#### MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

Recently, Mimi and I had occasion to revise our wills. We used that opportunity to create "Living Wills" with instructions to kin and caregivers detailing our wishes concerning heroic and extraordinary efforts to preserve life when all hope is gone. Like many of you, we see it as a vital necessity in this age of medical and technological advances.

It got me thinking about another kind of "Last Will and Testament" which one ought to set up while one is still "compos mentis", still in possession of one's mental and emotional faculties. The Jewish Tradition calls it an "Ethical Will". Pre-modern Jews were very serious about producing such wills.

Such an "ethical will" contains much the same stuff as the modern "Living Will". Like the latter, it seeks to tell children and caregivers what the writer thinks about life and its purpose, and how his or her actions through the years evinced such definitions. Like "Living Wills", it talks about the "Quality of Life", that to "live" means not just to metabolize but to give of oneself to the greater life that is God. And, it instructs. The "ethical will" instructs kin and caregivers how to behave when, to all intents and purposes, the writer's life is over. Like a "Living Will", it warns. It admonishes. It urges. It pleads with survivors to enhance the quality of life as the writer tried to do.

Thus, was a beautiful genre of Jewish literature created. And, you and I ought to contribute to that literary legacy!

To our commendable concern that our material goods be legally and properly disbursed among our inheritors, we ought to add a codicil that unambiguously details our ethical and moral stances that might benefit those who survive us. We are rightfully anxious that those who care for us should know exactly what we want from them at the apparent end of our lives when we can no longer articulate our wishes. Ought we not be equally anxious to crystallize for them our deepest thoughts and faith about the entire enterprise of having lived, of having been Jews, of Being itself?

The Hebrew word for this kind of will is "Tza-va-ah", literally, a command. It comes from the same verb (tz-v-h) as "mitzvah", a commandment. A "mitzvah", a commandment, is the Jewish opportunity to concretize an encounter with God. Isn't that what an "Ethical Last Will and Testament" ought to be: our final description of our life's encounter with the Divine?

Among the goodies that we bequeath to our children, let us leave behind an "Ethical Will", an Essence of Self.


#### SENATOR BILL BRADLEY To speak at UJC Breakfast March 8th

While we are writing to you in the dead of winter and your memories of summer's heat and humidity may be dim, we know that at a moment's notice, you will be able to recall the dreadful discomfort that we all endured throughout our High Holiday services. Indeed, two congregants collapased from the heat and many of you complained vociferously..and rightly so, about the inadequacy of our present air cooling system.

We use the term "air-cooling" not air conditioning because Temple Emeth's system uses the cooling effect of well water to reduce the temperature of the ambient air. The major problem with this system is that the temperature of the well water has risen steadily to a point where, today, it is too high to be effective. Additionally, this kind of system provides no reduction in humidity which exacerbates the discomfort. A third grave defect of the current system is the noise generated in the social hall, which interferes with one's ability to hear in that space, while the system is functioning.

Recognizing the limitations of our present system, your complaints were taken to heart by our hard-working House Committee and its chairperson, Howard Kaplan, who initiated a thorough investigation and analysis of our heating, air conditioning and ventilation systems. Professional examination revealed some minor problems in the heating system--all of which were repaired in short order before the cool weather arrived.

And now on to the air conditioning. We are fortunate to have as a member of our House Committee, Dan Leff, an engineer who's business is commercial heating, ventilation and air conditioning. Dan very kindly brought in his team to assess our needs and presented his findings to, first, the House Committee, then the Executive Board and finally the full Board.

It quickly became apparent, through his clear and detailed explanation, that renovating our present system would be a complex and lengthy project and one that would be quite costly. With all this in mind, we have appointed a sub-committee, chaired by David Paul, to further examine our options and alternatives. Our goal is to enable all of you to worship in comfort when summer comes, so time is of the essence in this undertaking. Should you have any comments or suggesitons, please communicate them to us.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE CANTOR

January 17 brought to us the joyous celebration of Shabbat Shirah, the Sabbath of Song. This Sabbath, on which Moses' victory song known as Shirat-Hayam (The Red Sea Song), is noted for its vivid imagery and beautiful poetic nature. No less powerful is its eloquent expression of the triumph of our People Israel over our Egyptian enslavers. This "song" is also chanted in a special Torah reading prescribed for the seventh day of Passover. Subsequently, Shabbat Shirah has come to mark the onset of Jewish Music Season in our country.

From these moving verses comes the famous "Who Is Like Unto Thee" - Mi Chamocha, sung during Sabbath and Festival services. Many musical settings have been offered to the text of Mi Chamocha, several, quite elaborate.

Relevant to our Judeo-Spanish awareness is the fact that Sephardic Jews chant the "Song" on every Shabbat evening. The tune used by the Sephardim is a metrical lyric melody rather than a direct rendition of the cantillation. In the Sephardic tradition, this melody has become a theme of rejoicing. There is, as well, a hymn to that melody in Judeo-Spanish (the vernacular of the Sephardim) called BENDIGAMOS. On Passover, when the Exodus from Egypt is

celebrated, Sephardic Jews chant the inspired Psalm 118 to practically the same tune. Finally, I would be remiss were I not to make mention of George Frederick Handel, whose famous oratorio, ISRAEL IN EGYPT, provides a magnificent

setting of this great biblical song of joy.
 I suspect that for us, here at Temple Emeth, this Jewish Music Season will
be the richest and most prolific one yet!

In many ways, our Religious School is a microcosm of life at Temple Emeth. This is most certainly true when our students gather in the sanctuary on Saturday and Sunday mornings to learn what it means to be part of a congregation. The purpose of these student services is to create a setting in which Jewish children not only <u>practice</u> worshipping by learning prayers, blessings, and songs, but actually experience genuine worship.

Toward this end, during the first semester of the 1991-92 school year, students in each grade planned, practiced, and led their own, unique morning services. The Kindergarten, 1st, and 2nd grades focused on Shabbat songs and showed their mastery of the Barchu and the Shema at their service on December The 3rd grade emphasized the magnificence of God's gifts, especially 14. the gift of Torah--Jewish learning--on November 9. On October 26, the 4th grade presented a sensitive and beautifully balanced Shabbat service, complete with all the key prayers, a Torah service, and some of the most beloved Shabbat music. Students in the upper grades deepened their experience of prayer with the addition of original commentaries. On December 15, the 5th grade students elaborated on the Shema, expressing their understanding of God's oneness. The 6th graders shared what it means to love God in their commentaries on the V'ahavta, part of the November 10 service. And the 7th grade class exercised their Hebrew skills, as well as demonstrating their growing familiarity with the liturgy, composing commentaries for each section of their service on October 13.

Student-led services take place from 9:30-10:00 am. For the second semester, creative services are scheduled to take place on February 29 (K-4th) and on March 1 (5th-7th). On April 26, the 7th grade will conduct services marking Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Day); and on May 3, the 5th and 6th grades will lead services for Yom HaZikaron and Yom HaAtzmaut (Israeli Memorial and Independence Days). All are welcome to join the congregation!

Services in <u>Gates of Prayer</u> include a passage from the Mishnah which lists a series of worthy deeds (pages 52, 285, and elsewhere). Along with honoring father and mother and performing acts of love and kindness, praying with sincerity is considered a deed "beyond measure." Our students are learning to pray with sincerity by bringing their hearts, minds, and creativity right up onto the bimah. We should all be very proud of them.

#### MISSION IMPOSSIBLE

We stood on the Haas Promenade overlooking the old City of Jerusalem. We looked at each other through tears and marvelled that we were really here. Just four weeks before we could not have imagined that we would be going on a Mission to Israel. It came about almost by accident. On one of our morning walks, we talked about the Mission and the fact that neither of our husbands was able to go. "I really would have liked to go", Martha said. "Me too", Betsey said. We looked at each other, "How about just the two of us going together?" We signed up barely three weeks before the trip. Neither of us had been to Israel. This was to be a truly special Mission. We each came to Israel for our own reasons: Betsey not only for herself, but for family members for whom going to Israel had been an unfulfilled dream. Martha came to affirm a part of herself.

Our first introduction to Israel was when we disembarked from the El Al jet and were greeted by a big blue and white banner that said, "Welcome to Israel" as Hatikvah played. We were overwhelmed with many feelings.

We boarded buses to a National Forest, where we each planted a small tree. It was a good feeling to know that now a part of us would always be here in this land. We toured Kibbutzim, drove through the desert and were surprised to see lush green trees and rich farmlands. We visited UJC's Project Dora, which years before had been a slum. With care and financial help, it is now a beautiful family community. Costumed Moroccan women danced for us and we were invited into their homes for dinner. It was a warm and exotic experience.

How can one describe the feeling of being at the Western Wall and touching the ancient stones our ancestors touched, walking the land our ancestors walked? That feeling could only be equalled by our visit at 4 am to Ben Gurion Airport to welcome a plane of Soviet Olim. We truly don't know who was more moved emotionally, the Olim or our group.

#### SEPHARDIC EXPERIENCE WEEKEND

The weekend of March 27-29 has been set aside for our Sephardic Weekend. Sepharad is the name by which the Jews who lived in Spain in the 1400's called their country. Their descendants have had a profound influence on Jewish life everywhere, because on March 31, 1492 King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella signed an edict expelling all the Jews from Spain. Their exodus took them to every corner of the world. The first Jews to settle in America in 1654 were descendants of these refugees. This year is the 500th anniversary of this mass migration of Jews. To commemorate this event and to learn about this aspect of Judaism we are planning a series of programs.

On Friday evening, March 27 and Saturday morning, March 28, our services will be in the Sephardic style with Sephardic music. Friday evening our Jewish Experiential Museum will open its' special photographic exhibit on "The Jewish Roots of Spain". This special display was commissioned by Iberia, Spanish Airlines. It features the work of several of their best photographers. The beautiful color pictures show some of the synagogues, cities, streets, and artifacts that were created by the Jews of Spain. They will be on display until May 6.

Saturday evening, March 28, there will be a concert of Sephardic music performed by Joe Elias and the Ladino Ensemble. These musicians from Turkey play authentic Sephardic instruments and sing old and new Sephardic folk songs. The evening will conclude with Spanish style refreshments. On Sunday morning, March 29, Brotherhood will sponsor a special breakfast program featuring Janice Levit, lecturer on the Jews of Southern Europe. Recently she has been working with the government of Spain to prepare programs for this guincentennial celebration year. Everyone is invited to join us. 

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#### MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS SOUGHT 11 FOR REFORM MOHALIM

To serve the growing need for Mohalim who are both medically competent and Jewishly sensitive to the needs of today's Jewish family, the Reform movement is seeking to train health professionals to become Reform Mohalim (ritual circumcisers). Open to male and female doctors and other medical professionals affiliated with Reform Congregations, a program consisting of 10 weekly sessions will be offered in our area beginning in mid-March.

The curriculum for the program includes historical, legal and aesthetic background of circumcision and the ritual surrounding the Brit Mila ceremony itself. In addition, participants will learn about the social and psychological implications of Brit Mila in contemporary society; educational, medical, and theological issues, and the Reform perspective on Brit Mila.


#### BOOK REVIEW GATES OF SHABBAT: A GUIDE FOR OBSERVING SHABBAT by Mark Dov Shapiro -

Celebrating Shabbat at home one of the most meaningful is affirmations of our identity as Jews. Yet many Jews feel intimidated by a ritual they may not have experienced themselves when growing up. Gates of Shabbat not only guides the reader through the ritual of Friday evening candlelighting and blessings and Saturday evening Havdalah, but goes much further to illustrate the greater possibilities of Shabbat day by defining what "work" and "rest" mean in our tradition. It offers suggestions for activities that would encourage the spirit of Shabbat observance.

The author divides the guide into three sections. The first explains the rituals and answers questions about the history and origins of our observance. The prayers and blessings are in English and Hebrew (with transliteration). Suggestions for discussions and activities during the Shabbat meal are given. The celebration of Shabbat in the synagogue is also explored. Section two provides a wonderful selection of readings and meditations that can be used to enhance home services and add variety to the traditonal prayers. Section three offers a general discussion of mitzvot and its meaning for the Reform Jew and then goes on to discuss the specific mitzvah of Sabbath observance.
