JEWISH PROJECTS RECEIVE \$244,000

(Milwaukee, WI) The Board of Directors of the Helen Reder Foundation, Inc. recently met and approved \$244,000 for Milwaukee Jewish Education and Jewish Philanthropy. Through its commitment to strengthen Jewish heritage, the Foundation attempts to enhance lives of the Jewish population.

The following grants funded by the Foundation in the area of Milwaukee Jewish Education will remain within the Milwaukee area.

- The Jewish Community Center of Milwaukee (JCC) will receive a \$90,000, two-year grant to hire a director of Adult Judaic Education increasing its capabilities to provide Jewish adult educational programming.
- A \$12,500 grant has been awarded to the Milwaukee Association for Jewish Education (MAJE). The funding will allow a second year of instruction at the Teachers Institute, which provides a forum for teachers to increase the level of their substantive knowledge, teaching techniques and strategies. Teachers who attend these courses will acquire a better understanding of what it takes to be effective teachers in a Jewish school.

Wisconsin Institute for Torah Studies (WITS) received a \$11,500 grant

to update its math and science textbooks. These new materials will be compatible with the

school's existing computer system.

· Jewish Family Services, Inc. has been awarded a \$5,000 grant to

increase teacher effectiveness in preschool Judaica and Hebrew education at its Child

Development Center. The funding will provide for new computer hardware and software,

along with other educational materials.

Newly resettled Jewish immigrants face both short-term and long-term challenges.

The Jewish Philanthropy area of the Foundation emphasizes its focus on the long-term

development of the new immigrants.

North American Conference on Ethiopian Jewry, Inc. has received a

\$75,000 grant for a preschool enrichment program to improve children's physical health

conditions and school readiness. The Ethiopian children of Ma'agalim (a barren trailer

site), between ages three and five, need to be prepared to enter public school on the same

level as other Israeli children. Through a hot lunch program, recreational and educational

activities, many of the children are successfully able to do so.

This year, Milwaukee will celebrate the 150th Anniversary of its Jewish community. In

support of this occasion, a \$50,000 grant has been awarded for the Sesquicentennial

Celebration coordinated by the Milwaukee Jewish Council and the Milwaukee Jewish

Federation. The funds will allow for an exhibit which will enlighten the public about the

history and traditions of the Milwaukee Jewish community.

The Helen Bader Foundation annually allocates \$6 million in its focus areas of

Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia, Families and Children at Risk, Milwaukee

Jewish Education and Jewish Philanthropy. Awards in the areas of Milwaukee Jewish

Education and Jewish Philanthropy total \$1,750,000 each year.
