The Board of Directors of the United Israel Appeal, Inc., considers budget proposals submitted to it by its operating agent in Israel - The Jewish Agency for Israel, Jerusalem. Based upon a continuing review and evaluation carried on by its Resisent Representative in Israel, the officers of the Board, and through the facilities of our independent public accountants - Green, Strocker & Company - the Board of Directors of United Israel Appeal, Inc., is in a constant process of allocating and reallocating, in the course of the fiscal year, to meet changing conditions.

The attached budgetary allocations totalling \$139,400,000 are based on our best estimate of the total amount of cash we will have available for operations in Israel for the budget period April 1, 1968 to March 31, 1969. These figures, however, are subject to revision, depending upon the actual availability of cash within the budget year. Final allocation figures will have to wait, therefore, until the end of the fiscal year.

<u>Subject:</u> Responsibility of Jewish Agency to needy immigrants and refugees as understood by the U.I.A. Inc.

On June 16th, 1968 the Prime Minister, in a letter addressed to the Chairman of the Jewish Agency, explained that the Israel Government did not intend, by its decision of June 9th, "to take over responsibility relating to needy immigrants and refugees, which has always been primarily the responsibility of world Jewry".

American Jews, anxious to assist in the solution of the problems of needy immigrants and refugees are always confronted with two major questions:

- 1. The motivation for giving viz. the perennial U.J.A. "Campaign Story".
- 2. The tax exempt status of contributions for the Annual Campaign.

"Immigration" and "Absorption" of needy Jews and refugees are one continous process which cannot be functionally divided. What is not clear, however, and now must be sharply delineated, is the extent of the absorption proces. It is therefore, most vital, that we put into sharper focus the specific aspects of Immigration and Absorption which in our view are to be carried out by the Jewish Agency in order to meet the two basic conditions listed above, viz.— campaign motivation and tax exemption of campaign contributi

I. Servicing of prospective Immigrants abroad

The servicing of needy immigrants and refugees begins with their arrival at a Jewish Agency Reception Center at some <u>free</u> port, of call. Such center are presently found in Austria, Italy, France, Greece. Additional offices are located, from time to time, in Belgium, Iran, Turkey. At times, the Jewish Agency uses the good offices of a sister organisation in rendering service to prospective immigrants. This, of course, is at the expense of the Jewish Agency.

Budgetary items for this category of work include: maitenance of offices, expenses of Israeli immigration administrative staff abroad, expenses of immigrant counselling staff abroad, transit centers, medical services to immigrants en route.

The absorption of immigrants cannot be effected without positive action on the part of the government. The specific point in the absorption process where the government takes over responsibility for its new citizens is dependent upon the amount of money available to the Jewish Agency, or government Policy, or both.

In the event additional funds are made available by the UJA in the United States, the U.I.A. Inc. is prepared to consider additional allocations, subject to approval of its board of Directors, for services and programs on behalf of needy Jews and Immigrants in such areas as it is entitled to act. For example, in the fiscal year 1967/68, the U.I.A. Inc. made additional allocations for such charitable and educational purposes in the areas of agricultural settlement, health, education, social welfare and housing and established specific procedures for the implementation of such allocations.

Over the years, the contributor in the United States has responded to the Annual UJA Campaign and has given it top priority because he has been impressed with the scope and uniqueness of its cause. The core of the Campaign story has been the opportunity and responsibility presented to American Jews of assisting fellow Jews in need who must be rescued and rehabilitated in the Land of Israel. The verbal symbols of this process of rescue are: Immigration and Absorption, which have become household terms throughout the American Jewish Community.

My dear Mr. Prime Minister:

It is with regret that we have to advise you once more of the deep sense of concern, on the part of our colleagues and ourselves, with regard to the proposals of the Government of Israel involving the absorption of needy immigrants and refugees.

We have conveyed to you, on several occasions in the past few months, on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal and the United Israel Appeal, both orally and in writing, our apprehensions regarding the proposed changes in the various procedures which have prevailed until now under our contract with the Jewish Agency for Israel, our operating agent.

In a letter to the Chairman of the Jewish Agency, dated April 9, 1968, Dewey Stone stated:

"The people and the Government of Israel are, of course, free to decide that they wish to assume the responsibility for immigration and absorption. We shall have the highest respect for them if and when such a decision is made. However, such decisions carry certain consequences. It should be clear to all concerned, as I know it is clear to you personally, that the funds of the U.J.A. and the U.I.A. will not be available for these activities if they are carried out by, or under the authority of, the Government, or the Knesset,

or any other Agency which is not strictly voluntary, non-governmental in nature and to which we could entrust the administration of charitable funds in full compatibility with American legal requirements."

On June 14, 1968, a delegation, under the chairmanship of Max M. Fisher, representing U.J.A., U.I.A, and the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, met with you and three of your Ministers concerned with this matter. Mr. Fisher and his associates went away in the definite belief and understanding that the problem had been resolved. This belief was further strengthened by your letter of June 16, 1968, which you addressed to the Chairman of the Executive of the Jewish Agency, in which you stated:

"The Government did not intend by that decision (i.e., to establish a Ministry of Absorption) to take over responsibility relating to needy immigrants and refugees, which has always been primarily the responsibility of world Jewry."

We have just seen Mr. Allon's memorandum to Mr. Pincus of July 8, 1968, setting forth his view regarding the functions of the Ministry of Immigrant Absorption. Our legal advisor informs us that if these proposals, in respect of needy immigrants and refugees, are implemented, it would jeopardize our American tax exemption.

We understand that the Joint Government Agency Committee, referred to in your letter of June 16, 1968, will be meeting in a few days to discuss the functions and responsibilities of the new Ministry of Absorption. In response to the suggestions made both by Mr. Allon and Mr. Pincus, we have requested our Executive Vice Chairman, Mr. Gottlieb Hammer and our legal advisor, Mr. Maurice Boukstein, to proceed to Jerusalem to assist the committee in its deliberations.

We have further asked Mr. Hammer to deliver this letter to you personally, and to convey to you, in detail, the essence of the discussion which took place here today at the meeting of our Board of Directors, and the thinking of its members with regard to this entire matter.

We sincerely hope that you will use your good offices with

the Joint Ministerial Agency Committee to the end that the responsibility for the work of caring for needy immigrants and refugees will continue to be that of world Jewry as executed by the Jewish Agency for Israel.

May we, Mr. Prime Minister, on behalf of our colleagues and ourselves, assure you of our highest esteem.

AMERICAN JEWISH Dear Mr. Pincus, P. C. L. I. V. E. S.

From the various meetings which we have held together it is clear that there have arisen some misunderstandings as a result of the decision of the Government as announced on June 9th.

In order to remove any doubt, I wish to state that the Government did not intend by that decision to take over responsibility relating to needy immigrants and refugees, which has always been primarily the responsibility of world Jewry. This was particularly stressed in the letter of the Minister of Finance to you of June 19, 1967. The decision of the Government referred to above did not, nor was it intended to, change that position.

In establishing the Ministry of Absorption, its functions and responsibilities will have to be determined in detail, taking into due regard the foregoing. To that end, a joint committee of the Government and the Jewish Agency has been appointed and will report shortly.

I hope that the above clarifies the whole position and it is my fervent wish that the Jews of the world will continue to mobilize their full resources for the great humanitarian needs which have to be met in this country.

In connection with the discussions currently taking place between the Jewish Agency for Israel (the Agency) and the Government of Israel (the Movernment) with reference to the division of functions and financing between the Agency and the Government in relation to activities connected with the absorption of the needy immigrants and refugees in Israel, the following considerations should be constantly kept in mind by the United Israel Appeal, Inc. (G.I.A.) and by its operating agent the said Agency.

1. The activities and method of operation of the U.I.A. are governed strictly by, and must be conducted in accordance with, the submissions made by the U.I.A. (then known as the Jewish Agency for Largel, Inc.) and the U.J.A. to the U.S. Treasury Department (the Treasury) in Washington B.G. in the years 1959/60 and the ruling letter of the Treasury dated December 21, 1960.

It is only on the besis of the undertaking of the U.I.A. and the U.J.A. to conduct operations in Israel with tex exempt funds within the framework of the said submissions and ruling that the tex exemption of U.I.A. was permitted to continue and the deduction of contributions to them would continue to be allowed for tax exemption purposes.

2. The Agency enjoys the status of a tax exempt organization in the United States within the specific terms of a letter-ruling from the Treasury dated September 2, 1948. (Direct contributions to the Jewish Agency for Israel are not deductible as tax exempt charitable contributions because it is a foreign organization; however bequests and income from investments are exempt from taxes and there are also other tax benefits.) The tax exemption of the Jewish Agency for Israel Inc. is further limited by the following provision contained in the said letter-ruling:

"A typewritten statement dated July 19, 1948, and shown to have been signed by Sh. Bisenberg, General Secretary, Executive of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, was submitted to this office on August 10,1948. This statement shows that at a duly convened meeting of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, at which a quorum

was present, a resolution was adopted, which resolution states that from and after August 1,1948, no part of the funds of the Jewish Agency for Palestine shall be expended for security, military or political purposes nor for carrying on propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; that no funds of the Jewish Agency for Palestine shall directly or indirectly be contributed to the Government of Israel for any use or purpose what-soever; and that the funds of the Jewish Agency for Palestine continue to be employed solely for charitable purposes and for no other use or uses whatsoever.

- 3. When the Internal Revenue Service agreed, after prolonged negotiations, to the designation of the Agency as the operating agent in Israel of the U.I.A. it was expressly and specifically understood that the above quoted limitations would be strictly adhered to.
- 4. The U.I.A. may not change its method of operation without the prior approval of the Treasury.
- 5. The operations of the U.I.A. with the proceeds of the Israel Education Fund are governed strictly by the submission made by the U.J.A. and the U.I.A. to, and the letter-ruling of, the Treasury dated September 24, 1964.

The submission to the Treasury which contains in detail the proposed method of operation was filed with the Treasury with the full agreement of all the parties concerned in Israel with respect to the contents thereof.

A key paragraph in that letter-ruling states as follows:

"Based strictly upon the facts submitted in your letter dated May 4, 1964, the activities proposed to be undertaken by the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. and The Jewish Agency for Israel, Inc., and the method of operation described, appear to be contemplated by Revenue Ruling 63-252, and thus will not affect the exempt status of The Jewish Agency for Israel, Inc. to which it is otherwise entitled as an organization described in section 501 (c) (3) of the 1954 Code, nor will such activities or method of operation affect the deductibility under section 170 of the 1954 Code of contributions made to the Jewish Agency for Israel, Inc., provided its activities continue to be limited to, and its funds distributed exclusively in furtherance of, its charitable purposes.

No change in the method of operation may be effected also in this area of activity without prior approval of the Treasury.

- 6. Funds allocated by the U.I.A. for any specific program may not be used by the Agency, directly or indirectly, for any other purpose.
- 7. The agency may not use any of its funds for any governmental or municipal purpose whatesever, directly or indirectly.
- 8. The U.I.A. or its operating agent, the Agency, must retain administrative and supervisory control over all activities conducted by it with funds allocated by U.I.A. The U.I.A. is entitled to revoke allocations at any time whenever it deems advisable or necessary to do so.
- The agency is expected to consult with the appropriate authorities of the Government of Israel on matters relating to immigration, absorption, education, social welfare, health, etc. and is obliged to function in compliance with the applicable laws and regulations and standards promulgated by the Government of Israel. This was made clear to the Treasury in the various submissions made by the U.J.A. and the U.I.A., and is understood by and agreed to by the Treasury. The Agency may not however delegate to any governmental or municipal authority in Israel the performance or control of its activities. This does not preclude the Agency from employing strictly technical or mechanical facilities, such as IDM machines, computer services, or transportation facilities owned and operated by any governmental or municipal authority (against payment of a reasonable fee, or free of charge), provided that the activity employing such governmental or municipal technical or mechanical facilities remains throughout within the control of the Agency.
- 10. The Government of Israel may make contributions, of funds or in kind, or of service, to any program or activity conducted by the Agency, provided that the Government does not thereby directly or indirectly exercise administrative or policy control over such program or activity.

- 11. There is no objection to joint committees, consisting of representatives of the Sovernment and representatives of the Agency, the purpose of which is to consider, discuss and coordinate programs and activities, provided that the Agency does not thereby relinquish financial, administrative, policy or supervisory control over the specific program or activity in which charitable tex exempt funds are used.
- 12. As the operating agent of U.I.A. the Agency may cooperate and engage in joint programs with, and make contributions for specific purposes to, other tax exempt organizations (assuming U.I.A. allocated funds therefor) provided that such other tax exempt organizations are not administered or controlled by any government or municipal authority. In the case of U.I.A, because of the specific Treasury ruling, the application of this method of operation may not be so extensive as to constitute a change in its method of operation.
- 13. If it is desired to effect a change in the method of operation so that activities presently carried on under the complete control of the Agency should be in the future conducted jointly with, or completely by, any governmental or municipal authority, with funds furnished by U.I.A., the matter must be first submitted to the Treasury in Mashington D.C., and a specific ruling allowing such change of operation should be obtained. Failing to do so would jeopardize the tax exempt status of U.J.A. and U.I.A., as well as the deductibility of contributions made to U.J.A. end U.I.A. in the United States within the provisions of the United States Internal Revenue Code.
- 14. Agents of the United States Internal Revenue Service are entitled to, and do in fact, examine periodically the records of the U.J.A. and U.I.A. with a view to determining whether their allocations and notivities are compatible with the applicable law, regulations and rulings of the Internal Revenue Service. The Internal Revenue Service is also entitled to examine the books and records of the operating agent of the U.I.A., whether in the United States or in Israel.
- 15. The allocations made by U.I.A., including those made of funds derived from the Emergency Campaigns of 1967 and 1968, were made in conformity with the foregoing principles and the arrangement for the administration of such funds by the Agency were to be implemented in accordance with specific instructions of, and upon the conditions made by the U.I.A.

Dear Priends:

I would like to submit berewith my views with respect to the division of responsibility for absorption of new immigrants between the Immigrant Integration Ministry of the deverment and the Department of Aliya and Klita of the Jewish Agency.

In submitting these suggestions, I am ever mindful of the legal guidelines set forth by Mr. M. Boukstein in his memorandum to me of August 1, 1968.

In my view, the Jewish Agency should be responsible for all functions starting with immigrant reception centers abroad until the immigrant is brought to the point of settlement. This point of settlement could either be an ulpan, a kibbutz or moshav, or an apartment in a new development town.

If the new immigrant is brought to an ulpan, he remains the responsibility of the Jewish Agency until he has finished his course. At that point he is turned over to the Ministry of Immigrant Integration, which will them provide him with his permanent housing and help him to obtain gainful employment.

If a new immigrant is brought to an agricultural settlement, then the Jewish Agency continues to be responsible to the extent of its Hityashvut program.

If the new immigrant is brought to an urban centre or city and put in an apartment, at that point the Jewish Agency transfers its responsibility to the Ministry of Immigrant Integration.

The Ministry's concern with the problems of absorption begin long before the immigrant arrives in Israel, even though the Jewish Agency executes the initial functions of servicing immigrants abread, transportation, reception at point of entry, etc. In order to translate its someon into positive

decisions, the Ministry will maintain limison officers with the Jewish Agency Absorption Department for the purpose of obtaining useful information regarding the immigrants being processed. This information would be transmitted as quickly as possible to the Ministry's information center and processed (preferably by computer in order to ensure all possible speed) to determine whether the new arrival would be directed either to an ulpan or to an urban settlement or agricultural village.

Deployment of a new immigrant must obviously be a subject for constant consultation between the Ministry and the Agency. The Agency must know as far in advance as possible what is the extent of the job to be done by it. The Ministry must know, as far in advance as possible, that the Agency is prepared and financially able to assume such responsibilities. In the final amalysis, however, the ultimate decisions with respect to settlement of new immigrants is a governmental responsibility.

But the Government presence can also take the form of a Ministry official at the port of entry who, apart from greeting the new immigrant, can also distribute the immigration visas or identity cards. This can and should be done without interfering with the Agency function of processing new arrivals and getting them on their way to their point of settlement. After an immigrant reaches a point of settlement, the Ministry may, from time to time, call upon the Agency to perform such services for the new immigrant as are compatible with Internal Revenue Service regulations. These services could include education, health, social welfare and aid to the aged and needy. In performing these services, however, it might be borne in mind that the key test would be the specific rules laid down in Mr. Boukstein's memorandum of August 1.

In applying these rules it might be useful for the Jewish Agency to forward to us, for consideration by us in New York, such requests for clarification as you may desire from time to time.

For example, in the field of housing, two methods have been employed in the past and can still be considered in connection with future operations. One way would be for the Jewish Agency acting as UIA Inc., to actually buy immigrant housing, register it in the name of UIA Inc., and make these flats available to new immigrants. An a termstive to this would be for the Ministry of Housing to provide apartments to be occupied by new immigrants who then are provided with funds by the Agency for a limited period of time to pay for the rent in its entirety or to subsidize new immigrants until they can afford to pay "economic" rent.

In mo far as ulpanim are concerned, these are educational institutions and therefore eligible for allocations from UIA Inc. for capital purposes or for maintenance, provided, however, that the operations are supervised and maintained by the UIA Inc. s operating agent - the Jewish Agency for Israel.

I hope that this letter has contributed in some measure in clarifying the question of division of function and that we can go forward with renewed vigour in the prosecution of our respective tasks.

THE REMAINDER OF IL 100,000 IS EXPENDITURE IN WHICH UIA DOES NOT PARTICIPATE.

(c) LAND AMELIORATION AND DEVELOPMENT

EXPENDITURE IL 11,750,000 COMMITMENTS IL 6,250,000

THIS IS A GRANT TO THE JEWISH NATIONAL FUND FOR EFFECTING LAND AMELIORATION AND DEVELOPMENT. A DETAILED REPORT ON THE UTILIZATION OF THE AMOUNT ALLOCATED IS BEING PREPARED BY THE JEWISH NATIONAL FUND AND WILL SHORTLY BE SUBMITTED.

ACCORDING TO THIS LEASE AGREEMENT, WITH REGARD TO APARTMENTS ALREADY OCCUPIED BY TENANTS AND IN RESPECT OF WHICH AN AGREEMENT HAS BEEN SIGNED BETWEEN THE TENANT AND "AMIDAR" NATIONAL COMPANY FOR IMMIGRANT HOUSING IN ISRAEL LTD. (THE MANAGING AGENT OF THE MINISTRY OF HOUSING), SUCH AGREEMENTS WILL BE TRANSFERRED INTO THE NAME OF UIA. AN ADDITIONAL AGREEMENT WAS SIGNED BETWEEN UIA AND "AMIDAR" PROVIDING FOR THE CONTINUATION OF "AMIDAR" AS THE MANAGING AGENT OF THE UIA.

A FURTHER AMOUNT OF IL. 2,400,000 WILL BECOME PAYABLE TO THE MINISTRY OF FINANCE SUBJECT TO THE FULFILMENT BY THE LESSOR OF ALL THE TERMS OF THE AGREEMENT.

THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR SELLING HOUSES TO NEEDY PERSONS ARE TO BE UNDER THE CONTROL OF THE JEWISH AGENCY, AND SPECIAL UIA AUTHORIZATION IS REQUIRED BY "AMIDAR" BEFORE A HOUSE IS SOLD.

THE TERMS OF THE CONTRACT WHICH "AMIDAR" SIGNS WITH THE TENANTS, AND THE PAYMENT OF RENT ARE APPROVED IN ADVANCE BY THE UIA THROUGH ITS AGENTS, THE JEWISH AGENCY.

LAND REGISTRATION OF THE PURCHASED UNITS IN NAME OF UIA HAS NOT YET BEEN EFFECTED. HOWEVER, UNDER CLAUSE 9 OF THE LETTER OF UNDERTAKING OF THE ISRAEL LAND BOARD TO THE UIA DATED JUNE 17, 1968, UIA MAY TAKE ALL THE NECESSARY STEPS TO REGISTER THE PROPERTIES IN THE LAND REGISTRY IN THE NAME OF UIA.

A SECOND AGREEMENT WAS SIGNED BETWEEN THE JEWISH AGENCY (REPRESENTING THE UIA) AND THE GOVERNMENT, FOR LEASING AN ADDITIONAL 1,180 UNITS ON THE SAME TERMS FOR A PAYMENT OF IL 23,300,684. THE COMMITMENT STATED ABOVE RELATES TO THIS AGREEMENT.

2. RENT SUBSIDIES FOR IMMIGRANTS

THE PAYMENTS WERE MADE TO "AMIDAR" ACCORDING TO AN AGREEMENT SIGNED BETWEEN THE JEWISH AGENCY AND "AMIDAR". THE AGREEMENT PROVIDES FOR PAYMENT OF IL. 1,000 PER YEAR (OR A PRO RATA AMOUNT FOR PART OF A YEAR) IN RESPECT OF NEEDY TENANTS. PAYMENTS ARE MADE ACCORDING TO LISTS, DETAILING NAMES OF TENANTS AND DISTRICTS, AND ARE AUTHORIZED BY THE IMMIGRATION AND ABSORPTION DEPARTMENT.

AN ADDITIONAL AMOUNT OF IL 32, 472, 463 IS NOT PARTICIPATED IN BY UIA.

Dear Senator:

As I wrote you, I greatly appreciate your sending me the pamphlet, "Is The Message In The Image?", and the following are the basic facts in response to your request, developed through the continuing studies we have been making over many years. These studies include examination of the firancial reports of the United Jewish Appeal and United Israel Appeal, and budget information and consultation discussions with their officials. The facts as we know them are quite contrary to the impressions the pamphlet seeks to convey:

- The funds received by the United Jewish Appeal and transmitted by it to the United Israel Appeal for use in Israel are utilized entirely for welfare, health, educational, housing, and vocational needs of refugees and other needy immigrants.
- In the reports we issue regularly to our Jewish Community Federations and Welfare Funds, we have reported the expenditures for these refugees and immigrants as follows:

- 3. As a result of our studies we have further reported to our community organizations:
 - "Complete responsibility for the use of the American Jewish philanthropic funds provided by Federations to the UIA through the UJA for needs in Israel is centered in the United States.
 - "The UIA utilizes American staff appointed by and responsible to itself (stationed in Israel) in order to assure American supervision and control of the expenditures for specific programs in resettlement, absorption of immigrants and related service for which it assumes responsibility for financing."
- 4. We have been informed periodically by the United Israel Appeal over the past several years that the Internal Revenue Service has thoroughly investigated its activities and flow of funds, and similar investigations have been made of the United Jewish Appeal.
- The United Israel Appeal is an autonomous American corporation, under American control.
- The United Israel Appeal is not part of the World Zionist Organization nor of the Jewish Agency.
- 7. The United Jewish Appeal is not a "foreign agent" -- nor is the UIA.
- 8. The Jewish Agency for Israel-Jerusalem, is the operating agent for the United Israel Appeal in Israel to carry out the humanitarian services financed by the United Israel Appeal, under the supervision and control of the United Israel Appeal in accordance with the provisions of the contract between the two organizations and the specific instructions of the United Israel Appeal. The control of the American funds is in the American body, the United Israel Appeal.
- The United Israel Appeal and United Jewish Appeal have made available continuing and detailed disclosure of their finances and activities.

I trust that the above will be helpful to you. Again, with appreciation for your inquiry.

In accordance with (a) above, the accompanying statements do not reflect, as a reduction of income, any amounts expended by the United Jewish Appeal, Inc., during the six months ended September 30, 1969, in connection with the Israel Education Fund Project. The United Jewish Appeal, Inc., had expended approximately \$78,875 for this purpose, no part of which had been charged to your organization.

- Note 3 Miscellaneous securities and investments are reflected at cost or contributed value.
- Note 4 It has not been your Corporation's policy to charge its operations for depreciation of its improved real estate. Such real estate is reflected on the attached statement of assets, liabilities and estimated reserves, at cost, without reduction for estimated allowance for depreciation.

The mortgage is payable in constant quarterly installments of \$34,850, which include interest at the rate of 5 3/8% per annum. The mortgage matures November 1, 1984.

Note 5 - The attached statements reflect separately the earmarked funds of the Israel Education Fund and Greenberg Estate Fund.

To September 30, 1969, the Corporation had advanced \$13,617,494 to The Jewish Agency for Israel - Israel Education Fund, in accordance with the purpose of the contributions to the Fund (erecting and equipping of schools, libraries, etc., and funding of scholarships). The schools, libraries, etc., erected are to be owned by your Corporation. Whenever feasible, only the income from the endowment of scholarship funds is to be used. Since the projects are still in process of construction, and all costs have not been incurred, the amounts transferred have been

reflected as an advance on the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities and estimated reserves.

Greenberg Estate Fund

The project in Israel consists of 72 apartments built in accordance with the terms of the bequest of Samuel Greenberg.

Note 6 - The notes payable represent the balance outstanding on the \$50,000,000 borrowing. The loan is repayable in constant semi-annual installments of \$2,469,221, which installments include interest at the rate of 5 1/2% per annum. The final installment is due on May 1, 1980.

Under the terms of the \$50,000,000 loan, your Corporation has agreed that: it will not have outstanding long-term debt or guarantees in excess of \$75,000,000 (as defined in the agreement); it will not have any short-term debt outstanding during a period of twelve consecutive months in excess of \$10,000,000; and it will not have more that \$1,000,000 of short-term debt outstanding for a period of forty-five consecutive days in any period of twelve consecutive months. The Corporation has further agreed; to a limitation on its power of guaranty and pledging of its assets; to a ceiling of \$10,000,000 per annum for payment of interest, principal and rental with respect to long-term debts and certain rental payments for housing in Israel; and that it will not have outstanding or create any debts ranking senior to the notes representing the instant loan.

Note 7 - At September 30, 1969, certain individuals, for technical reasons (over-age, etc.), could not be covered under the Corporation's regular employees' retirement plan, nor had they been covered by other means. Accordingly, your management has retained the balance of the "Estimated reserve - severance and vacation" in reduced amount of \$165,440.

Your Corporation has agreed to reimburse the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Inc., for payments made, or to be made, by them against severance accruable to certain of their employees at March 31, 1960. At that date, the relationship of parent (The Jewish Agency for Israel, Inc., predecessor of the United Israel Appeal, Inc.) and subsidiary (the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Inc.) terminated. The maximum of payments required to be made under the agreement has been calculated at \$134,231, against which \$42,310 had been paid at September 30, 1969. The payments made to September 30, 1969 were charged against allocations, and any future payments will be provided from current income.

Note 8 - At September 30, 1969, your Corporation was contingently liable on guarantees, which are not reflected on the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities and estimated reserves, as follows: - \$16,725,000 - composed of \$2,325,000, \$2,550,000, \$5,700,000 and \$6,150,000, representing the unpaid face amount of notes issued by American Associates, Inc., United Associates, Inc., Intercontinental Associates, Inc., and Atlantic Associates, Inc., respectively.

Your Corporation, by instruments dated May 7, 1962, February 26, 1963, December 16, 1963 and November 23, 1964, guaranteed the principal, interest and premiums, if any, payable on the notes referred to above, and agreed to certain limitations concerning its borrowing and guarantee powers.

Your Corporation had loaned \$534,000 to American Associates, Inc., in order to provide a reserve fund required under the terms of a subordinated loan agreement dated April 30, 1962. The advances had been charged to "Expenditures on account of allocations for operations in Israel." A new subordinated loan agreement, dated February 12, 1969, terminated the reserve fund established under the prior agreement, and authorized the refund of the reserve fund to American Associates, Inc. Under the terms of the new agreement, in the event the United Israel Appeal, Inc., fails to renew its Allocation Agreement, the American Associates, Inc., may be required to establish a reserve fund, and United Israel Appeal, Inc., has agreed to provide sufficient funds for this purpose.

Your Corporation has agreed to lend to United Associates, Inc. such sums as may be required to provide and maintain the reserve fund provided for in the Senior Notes, and to Intercontinental Associates, Inc., and Atlantic Associates, Inc., the sum of \$600,000 plus interest, each, under the terms of the subordinated loan agreements dated March 6, 1963, December 18, 1963 and November 25, 1964, respectively.

Your Corporation has entered into net net leases with American Associates, Inc., United Associates, Inc., Intercontinental Associates, Inc., and Atlantic Associates, Inc., on May 8, 1962, March 6, 1963, December 18, 1963 and November 25, 1964, respectively, covering certain real property in Israel for the periods from May 8, 1962 through April 30, 1982, March 6, 1963 through February 28, 1983, December 18, 1963 through December 31, 1983, and November 25, 1964 through November 30, 1984.

The operating agent of the properties covered by the leases referred to above has been receiving rents from subsidized tenants (newly-arrived immigrants) and has rendered accountings through June 30, 1969.
