C. I emphasized the importance of making a full day of orientation for Steve Chervin to the work of the CIJE so that he has an opportunity to meet with all of our staff. We fixed the 22nd of September as that day and all of our staff (VFL excluded) should keep that day open in their calendars. He will come in the previous night to New York, and will spend the entire Thursday with us.

E. I discussed Lauren Azulai's role with Steve, and it is clear that they have not defined what her role will be. She is going to go down to 3/4 time and she is anxious, he tells me, to work only in the continuity area and not in the general planning area of the Federation, but I think that Dave Sarnat has not yet given her a final answer to this request. By the way, Lauren was out of town on vacation today, so I think that I avoided insulting her by not having let her know that I was coming to town.

4. David Sarnat -

Dave Sarnat and I had a second conversation which I think is extremely important and points at a direction for our work, and particularly for Nessa's work. As we talked about the problems of his bringing somebody's key lay leadership into the area of Jewish education he expressed to me his frustration at having approached Bernie Marcus who is probably the largest contributor, or certainly the wealthiest member of the community (700 million dollars of assets), interesting him in the Jewish Continuity agenda. According to Sarnat, when he had a private meeting with Bernie Marcus a few weeks ago with the avowed aim of interesting him in Jewish Continuity "as soon as he hear the word Jewish education, his eyes rolled to the back of his head and he lost interest!" David Sarnat believes that, contrary to his feelings of several months ago, we are going to have serious problems in engaging the key leadership in Atlanta in this issue. He now believes that Mort Mandel is sui generis and that we cannot extrapolate from Mort's biography for leaders of similar calibre but who have different makeup. The implications of all of this are that we are going to have to take a very serious look at this problem which resonates to my own sense that our agenda does not automatically engage the leaders whom we are particularly interested in engaging. I and Dave Sarnat are interested in taking Bernie Marcus and another couple of leaders of this calibre as a case study in order to try and work out how exactly we will be able to make them "champions" of Jewish education. I suggested to Dave Sarnat that Nessa and I spend some time with him at the quarterly of the CJF and I was most interested in Tuesday the 31st of August, although the meeting could also be on the 30th (VFL: in a week or two, could you please check with Sarnat's office and see whether you can make a time for me to meet with him at the quarterly together with his new president for an hour and a separate meeting with Dave Sarnat, and Nessa, and me for an hour and a half in order to talk about this particular issue.

5. Dr. Harry Stern and Dave Sarnat -

A. I met with Harry Stern and with Dave Sarnat and reviewed the conversations that I had had in Jerusalem with Laurie, the new *shelicha* to Atlanta whom I had selected on behalf of Atlanta and with Debbie Goldstein who is going to be the new educator in the JCC.

SUBJECT: Meeting space in New York

The issue of location for the April 2 board meeting remains unresolved. As you know, UJA/Federation is not available on that day. Barry Holtz has been in touch with the Jewish Museum about use of their space and thought we had an arrangement for a waiver or reduction in rent, but the director recently told him that we would have to pay the full fee, which they charge even to their own board members. Barry then tried to find us space at Columbia University, but learned yesterday that it is not available then, either.

I called the Jewish Museum today and learned the following. They have an auditorium which seats up to 220 and tan be arranged lecture style, classroom style, or conference style (around a table). There is a smaller space, called a gallery, which can hold 75 people and be set up in any of these ways, as well. In addition, there is a section of the cafe which can be closed off and used for meeting.

With hoard members, guests, and staff, we can anticipate about 60 participants. Our day is tentatively planned as follows:

- 9-9:45 Study session (Could be held in the gallery or auditorium.)
- 10-12 Committee meetings (They could set up one at each end of the auditorium, one in the gallery, and one in the cafe.)
- 12.2 Lunch (They would need time to set up the auditorium for lunch. If we used 12 12:45 for people to tour the museum, which they would arrange, lunch could be set up during that time.)
- 2-4 Board Meeting (Could be held in the gallery)

The rental charge for the auditorium turing the day is \$1800 and for the gallery is \$1000. The woman I spoke with said they might be able to work out a combined fee that would be less that \$2800, but couldn't guarantee it and didn't know what that fee might be. The cost of food would be additional, and we would have to use their in-house, kosher caterer. The space is currently being held for us.

An alternative to the Jewish Museum might be to use one of the university clubs that Premier uses for investor meetings. I learned from Bill Evanson that Premier uses either the Princeton Club or the Cornell Club, one through John Colman and the other through our PR consultant in New York. Before pursuing this option further, I thought I should check with you.

My recommendation is that we go ahead with the Jewish Museum. It is a more appropriate space and can be set up to accommodate our needs. I would appreciate your guidance.



Dear Ruth:

I was delighted to receive your call yesterday about a relationship between the Milwaukee Jewish Federation Lead Community Project and the Cleveland College of Jewish Studies. I believe that it is possible to overcome the obstacles of distance to provide high quality Jewish educator training to communities which require access to institutions of higher Jewish learning.

While I need to know much more about Milwaukee and your community's needs, I can assume certain similarities with Cleveland. Although it would require further discussion to develop a proposal appropriate to Milwaukee, I am enclosing a concept paper which illustrates what we might offer. It assumes that we might offer a Master's Degree program in Jewish education to Jewish educators in Milwaukee but it could just as easily be developed as a proposal for a Bachelor's Degree or a Certificate in Jewish Education. The budget which which goes along with the paper would likewise change for a different program. It is meant as a point of departure for further discussions rather than a narrow idea of what the College can offer.

I look forward to discussing the concept with you shortly.

The requirements for the Master's Degree are (1) satisfactory completion of a designated sequence of fifteen graduate courses in Judaic studies and Jewish education, (2) satisfactory completion of an approved field placement or internship in a current or new work setting or settings, and (3) supervised mentorship with a faculty advisor.

The Cleveland College of Jewish Studies will work with the Jewish educators sponsored by the Milwaukee Jewish Federation to develop a specific program which will include a core curriculum and individualized study programs. The College will work with the individual educator in order to assess educational needs and determine the appropriate

The core curriculum of the program will include the following courses:

- Foundations of Education
- Philosophies of Jewish Education
- The American Jewish Community
- Working With Families
- Supervision in Formal and Informal Settings
- Administering Programs and Institutions
- Colloquium: Issues in Jewish Education
- Independent Project

The elective courses will include, among others, the following:

- Understanding and Teaching Prayer.
- Teaching Bible: Investigation and Methodology
- Israel and Jewish Identity: Their Place in the Curriculum
- Group Theory and Practice: Integrating Formal and Informal Education
- Supervising a Hebrew Language Curriculum
- Human Development: Cognitive, Moral and Spiritual Perspectives
- Learning and Teaching

Students are required to complete five courses in Judaica studies and demonstrate competency in Hebrew by the time of completion of the program.

A monthly colloquium will anchor the program. The project director will travel to Milwaukee to conduct the colloquium and to offer individual advisement. All students participating in the degree program will be expected to participate in the monthly colloquium devoted to fostering a sense of professional identity and serving as a forum for serious discussion of the foundations of education and educational theory.

The program can be completed in three years and can begin September 1, 1994. The College will offer a variety of learning venues and delivery systems through which Jewish educators will be able to complete the Master's Degree. These venues and delivery systems include:

- Summer School: The College offers a summer school program between July 1-31 each year. The summer school will offer a sufficient number of courses so that an individual may complete the course requirements, internships and colloquia for the degree in three summers while pursuing full-time employment during the regular academic year. Students will take classes for two to three weeks, Monday through Thursday and will reside in residential dormitories at a university near the College.
- Intensive Semester: The College offers several intensive courses each year in Jewish education. Each course may be offered on four consecutive weekdays (Monday-Thursday) from 9:00 a.m.- 3:00 p.m. so that participants could complete a course within one week. Each course would be preceded by a six-week supervised reading period and followed by a six-week project. Other time frames will also be considered. Some of the intensive semester courses will be offered in Milwaukee and others will be offered in Cleveland. Some will be offered during school vacation periods and others will be scheduled as necessary.
- Distance Learning Programs: The College will employ distance-learning programs to expand the available course offerings, offer specialized instruction by non-resident experts, and deliver courses by faculty from origination sites including Cleveland and other institutions of higher learning in North America to Milwaukee. The distance learning program is based on videoconferencing which is fully interactive two-way video and audio communications involving multiple locations linked by videocameras, microphones and viewing monitors across telephone lines. This will create a virtual classroom in which technology creates the environment of a regular classroom even though the instructor and students are in different locations. The platform for the videoconferencing program is the CLI Eclipse Videoconferencing System, operating at 112 Kbps. Through an agreement with Management Recruiters International, a Cleveland-based firm operating the Conferview Videoconferencing System, the College will make MRI facilities available to the the Milwaukee Jewish Federation program for this program. Videoconferencing programs may be held at an MRI site in Milwaukee (601 East Henry Clay, Milwaukee WI 53217) or at a location within the Jewish community.
- Faculty in Residence: The College will employ a resident instructor(s) as an Adjunct Professor of Jewish Studies or Education in Milwaukee who will teach a regular course to the Jewish educators in the program who will provide field supervision and mentor the students on a regular basis.
- Credit from other Institutions of Higher Learning: The College will accept up to three
 courses from other accredited institutions of higher learning towards the degree.

Recruitment and Admission

The College will work closely with designated representatives of the Milwaukee Jewish Federation to identify suitable candidates for these programs. Students will apply through the regular admissions process of the College. Admission to the program is open to students with a Bachelor's Degree from an accredited institution of higher learning. Upon review of their credentials, the faculty may recommend that preparatory studies be completed prior to acceptance in the Master's Degree program.

Applicants must complete the College application and receive a letter of support from the Milwaukee Jewish Federation. The College operates with a rolling admissions policy for all degree programs. Other policies and procedures are detailed in the Student Handbook.

Graduates of the Program

Graduates of the Master's Degree program in Jewish education at the Cleveland College of Jewish Studies have been able to work more effectively in their current positions and to advance professionally within a variety of settings. Graduates of the Master's Degree program are currently serving as teachers, family education specialists, subject area specialists, principals, school directors, congregational educators, directors of central agencies for Jewish education, department heads of central agencies for Jewish education, and other positions in congregational and communal education. The Jewish Education Service of North America recognizes the Master's Degree as qualification for the highest level of national licensure. The Master's Degree is recognized by the Israel Ministry of Education.

Scholarships

The Milwaukee Jewish Federation will establish a pool of scholarship funds for Milwaukee Jewish educators. Students in the degree program may receive tuition and fellowship funds based on merit, need and the importance to the Milwaukee community of the professional position for which the individual is being prepared. Participants in the program are eligible to apply for Federal Student Financial Aid programs and other College fellowships.

We at the Melton Centre for Jewish Education in the Diaspora wish to thank you for your generous scholarship endowment to our Pre-Academic Studies Program.

Your endowment is being used to help students prepare for the Senior Educators Program - the Melton Centre's response to the need for talented, committed and qualified Jewish educators in the Diaspera. This program brings a select group of Jewish educators from around the world to the Hebrew University for an intensive year-long program of study and enrichment. In this pluralistic setting, participants explore new approaches to Jewish education, probe critical issues in educational thought, reflect upon their work and professional goals, and develop skills and resources which they will be able to utilize in their home communities.

The standards for acceptance to this program are very high. Participants must have a Bachelor of Arts and at least three years of experience in Jewish education; they must meet the Hebrew University's general entrance requirements and have a basic knowledge of Hebrew. They must also be committed to working in Diaspora Jewish education for three years after completion of the program.

The Pre-Academic Studies Program prepares students who generally meet the requirements for the Seniors Educators Program, but, because of factors in their environment, may be lacking in certain areas. Most of the participants are from Eastern Europe, where they have been shut off from Jewish tradition and now need reinforcement in both Hebrew language and Judaic studies. Each student in the preparatory program has a six-month course tailor-made, focusing on their individual needs, to bring them up to the level of the other Senior Educators Program participants.

Part of your contribution is also being used to support the Centre's Summer Institute for Jewish Educators. This program is designed for formal and informal educators in the Diaspora, such as teachers and principals in Jewish schools, bureau personnel, community workers and adult educators. This intensive and diverse program consists of seminars, workshops and pedagogic tours to enrich both the participants' Jewish background and their professional skills and knowledge.

On behalf of the Melton Centre, I once again want to thank you for your generosity, which enables us to provide these programs to help Jewish educators provide meaningful and stimulating Jewish education in the Diaspora.

Since we met several weeks ago, I have been working on the concept we discussed regarding the role of resident camping in Jewish education and Jewish continuity. The ideas that you gave me have lead to a series of meetings which has helped me strategize an approach which I would like to discuss with you when next you are in Milwaukee.

In brief, our idea is that the JCC in Milwaukee, along with the JCC of Atlanta and perhaps one or two other cities that have resident camps, would work together to develop a task force that would identify the components that make resident camping such a powerful Jewish experience and to help develop the programs and the knowledge base that will not only enhance and build upon what the resident camp experience currently provides, but make sure that other communities can share and benefit from that knowledge and experience. I have talked to Jane Gellman, Tzivia Blumberg and Barry Chazan. Tzivia, Barry and I spent about 45 minutes at the Biennial discussing the idea and focusing on the role that Jewish resident camping can play in terms of Jewish continuity.

I would like to suggest the following to you:

- That when next you are in Milwaukee, we get together to discuss a 2-4 city effort
 that would identify the strengths of Jewish resident camping and focus on the
 concept of building Jewish continuity through camping experience that is strongly
 related to Jewish community.
- 2. In the interim, I will speak to Harry Stern of Atlanta and perhaps one other city to see if we can get at least three or four camps involved. Chicago, and Camp Chi, is very interested in participating. My feeling is that we should do it with more than just Milwaukee and Atlanta, because there are different resident camps and experiences. Therefore, we need a broader base so that the recommendations will be applicable to all of the resident camps provided through the Jewish Community Center network.

In speaking with Jane Gellman, she is willing to work actively on this committee since both Judaic education and resident camping are areas of major interest and expertise for her. I would hope that Jane would be able to attend the meeting that we have during your next visit.

I look forward to hearing from you shortly.

Data analysis requires appropriate computer hardware and software, and I asked Bill to explore two options: (1) Use of a personal computer as a terminal, to connect to a mainframe computer at a local university for data analyses; and (2) Use of a sufficiently powerful personal computer and software to conduct data analyses on the PC. I am writing to report what we have found, and to make a recommendation for purchase of equipment.

In short, we recommend the PC option (option 2). In reviewing this recommendation, please keep in mind that a notebook PC is standard and necessary equipment for our field researchers. The notebook we purchased for Claire Rottenberg is unfortunately not usable by Bill because it is an Apple (a MAC Powerbook), and he is an IBM usef (like the rest of us). We have collected Claire's computer from her, and will turn it in to Ginny at the first opportunity.

Bill reports that the difference between a run-of-the mill notebook PC and a PC sufficiently powerful to run SPSS-PC (the data analysis program) is about \$400. In addition, the SPSS-PC software costs about \$700. Thus, the PC system for data analysis costs about \$1100 more than a PC for word processing only. However, in consultation with computer staff at Emory University, Bill estimates the cost of analyzing data on the mainframe at \$1200 per year. Thus, the first-year costs are about the same, and Bill argues that the PC system is more convenient.

I would emphasize important points. First, whereas the PC system (option 2) includes all present and future costs, using the mainframe (option 1) incurs charges estimated at \$1200 each year. Since this is a multi-year project, option 2 is more cost-efficient. Second, \$1200 is for moderate usage, but if we gather new data in the future and conduct more figorous analyses (e.g., as part of a market survey), the charges could be even higher. Third, if our project ceases at some point, CIJE will still possess a powerful computing system which could be deployed elsewhere, but if we pay for mainframe computing, those costs could not be recorped.

For these reasons, I endorse Bill's recommendation and ask that you authorize purchase of the computer system described as option 2 in Bill's mento. Funds for the computer system should be drawn against the miscellaneous line in the MEF budget for 1993-94. The cost can be accommodated within our approved budget.

If CHE is able to recoup any costs by selling Claire's notebook, I request that the funds be credited to our budget.

Proposal for Computer System (to Analyze Osentitative Data)

Bill Robinson, CIJE Field Researcher - Atlanta

There are two options available for analyzing quantitative data - 1) through a mainframe computer at a local university using SPSS, and 2) through a personal computer using a PC version of SPSS. The two options differ on costs and convenience.

In terms of costs (as detailed on the following page), both options require the purchase of a personal (notebook) computer. However, in order to run SFSS on the PC a faster microprocessor with a built-in math co-processor (at an additional cost of \$412) is strongly recommended. In addition, option \$2 will involve greater short-term costs (\$695 for the SFSS-PC software). However, option \$1 may require greater long-term costs for use of the university mainframe. This cost is difficult to estimate since the cost depends on two factors: abount of usage and the manner in which access to the mainframe is acquired. For example, at Emory University the faculty of Emory College uses the mainframe at no cost while others associated with the University pay \$.07 per second of CPU time. At moderate usage this equals approximately \$100 a month, but could range up to \$1000 a month.

In terms of convenience, using SPSS-PC (option #2) provides certain benefits over the mainframe (option #1). First, SPSS-PC provides continual and immediate access to the data and calculations, while access to mainframes can be interrupted or delayed due to university maintenance or hardware breakdowns. Second, use of SPSS-PC will allow phone lines to remain open for incoming calls and faxes. On the other hand, mainframes tend to run calculations at a faster rate. However, purchase of the recommended (T1950) personal computer should ameliorate this problem considerably.

Recommendation:

Based on moderate usage of SPSS on the Emory mainframe computer for a year, the costs of the two options are not significantly different. Option #1 (mainframe) is \$4138 and option #2 (SPSS-PC) is \$4045. Coupled with the greater convenience of using SPSS on a personal computer, option #2 is strongly recommended.

IV. Issues in Processing CIJE Expenses

During the January meeting of the CIJE staff in Cleveland, BR met with the staff to discuss any open issues or suggestions in processing CIJE expenses. They offered several recommendations for improving the process. Following discussion, the Philanthropic Finance/Administration Committee suggests that the following modifications be made:

A. When submitting telephone balls, CIJE employees and consultants should identify personal calls only, assuming the others are business calls. ADH will decide if field researchers should install a separate line for their CDE activities. If so, these bills would be submitted as business expenditures.

RE: MAJE Institutes

Ina, when we spoke albeit briefly at the teachers' reception, I mentioned to you that Ruth, Jane, Louise and I had been talking about how the MAJE Institutes could become part of the developing personnel action plan. It makes no sense for the community's plan to not to build on what you are already working on. Based on our previous conversations, one way to enhance the present system would be to start with the teachers' institute since we know that the research report points to the need to enhance both the Judaic and pedagogic knowledge of more than 50% of the teachers teaching in supplementary schools (I don't have my report with me so I don't remember the exact percent). As I understand the structure of the institute to date, there has been no systematic attempt to connect the courses that people are taking with the curriculum they are teaching. This element does already exist in the design for the early childhood teacher's institute. Would it be possible in the next meeting of your subcommittee to suggest beginning with this approach? If we can get agreement in theory to the idea, then let's appoint an appropriate smaller committee to do the work of meeting with principals and rabbis and writing up a proposal for the Institute with the first two offerings spelled out in greater detail. We could potentially have it up and running by fall.

The suggestion could go something like this:

Teachers' Institute

Bring together the principals (and perhaps, rabbis) of the congregational schools to talk through their present curriculum and the gaps they see in teacher knowledge in holding on to the curriculum as they would like to see it. This would be important both for their buy-in (after all we want them to encourage their teachers to attend) and because we would want to see if there are any agreed upon areas of concern. What we would be looking for are the first places we would want to develop courses for teachers. Of course, we are also looking for their understanding of the importance of this endeavor to upgrading the education of the children of Milwaukee through the unpgrading of the teaching force. might involve the commitment to support professionalization through agreement to a system of upgrading pay based on courses taken, perhaps even giving some time for teachers to visit each other, etc. etc. (but these could remain separate issues at this point).

I could then imagine developing several (between 2-4, depending on human and financial resources) offerings for teachers for next year that would involve both coursework -- that is based

both subject matter and pedagogy -- (the simplest, most straightforward kind of seminar to mount would be one that has agreement not only on the course topic -- holidays, prayer, Torah -but one that agrees on using a specific certain curriculum content--like Melton holidays, or Torah Aura's Being Torah) and follow up in their classroom settings.

This follow-up could be done in one of three ways (or some combination of all three): by their own principals (who could be encouraged to attend the course), by master teachers who we would identify (who would definitely come to the course and to some follow-up afterwards), and/or by the participants in the course itself.

As I see it if you could get the committee to agree on this, you could form a small task force that would be in charge of writing up the proposal and working to get it off the ground. I would be delighted to work with that task force in terms of thinking through the course(s) that would be offered next year and the design of the whole of such a program (the latter would probably have to come back to this little committee, the personnel committee and/or larger CIJE committee and certainly for planning and allocations).

Additionally, we could/should figure out (this is the responsibility of the other subcommittee) what (how many/in what areas) would be the nature of the professional development path that a teacher could take to qualify for step increases on some kind of scale. Read through the stuff from the National Board of License and from Yoni Shultz. We may have better luck in Milwaukee getting agreement on step increases than they have in big cities.

One other thought: One way to develop a communal agenda which would create more support for improving supplementary school enterprise (in which improving teachers pedagogic and content knowledge would be only one part) would be to create a "best practices" seminar for the principals, lay leaders and rabbis. This could be seen as a follow up of the beginning organizing meeting.

Principals' Institute

I suggest this as the first step because of the results of the Milwaukee study. But it is only a suggestion, it's not carved in

stone. It can be added to, emballished etc.

Additionally, We (CIJE) is still committed to an October seminar for the principals in the lead communities. We are planning to link the leadership seminar and the goals project thematically by dealing with issues such as the importance of shared vision in educational institutions, skills and strategies involved in leading such a process in your own institution. We are still looking at the week of October 14 from Sunday beginning with dinner at 6:00 pm to Thursday at 3:00 pm. It will probably be done in cooperation with either Harvard's Institutes on Professional

Development or Columbia Teachers College. By the middle of this month we will probably have enough of these details finalized for you to begin talking it up with proncipals so that they can schedule the time and begin thinking about sources for money for travel and lodging.

This would lead me to hope that next year in Milwaukee we would also be able to expand this year's principals' institute to follow up on both projects: the goals project and the teachers'

institute project.

This too could become part of the larger personnel action plan and get the necessary funding that be needed to pull off an expanded version of what you are doing. I'm thinking that we ought to meet with the folks at UW Milwaukee's institute for educational leadership and find out how they do their thing and if we could coordinate some of our local efforts together. Perhaps there is an opportunity to cooperate and create some incentive for the principals themselves to become involved in serious professional development.

Early Childhood Institute

Last but certainly not least we should discuss how we can build on the wonderful success of this institute. We know from the study that the EC have the least background in Judaica and the worst working conditions. We also know how important this time is in the life of the child and the child's family. Perhaps it would be possible to really be the leaders in establishing ways in which we can enhance still further these teachers Judaica knowledge, pay them a decent wage and get them benefits.

I think that this will involve not only working on the course of study for the teachers, but trying again to work "the best practices for early childhood seminar" in which not only the directors of the schools are involved but also their lay people, key community leaders, and rabbis (in those schools housed in

synagogues).

I thought I was just going to write about the Teachers' Institute but once I started, I was on a roll. So much for my thoughts at 35,000 feet. I look forward to talking more about these ideas when I get back from my vacation. Take care.



Judaic teachers lack training, benefits: survey Still, Milwaukee Jewish education system is considered among strongest in nation

By Marilyn Ruby

Milwaukee's Indaic teachers are professionally stable and devoted to Jewish education and Jewish youth. On the whole, they are Jewishly better educated than the typical U.S. Jew.

Yet most lack content knowledge, are inadequately trained and face low earning standards and a scarcity of benefits and career-advancement opportunities.

These are among the conclusions of the survey "The Teaching Force of Milwankee's Jewish Schools," conducted by the national Council for Initiatives in Jewish Education.

Survey director Adam Gamoran, professor of sociology and educational policy studies at the University of WisconsinMadison, summarized the results last week for Milwaukee participants in the Lead Community Initiatives for Jewish Education project.

Last year, CIJE chose Milwaukee, Atlanta and Baltimore as "lead communities" to develop and implement educational programs that will serve as models for other communities.

Milwankee's teacher survey, completed last June, is based on surveys of all Milwankee area Judaic teachers and interviews with 27 educators. Eighty-eight percent of surveyed teachers responded.

"Milwankee is in the national spotlight,"
Gamoran said, and "is one of the outstanding communities in terms of Jewish education in North America. But we can't rest at
that. The community must pressure leader-

ship to raise the standards and make changes."

The survey sought to answer questions about teachers' qualifications and compensation, including:

Who are Milwaukee's teachers?

Milwankee's Jewish schools employ 215 teachers. They predominantly are women (80 percent), married (80 percent) See editorial,

and American-born (89 p. 4.

immigrated from Israel and 2 percent from

the former Soviet Union.

Forty-five percent label themselves Reform, 24 percent Orthodox, 19 percent Conservative and 6 percent traditional (between Orthodox and Conservative.)

Of the 65 percent who have visced Israel, 46 percent lived there for three months or more.

A majority of teachers plans to continue working in their present position, and 68 percent indicate they will continue teaching.

Most Judaic teachers work part-time. Fifty percent work fewer than 10 hours per week and 25 percent work full-time (newschan 30 hours per week).

Part-time teachers do not receive he and pension benefits. Benefits are so even for full-time teachers: 30 perceits full-time teachers are offered health fits, 25 percent disability and 30 perceits.

pensions.

Although almost half the preschool teachers work full-time, 8 percent are offered health benefits.

Interviews with teachers gave circumstantial evidence that some schools may hire part-time teachers to avoid paying benefits.

Seventy-five percent of teachers work at one school, 21 percent work in two schools and 4 percent work in three or four schools. Most of those who work at more than one school are unable to put together full-time hours, and receive no benefits.

· What are teachers' salaries?

Sixty percent of teachers surveyed earn less than \$10,000 teaching at one school, and 44 per-cent earn less than \$5,000. Nineteen percent of teachers earn more than \$20,000 a year.

· What are teachers' training levels and professional growth

opportunities?

About 85 percent have college degrees, and one-third have graduate or professional degrees. Fifty-four percent have degrees in education.

Thirteen percent majored in Jewish studies in college or graduate school. Thirty-one percent have no formal Jewish education after bar/bat mitzvah.

Nineteen percent of the teachers are well prepared in both Jewish subject matter and general education. Twenty-one percent of the pre-school teachers are not Jewish.

Aside from a twice-annual teacher's conference and a few courses offered at institutions, there is no systematic in-service. training for day school and supplementary school teachers.

Milwaukee Judaic and Hebrew day school teachers - most of whom are only partially prepared to begin with - receive as little as one-seventh the in-service workshop training required of licensed teachers in Wisconsin, according to the survey.

Response in works

Ruth Cohen, Milwaukee's Lend Community project director, said she was not surprised by the findings. "But this is important because it is the first time the data has been quantified," she said. That gives it power versus having hunches. Now we can draw specific conclusions that will lead to action."

Cohen said an action team on personnel issues, co-chaired by Susan Jona and Jody Kaufman Loewenstein, has been meeting with CIJE consultants to review the survey's findings and develop a comprehensive plan which addresses issues raised in the sur-

The team's plan will be prosented to the steering committee of the Commission on Visions and Initiatives in Jewish Education, then to the Milwaukee Jewish Federation's Agency Relations Committee and finally to the federation board.

It's time to help teachers

There's good and bad news in a recent survey of Milwaukee's Judaic teachers (see p. 1). The good is that our teaching force is judged among the best, most dedicated and stable in the country. The bad is that if our Jewish community's educational apparatus is one of the best, Jewish education in America needs significant improvement.

The survey, commissioned by the Council on Initiatives in Jewish Education, presents some alarming statistics. Only 30 percent of full time teachers (30 hours per week or more) are offered benefits such as health insurance and pensions. Only 19 percent of all Judale teachers carn more than \$20,000 per year.

Most are trained either in education or Judaic studies — but rarely in both. Although Milwaukee Judaic teachers have more formal Jewish education than the average U.S. Jewish adult, they are not well educated in their field compared to other types of teachers. Pre-school Judaic teachers often are not Jewish. And while the part-time nature of Jewish education fits the needs of many teachers (half teach less than 10 hours per week), there is a need to increase the proportion of full-time teachers in order to improve professional standards.

Our teachers and principals have known these facts for years. This survey turns teacher-lounge conversation into data that they and we hope will stimulate change. With the help of this study, and similar ones to be conducted in Atlanta and Baltimore, local models can be tested to solve educational problems besetting every U.S. Jewish community. For example, Jewish educators could form a professional pool, first locally, then nationally, to buy health insurance collectively. And communities could develop or increase ad hoc enrichment programs for teachers, or create resources to finance university-level course work.

In cooperation with CIJI, Milwaukee Jewish Federationsponsored committees are exploring such practical measures that help teachers without imposing a particular ideology. This makes good business sense and is the "Jewish" thing to do. Our students deserve highly qualified teachers. And our teachers deserve decent wages, benefits and respect.

A Sense Of Priorities

Fund Jewish education not identity, seminary chancellor tells UJA-Federation.

iamesha Lake, N.Y. — The chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America termed as "wrong-headed" UJA-Federation's decision to fund new programs for enhancing Jewish identity rather than using the money to train youngsters to become Jewish educators.

Citing statistics that he said point to a "pervasive lack of competent Jewish personnel in all areas of Jewish communal life," Rabbi Ismar Schorsch said that in 1989 barely 100 students graduated from all programs in Jewish education, excluding those under ultra-Orthodox auspices. But at the same time there were 30,000 positions in Jewish education, 5,000 of them full-time.

"Our ranks are very thin," said Rabbi Schorsch. "We don't have a lot of people out there qualified to do what the community needs. If we produce the right personnel, programing will follow ... [and] synagogues and federations will employ them."

The chancellor said during an interview at the 94th convention here of the Conservative movement's Rabbinical Assembly that he recently wrote to Marvin Lender, cochairman of the Council of Jewish Federation's Commission on Jewish Identity and Continuity, suggesting that federations annually set aside \$10 million in fellowships. He said it would be to train 300 youngsters each year in the rabbinate, cantorate, Jewish education, Jewish social work and specialized programs.

Lender said the suggestion would be considered, according to Rabbi Schorsch.

The rabbi observed that the federations' approach to dealing with the problem of internarriage and Jewish continuity is "still in the formative stage. I don't see a shifting of money or priorities."

He took issue also with the "federation world coming to synagogues with a self-righteous tone, saying we're going, to tell you how to run your synagogues. They [federations] just woke up and now they're going to tell them what to do. That is pure arrogance."

And Rabbi Schorsch said he believes that what UJA-Fed-

fund 15 or 20 new programs to strengthen Jewish identity is "not sufficient and is wrong-headed. That's why I'm arguing for personnel and not programing. To effect change Iyou don't usel the buckshot approach of giving \$20,000 here and \$35,000 there. You have to put more people into the field."

John Ruskay, executive director of education and community services for UJA-Federation, said in a telephone interview that "recruiting first-rate people into the field of Jewish education is more complex than simply increasing scholarship money. Some of the major foundations involved in funding Jewish educators find it very difficult to increase the number of people going into the field."

He said Rabbi Schorsch's "view of the personnel issue is quite sound." But Ruskay took sharp issue with the chancellor's criticism of the funding program now being implemented.

"We are not approaching the synagogue community and telling them or anyone else what to do," said Ruskay. "On the contrary, for the first time UJA-Federation is offering money to synagogues to enable them to undertake initiatives which synagogue lay and professional leaders developed to strengthen their own institutions. In this new partnership we hope to demonstrate that synagogues can become even stronger and more effective institutions for Jewish living, for Jewish commitment and for Jewish education."

training Jewish professionals who will instill in young people a pride in their Jewish heritage from the time they are toddlers. This will help to counter the growing rate of intermarriage, which is now nearly 50 percent among American Jews

In his address to the convention, Rabbi Schorsch pointed out that "there is no house in American Jewry that is unaffected [by intermarriage]. "It's not their children, it's our children. This is a plague that is affecting all of us, and the survival of American Jewry will depend on how we successfully respond to it."

He told the rabbis that "after our children intermarry it is our obligation to love them more, not less. They did not marry out because they hate us [but because of] social forces. We shall never succeed in getting them to return [to Judaism] if we break the relationship."

Rabbi Avis Miller, chair of the R.A.'s keruv (outreach) commission, said she believes too little attention has been given to the children of Jewish fathers and non-Jewish mothers who are invariably raised as non-Jews. She said she has found that many of them are "intrigued by their Jewish heritage and are just waiting for us to put our hand out. They are yearning for a spiritual connection."

Rabbi Schorsch said the Conservative movement is in a unique position to encourage conversions to Judaism. Unlike Conservative Judaism, which considers only children of Jewish mothers to be Jewish, the Reform movement considers them Jewish if either the father or mother is Jewish.

And Orthodox Judaism, he said, frightens people into Reform Judaism by demanding that they be converted by an Orthodox rabbi or face difficulties if they try to move to Israel.

The R.A.'s new president, Rabbi Alan Silverstein of Caldwell, N.J., vowed to mobilize the Conservative movement to stem the tide of rising intermarriage. It's a "battle we can win," he said.

Rabbi Silverstein implored his colleagues to "roll up their sleeves in this effort."



AMERICAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO THE JOINT AUTHORITY FOR JEWISH/ZIONIST EDUCATION - WORKING COMMITTEE MINUTES DECEMBER 14, 1993

In attendance: Alvin Schiff, Chairman, Robert Abramson, Aaron Eldar, Zev Machnai, Uzi Narkis, Udi Praver, Rari Shemiak, Elliot Spack, Jonathan Woocher. Staff: Daniel Allen, Zelig Chinitz Observer: Fred Green

Dr. Schiff opened the meeting by noting that Rabbi Israel Miller has made a wonderful recovery from his recent surgery. He also noted with sadness the passing of Mendel Kaplan's mother and of his mother in law this past week.

Dr. Schiff gave a Dvar Torah relating Hanukkah to our Council's work. There is a relationship between the manner of lighting Hanukkah candles and learning. We light candles according to the school of thought of Hillel - Mosif vs-holech - increasing the number of candles each night. The idea of "increasing" is underscored by Hillel in another vein in the Ethics of the Fathers. "He who does not increase his/her knowledge, decreases it."

Knowledge, Dr. Schiff noted, does not remain static. If it is not reinforced, it diminishes by the sheer force of human forgetting. The same thing is true regarding the affective domain. A person's attitude towards an idea or activity requires engoing reinforcement, or else it, too, wanes.

We have a unique opportunity through Jewish Zionist education to help reinforce both the cognitive and affective domains concerning Jewish life, Zionism and Israel - to increase Jewish knowledge and strengthen attitudes towards Jewishness and Israel.

On another level, it is important to provide Jewish Zionist experience to Jewish youth and adults. Indeed, according to Magillat Antiochus which parallels other historic accounts of Hanukkah, Antiochus was bothered most by the Jews' observance of Sabbath, Rosh Hodesh, Brit Millah and Kashrut because he knew that doing was a condinal characteristic of Jewish tradition and continuity. Experience is a powerful teaching tool. In this regard, we have unique educational opportunities through the provision of Israel experience for individuals and families.

Our threefold goal is to 1) make possible the acquisition and increase of Jewish Zionist knowledge, 2) to help develop positive Jewish Zionist attitudes, and 3) to help provide quality Israel experiences.

I. Committee Reports

<u>Jerusalem 3,000</u>. Dr. Elliot Spack, chairman, reported on recent meetings of the committee. The notion of Jerusalem 3,000 being

accepted on the larger American Jewish community agenda is gaining ground. UJA and CJF have both indicated that they would cooperate in bringing this issue to the community. To that end, the AAC will circulate a letter to the American Jewish leadership in order to create a broad coalition. The hope is to have a meeting of all those interested at the CJF quarterly in April. This will enhance the advocacy and promotion areas of Jerusalem 3,000. (Note: Subsequent to the meeting Dr. Schiff agreed to delay the AAC note to leadership in order to coordinate this effort in early January with the Conference of Presidents effort regarding Jerusalem 3,000.)

The area of programming and educational input continues to lag behin! Dr. Spack suggested that the only way to really flesh out ideas in order to present them to JAJZE would be for him to consult with various people one on one. Dr. Abramson pointed out that the problem is that there is no consultative/collaborative process. If JAJZE has a budget for Jerusalem 3,000, and if there is a desire to be collaborative and consultative with the American Jewish educational community in particular, then there needs to be a process not merely a system of initiatives and responses.

THE WORKING COMMITTEE URGES JAJZE TO HAVE SUCH COLLABORATIVE PROCESS WITH THE AMERICAN JEWISH COMMUNITY. This process would mean that JAJZE staff and other persons in Jerusalem working on this project should come to the U.S. for consultation. The AAC Jerusalem committee would arrange for a day long consultation (possibly two consultations in two places). The consultations should include a select group of teachers, school principals, AAC members, bureau personnel and shlichim.

The Working Committee was unanimous in requesting a serious consultative process with JAJZE.

Rafi Sheniak discussed the plans of the mishlachat. He indicated that each department would do some of its own activities as well as collectively co-sponsor a Jerusalem 3,000 contest. Several members of the Working Committee were surprised that a decision had been made about such activity, particularly a contest, without first discussing it with the Jerusalem 3000 committee and the Working Committee. It was strongly noted by the working committee that collaboration and consultation should happen before a decision is made on program not after the fact.

The discussion focused on the lack of a priori knowledge and process between the departments and the Working Committee here in the U.S. on the work of the departments. The departments responded that they could not stop their work and planning in order to consult with the Working Committee and council. (This issue in another form will be discussed later. See notes on program review)

Habrew Committee. Carol Diament, Chair, was not present. Daniel Allen reported on the recent committee meeting. The committee met on December 7, 1993. The level of senior Hebrew language experts in attendance or who had been in communication with Dr. Diament was impressive. Several decisions were made.

- 1) There should be no stop in the current work of the departments with regard to Hebrew. This was a statement in response to a discussion of the Hebrew Language Committee paper from 1992 with regard to Hebrew and curriculum development. (Statement attached)
- 2) There is no need for JAJZE or the AAC to do research on the teaching of Hebrew. It was agreed that there is a need for strengthening the preservice and inservice assistance to Hebrew teachers.
- 3) No projects currently underway should be frozen.
- collect materials on the teaching of Hebrew.
- 5) It is important, as advocacy, to have a senior, respected Federation lay leader become the chairman of a committee to advocate for Hebrew in the United States. Dr. Aviva Barzel will assist Daniel Allen in this search.
- 6) Hebrew materials need to pay special attention to the cultural needs of the American Jewish community. The secular and general life functioning types of stories associated with most Hebrew material from Israel is not useful in the U.S.
- 7) Some quastions concerning Hebrew language instruction will be added to the inventory questionnaires.

Inventory Committee. Simon Schwartz, Chairman. In the absence of the chairman and research consultant, Daniel Allen presented a brief report. The process of developing the questions and questionnaires will be completed and prepared for final approval of the committee on January 18, 1994. The questionnaires will be ment to the various categories of respondents the first of February It is hoped that the general analysis - mapping - of Jewish/Zionist education will be initially completed by April. The more in-depth analysis and program review should begin at that point. The committee is gratified that the project is moving along so quickly. Nathan Kruman is to be congratulated for his efforts. The committee also wondered out loud if all of the work, especially the more in-depth program pieces can be accomplished in one year.

There was no report from the Shillchut Committee. Its activity is ongoing.

II. Program Review

Jonathan Woocher began this part of the meeting with fundamental questions: What is the reason that after a budget is passed the Advisory Councils are then asked their opinion? Why weren't the program proposals sent to the councils before the budget process? This would allow for comment and even collaboration. A consultative process before the budgeting is serious and shows respect for a council's ability to comment. A process after the fact is not useful. It was also pointed out that even though the descriptions of the programs were neighbor. And process had in fact been budget would come; even if the budget requests had in fact been budgeted. The entire discussion focused on the fundamental issue of the role of advisory councils.

If there is a real desire to have a two way street between councils and the Commission this kind of process of program review is not the way to do it.

It was agreed that for this set of programs three things would happen. 1) A serious review, with back up material provided in advance, would occur at the January 5, 1994 meeting. Three programs are to be reviewed: Ma'apilim, Teacher In-Service Training, and Non-Formal Hebrew Teaching. 2) Comments on all other programs will be heard at the January 5, 1994 meeting. These comments along with the reviews will be sent to the Commission and presented to the full Council at the end of January. 3) The Working Committee will bring to the council a plan for approval of how the process of program development and review should take place in the U.S. The Working Committee will ask that the Council approve the plan as the advice of the Council to the Commission.

Good and Welfare

Several members suggested that it is time to review the membership of the Working Committee and the council. Membership was not to be permanent. Several people felt that the work load of the Working Committee and other committees was starting to be a burden. The Council needs more lay representatives from the federation system. All of these concerns will be addressed by the chairman and staff in order to bring back recommendations to the Working Committee, Council and the UIA, and Zionist community in the U.S., the cosponsors of the American Advisory Council.

I very much enjoyed meeting with you on Wednesday to discuss your organization's computing needs. Based on our discussion, I have presented below my recommendations for enhancing your current level of automation.

Current Situation

Although based in Cleveland, CIJB will be establishing a New York presence by leasing space in JCCA's office at 13 Bast 26th Street. Initially, there will be three executives and one support staff, each being located in separate offices or work areas. All membership, billing and accounting functions will be handled in Cleveland. The emphasis on computing in New York will be primarily in the following areas: word processing, mailing list management (including grants tracking), electronic mail, and fax.

A strong preference for IBM compatible systems exists due to a number of factors including the issue of compatibility with current DOS-based laptops, experience of each user in the IBM environment and compatibility with the Cleveland office. Each of the three executives to be based in New York currently uses different word processing software. Alan uses Microsoft Word; Gall uses WordPerfect and Barry uses Xywrite.

Requirements

All four individuals require access to a computer while in the office. Alan, Gall and Barry each require a laptop or portable computer for work outside of the office. When in the office, each person requires access to a letter quality printer. The ability to share documents, forms, and (in the future) a database would also be desirable. Without an inhouse computer manager, CIJE requires a system that is easily used and maintained; one that is powerful and flexible yet without the complexity of some "higher-end" systems.

Software requirements include standard word processing for letters, memos and other correspondence. The word processing software should also have the capacity for basic page layout/design for newsletters. Training time is a critical issue in that the users will not have a great deal of time to spend learning new software. Where possible, the Vord and/or Xywrite keystroke commands. A Tative.

Office Set up

1. Telephone system

As it turns out getting a phone system is quite a thing! I have spent much time talking with the company that JCCA uses to do the setup. JCCA has kindly let us have use of 4 telephones that they own which they use for backup, so we don't have to buy the actual phones. If they need to use these in case of a broken instrument, I imagine we will have to buy something on our own, but in the meanwhile, this is a minor item.

The phone set-up has three elements-- a physical set up, a connection to NY telephone, and an optional element for "Automated Attendant":

1) Basic set up using the JCCA people (Central Business Systems):

Trunk card added to JCCA system \$950

Modem cable setup (using 2 instead of 4) 90 per line= 380

Fax cable setup 190

Reprogramming 4 phone instruments 180x4= 720

Reprogramming 4 phone instruments $180x4 = \frac{720}{2240}$

This also gives us voice mail: each person will have his/her own voice mail box, plus an office "box."

2) In addition basic set up by NY Telephone is required plus monthly charge:

To set up 7 numbers (4 numbers plus fax plus 2 modems) 406

Plus (!) personnel charge of \$129 per ist hour plus \$41

for each additional 1/2 hour (even if we already have the jacks)

Plus a security deposit of \$300 per 7 lines= \$2100 (perhaps we can get around this by using the JCCA credit rating?)

The monthly per line fee is around \$23 per line= \$161 per month. We also have to choose a long distance carrier. Does Premier have a policy?

3) Central Business Systems can set up our phones with an Automated Attendant. This is different from voice mail, which we get with the setup in #1 above. Automated Attendant is the system by which a call that comes in get routed to the correct extension by going through a menu: "You've reached the CIJE. If you want to speak to Gail Dorph, please press 201; if you want to speak to Barry Holtz, please press 202, etc." The call then goes to the correct person or to the person's voice mail if the person isn't there.

The big advantage in a set up like ours is that with a parttime secretary, calls that come in can be routed to the right person if the secretary is not there. Otherwise, one of us will be answering the phone for the whole office. In the setup of #1 above there will be one CIJE number plus extensions unless we set up a separate "private" number. Let's say I'm in the office alone. No secretary is on. I have to pick up the phone whenever it rings in that case since I won't have an individual number just for me (unless we set that up, which we could.) Automated Attendant is a very good thing but it costs a lot to set up: \$3200 (and that uses JCCA's main system—we buy 2 ports to connect us) It's not a thing we can take with us to another office.

We can choose to add this whole feature at a later time if we wish.

2. Plain paper Fax machine

I have been in touch with the person that the JCCA uses. The JCCA leases their fax machine, a Pitney Bowles plain paper fax, with a three year lease. All service is included with that lease. The machine we have spoken about (similar to the JCCA machine) costs about \$80 per month. The advantage of going this route is that we get a high quality machine (it sells for around \$3000) and service included. This machine has about 10-15 pages of memory and hence can send faxes of reasonable size (such as to Israel) after hours.

The other way to go would be to buy a fax machine for the office. We could buy a less advanced machine probably for around \$1000 to \$1200 with a service contract for around \$175 per year. This would be an ink-jet (not Laser) machine which is cheaper to run. It doesn't have a real memory for "send later from memory" function. Of course that send later function does save you money especially on faxes to Israel, but we tend to send fewer faxes thanks to e-mail. A third option would be to buy a laser Fax with such a memory, but one not as advanced as the Pitney Bowles. This would probably go for around \$2000. I am leaning toward the leasing method, but it's not a clear cut yes.

If we go the leasing method, we will need to fill out a credit reference form unless JCCA will agree to be billed for this directly and have their name on the lease.

3. Computers

As we agreed I have met with a consultant, Steve Jacobson of Jacobson Consulting, for an analysis of our computer needs. His recommendations are enclosed. Let me sum up the issues:

There is a wide range of possibilities and issues to deal with. The first question is how many computers to buy. Certainly we need one for the secretary and ideally we would have three others, one for each of us. There are other alternatives: we could buy one for the secretary and two additional machines, on the assumption that you (Alan) don't need a machine sitting there in the office. Another issue is a laptop for Gail: She is currently using her own personal laptop (mine belongs to CIJE) and I think she would prefer a CIJE laptop, expecially since hers is fairly heavy.

(I don't think Gail and I are so keen on shlepping our laptops into the office every day, but of course that would be another option: one for the secy and no additional machines.)

The second question, somewhat related to how many to buy, is should we create a "peer to peer" ("local") network for the office (LAN in computerese). In such a case we buy one fairly heavy duty machine (c.\$2000) and the rest as somewhat less fancy machines (\$1300). The big machine is the "server" in which all the programs and data reside more or less and the other machines become "workstations." We are fortunate that JCCA has installed wiring throughout the offices, so setting up the network would not be as expensive as it usually is. Networks have pluses and minuses:

Plus: a) it's somewhat cheaper in terms of hardware and software; b) it allows everyone to share the same files-- like a data base or reports or letters. c) it allows the office to easily share a printer and modems.

Minus: a) if the server goes down the other machines may also be out of commission. b) none of us has ever been on a network and we'd have to learn how it's done-- it is different. c) do we really need to share and work on the same materials so much?

Without a network we definitely have a problem in all of us using the printer. We probably would have to actually take diskettes and bring them to the machine that the printer is connected to. Setting up printer cables through the JCCA wiring is expensive and difficult. And I don't think they would want us running loose wires around the offices. In addition Steve Jacobson (the computer consultant) said that having a network would allow us to share use of modems.

The computer guy was very pro-network. But we should be aware that it is something you can add later, especially since the wiring is already in place.

He also recommends that we standardize the word processing program that we all use and that the machine be in the "Windows" rather than dos environment, it being the w y that computers are headed. I agree with that assessment, even though I've never used Windows before.

I. OBJECTIVE

To provide guidelines for approving additions to staff.

II. SCOPE

The guidelines within this policy are meant to apply to individuals who are hired as staff for any project or ongoing program.

III. POLICY

- A. An employment agreement in the form of a letter must be issued. During an interim period, the chair of the CIJE will be the operations approver of any employment agreement. Before completing the hire of a full or part time employee, there must be both an employee agreement and a completed Personnel/Payroll Record (MAF 301).
- B. Employment agreements will be established for a fixed period of time. The specific responsibilities of the position should be documented.
 - The salary and benefits arrangements should be clearly stated.
 - Arrangements and timing for performance appraisal will be included.
- C. Any renewal of the employment agreement or changes to terms (e.g., financial arrangements) will be handled by completing a new Personnel/Payroll Record (MAF 301).
- D. A proposal for health benefits will be submitted, listing all benefits to be provided, and the total cost to MAF, as proposed.#

MAJE's relationship to the Project. A step taken to give MAJE a more prominent role was the inclusion of a MAJE professional as a Steering Committee member. This step did not satisfy all involved in leading the Project. Although it gave MAJE a more prominent role than any other institution, MAJE was not invited to be a full partner with the Federation in the Lead Community Project. Contention among the Core Planning Group has prevailed over the issue of whether or not a MAJE leader should be a member of their group. They resolved this issue by giving a MAJE leader a prominent role as a member of the Personnel Issues Task Force's Planning Group. Although this MAJE leader does not co-chair this Task Force, the MAJE leader is involved in all the planning meetings. The Core Planning Group rationalizes this compromise because MAJE's organizational mission is the professional development of personnel whereas not all Lead Community Project activities concern professional development.

The relationship between MAJE and the Lead Community Project has required constant nurturing and negotiating. Issues that created tension were: the working relationship between the professionals representing the two organizations; the Lead Community Project's role in long-range planning and MAJE's developing its own organizational long-range plans; potential overlap between MAJE's family educator's course and the Lead Community Project's Family Education Think Tank. All three issues have been worked through by individual and small group meetings and conversations.

CIJE Board Committee on Content and Program

Definition and Purposes

The Committee on Content and Program will deal with the contents, methods and evaluation of the educational program areas of the CIJE work. In specific the Committee will address two major CIJE projects currently underway, the Best Practices Project and the Goals Project. As the CIJE extends its scope, other projects concerning educational program will also become part of the Committee's focus. The Committee will serve as the forum to discuss the progress of these projects, to explore significant issues that emerge from the work and to recommend program and policy choices to the Board.

The meetings of the Committee will serve three purposes: a) to inform the members of the Committee about the CIJE efforts in these areas, increasing the knowledge of Committee members; b) to gain advice from the Committee members about issues of policy and priority; c) to suggest new project areas for CIJE exploration.

The Best Practices Project is an effort to document exemplary models of Jewish educational work and to use these examples for improving the quality of Jewish education in the field. The project is directed by Dr. Barry Holtz (Jewish Theological Seminary of America).

The Goals Project is an effort to foster an understanding of the critical role that Vision, Goals and Objectives play in Jewish education and to collaborate with local communities to translate these leadership qualities into communal practice. The project is directed by Dr. Daniel Pekarsky (University of Wisconsin). The Goals Project coordinates its work closely with a long-term research enterprise of the Mandel Institute in Jerusalem called "The Educated Jew Project." This project invites leading Jewish thinkers to articulate their respective visions of an educated Jew and then to work with educators to translate their visions into terms that will make them usable in educational settings.

Possible Activities of the Committee

Best Practices Project The Committee will:

- a) Review reports of the findings of the Best Practices Project
- b) Hear the best practices researchers describe their work
- c) Hear best practices practitioners discuss their educational programs
- d) Visit selected best practices sites

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Following these inputs, the Committee will:

- a) Evaluate issues arising the the documentation of best practices (e.g. how should they be documented? what models currently exist, if any, for documentation, etc.)
- b) Discuss issues that relate to the implementation of best practices to new settings (questions of "replication", educational projects that emerge out of best practices work, etc.)
- c) Discuss "new practices" that deal with similar issues
- d) Discuss other possible expansions of the Best Practices Project, e.g.:
 - --evaluation of "best practitioners";
 - -- project on best practices of the past;
 - -- compilation of biographies of leaders from best practices sites, etc.

The Goals Project

The Committee will:

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- a) Learn about the aims and method of the Goals Project
- b) Discuss issues related to goals in Jewish education
- c) Explore the "Educated Jew Project" and its relationship to Goals project
- d) Hear presentations by writers of the Educated Jew Project
 - e) Discuss issues related to moving from Goals to action
 - f) Hear presentations by representatives of educational institutions that are characterized by "vision-drivenness"
 - g) Visit such institutions

Committee on Content and Program Biographies of Staff April 21, 1994

Barry W. Holtz is Senior Education officer and Director of the Best Practices
Project of the Council for Initiatives in Jewish Education (CIJE). He is an
Associate Professor of Jewish Education at the Jewish Theological Seminary of
America and for the past thirteen years has been the Co-director of the
Seminary's Melton Research Center.

He received his undergraduate education at Tufts University and his Ph.D. from Brandeis University. Dr. Holtz was the editor of most of the volumes of the Melton Graded Curriculum Project, a set of teacher's guides and related materials used widely in North America. As author and editor, his books include: Finding Our Way: Jewish Texts and the Lives We Lead Today (Schocken Books, 1990), Back to the Sources: Reading the Classic Jewish Texts (Simon and Schuster, 1984) and, most recently, The Schocken Guide to Jewish Books (1992).

Daniel Pekarsky is Professor and former Chairperson in the Department of Educational Policy Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He did his doctoral work at Harvard University, where he specialized in philosophy of education. In addition to work he has done as a Jewish educator in congregational and other settings, he has also been involved over the years in the education of Jewish educators.

In 1987-88, he served on the faculties of the Jerusalem Fellows and of the Melton Center for the Study of Jewish Education in the Diaspora at the Hebrew University. More recently, he took an extended leave from the University of Wisconsin in order to direct the Cleveland Fellows Program at the Cleveland College of Jewish Studies.
