# A MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

## Chanukah, their miracles and ours

Chanukah is a holiday instituted by the Rabbis. It does not appear in our Torah. The Talmud on tractate Shabbat asks: "What is Chanukah"? It replies: "When the Greeks entered the Temple, they defiled all the oil in the Temple...A miracle occurred there and they kindled light for eight days because of it...". According to the Talmud then, the reason for the holiday of Chanukah is centered on the miraculous event. A little oil lasted much longer than anticipated.

On the other hand, one of the central prayers of Chanukah (Al Hanissim) does talk about a different kind of miracle, the victory of the few over the many, that is a military victory. The Al Hanissim prayer states "We thank You also for the miracles, for the redemption, for the mighty deeds and acts of salvation, wrought by You, as well as for the wars which You waged for our fathers in days of old, at this season. In the days of the Hasmonean, Matityahu son of Yohanan, the High Priest, and his sons, when the iniquitous power of Greece rose up against Your people Israel to make them forgetful of Your Law, and to force them to transgress the statutes of Your will...".

Also, we have another testimony as to the origins of Chanukah. The first book of Maccabees tells the story. It states..."Then the king's officers who were forcing the people to give up their religion, came to the town of Modi'in, to make them offer a sacrifice... And Mattathias saw him and was filled with zeal, and his heart was stirred... and ran up and slaughtered him upon the altar. At the same time he killed the king's officer who was trying to compel them to sacrifice, and he tore down the altar... Then Mattathias cried out in a loud voice in the town and said: Let everybody who is zealous for the Law and stands by the agreement come out after me...". According to this source, the initial impetus for Chanukah was the oppression of the Jewish people, the imposition by the Seleucid monarch Antiochus IV of the compulsory worship of the Greek Gods. Political and military oppression led to revolt. So we have these two perspectives on Chanukah. The religious miracle and the historical revolt.

As we will celebrate with our families by lighting the candles, playing dreidel, eating oily latkes and playing with Chanukah gelt, we should have in mind these two perspectives. Let us remember that Chanukah is also about looking at our world from the Divine perspective. Let us be more aware of political and religious persecutions in our world and like the Maccabees of old, we too should stand to oppose attempts to diminish our image and likeness of God.

# **Eight Nights, Eight Lights**

It is hard to believe that Chanukah is here already! Even as we finish eating turkey and cranberry sauce, we begin throwing potatoes and onions in the blender, wrapping gifts and polishing our Chanukah menorahs. We are so anxious to see those eight lights glowing on the *chanukiah* that we wish we could light them all the first night. So why not? Why don't we light eight candles each night instead of lighting just one per night? This is not an unusual question, one that I have in fact, pondered before. In *Shabbos 21*, we read that Rabbi Hillel says: On the first day of Chanukah, one candle shall be lit. Each subsequent night one candle is added, so that on the eighth night there are eight lights.

We can learn any number of things from this. By increasing the light each night we remember that we must also increase our own light, our own learning and spiritual enlightenment. It is imperative that we do not remain stagnant, for an inactive spiritual soul is sure to weaken and be unavailable to us when we need it the most. Even as we achieve spiritual growth, we must constantly further that growth.

We must also remember that in any case, it is a mistake to grasp too much too soon. Any growth should be gradual and happen but one level at a time. If our spiritual growth happens too quickly, our spirituality could be occurring only on the surface and we may not even recognize it. The foundation is what is truly important here and we must be patient if we are to acquire the gifts that each of us already possess. This Chanukah, may we light the *chanukiah* with the anticipation of seeing increased light in ourselves and our loved ones with each new candle.

At this season of Chanukah, teachers and students in our religious school reflect on the meaning of "light" as a theme which is a source of meaning in Religious School studies. The Torah, History, Hebrew, Ethics, and Holidays that we study in our Religious School are the building blocks that shed light and illumination and shape us as Jewish adults and "mentchen". Our students encounter Jewish learning experiences that are illuminating and exciting.

- 7<sup>th</sup> grade field trip to Ellis Island fun, informative, community building.
- 6<sup>th</sup> grade reflecting on heroes and heroines in their lives and making decisions.
- 5<sup>th</sup> grade studying "a modern miracle" the State of Israel and its impact on their lives.
- 4<sup>th</sup> grade creating an exciting game based on the Exodus and journey of the Israelites and learning to connect to our liturgy as a living faith.
- 3<sup>rd</sup> grade beginning the exciting study of Hebrew, both modern and ancient.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> grade learning blessings, holidays, and the blessings of our tradition.
- 1<sup>st</sup> grade identifying and connecting to Jewish values through traditional Jewish stories and literature.
- Kindergarten creating art, learning songs, and how our synagogue is a home to them.

Encompassing all of these studies is our emphasis on "living a mitzvah and being a mensch". A great chasidic master used the candle lighting of Chanukah as a time to focus on the need to shine a light into our "inner darkness" and to purify our "inner temple". It is truly a joy to see the "illuminated faces" of our religious school students as we continue our Jewish journey together. A poem written by Rabbi Leah Kroll articulates beautifully this idea. Share it with family and friends this Chanukah and make your holiday be filled with light and joy.

# WINE 101 (WITH SOME 201 FOR DENOPHILES)

## LECTURE AND WINE TASTING LED BY PIERRE OF WINE VENTURES OF TENAFLY

You've just finished ordering your meal and the waiter asks: "Would you like to order wine with dinner?" Of course you would! But you're having veal, and your dinner companion has ordered fish. Panic sets in. Do I order a white or red? I could ask the waiter; but what if he recommends a bottle that's outside my budget? Fearing embarrassment, you turn to the waiter and say: "We'll just have a couple of cokes, please."

On February 8, wine expert Pierre Szczygiel will shed light on which wine to order with particular foods-and (pretension aside) how much it really matters. He will also discuss the difference between different varieties of wine, regional designations. aroma, taste and bouquet. Facts will be validated and myths dispelled. Does red wine really have to breathe before you drink it? Can you really get a good bottle of wine for under \$10?

A variety of fine wines will be available for tasting, along with discussion of differences between them.

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# Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library Update:

# THE GREAT AMERICAN JEWISH NOVEL...CONTINUED

As we enter the 21<sup>st</sup> century, we find the American Jewish novel alive and well. Michael Chabon's acclaimed novel, "The Amazing Adventure of Cavalier and Clay," started off the new century with a bang. However, the book still describes the Jewish experience in America of the last century. It has themes of flight, dislocation, and the urgency of reinventing oneself as an American. Set in New York City during the war years, it is combined with a personal story about the Holocaust. It stars two young cousins, one American and one European, who launch their strange careers at the start of World War II. Their wildly popular comic book characters mirror their own hopes, dreams, and hatred of fascism. The world of Europe will disappear in flames and death, and they must forge a new life in the new world.

Bernard Malamud, Saul Bellow, and Philip Roth make up the grand triumvirate of Jewish novelists of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Each of them has written great novels which depict the struggle of Jews assimilating into American secular society while coming to terms with what it means to be Jewish. Malamud's novel "The Assistant" is one of the most interesting and enigmatic of these novels. It tells the story of Jewish grocer Morris Bober, struggling to keep afloat in Depressionera Brooklyn, and the guilt-ridden Frank Alpine, an Italian-American who robs Bober's store and tries to redeem himself by working as Bober's assistant and eventually converting to Judaism himself. Other featured novels of this immigrant experience are Bellow's "The Adventures of Augie March" and Roth's "Portnoy's Complaint."

These novels all leave the "old world" behind and concentrate on the new world. A 21<sup>st</sup> century novel just published, "Everything is Illuminated," by Jonathan Safran Foer, recalls the literary tradition of Malamud, Roth, Bellow (and now Chabon), while creating something different. Its structure is emblematic of a secular Jew who grew up on MTV. Foer explores Jewish identity in a post-assimilation age by concentrating on Eastern Europe. After all, what 20<sup>th</sup> century American Jew considered returning, either emotionally or physically, to Eastern Europe?

In the summer after his junior year of college, a writer—also named Jonathan Safran Foer journeys to the farmlands of Eastern Europe looking for a woman named Augustine, who may or may not have saved his grandfather from the Nazis. Much of the book is narrated by Foer's Ukranian guide Alex Perchov, whose use of malapropisms in broken English lends a tone of humor to a book with a basically serious theme. Alex's growing sensitivity towards Jews echoes that of Frank Alpine in "The Assistant," and his name and sex-obsessed personality is reminiscent of our old friend Alex Portnoy. Woven into the story is the book the fictional Jonathan is writing, a fable of his grandfather's village set in the 18<sup>th</sup> century.

The book has elements of magic realism, uproarious narration, and a dog named Sammy Davis Junior Junior, who adds his voice and opinions to the narration. The journey into American assimilation was completed in the last century. It is time for the journey back.

# Review of the Italian writer Oriana Fallaci's book "The Rage and the Pride"

As a result of 9-11 writer and journalist Oriana Fallaci wrote a scathing book which ignited bitter controversy in Europe (millions of copies of her book have been sold). Her defense of American culture found much antipathy in Europe. Fallaci was an anti-Fascist resistance fighter as a teenager and a war correspondent for most of her career as a journalist. But for the past 10 years she did not write. This book is a spontaneous reaction to 9-11, an indictment of Muslim immigrants and Italian ambivalence towards the United States.
