From the Rabbi's Study

Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel wrote: "What does a person expect to attain when entering the synagogue? In pursuit of learning one goes to a library; for esthetic enrichment, one goes to the art museum; for pure music, to the concert hall. What then, the purpose of going to the synagogue?"

As we prepare to gather here at our synagogue in the days ahead, I imagine that in some fashion, we all ask ourselves Heschel's question. "Why am I here?" "What draws me, and so many of my fellow Jews to this place at this time?" Perhaps Heschel himself gives a bit of the answer as he continues: "Many are the facilities which help us acquire the important worldly virtues, skills, and techniques. But where should one learn about the insights of the spirit? Many are the opportunities for public speech; where are the occasions for inner silence? It is easy to find people who will teach us to be eloquent; but who will teach us to be still? It is surely important to have a sense of reverence."

We come together in the days ahead to welcome a New Year. These days are not about acquiring "worldly virtues, skills, and techniques." They are not about public speeches or eloquence (though every rabbi I know has been hard at work in this area.) These days are about inspiration and awe, about reverence and the spirit -- our respective spirits.

The words of our machzor - the Gates of Repentance, the haunting melodies chanted by our Cantor and choir; the timeless words we shall read and study from the Torah; and yes, even rabbinic attempts at eloquent speech -- all are gearing towards motivating our spirits. We come to the synagogue because we believe that there is something mystical, magical and even powerful that can happen. But I caution you: do not look for such mystical, magical, power in grandiose manifestations. We have become attuned to Hollywood-style majesty. Hence, we often expect too much from our synagogue moments. But the most important element in creating a meaningful, majestic, powerful High Holy Day (and for that matter, Shabbat) experience is beyond the control of Rabbi, Cantor, Choir, and readers. Only as individuals can we, sitting in the midst of a congregation at prayer, reach inward to draw forth inner silence, stillness, and a sense of reverence. The external conditions may be all in place -but it is each of us who must draw that inner sense of awe and reverence and allow it, and all that goes on around us, to water our soul.

Come prepared to play an active, if sometimes still role in making our celebration of the coming of a New Year a powerful and meaningful experience for us all -- one that will draw us back together again and again, throughout the year 5755! Laura, Benjamin, Sarah and Aaron join me in sending the best of wishes for a Shanah tovah u-m'tukah - a sweet and good year! A year, we all pray, will be filled with health, blessing and Shalom!

Tanks, But No Tanks.

- Turn your water heater tank down to 140 degrees hot enough to kill bacteria and still save energy.
- Insulate your water heater with a pre-fab "blanket" making sure not to block off air vents (on gas heaters). Insulating is important, especially if it's in an unheated space. So you can save 7 to 8% of the energy you've been using.
- Every two months, drain about two quarts of water from the valve faucet located at the bottom of the water tank. This helps prevent accumulation of sediment and improves heater efficiency.

MESSAGE FROM THE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL



"The Dreyfus Affair: Commemorating the Centennial" Saturday, August 27 thru Sunday, October 23.

To mark the centennial of the "The Dreyfus Affair" the exhibition will chronicle the life of Captain Alfred Dreyfus, a Jewish officer in the French Army, who was wrongly accused of treason in 1894. His court-martial, conviction, incarceration, retrial, ultimate exhonoration and honorable reinstatement in 1906 developed into a political event that divided France.

In addition to the exhibit, educational programs including guided tours, films, and lec-

tures are being planned.

Organized by the Museum Committee, chaired by Sharon Vatsky, the exhibition will include original documents from the collection of Lorraine and Martin Beitler.

MAZON grant.




TROUBLE WITH GRANDFATHERS by Bob Spiewak
