The music and professional singers are carefully selected by Cantor Bornstein. The Cantor and choir then rehearse long hours with our superb organist/choir mistress Lenora Thom. High Holiday honors have long been a tradition at Temple Emeth and our Ritual Chairperson coordinates this essential ingredient. With their seamless "choreography", integrating lay readers and aliyot with clergy and choir, our worship experiences flow...with warmth and dignity.

Several families, impressed last year by the beauty of our choir, enhanced by professional voices, made special contributions which enabled us to engage professional singers once again. A heartfelt thank you to these "angels"!

Similarly, the Temple was the very grateful recipient of a most generous gift in memory of a congregant's mother. This donation was given specifically to refurbish our sound system, enhancing amplification throughout the sanctuary and social hall and adding components for the hearing impaired. "Bugs" in the system could only be worked out during the actual High Holiday services, when our entire "space" was filled with people; for this we apologize. Even more, we are delighted to have been given this opportunity to meet the longfelt needs of the hearing impaired. Sincerest thanks to our generous benefactors and to the devoted volunteer who worked so hard to see this new equipment installed.

Our splendid clergy and dedicated professional staff rely on these wonderful volunteers, who are among the many "unsung heroes" who quietly and persistently toil to make our congregation so very special. Whether it be of time, money or effort, for them the joy is truly in the giving.

A few new spaces are now available for three and four year olds. Please call the office at 833-8466 for further information.


News From Our Parenting Center


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DAN KIRSCH TO BE HONORED AT ISRAEL BONDS DINNER

ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION SPEAKER SOCIAL ACTION SHABBAT NOVEMBER 30

The Social Action Committee will sponsor a showcase of its activities and programs, featuring an environmental-activist guest speaker on Friday, November 30 during Social Action Shabbat.

Dr. Harry Kisseleff of Teaneck, an expert in Jewish attitudes towards environmental protection, will deliver a talk from the pulpit during services.

An Associate Professor of Clinical Psychology in Psychiatry and Medicine at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons, Dr. Kisseleff will speak on the role of the synagogue in taking action to protect the environment.

As a member of Congregation Beth Sholom in Teaneck, he is the coordinator of "Hug Tevah" (Nature Circle), a study group which focuses on the historical and religious background of Judaic approaches towards conservation of the Earth.

Dr. Kisseleff has published articles on Judaism and the environment in many publications, both religious and secular, including The Jewish Standard.

During the Oneg Shabbat following Services, members of the Social Action Committee will provide information about the Committee's activities, including resettlement of Soviet Jews, sheltering the homeless, and feeding Bergen County's hungry.


OUTREACH CONNECTIONS - THE ROLE OF NON-JEWS IN THE SYNAGAGUE

Over the past few years most Reform synagogues have extended membership privileges to families in which one partner is not Jewish. This has enabled these families to enroll their children in our religious schools, join in communal worship and participate in the life of the congregation. As these members become more involved, Temple leaders find themselves confronted with unexpected questions- "What, if any, are the limits on participation by non-Jewish spouses in Temple life?"

For many non-Jewish spouses and parents, active participation in the Temple is their way of "trying on Judaism" and determining how comfortable they feel with a Jewish way of life. Temples are always grateful for volunteers to serve on committees, help with building the Sukkah or usher at services. Shall we let actively involved individuals who are not formally Jewish become committee members, chairs and board members? Would excluding these individuals impede their attempt to learn about and participate in Jewish life?

And what of ritual matters?.. Shall the non-Jewish parent participate in all the rituals usually reserved for parents of B'nai Mitzvah celebrants? Shall she bless the candles? Pass the Torah? Sit on the Bimah? Have an Aliyah to bless the Torah? What are the limits and how do we determine them?

Every Reform congregation will need to sensitively address these complicated issues, and develop policies that reflect the congregation's values and understandings of Jewish tradition.



While delivering our Yom Kippur collection of food to the Center for Food Action, quite happy over the increase, I faced the collection being delivered by Beth El in Closter--3 full van loads! How come? Is there no perceived need amongst Temple Emeth congregants? Let's face facts:

NJ has the third highest percapita income of all states and yet over 600,000 people are hungry at some time each month. Many are the working poor who can't earn enough to eat. As the economy recedes, even those with good jobs find themselves laid off and resources depleted. More people are depending on emergency food centers like the CFA. In the last 3 years, CFA has witnessed a 110% increase in requests for food.

The CFA receives financial support from numerous organizations including MAZON--the Jewish response to Hunger, but support largely comes from caring individuals like you.


VORSPAN TO ADDRESS REGIONAL DINNER

INTERRELIGIOUS FELLOWSHIP

We have arrived at the end of the fiscal year for the Interreligious Fellowship for the Homeless of Bergen County and we note that your Congregation has contributed \$246 since October 1, 1989. We wish to thank you at this time, not only for your concern and interest in the work of the Fellowship, but also for your financial support of our programs. Without such generous support we would be unable to carry out this joint ministry of caring which the Fellowship embodies.

This past year the IRF has continued it's three sheltering programs, the Overflow Shelter Program (OSP), the Emergency Family Shelter (EFS) and the Transitional Apartment Shelter Program (TASP). In these programs we shelter between 90-100

people each night. We have also provided furniture for families and singles moving into their own housing; we have lent \$3,500 in nointerest loans to help families from our programs pay their security deposits on apartments; and we established a Youth Council with representatives from 16 County high schools, which has provided child care in the EFS, and a special day camp for homeless children the last two weeks of August.

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VOLUNTEERS FOR ISRAEL CRGANIZE

The Israel Programs Center of United Jewish Community has announced that from March 3-24 it will participate in a local community program called "Volunteers to Israel" which sends American adults to Israel to work on Israeli military bases.

In the last eight years, more than 25,000 participants have come to Israel under the auspices of this program to help sort, store and clean parachutes, clean and fix barracks, clean weapons and weed compounds.

Volunteers receive a discounted plane fare of \$699 per person for a round trip ticket open for 180 days. They are provided with three meals a day, organized touring, home hospitality, and free weekends. The program includes spending three weeks volunteering at either army, navy or air force bases or at hospitals.

Anyone between the ages of 18 and 70 is eligible. We urge all those interested in signing up to do so as soon as possible by calling (201) 488-6800 ext. 225 or 125.



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
