- 1) Content: Summarizing what we think we are and have done always turns out to be a big deal—especially since, in this instance, it will be a very public face. There are a tremendous number of judgment calls, far more than in the brochure or Current Activities—and that took time. Do we list the current board? Etc. We would also have to report numbers. What kind of numbers do we include? Do we list our budget? Do we list the foundation and individual contributions?
- 2) Technical: Annual reports are expensive, and we'd need to draw up a budget. They're four-color, they require photographs of ongoing activities, and we have--to the best of my knowledge--almost no photographs by a professional of our activities. So the design side will

be a challenge of its own. (i.e.: Do we want to hire a photographer to come to Harvard and TEI? Do we want to hire a photographer to get pictures of Mort, Hartman, etc., and the board seminar and meeting? All these need to be decided now.)

If this is a priority for me to both do and oversee what I can "outsource," then you and I need to hold, with Josie, a two-hour meeting to conceptualize the entire document, based on a couple of prototypes I'll provide (Cummings; AJC; Weizmann). But I'm alerting you to the fact that it is a very big job—and no, I can't simply delegate the entire thing to someone else! We're at the beginning of March; half of April is a write-off; and I'll be away for half the summer. So we'll have to sit down and bump several things off my plate.

I, too, still feel the same way. (Unfortunately, it's the opposite of the way you feel!) That is, I continue to think that, for 1996, creating a polished package like our maroon folders, adding Hartman, and perhaps Green; a fuller Current Activities; Dan's redrafted vision piece; Amy's report on TEI; Kathy's report on Harvard; whatever numbers you want; and a long, personalized cover letter from you will be very effective and far more appropriate, given our capacity. (Josie thinks so too, by the way.) But it's your call.

I REALLY WANT IT AND I THINK IT WILL HELP US WITH MLM WHO IS A LITTLE IMPATIENT ABOUT THE PUBLIC FACE NOT BEING PUBLIC ENOUGH.

Hartman: I am currently inclined to send out the invitation to this event before we are ready to send out the board letter, because I think attendance is an issue. I'd invite the board seminar people, luncheon seminar additions, and simply append a note to the board members' letter reminding them of the time frame of the next day. Otherwise, by the time we draft all those individualized letters for executive meeting, etc., we're close to April, and that's not cool. OK with you?

#### THE NEED

Three principles are basic to our change philosophy:

- 1. Whole institutions need to change and such change takes major effort;
- 2. We need to focus on multiple institutions and age groups;
- Concentration of resources in one place has a much greater effect than the same resources scattered around.

The first two principles when taken together suggest the need for high intensity effort to transform institutions in many places at once. but, the resource requirements of this would be simply unavailable and unaffordable on a national basis. A small scale experiment would allow a high level of intensity with much less resource investment. Principle number three suggests that such an experiment should be focused in one geographic area for maximum effect and to reach the "tipping point."

There are two other advantages to such an approach. The first is that it provides a laboratory for change that would allow an iterative process of developing ideas, testing those ideas, learning from the test and revising the ideas. Mistakes would be made on a small scale and we would not be rolling out a defective product.

The second advantage is that it would demonstrate the potential for transformational change, making it much easier to mobilize leadership around the country to implement such changes in their own communities.

## THE CONCEPT

We would select one community to be a laboratory for change. The criteria for selection would be:

- 1) Change readiness
- 2) Proximity to human resources

We would develop programs in the community to transform a critical mass of Direct Service Institutions in the community. Examples of such programs might be:

- 1) A supplementary school transformation program
- 2) Early childhood transformation program
- 3) Development of innovative youth programs using the resources of Brandeis

- 4) An Israel Experience Program with excellent paperwork and follow-up
- 5) Transformation of camps that serve the area
- 6) Transformation program for the JCCs

In support of all these programs we might provide:

- Establishment of professional development programs for Teachers and educators
- 2) Leadership training for lay leaders, Principals, Directors and Rabbis
- 3) Help with fund-raising
- 4) Network of like institutions undergoing the process of change
- 5) Big Ideas
- 6) Consulting to institutions on goals and change process
- 7) Intensive evaluation by 1-2 full-time experienced evaluators using Leading Indicators methodology

Because of the large resources needed by this project, it should be undertaken by a coalition of funders and service providers.

# **DEVELOPMENT STEPS**

- Hire/Appoint Director (1998)
- Hire an evaluator (1998)
- Build the coalition/obtain funding (1997-98)
- Select the location (1998)
- Work with community to lay out detailed plans for the first round of interventions (1998-99)

[Not these words, but something like:] Bringing the latest, best, state-of-the-art thinking about teaching and learning and professional development from the world of general education; and adapting it in a way that's uniquely Jewish to solve the problems of Jewish education. Gail: I can't tell you how much I appreciate your taking time to even read, let alone comment. Far beyond any expectations. It's not a case of "too little, too late." It's a case of "too little clarity from the beginning."

It did not occur to me to elicit comments from you at a point where I could have used them, because the whole point of Barry's being the "yoetz" is that he is a curriculum expert who has also thought a lot about prayer. He stands behind this guide in its limited ambition—and I stand behind him! I have already learned from your e-mail what questions I might have asked, but the issues you raise would not occur to an editor. They are indeed "inside" education.

As for the larger context of the discussion, I will talk to you when I see you.

## To the business at hand:

I read the report and here are a few minor reactions:

PAGE ONE: I don't really love "models of successful J. teaching and learning . . ." I'm not sure an "outsider" would have any idea what that really means.

Last para: "best of general ed to the field." Maybe "the field" needs "of Jewish education". In the sentence that has "working with a range of organizations," do we need the word "institutions" rather than or along with organizations.

PAGE TWO: First line. I like "great leaders make great learning possible," rather than where "possible" sits now. Second para: "to them" feels weak to me. Maybe just drop "to".

I Didn't like the para on TEI, esp the last sentence. So WHAT IS THIS PROGRAM an outsider might ask. "Mentors" won't mean anything (or it will mean the wrong thing) to people outside our ken. How about something along the lines of: "Participants develop the ways of thinking and skills that will help them to design and implement innovative programs for transforming (improving?) the quality of teaching in supplementary schools, day schools and early childhood Jewish education."
