead on our superiority as far as human factors are concerned.

Even more so - just because of technology - it might become progressively even more difficult for the other side to master the advanced, sophisticated weapon system they are getting and have to get and to integrate it properly under severe conditions.

Question - How would you phrase the position of the United States and Israel as far as military support?

Aharon Yariv

We are somewhat in a difficult position - I think. I remember a distinguished Israeli person, Mr. Horowitz who is now the President

the Bank of Israel used to say it - a grievance is also an asset and there are not enough grievances left now, but there is one very important grievance left and this is the grievance about planes. I think this has been published in all the newspapers and you know about it - I think about two months ago the supply of Phantom planes has been stopped, whereas the Arabs have been getting a lot of planes - about 100 Mig 21s alone during the last year, not to mention other planes and are still getting planes and their supply of Phantom planes has been stopped - this is, I think, our major problem.

You know we Jews are always afraid of the evil eye, so I don't want to say it's our only problem, but this is our major problem - a continuing and ongoing supply of Phantoms and if I may add, this is not only a problem of the hardware - it is also a problem of the hardware - and if this goes on for a long time, it will become a very serious problem of the hardware - but this has also a very important meaning as far as the whole situation is concerned, because a stoppage of the supply of Phantoms is giving encouragement to the aggressive elements and motives on the other side. This means that the Arabs are continuing to get planes - the Israelis don't get any more Phantoms - perhaps the Americans are not so much behind the Israelis and we are growing stronger and the supply of planes has a political meaning as far as the relationship between the United States and Israeli is concerned, and this is very well understood by the other side and there is a psychological problem involved - the Phantoms for the Egyptians is something that has a psychological effect on them. If no more Phantoms are coming, then they breathe easier and they should not breathe easier, because if they don't breathe easier, then their readiness to resume fighting is decreasing.

tion - you mentioned that the technological gap isn't being closed by the Egyptians and I'm sure the Russians are aware of this - if there is another war, and there is this technological war - the Russians would probably intervene and they would be using this so-called advanced equipment and could the Israelis then cope with it.

General Dayan

The problem of the Russians in case fighting should resume, does not stem from the difficulties the Egyptians are going to have in handling equipment. The problem of the Russians stems from the fact that the Russians are actually committed to partake and participate in the air-defense of Egypt. Their active participation - by the word active I mean not only advising and supervising, etc. - but active participation in the air-defense - will take the expression of Russian ground to air missile batteries, usually the Sam IIIs, not on the Canal Zone, but in the interior of Egypt and will take the expression of Russian interceptor squadrons. There are about five or six of these squadrons in Egypt today and they have an operational responsibility in certain areas - one area is south of the Suez - Cairo Road and down towards the Gulf of Suez and the other area of responsibility is in the area of Alexandria - that is to say in the north-western zone of the Delta. So we have to take into consideration that if and when the fighting will be resumed and when our planes are going to go inside Egypt, within these areas I mentioned, we might have to tackle Russian pilots. This we must take into account. It is also possible, of course, for the Russians to augment their force there - technically this is possible - strategically, politically, there are problems involved in it - but the definite commitment the Russians have and their definite presence as far as Egyptian

air-defense is concerned, is something we have to reckon with.

Now in war you have no guarantee for anything and things can get out of control and they could work differently than you would like them to - but we hope and we think, that we can take care of our problems, of our military problems if the fighting is going to be resumed without getting into a running battle with the Russians. We might have to get into contact with them here and there - but we think we can manage our affairs without getting really getting into a War of Attrition with the Russians. At least, we think we can have a good try - as I say - there are no guarantees - but the way matters look now and the way they might develop, we have a good chance of managing our affairs in a way that we won't get too deeply involved with the Russians.

Question - What would happen in case the U.S. cut off supplies to Israel?

General Dayan

We won't like it, but if this is a threat - an ultimatum and if one is attached to it as now Israel is - unless you accept our terms - that is to say, Secretary Rogers' plans - and we go to the old boundaries - we, America, cut off our supply to you - I think that our answer would be - No Sir - and of what I know about the situation in the front, we shall manage. Even if as a result of such a threat the Arab will resume the war - we shall go on fighting - we won't like the Americans suspension of military supply - we shall be short of many items - we will not be that bad off that we will have to give in.

I just wanted to add one word to the answer that General Yariv gave before about the question of wrong is it going - the American military supply. Besides what he said - and he explained

everything about it - I want to say that in a way - at least I feel - that we a little bit are let down. That is to say that some of the American promises are not being kept - this business of the formula of ongoing military including aeroplane supply, has its meaning. That is to say that like you have the blood in your vein, no matter what the number is, but we America, realize that you have to maintain your forces and that includes airforce and so it might be called a replacement, it might be called additional or paying attention to the kind of equipment that is obsolete - but there will be ongoing military supplies so that your forces can go on living - probably poorly living, but living - and the way things are being carried out now, besides everything else, all the disadvantages that General Yariv referred to, I think with all due respect, that the promise as it was given, is not exactly being carried out.

Question - General Dayan, All things considered, how would you compare the co-operation militarily and politically of the Nixon administration to those administrations that you have dealt with since 1948?

General Dayan

Well, except for what I just said a few minutes ago, and not referring to the administration, but I am referring to President Nixon - I am very happy with President Nixon.

Question - How important is the technological information that's being sent back to the United States through Israel, based on some of the information you have picked up from contact with the Russian equipment.

Aharon Yariv

I hope it's important.

Question - This thing could go on a long time - no war - no peace - is this a correct conclusion?

General Yariv

As usual, ~~myxjshdpendaxwryxakfer~~ and in my job it happens very often logically this is really a good question - what you said is very logical, but in life there are many other things besides logic. For example, it is very difficult for the Soviet Union - or I'll say, it is difficult for the Soviet Union to turn a deaf ear to Egyptian demands - they can try to tell them, look here, take your time, this is a difficult thing to liberate your territories from imperialist ~~yakxxx~~ yolks and the Israelis are only agents of the United States, et., etc. This is a very difficult question and you know it must take time - and you must get ready - your army isn't ready yet - they can say all this. But nevertheless the Egyptians want a change in the situation. There's no doubt about it and not only that - the Russians are considered for example, in the Third World - as protectors of the Egyptians.

And there is somebody who is pointing his finger at the Russians saying - what are you doing about the situation - e.g. Communist China. So it's not so easy for the Russians although the present circumstances are favourable. I think if they can have the present circumstances with an improvement - for example, opening the Suez Canal, they would perhaps achieve something for the Egyptians and achieve something for themselves. So I think that under the present circumstances this is a situation where I think one of the factors mentioned could live with very well - this is us. For the Egyptians this is difficult - it is very difficult for an Egyptian President - perhaps not for the Egyptians, but for an Egyptian President who has to make policy, who has to deliver to his people who might be under pressure, it is very difficult for him to continue like this

without any change. For the United States I think - perhaps I might be wrong - the United States could continue like that if it would be ready to take limited certain risks for the United States thinks differently. They think that if the situation remains inherent, it is a danger and a threat of the resumption of fighting - the resumption of fighting might complicate matters - it might create a situation which might put the United States before the choice of involvement or non-involvement and either thing would be very bad for the United States and very difficult. Therefore it wants a change in the situation and the Russians, I think, would like also a certain change so that they could cater to the Arabs, at least to a certain extent.

So therefore I think that to assume that the present situation could continue indefinitely without any change is perhaps an assumption very favourable to Israel - but I think too optimistic an assumption and I think if you want to be realistic, we should assume that a continuation of the status quo implies a danger - perhaps not the certainty, but does imply the danger of the resumption of fighting and therefore at least 75% of the partners involved have an interest in doing something that would stop the resumption of fighting which means at least a certain change in the situation.

Question - General Yariv, how expensive is Israel's involvement and what are the implications in the independence fight of the Negro population of Sudan and also Iraq. (Kurds)

The other question, General Dayan is would you like to make a statement or even opinions, if the press isn't here, about Arab leaders such as Sadat, El Bakker, Asaf, Gadat - etc.

General YARIV Dayan

I just want to explain that I refer the two questions to General Yariv, because whatever I know about them, I hear from him

General Yariy

As far as the first question is concerned, it is about Israeli involvement - if it does exist - in the fight of the people of southern Sudan and in the freedom fight of the Kurds. Well, I'll say it can't be - as far as the second question is concerned - well, I would say one thing. As Jews and human beings you should not be unduly worried about Israel thinking only about it's own freedom. - As far as the second question is concerned - this is a very difficult one.

Sadat - a man with problems. Kavaffi - definitely mentally unstable -- but with a lot of money at his disposal and therefore can create trouble - not too much trouble, but can create trouble and I don't know if you know the Yiddish saying - ein katz kan aug telle machen -. Assaf is a man, I have to admit, with his feet on the ground and he understands that after all he has got to do something for the Syrian world and he is not unduly worried about the Golan Heights - he is worried - but he is also worried about what the Israelis can do to him - and therefore he knows he has got to take his time. He also knows he has got to be careful with the Palestinian, because they make not only trouble for the Israelis -- they can also make trouble for him. So altogether Assaf is a man, I think, who has for a Syrian leader, quite a good sense of realities and this is not only in his favour, but so far has also been and might also be in the near future, also in our favour.

King Hussein is a man with man problems, but with a lot of courage and all his problems have not gone away - some of his problems have gone away thanks to his courage - he has done a lot in order to bring law and order into his country by suppressing the terrorist and saboteur movement.

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Aharon Yariv (cont'd): ...BUT There still are a lot of problems left. We have to recognize his courage. Bakr - I think that we should recognise him and vote for him. He has taken the Iraqi troops out of Jordan, he has kept Iraq out of this whole business. He wants Iraq to occupy a special place and we are all for Iraq occupying a special place as long as possible.

Numeirā also has a few problems, and his main problem is to stay in power. Now he has an additional problem of how to steer a course between the Russians, the Chinese, the Egyptians and all that. It is a difficult thing and I hope it will keep him fully employed, but I must admit he has a brigade on the Suez Canal and I hope it will stay here unemployed for a long time.

Q: The Arabs appear to have a lot of allies. My question is: have the Israelis had an opportunity for an ally ^{other than} world Jewry or are they reluctant to accept allies... or what concept do they have for this*

Dayan: I think that we have foreign allies, and quite a number of them, but let me answer you in a different way. As far as we are concerned, we would not like anybody to fight for us. I don't know what you mean about allies, but if you refer to the fact that the Arabs have many allies, not only would I not like to have the Russians here as our allies, helpful as they are in Egypt, I would not like the Americas to be here the way the Russians are in Egypt, fighting for them and advising them, and telling them what to do.

I am sorry that we don't have many more supporters who understand us. I don't like our situation in the UN or in the press and in public opinion and all that, but if you refer to allies and compare the position of the Arabs with us, I don't envy them.

Gen. Yariv in an answer to a question tried to describe the character of some of their own group. I would add to that the King Hussein managed to kill some of his problems. With Gaddafi, he is unbalanced but he has a lot of money. Apparently it is better to be unbalanced with a lot of money than to be unbalanced without money, so he is managing with his money.

When you ask whether we want allies, I have to say fighting allies we do not want. AS a matter of fact, if you we could manage the Russians and keep them out of it, I wouldn't be worried at all about our military position. It is not the Arabs that make war for us. It is the Russians who are there. Had it been just the ^{Arabs} ~~Russians~~ around us, we would have managed, and we don't want to be involved in any military pact or any military alliance. We don't want to fight for others and we don't want others fighting for us. We can take care of ourselves. We would like to be in a position of not being isolated, to be able to buy weapons, to be able to develop our own, to have people understand us, supporting us in the political field, but I don't think that in our position we would like to be tied in military pacts and treaties, whether it is Nato or anything else.

Our problem is not military alone. Our problems are not to have the big powers too involved, and militarily not to be forced to clash with Russia. Not to have Russia involved too deeply in Egypt. and to have more people understanding us, and not to be isolated but just to be able to buy weapons and equipment.

Q: To what extent is Russia supporting the other nations militarily, other than Egypt?

Yariv: Russia is supporting some other Arab nations to an important degree. Syria, first of all, about 1000 Russian "specialists" in Syria; a lot of equipment is coming into Syria and it has been coming since 1967 and is continuing to flow into Syria.

The Russians are supporting Iraq and I think they are going to step up their military support in Iraq in the near future, and they are trying to establish as close a contact as possible with Iraq in the near future also keeping the evacuation of the Persian Gulf by the remnants of the British in mind.

They are supporting Sudan and they will continue to support Sudan, never mind that they executed Communist leaders. As far as Russian interests are concerned, they are very well served by the introduction of further military aid, so they are going to do it and they have not withdrawn even one "specialist" from the Sudan. They are militarily supporting the Southern Yemeni Republic, Somaliland, and the Yemeni Republic.

So they are supporting other Arab countries militarily as much as they think it is necessary for them, and as much as the other Arab countries are interested: But there is one very important difference between Egypt and the other Arab countries: it is only in Egypt that the Russians - so far - have an active commitment to participate militarily.

In Egypt this is manifest, but only in Egypt and not in the other countries so far.

Q: I would like to think in terms of peace. An enduring peace will require a compatible existence with our neighbours, and has anything been done to reach the people?

A: (Dayan): I could say that in the field in which we are acting in this direction we are doing very well, but I cannot pretend that we will be getting what the gentleman just referred to. We are now living there with some of the Arab people and they do have contact with other Arab people. Moreover we let the Arabs under our control send their children to universities in Cairo and in Damascus and in other Arab countries, and there are many visitors who come not only to the Western Bank but also to here - about 100,000 came this year

from the Arab countries and they see us. I would say that they are not always surprised by what they feel - they can live with us, so much so that some of them have deciddd to immigrate and those who left the WEst Bank and Nablus at the time it was under King Hussein and go and live in Kuwait and Libya and SAudi Arabia and found jobs there, now prefer to come back under our control to their places, something that tey would not have done under King Hussein, and they would rather come back and be under our control than stay in Kuwait where they get first class jobs.

That sounds very good and it is so, and it is important, but i am afriad that I cannot say that in this way we can change the attitude and the policies of the Arab governments. The Jordan government, The Egyptian or the Syrian. I somehow don't feel that the decision taken now by the Arab governments are really decided or effected by the feelings of their people. It works differently. I am sure that General Yariv could lecture quite a long time on the internal mechanism of the Arab countries, but in answer to the question I can say that not only are we doing our best, but it works, and very successfully in field of contact with the Arab people. I am afraid that I cannot see this as a breakthrough or a manner of change of the policy of their Governments.

Q: Would the gentlemen care to ~~comment~~ comment on any contacts with China? Is there any basis for an Israeli contact with Red China?

DAyan: NOt that I know. I don't know anything about it.

Q: I would like to ask two questions: one is, what involvement does China have at this particular time that you are aware of with the ARabs in tterms of supplying them with munitions, and secondly, what kind of a solution doeyou eventually foresee with the WEst Bank that might be acceptable to both Israel and Jordan?

Yariv: Communist China has a big problem in the Middle East. I don't know whether we would be best in saying "thank God", and this is that it is very hard for Communist China to compete in the Middle East with Soviet Russia. It is not in the position to deliver this massive aid and the amounts of money and the amounts of hardware that the Russians can be delivering.

But the Chinese are not ready to give up. Therefore they try to establish as many contacts as possible, to have diplomatic representation. And by the way, the only diplomatic representative that they kept outside of China during the Cultural Revolution was their representative in Cairo, and they now have representatives in Damascus and also almost everywhere else in the Arab world. Diplomatic representation, economic aid, nothing in the range of what the Russians are doing, but they have economic aid.

As far as military aid is concerned, as their contribution can only be marginal, they have latched on to some of the Palestinian movements - the Fatah and the Popular Front for the Liberation, and with these they do have contacts, but this is marginal. These weapons can still cause us trouble, but these are not a major problem. They latch on to these so that they can stake a certain claim in the area with a long range view, but at this time they cannot match the Russians.

Dayan: We owe the gentleman an answer to the other question. I wish he had forgotten it but he hasn't - the question of what kind of agreement we anticipate with Jordan or the West Bank.

I am a little bit embarrassed by the question because not only details should not be published before time, because this might be a subject for negotiation, but also because the subject is so complicated and there are different views in our country, even in our Cabinet about the ultimate arrangement.

This is our Homeland. When you speak ~~about~~ about Israel and

not only about Jerusalem or the West Bank, it is a part and parcel of our Homeland, so there is an emotional involvement in this too.

I think that there is nobody who thinks that we would withdraw from Hebron or anywhere else where we have settled down and where we have all of the new Nahal kibbutzim in the Jordan Valley, that they are just temporary there. I really don't think anybody has that in mind.

On the other hand there isn't any final decision or scheme about it, so let me just say a few things about it: we don't want to see a third state there, the Palestinian State. We should say that ~~the~~ Israel with Jerusalem as its capital is one country and Jordan with Amman ~~with~~ as their capital is another country and somewhere in between the boundary will pass and somewhere in between the population will be divided, but just now the only thing we are willing to say is that we don't want to see another state in between.

The second thing is that we feel very strongly about it that for security reasons our forces should be along the Jordan. That doesn't mean that everything West of Jordan will have Israeli - we take it as a military boundary and not of necessity as the political boundary.

Many of us do not object to seeing it as a political boundary too, but just now when we speak about the security boundary, it means the Jordan is the security line protecting Israel and it is very vital for us, and we keep our forces there with the view that they are to stay for good. We don't think that with our relationship with the West Bank we should have a position in the future that Jews will not be allowed to settle down there.

All that I ~~have~~ have said still probably doesn't answer your question, but that is about all I could say.

Q: We heard that Russian equipment and aircraft and hardware is vastly superior to that of the US - or we've seen it in the newspapers -

in your opinion is that difference substantial and if it is , how much of a concern is it to you?

Yariv: I think you are belittling yourselves, at least US equipment. Russian equipment is good, rugged, but the US equipment is not surpassed generally - I would say - ~~but~~ by it.

There are some things that the Russians have in this area that we cannot match, that is true, but this does not mean that the Russian equipment is superior to US equipment. If we could get that kind of US equipment that exists, then we could even match that thing that the Russians have, for example the Mig023.

Q: If ~~Russia~~ Israel would let the Suez Canal be opened, Russia would go into the Indian Ocean and take over the Gulf and take over that part of the world, and if Israel doesn't do it, it won't happen. We don't understand Russia. Russia is really contained by Israel in this part of the world.

Mr. Ginsburg: I have an idea that this is what is concerning Rogers.

Before we adjourn, I would like to thank Ruth Dayan on behalf of all of us, and I would like to say a word on behalf of all of you to Gen. Yariv and Gen. Dayan for a memorable evening. I am sure you found it stimulating, and exciting and interesting, and we are grateful to you for having us here and I can only say great thanks to you.
