Re: Cleveland's Evaluation Efforts

Thanks for agreeing to take up with your CIJE Steering Committee the question of how we in Cleveland can relate our evaluation and research efforts to CIJE and build upon your resources and expertise. This memorandum will outline the direction we expect to pursue over the next 18-24 months and identify possible areas of collaboration.

Following are the areas of evaluation which we would like to undertake:

1) Educator Survey - as a comparison between us and other communities which have not developed the range of programs and interventions we have thus far; as a guide to current planning around personnel issues; and as a benchmark against which future efforts can be measured.

2) <u>Qualitative Program Evaluations</u> - a qualitative look at the extent to which the four major areas/ programs of the Commission on Jewish Continuity activity have met their goals. These include the Cleveland Fellows, In-Service Education package, Project Curriculum Renewal, and Retreat Institute. Since there has been program modifications in each area, we want to look back as best we can, as well as establish current baselines and ongoing measurement procedures to facilitate further evaluation efforts.

3) <u>Overall Community Assessment</u> - a look at the extent to which the community has met the overall goals set by the Commission on Jewish Continuity; how we look at the impact of the sum of the parts.

At this point, based on our own thinking and our

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discussions with you, we are moving forward to explore with Roberta Goodman and Julie Taamivaara their taking on, as a team, leadership of the evaluation efforts in Cleveland. They will be coming to Cleveland February 19-20 to meet with us to work this out.

As we have discussed, CIJE assistance would be very helpful in a number of areas:

1) <u>Supervision for Roberta and Julie - Adam has</u> reviewed with me their strengths and weaknesses. We think we and our leadership would be more comfortable looking to this team for leadership if we knew that their was some form of supervision of their work from the CIJE MEF team. I don't think this requires on-site presence from Adam and Ellen. However, Roberta and Julie ought to be able to turn to them on some regular basis to test methodological and analytical approaches. Roberta and Julie are aware that we are exploring this as part of the relationship.

2) Updating the Educator Survey - Adam shared with me this week his timetable for generating the new and improved Educator Survey. We will want to have that available as soon as possible so that we can determine whether we can use it as is, or with modifications.

3) <u>Identification of Other Researchers</u> - We don't expect Roberta and Julie to handle all the research work themselves; they may not have the time, expertise, or resources to do it all. Therefore, we will want to identify along the way other researchers who may be able to handle specific pieces of the overall efforts. CIJE's recommendations would be very welcome. We have identified a local research group from the Cleveland Child Guidance Center which may play some role, but we would be glad to look at other resources also.

I look forward to hearing from you after your meetings on Thursday to see how we can proceed.

Follow-up on Cleveland Evaluation Efforts Re:

Based on my recent conversations with Adam and Gail, as well as Roberta and Julie's recent visit with us, I want to suggest the following relationship vis-avis Cleveland's evaluation efforts:

1) Consulting role for Adam Gamoran - We would like to have Adam serve as a consultant to our evaluation efforts. In this role Adam would be available to Roberta and Julie to test methodological and analytical approaches and would preview milestone documents within the process (proposal drafts, project reports, etc...).

2) Coordination of Educator Survey - we plan to look to the updated CIJE survey as well as the instrument Julie and Roberta have created for Seattle, and work from both of these to tailor ours. We will make every effort to keep the overall framework of our study such that comparisons between ours and the other CIJE studies can be made.

I understand from Gail that your staff is meeting on March 6 and that the question of Cleveland's work will be on your agenda. We are expecting a draft proposal from Roberta and Julie around March 8-9, and are scheduling a follow-up visit for them on March 21-23. Since our Cleveland leadership will not want to proceed down this path further without the CIJE connection assured, I hope we can talk after the March 6 meeting.

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

Re: Summary of December 12 Meeting

It was good seeing you earlier this month, albeit again for our usual breathless opportunity to consult. Following is a summary of what you, Sylvia and I talked about with respect to the CIJE/Cleveland connection:

1) <u>Personnel</u>

- a) In-Service Reassessment Between the educator survey we are now completing, and the mapping process you are working on with Sylvia through, we will have great tools on hand to reassess our current efforts in teacher education. CIJE's help in this reassessment process will be critical, both for its impact on our work, and translation to other communities.
- b) Informal Education As our Retreat Institute gets deeper into its work, they are building experience in training educators in retreat and youth work. They could serve as an interesting laboratory for this area.
- c) Early Childhood/Hebrew Educators these are the most serious currently identified areas for development in our system. We'd welcome CIJE help in identifying successful approaches.
- d) Educational Directors We are taking advantage more thoughtfully of the Harvard Principals Institute. Your ongoing help in identifying candidates for vacancies is critical, given the limited assistance we

get from other national placement operations. On a broader level, the difficulty we have in finding good candidates when we can get synagogues to focus on looking at the right level is an indicator of the ongoing personnel crisis at this level. Even more serious work needs to be done by CIJE with the training institutions to infuse the field. The number of openings nationally for both supplementary and day schools is staggering. Nothing else we are doing at the community level matters if we don't have solid, competent partners at the schools to work with.

2) Building Community Support

- a) Sustaining Political/Funding Support Your help thus far in presentations to leadership (formal and informal) has been great. As we have need we will continue to call on you. Your vantage point nationally and what you can tell our leadership about where we stand in relation to other communities is very important.
- b) Leadership Development - we have talked much but done little here about the issue of leadership development, both for our constituents and for future top community level leadership. One concept we have kicked around regarding the latter is to take a group of our top leadership (veteran and emerging) to Israel for a concentrated focus on Jewish education leadership issues. My leadership likes the idea, but hasn't committed to doing it. If we can gain the commitment to do it, CIJE's help in developing the trip could strengthen our experience, and possibly provide you with a model for other communities.

3) <u>Research/Evaluation</u> - CIJE is moving in the right direction. Keep pressing on, and keep us in the loop. Of particular importance is the creation of a forum in which communities' efforts in this area can be shared. 4) <u>Best Practices</u> - you advised us that the next two products are on JCC's and In-Service Education. As discussed above, the In-Service piece will be an additional helpful tool in our reassessment.

5) <u>Goals Projects</u> - there are a variety of ways in which the CIJE Goals Project is playing itself out, or will be, in Cleveland:

- a) Goals/Senior Seminar formation of a professional/lay forum for senior educational leadership, began with these issues. Last year's seminar focused almost exclusively on "goals" issues. This year's seminar is incorporating some of your resources (Pekarsky, Marom) and their focus on educational vision, in the program. The seminar meets 12-13 times/year.
- b) Our home-grown version of the Goals Project, Drisha, is now underway with the Schechter School, and in modified format it is guiding our approach to the Beth Torah (Conservative Hebrew School consortium) study.
- c) The Agnon School has framed its current strategic planning process as a visioning process, and is using Danny Marom, Lifsa Schachter, and Rob Toren as resources.
- d) As we move forward with the planning for a non-Orthodox high school, the initial planning stages will be framed around defining the vision for the school. Atlanta's experience with this will be very helpful.

The intersections between our work are many, which means we probably aren't spending enough time together processing and tracking all this, and more importantly, thinking together. Lets keep in touch.

The Jewish Education Center of Cleveland has a total of \$10,000 available, to be apportioned equitably among JECC affiliates, for educators to travel **outside of Cleveland** to attend conferences and workshops that will improve their teaching skills.

While most funding will be awarded for conferences with Judaic content, general studies teachers are welcome to apply for grants to attend workshops in their disciplines, and such applications will be considered, depending on monies available.

To take advantage of early registration discounts, applicants should return this grant application form promptly--no later than Friday, March 10, 1995.
