THE CANTOR'S MESSAGE

As we approach the High Holy Days we have much about which to think.

There is still war in Europe, along with the "ethnic cleansing" that is so reminiscent of the bad days of the 1930's. Skinheads and neo-Nazis roam the streets of Germany and prowl the cities and countryside here in the United States. We have witnessed various attempts to derail the Israeli, Arab and Palestinian peace talks: acts of violence followed by further acts of violence. Mayhem in our towns and cities seems to be an uncontrollable problem with the easy availability of military weapons a major contributing factor, and the weakness of the Congress to withstand the money of the lobbyists a constant threat to the internal security of our nation. We have seen the wrenching emotions of a child returned to biological parents who had not raised them, the anguish of adoptive parents from whom their child was removed. and the grief of parents denied access to their child who had been switched at birth. And there have been rains and floods throughout the Midwest: we have seen the devastation they have wrought. We have seen two doctors shot, one of them fatally, for being willing to perform legal abortions and we have heard preachers, and recently a Catholic priest, call the killing justifiable - and even call for more of the same. The

rolls of the hungry and the homeless have grown in this wealthiest nation on the face of the earth. We have heard the words of the misguided try to tell us that all of it is the punishment of an angry God. It goes on and on; the list seems to expand daily. And we ask ourselves: "Is there any hope?"

This is a prime reason for the High Holy Days: to fill ourselves once again with hope in the future, with hope that there will be a future. When we come to worship and pray together we must focus on the fact that there is hope.

We have all we need to bring about a better world. We have faith with which to strengthen ourselves. We have our minds with which to devise solutions to the ills of our time. We have our hands to do the work that is needed. We have been taught:

> "You are not required to complete the work, but neither are you free to abstain from it."

And those words, first spoken by Rabbi Tarfon more than two thousand years ago, instruct us even today.

This Rosh Hashanah, let's resolve to bring our faith, our minds and our hands together to work at the task of building a better world. We are people of God; we have committed ourselves to do no less.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

According to our tradition, we greet each other on Rosh Hashana with the wish, "May you be inscribed [in the book of life] for a good year" and on Yom Kippur with "May you end this day with a good signature [in the book of life]." Those are the wishes that the Board of Trustees extends to each of you. May the year ahead truly be sweet and be one of achievement, caring, and forgiveness.

We wish our Temple a good year as well. It is significant that September 19, the Sunday between the High Holidays, marks the first day of Religious School. A special committee of Penny Berger, Rick Meyer, and Suzanne Kalish, working with Cantor Weisser and school administrator, Bobbi Brooks, have put together an exciting curriculum and a talented and energetic teaching staff. One goal we have set for this year is greater parent in-Religious and Hebrew School volvement. parents soon will be receiving a letter detailing ways in which they can be more involved in their children's religious education. fact, the whole Congregation is invited to participate in making the Temple on Sunday mornings a place where we can all come together to participate with our students in a brief religious service and to have coffee, juice, and bagels. With your help, it will indeed be a sweet year for the Religious School.

Yom Kippur ends with the longest, loudest sound of the shofar. It is a sound full of hope for the new year. Shanah tovah. See you in Temple.

SHALOM FROM HASTINGS

Marsha Just reminded me that the deadline for the September Bulletin is upon us, and it is my turn to write this column.

We have had a very busy month in August with our normal work and other outside activities, not only here in Hastings but around the State of Nebraska.

Several weeks ago we had the pleasure of hosting a party in our home for six Jewish couples from Lincoln as well as some friends from Hastings. I always get the feeling that it is a greater effort for our Lincoln friends and relatives to make the 100 mile trip to Hastings than it is for us to make the hour and a half trip into Lincoln. Some of our guests remarked that they have a greater appreciation for our coming to Lincoln as often as we do. I told them,in this day and time in the 1990's, the trips are so easy, as compared to the days of my childhood in the 1920's and 1930's. I recall the ride being from three to four hours on narrow two-lane gravel roads known as the old D. L. D. Highway (now U.S. 6 paved). Cars seldom had heaters for winter driving and air-conditioning was a thing to come in the future. Today we travel on a beautiful I-80 and the Tom Osborne Expressway, all four lanes, between Hastings and Lincoln in comfort, playing our AM/FM radios, tapes, CDs and visiting with people all over the country on cellular telephones as we speed along in our cars. The grandchildren would describe this as being "a piece of cake." Of course, during the winter months, the trips become more difficult when the Huskers play football during a snow or sleet storm--but, we always seem to make the trips safely and well with God's help.

One week ago we attended a beautiful wedding in Omaha. During the long weekend we had occasion to be in all three Omaha synagogues. I have always been interested in architecture and design of synagogues and temples all over the U.S., Europe and Israel, especially the sanctuaries within. Although all three houses of Jewish worship in Omaha are large and traditional for the most part (and much newer than our little South Street Temple) I personally feel a certain warmth, charm and feeling of home in the older Congregation B'nai Jeshurun building, which the newer buildings in Omaha seem to lack. So, I hope we can appreciate our temple and surroundings that it has to offer. We hope that each and every student will have a great year!



S'LICHOT SERVICE SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 11 11:00 P.M.

Slichot is a time of preparation for the High Holy Days. Every year, on the Saturday night before Rosh Hashanah, Jews all over the world gather in their synagogues to recite the prayers of pardon (s'lichot).

The liturgy we use at B'nai Jeshurun is one that was created by Cantor Weisser some years ago. The mood is solemn and hopeful. The late night hour helps to enhance that mood. It is truly one of the most beautiful and moving services of our entire liturgical year.

Please plan to come and help to usher in the High Holy Days this year with friends and family. We will begin on Saturday, the 11th of September, with a social time at 11:00 P.M., along with some refreshments, and continue with the S'lichot Service at 11:30 P.M.
