COMMISSION MEMBERSHIP

A. Selection of Potential Lay Members

The list of potential Commission members was reviewed and selections were made of the "first 13" lay members: those whose participation is considered critical both to the Commission and to attracting others. An additional 12 potential lay members were identified, along with 6 foundation representatives who are to be considered lay members. Assignments were made for inviting their participation and are indicated on the attached chart.

B. Selection of Potential Professional Members

The list of potential professional members was reviewed and 13 were identified with one (Darrell Friedman) to be considered further. Assignments were made for inviting their participation and are indicated on the attached chart.

II. INVITATION FORMAT AND APPROACH

A. Approach

Initial contact will generally be made in person or by telephone, as indicated on the chart. This will immediately be followed up by a letter (and the design document) and, shortly thereafter, by a personal meeting with one of our planning group to discuss the ideas to be presented at the first meeting.

B. Meeting Date

PD will check immediately with Rotman, Schwartz, and Woocher to determine the best of three possible dates for them and their presidents. MLM will check the dates as early as possible with Bronfman and Fisher. The dates under consideration, in order of preference, are:

- 1. July 21, 1988
- 2. July 20, 1988
- 3. July 14, 1988

Once a meeting date has been selected by the aforementioned group, it will be relayed to others as they are invited or as soon thereafter as possible.

III. FIRST COMMISSION MEETING

A. Anticipated Outcomes

It is intended that the Commissioners will leave the first meeting informed on the issues, aware of both the emerging crisis in Jewish education and the opportunity of the group to have a positive impact. They should agree on the mission of the Commission, expected outcomes, a means of organizing themselves to reach those outcomes (task forces), and a timetable for accomplishing their goals.

B. Possible Components of the Meeting

- Opening statement by MLM summarizing the dilemma and opportunity (will have been discussed with Commission members prior to meeting).
- 2. JWB and JESNA presidents provide background and current picture from their organizations' perspectives.
- 3. Present talking papers which focus on the issues to be addressed by Commission (through task forces).
- 4. Eye-catching presentation (vignette) to get the attention of Commission members ("A little Broadway").

SUBJECT:

I had a very constructive talk with Bob Hiller by telephone today. He is concerned about too much Mandel prominence in the Commission's work. He wants the Commission to have maximum credibility for its independent, objective thinking and recommendations. He believes that the sponsoring foundation, if it is too dominant in the study process, might cause the recommendations to be suspect. This could interfere with support of the recommendations in the post-Commission period.

I assured Bob that every effort will be exerted to have a scholarly review of the subject of Jewish education in North America, and a series of recommendations which will reflect the best thinking of the outstanding Commission group which is comprised of scholars, experts, and leading laymen.

The windup of our discussion was that Bob said he would send me a letter, probably in a few weeks, to put on record his concerns and then to participate wholeheartedly in the work of the Commission. I believe Bob will be a constructive force in the work of the Commission and in our follow-up work later.

Mort Mandel has reacted favorably to my report of our recent Foundation Executives' Group discussion regarding the proposed Commission on Jewish Continuity/Jewish Education. He was pleased to learn that the idea of a Commission to try to improve Jewish education in North America was well received. He was sensitive to our group's opinion that, if the Commission's report were looked upon as a product of the Mandel Associated Foundations alone, it might inhibit the post-Commission involvement of other foundations in support of the Commission's recommendations.



Mort emphasizes that we are organizing this Commission in cooperation with the JWB and JESNA, and in close cooperation with the CJF. He now has asked me to work with him to involve leading Jewish-sponsored foundations in the membership of the Commission. Mort plans to invite CRB Foundation and Wexner Foundation participation. He has asked me to invite you, Eli Evans, Bob Hiller and Mel Mogulof to serve on the Commission. I hope you will agree to do so, and plan to telephone you next week to ascertain that you will serve.

The purpose of this Commission is to bring together the best lay and professional minds we can assemble to make a positive impact on the quality of Jewish education in the United States and Canada.

We believe that Jewish education needs a great deal of improvement if it is to make its appropriate contribution to the constructive continuity of the Jewish people. We believe that our Commission has a good chance to bring about important results, because American Jewish leadership is now sufficiently concerned to make this a high priority in its communal effort. Moreover, there are important new financial resources in the Jewish community which are available for Jewish education, if we show how these resources can be utilized to good effect.

I just received a copy of the wonderful material on your Commission on Jewish Education in North America. Needless to say, you, Art and Annette have all done a truly first-rate job. The people you've managed to involve are the outstanding intellectual and lay leadership of our American Jewish community, and I'm looking forward to very exciting results.

In reviewing the "Interview with Commission Members" document that was appended, I had two comments that I thought I'd like to share with you. The first relates to Section II -- "The Clients of Education," and the second to Section III -- "The Settings of Education."

With regard to the "Clients of Education," your respondents correctly identify a number of significant theories about who needs to be reached. There are those who believe that an intense outreach effort will be required to bring a large population of uninvolved individuals into the maintstream of Jewish education. In addition, there are those who believe that we must concentrate on the most committed segments of our community, perhaps by funding more day school education and generally give up on those who fail to meet our own rigorous standards.

What's missing, however, is what I believe to be the best documented and most widely accepted theory of targeting currently available: the theory of marginal affiliation.

Steve Cohen really formulated this notion for the first time in an article published in the Journal of Jewish Communal Service, and I made extensive use of it in my own paper on Jewish education. It's a theory that emphasizes attention to those 70-80 percent of American Jews who affiliate during the time that their youngsters are involved in Jewish schooling, but who are only marginally involved in the experience. agree with Steve that these represent our prime target and our prime strategic objective. I'm especially concerned about leaving the marginal affiliation theory out because there are those who are again "beating the bushes" for a nationwide advertising campaign to attract Jews to Jewish This notion was forcefully promulgated at a education. recent CAJE Conference and material is being widely circulated nationally. A significant investment of dollars in this kind of campaign would be, in my opinion, a tragic mistake when what is really needed are intelligent strategies for the intensification of Jewish experience at the "gateways of Jewish life" -- congregations and JCC's.

My second comment is a little more theoretical and relates to the section on "The Settings of Jewish Education." section highlights a number of the specific tools that are near and dear to all of our hearts: retreat programs, intensive Jewish summer camping, Israel experiences, youth groups, and parent and family education. These specific tools and environments are enumerated right along with day and supplementary education and there is also a very appropriate comment about the possibility of "combining forces between formal and informal education." I believe that this notion -- the integration of formal (classroom) and informal (beyond the classroom) education needs to be highlighted as the study proceeds, while also emphasizing the critical institutional role of congregations and JCCs in this process. Too often the notion of programmatic integration gets a great deal of attention without work on the very difficult institutional issues that must be overcome in order to implement any programmatic model. In my view, we need to recognize that the congregatioal setting itself provides an overarching opportunity to bring many of these programs together, while the JCC, as an institution, provides many of the back-up resources needed to make these programs come to life within the congregational setting.

Congregations are our most widely used "gateways to Jewish life" and settings for supplementary Jewish education and, therefore, can provide our primary impact point for parent and family education. Congregations also sponsor Israel trips, camps and youth movements that can round out a youngster's Jewish education and form a bridge between his schooling as a child and his college experience. The problem is that these are rarely integrated and are used by relatively few families within the congregational environment. It's vital that we begin to look at congregations as a total environment and a central area of concern, rather than as a series of disconnected experiences and as a peripheral issue.

Similarly, the JCC clearly has the back-up resources needed to expand the camp and retreat capacity of congregations and to create the training and support needed to vastly expand their capacity and outreach in the youth group field.

Focusing on the congregation as a totality, with the potential for integrating all the elements listed on Pages 3 and 4 would, I think, strengthen the conceptual direction of the Commission.

Mort, I hope these few thoughts and ideas prove helpful to you and, once again, I greatly admire the work that has already been done. I wish you all the luck in the world on this important venture.

COMMISSION ON JEWISH EDUCATION IN NORTH AMERICA Meeting of August 1, 1988

The Interview with Commission Members A Selection

The Commission on Jewish Education in North America is composed of 44 individuals representing a wide range of perspectives. Prior to this meeting the Commission staff interviewed almost all of the commissioners to help build the agenda of the first Commission meeting. What follows is a selection of the points of view expressed by the commissioners. Some of the statements were expressed by many or all of the commissioners, while others represent the perspective of a few. Some of the views expressed complement each other while others may be contradictory.

The major issues raised appear to cluster around six topics:

- 1. The people who educate
- 2. The clients of education
- 3. The settings of education
- 4. The methods of education
- 5. The economics of education
- 6. The community: leadership and structures

I. The People Who Educate

- A. The shortage of appropriate, qualified people to educate children, youth and adults is the most important issue for our Commission to address.
- B. The personnel of Jewish education, in formal and informal settings, their recruitment, their training, their retention, is the key factor affecting the quality of Jewish education. It is also a crucial factor in determining the number of participants in Jewish education.
- C. There is a need to build the profession of Jewish education and to develop a greater sense of professionalism in the field.
- D. Increased salaries and fringe benefits are necessary. They will raise the status of education and facilitate the recruitment of qualified people.
- E. Salary is important, but the status, the empowerment, the personal growth and advancement of the educator are even more important.
- F. It is necessary to undertake a concerted, well-planned effort to recruit personnel to the field.

- G. The education of educators is a high priority. It evokes some interesting differences of opinion:
 - Viewpoint I We should invest heavily in training institutions. The building of new and different programs should also be considered.
 - Viewpoint II The most effective kind of training takes place on-the-job, through apprenticeships, mentorships and sabbaticals of various forms.
 - 3. Viewpoint III The most practical approach is to build centers for thinking and research. Educational reform is most effective when it moves from the top down. Martin Buber's contribution to adult Jewish education in Germany, or John Dewey's contribution to education in America, demonstrate that profound ideas are the way to attract the people we need, are the fastest and most effective way to change the image of the field of Jewish education and to create a profession.

II. The Clients of Education

Many comments and suggestions concern the participants - young and old - who can or do partake of Jewish education:

Who are they? What do they need? What do they want?

- A. Three points of view were expressed as to whom we should try to attract and serve:
 - We must change our approach to our clients and actively reach out to the less affiliated. We must market our product more effectively and offer the kind of variety that will attract those that are not currently involved.
 - We must improve the quality of programs: outreach will resolve itself when the quality of Jewish education is improved. Good programs will attract larger numbers of students to Jewish education.
 - The most sound investment is in the strengthening and improving of education for the committed. This point of view claims that they are our most important population.
- B. Our knowledge base about the clients of education is minimal, at best, and our intuitions may even be misleading. We simply do not seem to know enough about the Jews of North America to make informed decisions.

III. The Settings of Education

Issues were raised about the many forms of formal and informal education: Which forms justify the greatest investment? What is most in need of qualitative improvement? What has the greatest potential?

- A. Informal education offers great opportunities: the community center, the arts, Israel experience programs, summer camping, youth movements and youth groups are means for reaching many more clients than are currently involved and for impacting on the lives of those that are already participating.
- B. Ways should be found of combining forces between formal and informal settings to create new forms of education.
- C. A massive investment of energy, thought and resources should be made in day-school education. The day school offers the most nearly complete Jewish educational environment; the schools can and will grow if they are improved and properly marketed, and if tuition is within the reach of more parents.

On the other hand, the impact of day schools for students coming from homes that do not support the values and goals of these institutions is not clear.

The number of all day high schools should be increased. Enrollment drops dramatically, precisely at the time when the values of the young person are particularly open to influence.

- D. Differences of opinion were expressed about the supplementary school:
 - Though the supplementary school serves the vast majority of our young people participating in formal Jewish education, it is not a successful educational enterprise and may not be salvageable.
 - The supplementary school is where the clients are.
 Therefore, we must engage in serious efforts to improve it.
- E. The ideas, views, suggestions expressed span the age continuum from early childhood through adult education.
 - 1. Early Childhood Education and Day Care

This area has great potential. The proponents of formal and informal education join forces to argue that the large number of children and the enormous potential for educational impact converge to make this area worthy of serious attention. However, the personnel for early childhood education, their training and salaries represent a very serious challenge.

2. The Israel Experience

Educational experiences in Israel have a significant impact on young people. Some commissioners believe this to be true for loosely structured programs, summer touring, camping. Others believe structured programs at universities, yeshivot or for day schools are more effective. The issue of ensuring program quality and the question of subsidies were raised.

3. The College Campus and the University

Approximately eighty-five percent of all Jewish young people attend colleges and universities. Educational intervention on the campus is very important because this may be our last opportunity to educate. The academic climate that values universalism over particularism forces difficult dilemmas upon our young people.

4. Adult Education - Family Education

The family environment and the education of adults is of considerable importance, particularly if we want to succeed in the education of children. Though there are encouraging developments in this area, this form of education is still underdeveloped.

IV. The Methods of Education

Energy should be devoted to the various methods used in different forms of education. These include methods for the teaching of Hebrew, history and contemporary Jewish life. A serious effort should be made at curriculum reform that would emphasize the teaching of values, the attachment to the Jewish people and to Israel. We should invest systematically in the creative use of the media and computers for Jewish education.

V. The Economics of Education

- A. We have very sketchy data about present expenditures for Jewish education by the North American Jewish community.
- B. This area is important because the reform of education will cost money, whether it be for teacher salaries, the development of training institutions, or on-the-job training.
- C. The high cost of tuition, particularly for day schools, for the Israel experience, and for camping is a stumbling block to increased participation.

- D. Improved educational facilities are needed. For example, we need good, up-to-date laboratories in the sciences. We need facilities for computer education and for physical education.
- E. There is a need for venture capital to encourage new and creative ideas.

VI. The Community: Leadership and Structures

- A. The recruitment of a cadre of community leaders to the cause of Jewish education is viewed as a high priority. The community leaders are one of the key forces for change. They will have to be informed as to the realities and problems of Jewish education and assume the key positions where policy is determined.
- B. The structures that support and deliver the services of Jewish education must be strengthened to become more effective in implementing change and reform.
- C. The question was raised as to whether the current structures are appropriate. It was suggested that new structures, new mechanisms, consortia between existing institutions should be developed - for example, between the federations that can fund, the denominations that deliver services and the community centers.

SUBJECT: REDEPLOYMENT OF COMMISSION STAFF

In light of plans for Seymour Fox and Annette Hochstein to spend time on MIG and the Israel office, I propose the following arrangement for managing the Commission between now and its termination.

1. Management Team

I propose to enlarge upon the management team that is currently composed of MLM, AJN, HLZ, and VFL. I would propose adding Steve Hoffman and Herman Stein to it. To schedule meetings on a once every three week basis between now and the spring of 1990. This management team would, in effect, coordinate all Commission activity and develop agendas for the policy advisory committee and other groups.

2. Implementation Team

An implementation team would be organized to develop and execute the ideas related to the IJE. This team should be made up of AJN, HLZ, VFL, Steve Hoffman, Art Rotman and Jon Woocher. The implementation team would look toward developing the strategies for implementing the IJE and also develop strategies for involving commissioners.

3. Final Report Team

A final report team made up of AJN, HLZ, Jon Woocher, Joe Reimer, Art Rotman and Herman Stein would begin to look at developing the final report, the commissioning of papers, and the coordination of those papers for the final report.

Fox and Hochstein would serve as consultants to the chairman and the director of the Commission and work with each committee. The key is that the teams would initiate work in each area and would have a budget and staff support. Each team would work on a tight timetable and report to the senior policy advisors on a regular basis. Should you agree to this arrangement, we may have to rework the budget.
