




#### MESSAGE FROM THE CANTOR

Shirat ha Yam, the Song of the Sea, is found in parshat Beshalach, Exodus XV. The Sabbath on which this portion of the Torah is read has become known as "Shabbat Shirah", the Sabbath of Song.

In our country, Jewish Music Month begins on this Shabbat. One can be sure to hear differences in the way that the Torah is chanted on Shabbat Shirah. Many of the phrases with in this portion are not chanted with the usual system of cantillation but rather, with a more florid system of notes that is used only when chanting Shirat Hayam. The musical form is responsorial, noting as we read, Moses led the men and Miriam led the women in song at the Red Sea.

Here at Temple Emeth we are observing Shabbat Shirah with a very special service. On Saturday morning, February 3rd, Rabbi Gurvis and I will be joined by Student Cantor Jordan Franzel who will help to lead us in prayer and song. Student Cantor Franzel and I will also present a sermon-in-song which will consist of duets written by Jewish composers who write in many different genres.

The celebration will continue as we join together for a Shabbat table luncheon, during which Rabbi Gurvis will lead a Torah study session. We will then join together as we raise our voices in song singing traditional Shabbat zimrot. I look forward to seeing you there as we come together in prayer and song!



#### MESSAGE FROM THE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

So often parents say to me, "I ask my child what they did in religious school today and they always answer 'nothing'." At first I told parents that the answer seemed strange to me. I walk around and know that a great deal happens during class, the response just did not make sense. Then I spoke to other educators in both secular and Jewish education to better understand the problem. What I discovered is that children often answer the question "What did you do today?" with the words "nothing" or "I can't remember." What we need to do, I was told, is to change our questions. At first I was a non-believer, however, upon my own experimentation, I have found that it can work with positive results. The following are a list of questions/statements developed by the Orange County (CA) Bureau of Jewish Education:

- 1. Teach me something that you learned today.
- 2. What was the funniest thing that happened in school?
- 3. Show me what pages you read in school today.
- 4. What art project did you do today?
- 5. What question did you ask today?
- 6. Whom did you sit next to?
- 7. Let's read one of your Hebrew pages together.
- 8. What prayer did you discuss today?
- 9. What does that prayer mean to you?
- 10. What story did you read in the Bible today?
- 11. How would you have changed the ending?

While I know that this list is not exhaustive of the more directed and leading questions you could ask your child, it is a great place to start. Perhaps if we all begin improving our methods of inquiry we will all learn more about the school. *B'shalom*.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTER

You can well imagine, playing in our outdoor playground is a rare experience this winter. A visit to the indoor playroom becomes an important part of our daily routine. We recently purchased new equipment which is being enjoyed by the children. A set of plastic blocks, ramps and hoops was bought to create obstacle courses. I introduced these materials to the children without specifying how to utilize them. It was rewarding to observe how much creativity the children demonstrated while exploring this equipment. Some children threw the hoops and ran after them to catch them. Others placed them on the floor and jumped from one to another. Others placed the hoops in stands and jumped through them and pretended to be circus animals. This equipment should provide hours of fun. When young children are given opportunities to explore materials they often can be more creative then adults.

Snow is everywhere and it has become a dominant theme at school. When snowy weather comes, we watch for every chance to explore its various qualities. It can be heavy and wet, dry and fluffy, hard and crusty, etc.. It's also fun to look at snow with a magnifying glass. We even bring it indoors and play with it. Teachers have been adding food coloring to it and the children find it even more exciting.

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





The Eichingers joined Emeth 3 years ago, about a year after Daniel became a Bar Mitzvah at the Workmen's Circle. That experience sparked something in Judy. She knew she wanted more in her life, more prayer and more of a connection to God.

Judy was convinced by several neighbors to attend a Friday night service at Emeth and when the evening was over, she felt like she had come home. She and Bob talked about becoming members, and although he's not Jewish, backed the idea. The Eichingers joined as a family.

Judy knows where her strengths and interests lie, and before long, she was a member of the Caring Committee.

She's seen how this group makes a difference and says it's so satisfying to help those who may have just experienced a death or an illness. In her words, "It's a good feeling you get from the smallest thing you do." Last spring Judy was named chairwoman and has plenty of ideas on how to expand the Caring Committee's role within the Emeth community.

Judy has a rich and full life. She's the outreach counsellor at the career and life counselling center, which is a division of Bergen Tech. The organization provides services and programs to low income women who are looking to improve their lives. It's a job that combines her writing skills with her interest in public affairs.

When she's not working, Judy's passion is discovering new places in New Jersey. She and Bob are also avid theatregoers.

Judy believes there's an added richness and fullness in her life since joining Emeth....the feeling is mutual.


