# From the Rabbi's Study

We read in *Pirke Avot* that Rabbi Shammai taught: "Make your study of *Torah keva*." What he meant is: make study a fixed (*keva*) part of your life. As with so many other things in life, if we do not make study a fixture in our routine, it is all too easy to allow ourselves to overlook it. We may value it, but unless it becomes a regular part of our routine, a habit if you will, it will likely go undone. In fact, there is something of a dispute among the Rabbis in that Rabbi Simeon, elsewhere in *Pirke Avot* states: "Do not make your prayer *keva*." Why should study be fixed and prayer not fixed? Perhaps it is in line with what Rabbi Louis Ginsberg taught: "In prayer I speak to God; when I study a Jewish text, God speaks to me." Hence, while we cannot fix when we might be ready to speak with God, we should set aside time for God to speak to us through the teachings of our tradition.

What a thrill it has been to watch so many of our members pouring in to the Temple for our programs of study. On the very first night of our Tuesday night Mini-University of Adult Studies, the classes were filled beyond our expectations. Tuesday night, Wednesday noon, Thursday morning and noon, Sunday mornings...not to mention Shabbat morning during our regular Shabbat worship...at Temple Emeth the opportunities to study our tradition with fellow Jews abound. And it is gratifying to your Rabbi and Cantor to see how much interest there is in learning about our rich heritage.

Jewish learning takes many forms. Our classes, whether Adult Education, Religious School, BARJ or ECC, are a start. It can also come in the form of reading Jewish periodicals, newspapers and books. It can come in discussing the week's Torah reading over the dinner table (and there will be more to come on this the months ahead.) It can come when a parent takes time to sit with his or her child as they return from religious school to share what has been learned. It comes in our wonderful family education opportunities: Family Education workshops run by our religious school, Mommy and Me, Daddy and Me, and more.

There are so many opportunities for making your Torah a keva - a fixture, a habit, a wonderful part of your routine. Seize them! Join with your fellow Jews in enriching your life and deepening your understanding! And to quote Shammai's contemporary, Rabbi Hillel, "If not now, when!"

Because our current budget and the long term financial health of Temple Emeth depend upon the success of our annual Circle of Friends campaign, contributors make an investment in both our

present and our future.

I would also like to thank Irwin Butensky, Seymour Yegelwel and all those whose assistance made

this year's campaign a success.

We all realize the importance of Temple Emeth's fundraising efforts and its dues and fees collections. Nonetheless, we would all prefer that Temple asked for money less frequently. So, if you knew there were a way to help Temple financially that was both easy and costless to you, would you not want to help? Well, there is such a way: it is to use Pathmark or Shoprite scrip that you

purchase from the Temple.

We all visit our local markets regularly and most of us spend more there than we care to recall. Temple Emeth can not reduce your grocery bills, but we can offer you the opportunity to contribute 5 cents of every grocery dollar to Temple Emeth. That is the result -- at no cost to you -- when you shop with Pathmark or Shoprite scrip purchased at Temple Emeth. Pathmark Scrip has no expiration date and Shoprite's expires only after six months. In both cases, check-out clerks are happy to give change.

How can you buy scrip? You can buy it from the Temple office during business hours or from a Temple officer during committee meetings or other events. Early Childhood Center parents can purchase from the ECC office. We will also deliver scrip to your door: all you need to do is call the Temple office (833-1322) to place your order. Payment is due on delivery if not received in advance.

Pathmark scrip is sold in \$100 batches and Shoprite's in \$50 batches. Checks should be written to

T.E. Market Checks.

If each of us did most of our shopping with scrip purchased from Temple Emeth, then Temple could really ask us for money less frequently!

# Religious School News



"...What does God require of you: Only to do justice, and to love goodness, and to walk modestly with your God." MICAH 6:8

The prophet Micah's prescription for the good life has been the subject of many commentaries. In Micah's time, the people of Judah and Jerusalem did not follow these words. They were selfish, conceited and thought little of their fellow human beings. There is a movement in modern Reform Judaism to return to the basic values envisioned by Micah. They have been stated many times, in different ways by many authors. It is no different at Temple Emeth. A recurring theme of many of Rabbi Gurvis' remarks before and during the High Holy Days was the peace negotiations taking place in the Middle East. While we know that there are individual agendas, it would appear that some people are attempting to return to the above values.

On October 10th, 5th, 6th and 7th graders took part in a special program showing how modern day values are relevant to the order of the prayer service. The format was an "Apache Relay." Not only did the students love participating in the program, but the prayer service with its attendant ethical principles was "brought to life." On October 17th, the initial Family Education Day program, with the theme of bringing Mitzvah back into the B'nai Mitzvah Experience, showed that there is more to a Bar/Bat Mitzvah than a party. That a carefully thought family celebration, using their child's Torah portion, can make a Bar/Bat Mitzvah experience even more meaningful for everyone than just having a gathering of friends and family.

Special programs throughout the year are being planned to make our students proud of their heritage and proud of their heritage in the 90's. Programs to watch for are the Family Education Day program for K-2nd graders, The Jewish Calendar (Nov. 13) and Mitzvot for 3rd and 4th graders on Dec. 18. The vast majority of our programs bring the teachings of our Sages to life in the classroom.

# A SEMESTER IN JERUSALEM by Allard Cantor

After spending the summer in Israel in 1988, I realized that I had to go back for an extended time period. I strongly recommend traveling to Israel, staying away from organized bus tours and making a concerted effort to meet the people, see the sights on your own and formulating your own perspectives.



#### RANDI M. DUBNO JEWISH COMMUNAL SERVICE

Let us be like the lines that lead to the center of a circle-Uniting there, and not like parallel lines, which never join. Hasidic saying

The circle that unites the Jewish Community is formed by the many intersecting lines of Jews around the globe. The importance of the community is rooted in the teachings of the Torah. In the Talmud it is written "Communal activity is as meritorious as studying Torah."

At a time of political and economic flux, it is imperative that we ensure the continuity of Jewish life. The Jews still living in the former Soviet Union present

a unique challenge.

For those who have not left, problems exist, including economic chaos and the threats of nationalism and antisemitism. Yet, in the midst of this threat, an ironic opportunity has unfolded. For the first time in seventy years, Jewish cultural life is possible.

World Jewry is impelled by the urgency to get as many Jews out as possible in the belief that there is no longterm future for them. The mass exodus, has created a leadershp vacuum. Those who do not leave and many who are intermarried or disconnected to their Jewish roots, must have access to Jewish education and culture in order to replenish their Jewish identity.

Our community partnerships can play a significant role at this pivotal moment in history. We have an oppor-tunity to instill among Russian Jewry a passion for Judaism, prepare for their eventual aliyah, and create an environment in which Jewish life can be enhanced.

I have been fortunate to work as an intern at the Jewish Community Relations Committee (JCRC) of the Jewish Federation Council of Greater Los Angeles. There, I have spent time devising a project that would encourage the development of a relationship between the Los Angeles Jewish Community and a community in the former Soviet Union.

The proposed Kehillah Project is a "community to community" project designed to establish person to person relationships, provide in-kind support, foster Jewish identity building, and promote the flourishing of Jewish values and ideals. A Pen-Pal Program between religious schools and synagogues, Bar/Bat Mitzvah Twinning and sharing of correspondence, and a library project for sending Jewish books to the former Soviet Union are among many projects under consideration.

While the needs are great, we American Jews can have a significant impact upon the physical and spiritual survival of these Jews. S.R. Hirsch, Nineteen Letters, has stated, "Join a community, by which alone your work can be made universal and eternal in its results." I took his

advice to heart.
