### A NIGHT UNLIKE ANY OTHER

esach is a time of memories. Seder night evokes a bundle of memories for so many of us. We remember the sounds. We recall the smells. We remember family members and family gatherings as well as the idiosyncratic ways in which our particular families fashioned their own observances and customs. For me, memories of Seder nights gone by evoke warm and loving memories of my grandparents and of family gatherings. I can remember hunting for the afikomen with my brothers and cousins. My memories also bring to mind the occasions of celebrating Pesach at a kib-

butz Seder on Kibbutz Ma'ale Ha-Chamisha as I did at Pesach in 1977. I recall sitting at the table of a friend's family in Rishon LeTzion at Pesach 1979 – a family steeped in Yemenite tradition. During the Seder that night I

was exposed to a part of Jewish tradition about which I had only read in books. And there are the memories of beginning to build our family tradition as in recent years the Seder has shifted to our home and the task of organizing and conducting fell on our shoulders. Each memory builds on the others. With each passing year the meaning of this particular celebration grows deeper in meaning and richness.

Without fail, I look forward to each year's celebration of Pesach with great anticipation. Somehow I never fail to get caught up in the excitement and tumult of preparing for and holding Seder. I am reasonably certain I am not alone in this. While we Jews turn out in great numbers for the High Holy Days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, studies suggest that the most widely observed Jewish ritual is the Passover Seder. To be sure, our sedorim take may shapes and forms. Nonetheless, there is something which binds us to this ancient ritual. For me it is a link to what I believe has to be one of the oldest, continually practiced religious rituals known to

humanity. In one fashion or another, our people has been observing Pesach for a long time. Over time, our ritual has been embellished and elaborated upon as each generation has sought, in its own way, in light of its own experience, to see itself as if it had come forth from Egypt.

Preparing for Pesach and the Seder is not a simple matter of culinary preparation. While so much of our celebration revolves around food, there can be so much more to getting ready for the holiday. As one who never needs too much of a push to acquire new books, finding a new Haggadah to add to my

ever-growing collection of haggadot is a part of my personal preparation. It is not a simple matter of buying another book to stick on my bookshelves. For me, studying the Haggadah, and looking for new insights, new questions and

new material is as much a part of getting ready as is getting rid of the chometz.

I urge you to try this in your own anticipation of the holiday. This part of the task is made easier with the growing wealth of materials. I, myself, have found some of the newer materials in recent years enticing and inviting. I mention just three: The Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem has published A Different Night: The Family Participation Haggadah. This "interactive" text offers a myriad of suggestions for livening up the Seder experience. And there is even a separate Leader's Guide which can help make the material come even more alive. A second offering is Shimon Apisdorf's The Survival Kit Family Haggadah. A third and final book worth looking at is Ron Wolfson's The Art of Jewish Living: The Passover Seder. While these are hardly the only three worthwhile texts, they are three that stand out in my mind as worthwhile. Nor is what I am encouraging a matter of acquiring copies for everyone at your Seder table. Rather, I suggest you pick out one text - buy a

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
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# From the Religious School

ver the last two years, Rabbi Gurvis and I have had the privilege of meeting with parents through our new "Parent Tea" evenings. We now have annual "teas" with the parents of 2nd and 5th grade students at the home of a family in that grade. We have learned a great deal from the dialogues and I think the parents have come to realize things about the school and congregation as well. Most of all, it has opened greater lines of communication between the parents and us.

Some of what we have been told is that parents are enjoying the opportunities we have provided to study and experience Judaism together with their children. This month allows for two wonderful occasions to celebrate some of the most positive experiences in our Jewish history. Passover is an exciting holiday that is predominantly a home celebration. The link between these two holidays is especially poignant this year. As Israel matures to 50 and is continuing to face a variety of difficult issues, we should take this opportunity to see where we were thousands of years ago and reflect on what the Jewish people has become. I encourage you to take the experiences that are available to us through family observance and worship of these holidays to reconnect to one another and to Judaism.

# Passover: A Time for Sharing and Caring

As Passover approaches, think for a moment about the time at the seder when the youngest child at the table asks the four questions. I ask an important fifth question:

Will you, and each family at your seder table, invite one hungry person to enter and eat?

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## Passover

At sundown, April 10th, Passover begins. Families around the world will gather together to celebrate the liberation of the Jews from bondage in Egypt. Passover is a time of joyous celebration and great preparation. Special foods are bought and prepared. In some households, there are

special dishes and cookware used only for this holiday which are unpacked and put in place of those used everyday. The home is searched for signs of Chametz (any leavened product made of wheat, oats, rye, barley and spelt) and these foods are removed. So that the food is not wasted, some families send these items to a food pantry for the needy. The holiday is observed for seven days and the Seder (the religious serves and festive meal) is held on the first night; in some homes, on the second night as well. Many of our Reform congregations have community seders on the second night of the holiday.

Preparation for the seder takes time and energy, but it is well worth it. Matzoh is used in place of bread; special desserts are baked and delicacies such as matzoh balls, charoses (a mixture of nuts, apples and wine), gefilte fish and tzimmes are prepared. Children look forward to Passover because they play a very special role in the celebration. During the reading of the Haggadah, the youngest child is asked to read the "Four Questions" At the end of the meal, the children join in searching for the hidden "Afikoman" (originally used as a good luck charm during the Middle Ages).

The day of the Seder arrives and the table is set with the finest of everything including flowers and candles. Symbolic foods for the Seder plate are prepared and a Haggadah (the written story of the holiday is placed at each plate. One of the Seder rituals is setting a special cup of wine for Elijah, the prophet, and opening the door to welcome him. This symbolizes our hope and belief in the coming of the Messianic Age. But it also

symbolizes the warmth and welcoming of the Jewish community to the strangers among us.

Whenever possible, our tradition asks us to make room for one more at the Seder table. Passover is to be shared with friends and family. Are you having a Seder? Invite someone to share your celebration.



There are programs for adults, children, and teenagers. The Religious School is devoting both of its sessions to Mitzvah Day activities. Religious school students who cannot participate with their families in off-site activities will take part in one of our on-site Mitzvah Day activities with our religious school faculty.

We will provide all necessary materials for all projects (except gardening tools). You need to bring only yourselves.

We look forward to a congregation-wide response. Reform congregations elsewhere have held Mitzvah Days with great success. Let's make our Temple Emeth Mitzvah Day a shining example in Bergen County.

The following are the details of the projects we have planned.

### For Everyone - Food/Glasses/Tzedakah Drive

- i) The local food pantry always runs short of food and other supplies in the summer. This is a perfect opportunity for Temple Emeth to help make sure the shelves are stocked during the slow donation months. Especially needed are items for infants. We need donations - and we need help sorting the food.
- ii) Local Lions Clubs have eyeglasses drops in many towns in Teaneck at the post office and in New Milford at the Town Hall. Please bring old glasses, both lenses and frames, to the drop box in the Social Hall.
- iii) Bring in your bulging Tzedakah cans we will sort them for you!

### Project #1 Gardening

Plant a vegetable and flower garden at Brightside Manor, a senior home in Teaneck. Last year we had a great time providing a driveway flower bed and a backyard vegetable patch for Brightside's twenty residents. We're doing it again! All ages welcome, children under 12 with adult please.

### Project #2 More Gardening

We're also planting a garden at the Sam Gorovoy Senior Residence in Bergenfield. Help brighten the residents' spring and summer. All ages welcome, children under 12 with adult please.

### Project #3 Hackensack Riverfront Cleanup

Our neighborhood river needs help! Joined by the Hackensack Riverkeeper - yes, there is one - we will clean the water's edge at Andreas Park in Teaneck and help keep trash from getting into the river. (We will not be going in or on the water.) All ages welcome, children under 12 with adult please.

### Project #4 River Pollution Prevention

Few realize that the storm drains in Teaneck all drain into either Overpeck Park or the Hackensack River. We will be attaching special town-approved medallions to storm drain shields in a few Teaneck neighborhoods to focus the public's awareness on pollution from this source. (The medallions read, "No Dumping - Drains to Stream" with a fish in the center, to remind everyone of the wildlife at risk.) All ages welcome, children under 12 with adult please.

### Project #5 Paint a Room at a Homeless Shelter

Under the auspices of the Interreligious Fellowship for the Homeless, we will brighten up one or more rooms at an I.R.F. facility. Bring your painter's caps and overalls - we'll supply the paint and brushes. *Adults and teens only*.

### Project #6 Blood Drive

A Bloodmobile will be stationed in our parking lot starting late in the morning. Adults only.

### Project #7 Food/Glasses/Tzedakah Drive in our Temple Building

Help sort the food, glasses, and *tzedakah* you and your fellow congregants bring to the Temple. All *ages welcome*.

### Project #8 Baking

Come test drive our new kitchen! We will be baking cookies, cupcakes and other goodies for the Hackensack soup kitchen and homeless shelter. Religious school children plus gourmets of all ages.

### Project #9 Raise Your Voices in Song!

Etz Chayim, Kadima!, and our Adult Choir will be visiting two local nursing homes to sing and visit with residents. Choir members and parents.

### Project #10 Office Help for Non-Profit Organizations

We will be helping two or three non-profit organizations with mailings and other office-related activities. Adults and teens only.

### Project #11 Crafts for Kids

Our youngest volunteers will be creating arts and crafts gifts to donate to those in need of cheer. Religious School and younger children.

### Project #12 Sewing Bee

Neither of the intrepid authors of this flyer knows anything about sewing - but we know some of you do! If you have the machines and the know-how, we'll supply the material and the electricity. Families in shelters could use your skilled output. Anyone who can sew.


