Rabbi Reacts

Overnight summer camp is a great place for kids to go to grow. At camp, kids learn how to swim, boat, horseback ride, play sports, or play an instrument. They can dabble in photography, music, dance or art. They meet kids from other places and develop new friendships. They gain independence being away from home.

Jewish camp is an even better place for our kids to grow. At a Jewish camp our kids recite prayers before and after the meals, they sing Jewish songs, they Israeli-dance, they lean Hebrew, they pray in a community every day and every Shabbat – all with great enthusiasm and spirit. In a nurturing atmosphere our kids learn to love their Judaism. Being Jewish becomes a positive and an important part of their identity.

OSRUI is an especially great place for our kids to go, because it combines both of the above. (See inside the Bulletin for 1994 attendees and pictures.)

This summer, I spent two weeks at OSRUI with the arts unit, Tiferet. I can highlight many high points, including climbing to the top of the alpine tower (no pun intended) and singing and dancing with the entire camp on Shabbat. This one peak, however, completely combines the "regular" and Jewish camp experience.

It was my turn to be with the dance studio. In Tiferet we were studying the Song of Songs. The dance instructor suggested we take steps and leaps like gazelles. We positioned our hands above our ears like antlers; we stepped; we leapt. The drum music beat in the background. Then words from Song of Songs came to me, and I sprang out from the group and recited to the beat of the drum, "Hark! My beloved!/ There he comes,/ Leaping over mountains,/ Bounding over hills./ My beloved is like a gazelle/ Or like a young stag." (2:8-9)

Those dancers were no longer just dancing, and we weren't just studying Bible text. We were living Torah; we were dancing Judaism.

OSRUI is not an unfamiliar term at BJBE. Many of us have been there: as campers, on staff, for adult and family retreats, and more. The summer seems far away, but June, July, and August are not the only times for us to take advantage of this wonderful Jewish space. BJBE offers a time and a place for everyone at OSRUI. Mark your calendars:

President's Corner

I spent a lot of time this summer doing what I do best: reading. I chased more spies and solved more mysteries than the Mossad and the FBI combined. I visited foreign countries, met intellectual giants, and tried cases in a variety of local and federal courts. I managed to be a Jew of the Biblical period, a heroine in the Warsaw ghetto, and an Orthodox Israeli in search of self. Reading for pure relaxation is so easy. Your mind can wander or stay focused. You can read straight through to the end of a chapter or stop after a page. No one tells you what to read or when to do it. You are on your own. It's wonderful!

How different is leisure reading from the experience of reading Gates of Repentance as we did during the recent High Holyday period. In this type of reading, someone tells you when and where you are to begin your reading and then to which page you go next. You are told what to read aloud and when to read silently. At certain times, one becomes a passive participant as the rabbis or speakers read the words or the choir sings them for us. Even your posture is other-directed: stand up, sit down, face the ark, bow your head.

Reading in a service is so difficult. You know you are supposed to stay focused, you want to stay focused, but your own thoughts and concerns intrude. You say the words that are on the page, but sometimes they aren't the words you want. At times you don't even know what you've read because the page must be turned or the next reader is about to begin to speak. And yet, while it seems that the words of prayer are sacrificed in order for there to be communal worship, I don't believe that to be all bad.

A book is a concrete object, and that which is in the book today will be in the book forever. If we forgot what we read, we can go back and retrieve the thought. If we were provoked or inspired by the words, we can go back for reinforcement. But the hallmarks of communal worship—a sense of community, the being there with hundreds of others in our temple family, the realization that you are doing what millions of other Jews are doing at that time—carry more power than any written word. Using our auditory skills as Rabbis Shapiro and Memis challenge our thinking with their sermons, allowing the music of the service to transport us, these are experiences that must be savored firsthand. Communal worship, an act of faith, allows us that.

I suppose as a congregational Jew I have the best of both worlds, for shortly after Yom Kippur and having been a part of the community, it has become my practice to turn to Gates of Repentance and read, just read, this compilation of modern poetry, ancient liturgy, and timeless Torah all by myself. I am free to read it at my leisure, go back to the parts I particularly like, absorb the intent of the writer, and respond in a more individual, personal manner. So if you're looking for something new, pick up Gates of Repentance. It's a terrific "read."


