FROM THE RABBI

Envisioning Tomorrow II

Over the next months, I am going to provide monthly installments of Envisioning Tomorrow. We are at a crucial time in our evolution as a synagogue family. Our growth has spurred an opportunity to reassess our mission. The needs and desires of our community have continually changed and we are enthusiastically embracing the call of the future. This is an exhilarating time in the illustrious history of Congregation Beth Israel. We are at the crucible of a significant step forward.

In my January Tidings article, I shared with you a glimpse at the array of opportunities for worship and learning, culture and community that we offer at Beth Israel. I briefly explained our vision for the synagogue building, and introduced you to our imminent search for a fully invested Cantor to join us on our Jewish quest. You should know that Beth Israel has never had a Cantor. While some have used the title, no one who has served our congregation had the credentials or the investiture that accompanies a Cantor. The Hebrew Union College trains and ordains Reform Rabbis. It also trains and invests Cantors. Invested Cantors study at the seminary in a five-year postgraduate program. They are learned in Jewish ritual, history, traditions, worship, and the breadth of rabbinic texts. They are trained to bring beauty and depth of spirit to our worship, our programming, and our synagogue. They teach us and touch our lives.

It is our intention to inaugurate a Cantorial search and to have a Cantor join our family on July 1, 2002. It is a substantial financial commitment, as you can well imagine, but one that is necessary, overdue, and of great benefit to our synagogue community.

Our Board of Trustees is vigilant in protecting the fiscal integrity of Beth Israel. The expense of a Cantor will dramatically impact our budget. Therefore, to allow the Fair Share Committee the necessary time to achieve their goal, we have established a Cantor Fund to cover the expenses of the Cantor, outside of the operating budget for the first two years.

Our Sisterhood, as it has historically done, has made a major commitment to this fund. Your Board of Trustees has been the first to step up and support this Cantor Fund. We hope that you will consider joining with our Sisterhood and contributing to this fund to enable Congregation Beth Israel to rise to her challenges, to continue to be a synagogue where dreams become reality. We thank you for envisioning the future with us and for your continued generosity to our synagogue home. Your gift to the Cantor Fund is an investment in our future, even as it is a tribute to our past.

We've been jolted out of complacency by the explosion of hate and mass murder. Terrorism abounds us, but we are a strong people, a people with spirit and the will to survive and carry on. We are rebuilding our faith and hope which is what makes us move on, and here at Beth Israel, we are certainly moving on!


I am proud to be part of a congregation whose long history has included several rabbis, choirs, and cantorial soloists, but never an ordained cantor. With the addition of 200 new families to the congregation in the last 13 years, and the congregation still growing, we are in need of a cantor, a person who will have a vested interest in our community, train B'nai Mitzvah, plan temple programs for students and parents, and be an integral part of our spiritual leadership. It has always been a budgetary problem to afford this needed component to Beth Israel's leadership, and all of us must step up to the plate and financially support this new cantor fund which we are implementing at this time.

Another way we can assure that monies will be properly budgeted in this direction, leaving room for other temple expenses, is to individually examine our Fair Share commitments and raise them when appropriate. Look to become a member of the Covenant Society with a \$2500 minimum commitment. The monies we donate are not to be considered as dues but as Tzedakah.

I am asking for your financial support for Beth Israel where you and your family can be a major factor in bringing our congregation to the forefront of spirituality with an ordained cantor, our dynamic Rabbi, and an already existing respected religious school.

As we have been jolted out of our complacency, we need to examine our reasons for wanting to be a member of Beth Israel. I know when we do this, we will understand the need to support our temple and make our commitment a meaningful one.
