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From the Rabbi's Study

I love *Pesach!* I love the way in which it brings a sense of meaning and purpose to life. First we clean our homes of *chometz* - the leaven we are to put aside during this time. Then we clean our bodies and souls of the *chometz* - the leaven therein as well. We change our habits, our diets and our focus for one week. And we do it with the coming of spring, a time when looking forward with a sense of relief (especially this year!) to the end of winter. We also look forward with hope to the new beginnings which spring represents as we watch the world around us come to life with the sounds of birds, the buds on the trees and blossoming flowers.

The Seder is filled with messages of hope. As we celebrate freedom and the liberation of our ancestors from bondage in Egypt we link ourselves with the age-old hope for freedom and peace. We proclaim - Bechol dor vador chayav adam lirot et atzmo k'ilu hu yatzah mi-Mitzrayim -- "In each and every generation we are obligated to see ourselves as if we ourselves had gone forth from Egypt." The changes, the story, the hopes are not merely disjointed factors which have little or no bearing on our lives. Rather, the Haggadah teaches us that the changes in the world around us and the changes we make in our lives in celebrating Pesach are indeed a part of us. The story we tell is not merely an act of story-telling or recanting history. We live it! It is a living drama in which we play a part and which continues year-by-year. The struggle for freedom has not yet reached its conclusion. With the words Bechol dor vador...we remind ourselves of our responsibility to continue working for freedom. The hopes of Pesach are not merely the hopes of others. They are our hopes. They are our dreams, our goals. In ending our Seder with "Next year in Jerusalem!" we speak of and link ourselves with the hopes of all Jews in praying for a year of peace and freedom.

Every year the changes, the story and the hopes take on additional meaning. Each time I come to the Seder table I find new meaning in the ancient words. This year is no exception. As we tell the story of our people's liberation from bondage and our journey to freedom I cannot help but think of the tragic events of weeks gone by: the shooting in the mosque in Hebron, the attack on the van of Jewish students in Brooklyn, the bombing in a church in Lebanon, the rising tone of the rhetoric of hate being spewed forth by speakers in public forums in our state and around the country, and more. For me these are potent reminders of the bondage which is still so much in evidence in our world. It pains me that we human beings have yet to learn the full meaning of being enslaved to narrow-mindness, xenophobia, and hatred. We have yet to learn that little is solved through attacks on innocent people, be they worshippers, students or by-standers on a street. As I read the story of our people's movement mi-ganut l'shevach - from bondage and oppression to freedom and praiseworthiness -- I will be thinking about the ways in which we must free ourselves, and our world, from the slavery of ignorance, bigotry and hatred. As we pray for freedom and peace in the year ahead, I will be praying that we will celebrate next Pesach in a world in which all will be b'nai chorin - free

From our home to yours, may your celebration of *Pesach* be filled with health, happiness and peace!

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

As many congregants are aware, during the week of March 6, the Teaneck and other local police forces received information that a violent attack was being planned against an unspecified synagogue in Northern New Jersey during Shabbat services on March 12. The original source and the reliability of the information were and remain unknown. Had the report not come shortly after the vicious slaughter of Muslim worshipers in Hebron and the shooting of Jews on the Brooklyn bridge and was the timing of the threatened attack not immediately following Ramadan, the Muslim month of daytime fasting, it would probably have been ignored. As it was, the threat could not be ignored, not by law enforcement authorities and not by synagogues, including Temple Emeth.

In response to this reported threat, Temple Emeth's Board of Trustees took the following actions at its meeting on March 10:

- . it decided not to be intimidated into shutting our doors but canceled Religious School both Saturday and Sunday as a precaution;
- . it confirmed the contingent decision, taken earlier that evening at a meeting at the Teaneck police station, to hire armed, off-duty Teaneck police officers for Friday evening and Saturday morning services and for Sunday morning, but increased the number during services from two to three;
- . it decided to limit the attendance at services during that weekend to members and to check identification at the door; and
- . it directed that the previously planned panic bar for the front door be installed immediately so that all doors could be locked during services and at other times while still ensuring emergency egress.

These decisions to exclude non-member would-be worshipers and to hire armed guards were agonizing for all involved as well as expensive for the congregation. Under the circumstances, however, erring on the side of caution, while not succumbing to intimidation and fear, seemed the appropriate action.

Shabbat came and went without incident, either at Temple Emeth or elsewhere in New Jersey. Decisions about security in the coming weeks and beyond have yet to be made at this writing, but will be within days. I pray that the forces of fear and retribution unleashed by the Hebron massacre will soon retreat and that the perpetrator's apparent purpose of derailing the peace process between Israel and the Palestinians will not be accomplished.

I wish you all a sweet Pesach.



THE BAR MITZVAH

Wrapped in a prayer shawl, he stands before ornate sliding doors, which are closed. Behind these stands the *Torah*, holiest of scrolls, history and law of the Jewish people. His tallis has been put on by his older brother and is, therefore, somewhat twisted as it lies on his shoulders. Standing between the rabbi and cantor, he looks fragile. How could this possibly be the day he becomes a man? It seems like just a minute ago we were picking up diapers and baby food for him.

The rabbi speaks. "On this Bar Mitzvah day for David he will be leading most of the service." He turns and beams at the boy. David does not return the smile. For him there will be nothing amusing about the next two hours. They contain only work and worry until the

service is over and his party begins.

He has prepared long and hard for this day. Not only studying *Torah*, but picking party favors, music, friends to be invited, his first grown-up double breasted suit and shiny black shoes. He feels the importance of the day. He is performing a ritual that has been passed down from father to son for thousands of years, the Jewish rite of passage from boyhood to manhood.

The sancturary is filled with people he has known all his life. They have come to wish him well and help continue the tradition. There is singing during the service, and familiar voices blend into a chorus of joy. People who are important to David will be honored by being called up to read with him.

I sit in the first row and gaze up at my nephew. As I try to control my tears of joy and pride, memories of David flood my thoughts. I remember him, recently, showing up at my door after a snow storm with shovel in hand. He had been going around the neighborhood clearing paths for money. When he finished our house, he would not let me pay him. "It's okay," he said, as I tried to put the money in his coat pocket, "I wanted to do it."

UPDATE ON TEMPLE SECURITY

March 20, 1994

Dear Friends

As explained in more detail in the President's Message within this Bulletin, we have taken extraordinary security measures at Temple Emeth during the last two weeks. I would like to take this opportunity to inform you what will be done during the next few weeks.

All doors to the Temple will remain closed and locked at all times. The school door will be attended just prior to and for a few minutes after the beginning of nursery school and religious school. With the exception of students and their parents coming to the school or school office, all access to the building should be through the main door. When the doors are unattended, pressing the bell will alert the offices that you are waiting at the door.

The front door will be attended approximately fifteen minutes prior to the beginning of adult education classes on Tuesday evening and prior to the beginning of evening meetings. All committee chairs have been or are hereby requested to ensure that the door is covered in advance of meetings in order to admit people to the building. All members are requested to arrive at meetings on time to ensure that you will be able to enter the building.

We will have a armed, plain-clothes off-duty Teaneck police officer in attendance before and during every worship service at least through the end of Pesach and at the Temple Seder on March 27. We will also have security on hand for our celebration of Yom Ha-atzmaut, Israel Independence Day, Friday April 15 and Sunday April 17.

Only Temple Emeth members and their guests will be admitted to services during this period. Ushers will be at the door with a list of Temple members prior to and during every service. They can not be expected to recognize all members by sight and they might, therefore, ask you to show identification. I would ask all members please to be understanding and to co-operate with the ushers. If you are bringing guests to services, please arrange to meet them outside and identify them to the ushers as you enter.

There is no question that these security measures, although necessary, are distasteful to all. They are also expensive. We are spending money that was not budgeted and that we cannot really afford. Needless to say, contributions to offset this expense would be most welcome.







He had been named for mother's baby brother who had been killed in the war. She always had a special place in her heart for little David. He and my father enjoyed each other's company enormously. By the time David was four years old, perhaps because of all the time he spent with my father, he'd begun to speak with a decidedly Jewish inflection. It was actually quite hysterical to hear the two of them converse. Funnier still, my father never noticed David's accent.

Suddenly my reverie is interrupted. It is my turn to read the prayer with David. I climb up and take my place next to him. I look out at the sea of people and decide not to do that again until I'm ready to sit down. I read, and then David does his part. I lean over to kiss my nephew before stepping down. His eyes are

glistening. Are they shining with tears?

Before leaving I again look out at the room of cherished friends and relatives. Way in the back, I see, sitting far from anyone else, an old man. His skull-cap, barely covers his bald head, and on the chair next to him rests a cane. I know this man. His face is indelibly engraved on my heart. He's my father, the same father who's been dead for seven years. I blink a few times and shake my head. The rabbi is gently guiding me off the stage and to my seat. But I do not go to my original seat. I walk to the back--where the man is sitting. Everyone assumes I am so overcome with emotion that I've decided to sit alone. Not so. I've decided I'd like to visit with my Dad. He's had a long trip.

I sit down. I'd like to touch him, but somehow know that is not possible. I whisper,

"Dad, you're here. But you're dead."

He looks at me with those blue eyes. "Yes," he begins, "I am dead." His eyes bespeak some disappointment. "But you didn't honestly think I'd miss David's Bar Mitzvah." He looks up at the stage. "I love that boy." It's not possible, but I feel my father's lips brush across my cheek. "I love you too, mamale," he whispers, and I hear him although his face is far from

my ear. "I am always with you kids."

I look away from my father as David completes his reading. Before I know it, the rabbi is asking everyone to join us for luncheon in the next room, to allow the immediate family to leave the sanctuary first. My sister and her family file by me. Through my tears, I am smiling. I wonder if my sister can see my father, too. I turn to look at him one more time, but the seat next to me is empty. I knew it would be. I have not lost my mind. I have simply reaffirmed my faith.

SOCIAL ACTION Jury Service

Justice has been a concern of our tradition since its inception. The principles of the pursuit and application of justice are embedded in our Torah. That rich and poor, mighty and weak alike should enjoy equal treatment in the application of law and justice is a principle enshrined in what our tradition knows as its Holiness Code (Leviticus 19). Traditional Jewish law (Halachah) carefully constructs a legal system based upon fair and equitable administration of the law. As a part of this system are the juries serving as the decisors in the application of the law. The right to a trial by a jury of one's peers is an important principle under

American law.

Currently, in the State of New Jersey, lists of potential jurors are compiled from voter registration and drivers license lists. This limits the jury pool in New Jersey both economically and racially and undermines the constitutional right we all have to a jory of our peers. Pending in the state legislature is A-531, a bill which would amend the current law on jury service by expanding the sources from which the names of potential jurors are drawn to include lists of public utility customers, of persons who file state income tax returns and those who apply for homestead rebates. It would also provide for penalties for employers who punish employees for taking time off to serve. This measure is sponsored by our congregant, Assemblywoman Loretta Weinberg, as well as Assemblyman Robert Brown. It has been endorsed by a New Jersey Supreme Court panel of judges and This bill has been released from committee and must be posted for a vote by Speaker Haytaian and Senator Gormley. 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
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
