are placed in the HANUKIYAH from right to left. But when the candles are lit, you light from left to right. Every night during Chanukah, when the candles are lit this is the prayer: Ba-ruch ata, Adonoi E-lo-hei-nu, me-lech ha-o-lam, a-sher Ki-de-sha-nu be-mits-vo-tov, ve-tsi-va-nu le-had-lik neir shel Chanukah. Baruch ata, A-do-noi E-lo-hei-nu, ne-lech ha-o-lam, she-a-sa ni-sim las-a-vo-tei-Nu ba-ya-mim ha-heim ba-ze-man ha-zah. Ba-ruch ata, A-do-noi E-lo-hei-nu, Me-lech ha-o-lam, she-he-chya-nu ve-ki-ya-ma-nu ve-hi-gi-a-nu las-man ha-zeh. We praise you, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe: You hallow us with Your Mitzvot, and command us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe: You showed wonders to our fathers and mothers in days of old, at this season.

"Dreidel, Dreidel-I made it out of clay ... "

One of the best known symbols of Chanukah is the Dreidel. It is a foursided top with a Hebrew letter on each side. The four letters are: Shin, Hey, Gimel, Nun. These letters mean "A Great Miracle Happened There." In Israel, the dreidel is a bit dif ferent in that their letters mean "A Miracle Happened HERE!" Dreidel is also a popular game played during the holiday. Players use pennies, nuts, raisins, or chocolate coins (gelt) as tokens or chips. The player spins the dreidel. When the dreidel stops, the letter that is facing up decides the fate.



Favorite Dish for Chanukah! **Potato Latkes**

A classic potato latke - you can't go wrong with these crispy hot cakes. Serve with applesauce, sour cream and chopped green onions!

Ingredients needed: 2 cups peeled and shredded pota toes; 1 tablespoon grated onion; 3 eggs beaten; 2 tablespoons all-

purpose flour; 1- 1/2 teaspoons salt; ½ cup peanut oil.

Directions: Place the potatoes in a cheesecloth and wring, extracting as much moisture as possible. In a medium bowl stir the potatoes, onion, eggs, flour and salt to gether. In a large heavy-bottomed skillet over medium-high heat, heat the oil until Place large spoonfuls of the potato mixture into the hot oil, pressing down on them to form 1/4 to 1/2 inch thick patties. Brown on one side, turn and brown on the other. Let drain on paper towels. Serve hot! Makes 10 to 12 latkes (six servings).


FROM THE RABBI

As we prepare to celebrate the spirit of Chanukah, I begin to realize how fortunate we are that we can celebrate this festive occasion together, proudly professing our Judaism openly and not having to hide the fact that we are Jews.

This idea brings to mind a recent movie, "Focus", where declaring one's religion as Jewish was not socially acceptable; in fact, it was downright dangerous to do so. The movie depicts anti-Semitism as something tasteless that infects and invades, causing a division in society, something like a plague would do. The story "focuses" on the character of Lawrence Newman, a white Anglo-Saxon Protestant, a seemingly innocuous man, who wishes to go about his business in private, until one day he dons glasses which appear to change his looks so much so, that even his mother says he looks like a Jew. Where people used to welcome him, now they are sneering. He becomes a threat because of his looks. Does this sound familiar?

In these tension-filled days of sometimes suspecting our neighbors of terrorism because of their appearance, we need to clarify misrepresentations and stereotypes as well as to gain accurate information about another's faith. Sometimes what people know little about scares them and thus causes confusion, at times ending in enmity for others because they are different. It seems we are always trying to teach our children about respecting differences when we as adults should be following the examples we teach. Shalom.

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NURSERY SCHOOL

Each year as the holiday season approaches, we all become inundated with flyers filled with "stuff" to buy. Each year there's a new something that we all just must have. The companies are very smart because they first introduce this very cool toy to your children, then they make it very hard to find. I still remember getting up very early to stand in line for my daughter's cabbage patch doll. How could Chanukah come without her getting a doll? Actually that year she did do without because I wasn't crazy enough to go in the middle of the night and stand in line in a parking lot waiting for the store to open. And you know the amazing thing-she actually survived and lived to celebrate another Chanukah! We were even able to get her to smile that year!

Having said all of the above, the point of this article is to say that sometimes we need to think about what's important and exactly what messages we are sending to our children. It's a very hard decision for some of us because we want to give our children the world. It's hard knowing when to draw the line. I think we can all admit to falling under that magic spell at holiday time and purchasing the unnecessary.

As Chanukah is quickly approaching, those decisions are right at hand. Having survived many Chanukahs, I'd like to share some of what I've learned both as a parent and as a nursery school teacher. Children love presents and they don't always have to be extravagant or expensive. Children, especially young children, love simple toys that they can make come to life. Their imagination is the key and they can create a wonderful story with very few props. The toys that get the most use in nursery school are the simplest ones.

Chanukah is also a wonderful time to create family traditions that your children will remember long after the toys are lost. Make a menorah with your child out of clay or even with tile and bolts. You'll both treasure this one for years to come. Prepare special meals and have them help make potato latkes. Light the candles together, sing songs and play dreidel. Make your own wrapping paper with their handprints or even their footprints. Have the children shop for someone less fortunate and give him or her a Chanukah they'll remember as well.



Chocolate coins, dreidel and candles are everywhere. It must be the season of Chanukah. The Sunday school mini courses have been busy preparing a presentation of a Chanukah play by Debbie Friedman. The children are divided into four groups; music, art, drama and dance. The presentation will be on Sunday, December 9th. Parents are invited to bring their child to school and come to the downstairs foyer for coffee. We'll have information as well as a video on Camp Harlam also that morning.

For those of you not familiar with the Camp, the video will show you how incredible your child's camp experience can be. Camp Harlam is located in the foothills of the Pocono Mountains in Pennsylvania. The camp offers an extensive sports and recreation program combined with the experience of living Judaism.
