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# NOTES TO TABLE

This table illustrates how estimated actual totals were calculated for endowment fund component ending balances, total grants and distributions and total additions. These calculations are necessary for two reasons:

- A. Several Federations reported their totals, but did not report the breakdowns by type of endowment fund component.
- B. Several Federations with endowment assets did not complete a 1988/89 survey.

The first line shows 1988/89 estimated actual totals.

The second line shows the totals from each component fund.

The third line shows totals reported from Federation that did not provide breakdowns.

The fourth line shows totals for all Federations that reported in 88/89. The figures include pro rata estimates for the totals on line 3 calculated as follows:

EXAMPLE: 18.6% of endowment funds, for which a breakdown was provided, were unrestricted. We assumed that 18.6% of the funds for which no breakdown was provided was also unrestricted. The formula was \$333,568,760 + (\$14,500,057 x 18.6%) = \$335,890,505.

Line 5 shows the estimated actual 1987/88 totals for Federations that did not report in 1988/89.

Line 6 is the estimated actual total. These figures are the closest possible approximation to the actual totals of all Federations.


