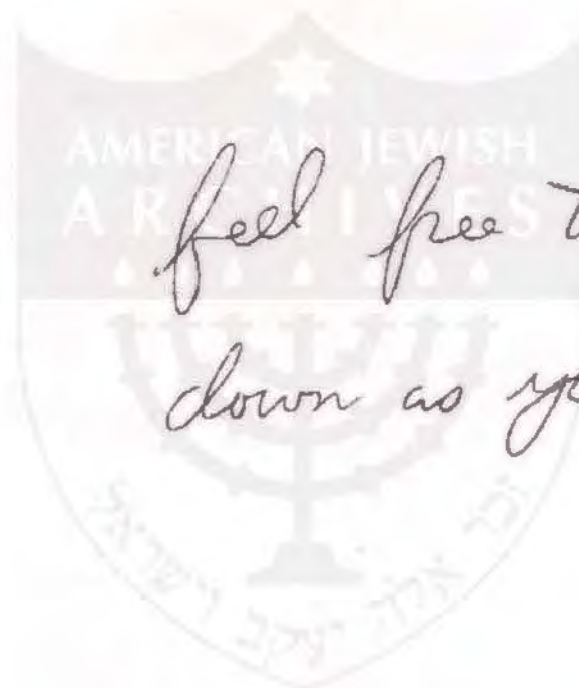

He received his early education in public and Hebrew schools of that city and is a graduate of the Boston Hebrew Teachers College, Harvard College and the Harvard Graduate School of Education. Prior to settling in Israel, Dr. Ackerman was Vice President for Academic Affairs of the University of Judaism in Los Angeles. He also served as Headmaster of the Beth El Day School; Director of Camp Yavneh and Camps Ramah in California and Canada; and Director of the United Synagogue Commission on Jewish Education. In Israel, he has been Chairman of the Department of Education of Ben Gurion University, Dean of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences of that university and founding Director of the School of Continuing Education. In addition, Dr. Ackerman has been a consultant to the Jewish Education Committee of both the Jewish Agency and the Joint Distribution Committee and a member of the faculty of the Jerusalem Fellows. He has published widely on Jewish education in the United States and education in Israel. Dr. Ackerman holds honorary degrees from the Hebrew College in Boston and The Jewish Theological Seminary.

Prior to his appointment with CJF, Mr. Kraar had served for three years as Executive Vice President of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Detroit. From 1984-86, he was Director General of the CJF Israel Office. In addition to holding various Jewish Federation and Community Center executive positions in St. Louis, Nashville and Memphis, he also served as Executive Director of Karitas Community, Inc., a 92-bed residential center for emotionally disturbed adolescents in Jackson, MI/Memphis, TN.

In addition to his numerous professional involvements and affiliations, Mr. Kraar has taught management, personnel administration and supervision courses and has served as a lecturer, instructor and trainer for various Jewish Federations, national agencies and other organizations on such topics as leadership development, facilitation training, board-staff relationships and non-profit management.

Mr. Kraar attended the University of Chattanooga, received a Certificate in Social Work from Hebrew University, and graduated from Memphis State University with a B.S. in Psychology. 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Lectureship funded to honor emeritus professor of art

CWRU's art department has received \$22,000 in funds to establish the Harvey Buchanan Lectureship in Art History and the Humanities. The lectureship is named for Harvey Buchanan, professor emeritus of humanities at CWRU. It is the department's first endowed lectureship. Income from the fund will be used to support an annual lecture by a distinguished art historian. The endowment was established with gifts from University trustees, friends, faculty and students.

"Harvey Buchanan was the prime mover in commissioning the many outdoor sculptures that grace the CWRU campus," says Jennifer Nield, associate professor and chair of art. "His activities on behalf of the arts in Cleveland have enriched the lives of us all."

Buchanan has taught art history and interdisciplinary courses in the humanities at CWRU since 1952. His primary interest is in 18th century European art, particularly French painting. He received the Ph.D. from Yale College and was a Fulbright Fellow in Naples, Italy from 1949 to 1952. Before he came to CWRU, Buchanan worked for six years in France, Germany, and the Near East. The French government recognized his contributions to French culture and made him Chevalier of the Ordre des Palmes Academiques in 1974.

Mandel said that to make a difference in the community, they are guided by two objectives. The first is to strengthen higher education; the second, to strengthen the quality of the professional core in the city. Downplaying the Mandel philanthropy he said, "While today is a day to thank us, it is also a day to thank you — you who work so hard in our community."

Former SASS Dean Arthur J. Napsierick, now president of Premier Industrial Foundation, introduced Mikulski, who lists among her achieve-

ments a degree in social work. "Cleveland is lucky to have the Mandels," she said. "This is a fitting tribute to their efforts." She also singled out the wins of each of the brothers, which brought loud applause from the audience.

Speaking on the role of social work, Mikulski said, "We must meet people where they are, not where we want

them to be... We need social inventions — it is social inventions that made America great." Mikulski is currently developing a new program designed to involve college students, in return for education benefits, in volunteer work. Such a program she explained, and quoting De Tocqueville, "cultivates habit of the heart."

Trustees approve resolution of gratitude to former provost

The following statement of appreciation for Herman D. Stein, former provost, was passed by the Executive Committee of the University Board of Trustees during their July 11 meeting.

In his 24 years as a member of the University, Herman D. Stein has distinguished himself as a teacher, a scholar, an administrator, and as an advisor to the state and other universities, to corporate and foundation leaders, and to foreign and domestic governments. After serving as Dean of the School of Applied Social Sciences, Provost for Social and Behavioral Sciences, and University Vice President and Provost, he has since 1972 held the rank of University Professor, the highest faculty position available to a member of the University.

Since 1972, in addition to extensive work with UNICEF and other international organizations, Dr. Stein continued to play an active role at Case Western Reserve. During this period he founded and chaired the Global Currents Lecture Series, which since 1983 has offered annual programs of presentations on matters of international importance. Appreciative audiences, including faculty, staff, students, and members of the community, have applauded this series for its breadth and the quality of the presentations. After five successful years, Dr. Stein this year stepped down from the chairmanship of the Lecture Series.

In 1986, the University approached Dr. Stein with yet another request for assistance. The search for a new Provost was suspended while a presidential search could proceed, and

the institution required the help of an experienced academic leader. Though reluctant to set aside a variety of professional and personal plans, he agreed to an interim appointment as Provost of the University until a permanent appointment could be made. In this capacity, he has provided leadership for the Office of Academic Affairs during the restructuring of the Colleges, the development of the Special Academic Investment Program, the transition to a new University President, and major progress in the areas of computing and library services, student affairs, and minority student affairs. All of this he has done with dedication, wisdom, and unflinching grace for which he is well known.

Dr. Stein will leave the position of Provost of the University on June 20, 1988, to resume his responsibilities as University Professor.

The Board of Trustees of Case Western Reserve University expresses its deepest appreciation to Herman D. Stein for his dedicated service to the University as a teacher, scholar, administrator, and important contributor to the work of this and other organizations. The Trustees note particularly his outstanding performance as Provost of the University since 1986, and wish him continued success in his extraordinary career.

New faces join CWRU

The past few months brought many changes in staff, including new people joining the University, people moving up within the CWRU ranks, and others returning to CWRU after working elsewhere. The following is a summary of some of these changes in personnel by department.

Business Affairs: John Lawryer was appointed material management manager, effective August 20. His responsibilities include purchasing, mailroom, receiving, and end distribution.

Lawryer comes to CWRU from Meridia Eudist Hospital, where he was director of material services for five years. Prior to that he was assistant director of material services at Huron Road Hospital.

Career Planning and Placement: Betty Mendelson and Rita Dowd-Mikolajczyk, who are sharing the fulltime position of coordinator of the professional practicum program.

Mendelson has been with CWRU since 1987 as coordinator of the small

business outreach program. Dowd-Mikolajczyk came to CWRU from Cleveland State University's Career Services Center, where she worked with cooperative education and adults in career transition programs.

University Communications: Three people have recently joined the staff of University Communications: John C. Westroop, media relations representative, who came on board August 16; Suzanne Neuman, who began September 1 as writer/editor for undergraduate admission; and Stuart A. Koller, who will be director of publications and advertising services as of October 3.

Westroop will be representing the Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences and the School of Law in the University's media relations efforts. Previously, he was an assistant publications editor at Penton Publishing, and has also served as assistant to the director of public information for the International Trade Fairs at the IX Center. Neuman came to CWRU from the University of Akron where she was a publications assistant.

Koller returns to CWRU from Cleveland State University, where he has been director of publications for the past five years. Prior to that he was director of graphic services at CSU for six years. He is also a contributing editor to Northern Ohio Live Magazine, and has won a number of awards for his writing.

Koller served as associate director and then director of CWRU publications from 1972 to 1977.

BIOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION FOR JONATHAN WOOCHEER

JONATHAN WOOCHEER is Executive Vice President of the Jewish Education Service of North America (JESNA), the continental planning, coordinating, and service agency for the field of Jewish education.

Prior to assuming this position Dr. Woocher was Associate Professor in the Benjamin S. Hornstein Program in Jewish Communal Service at Brandeis University, where he taught courses in Jewish political studies and communal affairs and directed the program in Continuing Education for Jewish Leadership. Dr. Woocher received his B.A. from Yale University, summa cum laude, in Political Science, and his M.A. and Ph.D. from Temple University in Religious Studies. He has also studied at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College. Before going to Brandeis, he served as Assistant Professor of Religion and Director of Jewish Studies at Carleton College in Minnesota.

Dr. Woocher is the author of the book SACRED SURVIVAL: THE CIVIL RELIGION OF AMERICAN JEWS, published by Indiana University Press. His articles on Jewish education, communal and religious life have appeared in several books and a number of journals, including JEWISH EDUCATION, THE PEDAGOGIC REPORTER, the JOURNAL OF THE AMERICAN ACADEMY OF RELIGION, JUDAISM, the JOURNAL OF JEWISH COMMUNAL SERVICE, and FORUM ON THE JEWISH PEOPLE, ZIONISM AND ISRAEL. Dr. Woocher is also a co-editor of PERSPECTIVES IN JEWISH POPULATION RESEARCH.

Dr. Woocher has been deeply involved in Jewish communal activities as a program developer, consultant, scholar-in-residence, and lecturer for both national and local organizations. He has written three program packages published by the National Committee on Leadership Development of the Council of Jewish Federations, and has spoken and conducted workshops at CJF General Assemblies, the JWB Biennial, and other major national meetings.

Dr. Woocher currently serves as Secretary of the Conference of Jewish Communal Service and is a Fellow of the Jerusalem Center for Public Affairs. His activities in a lay capacity include service on several committees of the Jewish Federation of Metrowest, NJ and the UJA-Federation of New York. He is a former member of the UJA Young Leadership Cabinet and has been a Vice-President of the Bureau of Jewish Education of Greater Boston, and a Trustee and member of the Social Planning and Allocations Committee of the Combined Jewish Philanthropies of Greater Boston.

Dr. Woocher lives in Maplewood, New Jersey, with his wife Sherry and their children, Meredith and Benjamin.
