The Power of Words - Our Reality, Our Turn

Last month I wrote of the power of words against the backdrop of the Million Man March in Washington, D.C. and the message of its leader, Minister Louis Farrakhan. I never would have dreamed that a few short weeks later we would be faced by a tragedy of the magnitude of the assassination of Prime Minister Yitzchak Rabin. While words alone are not responsible for Mr. Rabin's death, they most certainly prepared the way for Yigal Amir's evil act. One month ago I wrote, "Words have meaning, and words have power. Words can create realities, even if only in the ears, minds and hearts of those who hear them." Now we have painful evidence of this, and we face a painful reality. Hate rhetoric of rabbis, settlers and other members of the Jewish community paved the way for the murder which took place in Tel Aviv. And we must all grapple with a new reality in the Jewish world.

The pain we feel is sharp. A day rarely passes when we don't hear news of murder. Tragically, political assassinations have become a part of the fabric of life in our "modern" world. Yet we Jews have rarely, if ever, contemplated the possibility that one of our own could cold-heartedly murder another of our own. In the aftermath of Mr. Rabin's murder, we recoil in horror at the images of Jews rejoicing over the act of evil. It is a new day in Jewish life, a new reality. We had better awaken to that fact if we don't want to accept this as a part of the tapestry of our history.

Facing new realities is hardly new to us. With the rapid-fire pace of history in recent years we have been facing what we imagined unthinkable repeatedly: the fall of the Berlin Wall, the dissolution of the Soviet Union, peace between Israel and Jordan, and the beginnings of peace between Israel and the Palestinians, just to mention a few examples. Who would have imagined that at a state funeral for the Prime Minister of Israel, the fallen leader would be eulogized not only by family and friends. He is also remember eloquently by the President of the United States - no surprise. We also hear the King of Jordan speak of coming to bury a brother and a friend, and the President of Egypt rises to decry the act as an affront to the efforts to peace. This too, is a new reality. And wait -- but a few days later, PLO Chief Yasir Arafat, who stayed away from the funeral for security reasons, comes to the home of the fallen Israeli Prime Minister to pay a shivah call. My friends -- we are living in a new day. We are living in a day when we can see the saplings that have grown from out of the seeds of peace planted in the past 15 years. We, who have dreamed of peace, who have prayed for peace, and who have worked for peace must not allow the enemies of peace to destroy our dreams, to trample our heartfelt prayers and to crush our efforts. And we must now accept the reality that the enemies of peace are not only elsewhere - they are also within. I do not deny the opponents of the peace process their right to speak against it. But when rhetoric (and actions) deny the right of others to live in support of the process, then those who deal in hate and violence have no place at the table or in the discussion. Indeed, they have no place in our community!

We cannot afford to remain silent. Rest assured that those responsible for the hateful rhetoric that led to this evil act will not remain silent. As Prime Minister Rabin's widow, Leah Rabin said at the conclusion of the *shivah* period, "The silent majority must be silent no more!" Let our voices ring loud and clear. Let us show our support and our grief for our fellow Jews at this time of deep sadness in our people's history. But let us arise from our grief prepared to fight the hatred and the evil. Let us raise our voices, and join the efforts for peace. Those who poison our heritage with hateful and murderous interpretations of our tradition in the name of God have no place in our midst.

Let us not only remember Prime Minister Rabin *z*"*l* as a man of peace. But let us join ourselves to his fight for peace - through words and through deeds. It is the best way for us to create a lasting tribute to him. May Yitzchak Rabin rest in peace. And may his wife, children and grandchildren be comforted among the mourners of Zion and Jerusalem. Indeed, may we all find comfort -- and together, may we find the way back to the road to peace!

Home Energy Saving Tips (Part 2)

Proper maintainance of your major appliances can have a significant impact on the environment. The pilot light in your stove should be burning with a blue cone-shaped flame. If it's yellow, burners and ports are clogged or need adjustment. Clean or replace Air Conditioner filters once a month during the cooling season. Otherwise the fan has to work harder and consumes more electricity. Clean the condenser coils on the back of your refrigerator at least once a year, also keep the door gaskets clean to make sure that the seal isn't being broken by dried-on food.

MESSAGE FROM THE CANTOR

It was late in the afternoon when we received the call from my husband's family in Israel. "Quick, turn on CNN," they said (in Hebrew, of course). "Rabin has been shot! We couldn't believe it as we sat glued to the television set. We changed channels over and over again as if one of the broadcasts might tell us that this was just a bad joke, that the Prime Minister was fine, or that all the other stations had made a mistake. Unfortunately what we heard was quite the opposite. After some time, the newscaster told us that Yitzhak Rabin had died.

Now, I will be totally honest with you. One of the first things that crossed my mind was that it must have been a Palestinian from some extremist group that fired those shots. Yet, what I heard was the horrifying truth, that it was not an Arab, but a Jew who had killed the Prime Minister of Israel. Yes, one of our own people, one of the Children of Israel. It really didn't matter if he was Reform, Conservative, or Orthodox, politically to the right or the left or somewhere in between. A Jew had murdered another Jew. Of course it is very true that anyone murdering anyone has committed a heinous and unforgiveable act, but somehow this seemed terrible beyond belief.

Are our differences with one another so great that we must resort such violence? Is the gap between us so wide that we cannot discuss things in a rational manner? We all worship the same God, read the same Torah, and celebrate the same holidays, how can it be that we are so different?

In a song by the modern Jewish music group "Safam", we hear these words; We are one, like the waters and the sea. We are one, in the eyes of those that hate us, and to The One who did create us, we are one. In the future, let us all remember that despite our differences, we are one people, Am Yisrael, and work at making peace with others as well as with one another. B'Shalom,

MESSAGE FROM THE EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTER

Pre-schoolers seem to have a natural affinity with the kitchen. In our ECC classrooms cooking is an integral part of the curriculum and is one of the ways children learn firsthand about our Jewish tradition. Dipping apples in honey for Rosh Hashanah, preparing potato latkes for Chanukah or making charoset for the Passover Seder are favorite pastimes at our center.

Now that the weather is getting colder, I recommend you try some cooking experiences at home with your child or grandchild. From a developmental point of view, cooking has much to offer. Working with a variety of ingredients which need to be smelled, tasted, poked, poured, and stirred, the child is furnished with countless opportunities to develop fine motor skills. In addition, cooking also fosters language development and concept formation. With adult guidance, children, as they cook, will discuss the names, appearance, smell, texture and taste of the ingredients, as well as the way in which ingredients change as one is added to the other. Concepts of measurement, sequencing, "big and little", "more than and less than:, and classification are learned as children measure and pour ingredients, follow the steps of a recipe, and cut and slice foods.

Here are a few suggestions which I have found helpful in cooking with young children:

Cooking need not involve the use of a stove. Preparing fruit for eating or, for example, mixing mashed bananas with yogurt is as much a cooking project as is making pancakes or muffins.

•Use simple, nutritious recipes, involving a few steps.

•Try to engage children in the clean up process as well as in the actual cooking activity. Washing pots and pans and scrubbing tables with sponges and soapy water can be almost as much fun as cooking itself.

•Encourage children to stay in the kitchen as food is cooking, so they can smell and examine food at its various stages.

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

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
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

CHANUKAH

Did you know? The festival of Chanukah, the triumph of religious freedom, the major theme of the holidays, was particularly important for American Jews, especially for the generation who came to America in search of the idea for which the Maccabees valiantly fought.

In 1790, newly elected President George Washington received a letter from Congregation Beth Elohim in Charleston, pledging loyalty to this new nation and assuring Washington that "we and our posterity will not cease to commemorate you..with Judah Maccabee who was raised up by God for the deliverance of his people from oppression."

Chanukah is the Jewish response to the gloom of winter, lighting one candle and yet another against the gathering darkness. It is our way of expressing our profound belief that God will not permit utter darkness to prevail.

When the darkness seems overwhelming--and it can be the spiritual darkness of winter night--we need to know that it is powerless against the smallest bit of illumination.

As our world grows colder and darker during the winter months, light a candle in someone's life and see how it makes the darkness flee.

RELIGIOUS ACTION ADVOCACY ALERT

The Legal Services Corp. is the primary provider of civil legal services to poor Americans, insuring that low income families have access to the justice system.

On September 13, the House Judiciary Committee passed HR 2277, the Legal Aid Act of 1995, which provides substantially decreased funds in the form of block grants and restricts the activities of legal services attorneys from engaging in grassroots lobbying, abortion cases, class action suits, voter registration and representation of illegal aliens. A similar, less stringent bill has been introduced in the Senate.

The Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism has issued an Action Alert requesting that calls be made and letters sent to senators and representatives urging them to support Legal Services without any restrictions:

As Jews we reaffirm our deep respect for law as an equitable means of bringing justice to the world. 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


