FACT SHEET

WHO ARE WE?

The Young Women's Leadership Cabinet is comprised of young women, (under the age of forty) who have shown leadership potential in their community and who have committed themselves to a separate responsible leadership gift to UJA. Our members are women who are, or can relate to independent, free thinking women of today, married or single, who have been involved with careers in business or a profession as well as their own families.

WHAT ARE OUR OBJECTIVES AND GOALS?

a) The Cabinet itself shall be involved in a process of self-education so that these very same women will emerge from the Cabinet willing to assume leadership roles both nationally and locally. They will be qualified to assume these positions due to the knowledge gained on the Cabinet concerning the problems related to UJA and the programs of the constituent agencies of the UJA, Judaica information, an in-depth study of Israel, an update of current events and the workings of the local communities.

b) The ultimate goal of the Cabinet will be to reach young Jewish women, who have heretofore been uninvolved with the local Jewish organized community...turn them on and educate them as Jews, so that they become an integral part and active participant in their own communities and national programs.

WHAT ARE THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF A CABINET MEMBER?

- 1 - To make an independent responsible leadership gift to UJA.
- 2 - To participate fully in the self education program.
- 3 - Attending our annual seminar. (Presently scheduled for March 1978).
- 4 - To make every effort to attend the UJA National December Conference December 9 - 11, 1977 in N.Y.C.
- 5 - A pledge to go on a UJA mission during her term of office, if she has not already done so in the previous two years.
- 6 - Accepting speaking assignments within her own region.
- 7 - Setting programs (as developed by the Cabinet) within her region to accomplish the goals of the Cabinet.
- 8 - Agreement to serve for a two year term, with a four year limit.
- 9 - Recognition that priorities in the Cabinet member's own community will take precedent over national involvement.
- 10 - Participation and stimulation of participation in Regional activities.

WHY BOTHER?

By developing new, innovative programs geared to "Today's Women", we will reach out to women, many in careers, business, the single world, etc., who have thus far been uninvolved or peripherally involved with the organized Jewish community. Our unique approach will give women reasoned conviction about the importance of UJA to Jewish survival. Campaigns will be lifted to a higher level, where more of the giving will be voluntary in the truest sense of the word. By the same token, a type of sharing will ensue that will be in the finest Jewish tradition.
