SURPRISE HERE!

n Monday, February 9th, the Chief Rabbinate issued its verdict on the seven months of work of the Ne'eman Commission. I, for one, am not surprised by the Rabbinate's rejection of the Ne'eman Commission's proposals. I fully expected this response. If there was uncertainty, it came only from the perspective of not knowing at which point the door would be slammed shut by the Chief Rabbinate. Commenting on the verdict, my colleague, Rabbi Uri Regev of the Israel Religious Action Center noted, "the Chief Rabbinate's ruling leaves no doubt that it absolutely rejects any kind of cooperation with us (as they view our liberal movements as) 'trying to shake the foundations of the lewish religion."

The Rabbinate's statement suggests that it is prepared to accept only a part of the Ne'eman Commission's report in that they accept that all conversions in the State of Israel should be performed under the auspices of the Chief Rabbinate and its Rabbinic Councils.

There is nothing new here. Nor is there anything surprising in this position. This is merely a restatement of what has always been the case in Israel - the Chief Rabbinate wishes to maintain its absolute monopoly over all religious matters, in this case, conversion. Furthermore, in the Rabbinate's February 9th statement they call for the Knesset to enact legislation regarding conversions which would make the current religious reality a legal one. Without calling it by the same name, in essence the Chief Rabbinate called for a Conversion Bill, not unlike the one that has been on hold during the past seven months while the Ne'eman Commission did its work. They have, it would seem, made their position clear - "there cannot be any cooperation with one who does not accept Torah min

ha'shamayim (Divine Revelation of the Torah from heaven).

Recently I was invited to participate in the formation of a Dialogue group consisting of Jews from across the spectrum of Jewish belief, life and practice within our Jewish community. At the group's most recent meeting there was discussion of various rifts within relationships between Jews. One group member asserted that the healing of such rifts can only be realized if there is, first and foremost, a desire to heal the rift. Without a willingness to search for solutions, the gaps cannot be bridged. Though the statement of the Chief Rabbinate, in response to the Ne'eman Commission's report was never raised at our meeting, it was most certainly on my mind. And I am certain I was not alone! The remark of my fellow dialogue participant has also been on my mind ever since our discussion. Part of

the problem we have been facing in the Jewish community is how to approach the deepening crisis and rift in the Jewish community. However, all along there has been the awareness that the Chief Rabbinate in Israel would maintain the right to scuttle any solution which might be proposed. They have made their point, I believe quite clearly. There is, on the part of the Chief Rabbinate, absolutely no interest in finding an accommodation. There is no true desire to heal the rift. Making such a statement pains me.

Realizing that we must accept it as a reality is even more hurtful. Yet, I believe that we must recognize that this is their position.

However – recognizing that this is the position of the Israeli Chief Rabbinate is one thing. It does not mean that must accept that this is the way matters must be left to stand in Israel. The fight must go on.

Israel was founded as a state for all Jews! I believe that the Chief Rabbinate, through its intransgence, has demonstrated that it does not truly care about all Jews. Its concern is with power, and maintaining that power – all costs! We should not accept this. And I agree with the leaders of our movement who have been at the helm of this fight – Rabbis Uri Regev, Ammiel Hirsch and Eric Yoffie – that the fight must go on.

First and foremost, while our concern for Israel as a state must not diminish, I believe that we can redirect our energies with respect to Israel. It is vital that Reform/Progressive Judaism grow as a real entity on the ground in the Jewish State. Our synagogues, our educational and social service institutions and our rabbis in the Israel Movement for Progressive

Judaism need our support. And they need it now! Our response to the Israeli Chief Rabbinate must be forthright.

Contrary to their opinion, that we "try to shake the foundations of the Jewish religion" we must show them that their judgment is wrong. We must demonstrate to the entire Jewish community that the unwillingness of the Israeli Chief Rabbinate to join in partnership with us, their fellow Jews, is antithetical to the principles of Judaism. By continuing to strengthen Reform Judaism in Israel we will further the cause of tolerance and religious pluralism, even if the hill seems too steep to climb.

At its February Board Meeting, our Temple Board of Trustees unanimously voted to accept the recommendation of our Israel/ARZA Committee that we make a contribution, as a congregation, to support the Progressive Congregation in Ra'anana (a suburb of Tel Aviv) which, after 8 years of fighting authorities, has finally been granted

land on which they can build a synagogue and school to house their community's activities. I see this as a positive statement and commitment to strengthening Reform Judaism in the State of Israel. In the months and years ahead I hope that we shall be able to forge a relationship with Kehillat Ra'anan – along with other Reform institutions in Israel. The Chief Rabbinate may reject us – but we need not accept their narrow-minded view of what is acceptable as Jewish expression in the Jewish State!

Second, we must not allow all our energies to be directed towards Israel. There is too much at stake in our own Jewish community, in Bergen County and throughout North America. The diversion that the crisis in Israel has provided has allowed us to ignore the reality that we are part of a creative, dynamic and flourishing Jewish community right here. There are bridges to be built right here. There are opportunities

to foster understanding and tolerance – and most importantly cooperation in our own Jewish community. In order to do that, I believe that we must make certain that we are aware of our own priorities.

Relationships between Jews must take precedence. If we value our continued existence as a people, as a community, then we must work – harder than ever before – at finding the common ground, and at finding the sources of healing where there is division and pain. As we come to this month's observance of Purim – a festival which reminds us of a time when external enemies sought our destruction, it seems even more important that we reach beyond the divisions and not allow destruction to come from within. While Mordecai may have been able to assure Esther that if she did not act, "help would arise from another place" I fear we do not have the luxury of reliance of help arising from elsewhere to secure our future as a people. That future – as a people – as one people, is in our hands!

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Reform Congregation Gains Foothold in Ra'anana

Ten years ago, while London-born and raised Rabbi Michael Boyden was working at an immigrant absorption center in Ra'anana, northeast of Tel Aviv, a member of a local chavurah came to him seeking guidance for his group. Since that day, under Boyden's leadership, that chavurah has grown from a small unafilliated group to a thriving Reform Congregation.

Over 300,000 Israeli's live in a 4-mile radius of Ra'anana, a promising potential that can develop once the congregation owns it own synagogue. Kehilat Ra'anan has been struggling to receive land for a building. In Israel, synagogues do not buy land for a building. They are given public land by the local Council. Boyden's congregation has used rented space which can accommodate them only for weekly Shabbat services and limited activities. They have applied to the Mayor of Ra'anana for land in the same way that 60 Orthodox congregations in town had applied and been given land for their synagogues.

The Mayor, in coalition with the National Religious Party, replied that to award Boyden's

group land would upset more people than it would please. The congregation appealed for several years and was told to buy their own land – at a cost of approximately one million dollars. Meanwhile, Orthodox synagogues continued to receive free land.

As a result of pressure from Reform Jews in North American and threats of court action from the Israel Religious Action Center, the town council has finally granted Kehillat Ra'anan land for a synagogue – part of a deal in which Orthodox groups received twice the amount of land as the Reform, with the agreement to stay quiet, at least temporarily.

Presently the congregation has an ally on the Town Council, Nati Lamm, who is a member of the progressive Meretz Party, and current chair of the town's building and planning committee.n However, council elections will take place in the fall, 1998. Lamm has warned Kehilat Ra'anan to take advantage of this window of opportunity to start building as soon as possible, while he is still the chair of the committee.

Plans have been drawn which include a synagogue, kindergarten, day care area, youth area and library. Rabbi Boyden hopes construction can begin this summer.

Temple Emeth's Board of Trustees has approved the recommendation of the Arza/Israel Committee to send \$500 to this very worthy congregation. The money will come from the Margery Rothschild Memorial Fund for Israel/Arza. Our congregation has worked very hard to use political pressure on the leadership of the Knesset. But, the time has come to participate "on the ground". As we watch with great joy the work being done at Temple Emeth, we understand Kehilat Ra'anan's need for a "home" of their own. Our Committee urges members of our own Synagogue family to keep the Israel/Arza Fund in mind when making contribution to honor or console those dear to us. By doing so, we will be able to replenish the fund, and thus continue our mandate.



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Purim Commandments

"From the beginning of Adar (the month of Purim) we increase our happiness."

So said our rabinic sages, who were so enamored of Purim they predicted that even when the Messiah arrived, this holiday would still be celebrated.

The victory of Esther and Mordechai over the evil Haman is marked with noisy revelry by costumed listeners, commanded to hear and respond (with boos and cheers) to the scroll (megillah) of Esther.

But there are other commandments associated with this holiday that are also interesting, if less well known:

- Purimshpiels (skits) are performed, whose purpose is to poke fun at authority figures and traditional texts – no one is safe from this playful mockery, least of all the rabbi! Reverence is tossed aside!
- On Purim, we must give charity to everyone who asks us. Even if we suspect that the person who is asking really has no need for our money, on this holiday we give without questioning.
- Purim is also the day to commemorate other events in our history when Jews were saved from anti-Semites. Right over might is reaffirmed.
- We are told to prepare and enjoy a large, festive repast, know as the Purim "se'udah" (meal). Dessert is, of course, traditional haman-

tashen – small cakes that are filled with apricots, prunes, or poppy seed, and baked in the triangular shape of Haman's hat.

This is a holiday that precedes the reckless joy of spring fever and echoes its hilarious celebrations. As Jews have throughout our history, on Purim we laugh in the face of danger and mock those who wish to make us feel afraid. On Purim, we reaffirm that even when the odds are against us, victory against oppression is possible.

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UJA FEDERATION OF BERGEN COUNTY & NORTH HUDSON

Launches Community-Wide Clothing Collection Project for FSU's Elderly Jews

Winters in the former Soviet Union (FSU) are never easy, but for an estimated 300,000 frail elderly Jews in the FSU, this winter is expected to be brutal. Many of them live on meager pensions and are already experiencing hunger. Now they will also face a freezing winter in small apartments that usually lack heat.

In response to this crisis situation, UJA Federation of Bergen County and North Hudson is joining other federations around the country in supporting the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee's (JDC) Container Project. From now to Purim, the federation will coordinate this community-wide project to collect warm clothes that will be shipped in a JDC container to elderly Jews in the Ukraine. Among the items that are needed are sweaters, thermal underwear, pajamas, wool hats, gloves, mittens, scarves, so cks, slippers, blankets, sheets and pillowcases.

According to Andrea Haasova, a JDC representative who helped launch the project in Bergen County and North Hudson, there are an estimated 600,000 elderly Jews in the FSU, half of whom are in desperate need of help. Over the past four years, JDC has developed a network of welfare services in response to this situation. They currently reach approximately 70,000 who receive cash assistance, food packages, medical equipment and home care visits.

"A pair of socks, gloves, a scarf might be small and ordinary things for us, but can help someone on the other side of the world so much," Haasova said, "People who support this project might never meet the people they are helping, but their gift will give these elderly Jews much more than just warmth ...it will give them the knowledge that they are not alone anymore."

Three seventh grader students from the Moriah School of Englewood – Zen Gontownik, Jay

Reidler, and Daniel Setton – have made the Container Project their Bar Mitzvah chesed project. They collected \$767 at a singles event held at a private home in Englewood and will use this money to buy items for the elderly Jews in the FSU. The boys who all live in Englewood, said they are planning other fund-raising events for this project, and will donate some of their Bar Mitzvah money to purchase more items.

All items donated to the Container Project must be new in order for the authorities in the FSU to allow the container into the country. People, or ganizations or schools that want to get involved or make a donation of clothing should call Genene Kaye, project coordinator at 488-6800.
