

## Morality of War - David Hartman's View

**I** pass on this important report, written on March 2003 by David Hartman, director of the Shalom Hartman Institute where I am a Fellow. By the time you will read this message, war with Iraq might have started. The morality of this possible war needs to be clarified in our minds. David Hartman's perspective is an important one to consider.

"Dear Friends,

Our people's resilience fills me with a sense of radical amazement. The atmosphere in our country today is festive and Purim-like, while at the same time, it is anxious and stressful as we wait for yet another United Nations' Security Council vote. During the past months we witnessed with astonishment how a major part of the world turned against the United States with unexpected hostility and venom, going so far as to characterize the American government as a dangerous global power bent on humiliating and attacking defenseless victims such as Saddam, and his benign regime, in order to expand American hegemony throughout the world.

The distortion of turning this "defenseless victim" — who is the primary aggressor and violator of human decency — into a martyr endangers the very meaning and credibility of moral discourse. Despite Saddam's proven treachery and the clear hypocrisy and cynicism of his pretense at disarmament, there are, incredibly, many in the West willing to play Saddam's game and to accept his declarations of innocence at face value. This gross perversion of reality and the ludicrous claim that Bush presents a greater threat to Western civilization than Saddam is, in part, a result of the foolish — but no less dangerous — parody of liberal morality that reduces moral judgments to power relationships. Moral judgments are informed by the relative difference in power between two parties; the weaker side, the victim, is in the right; the stronger side, the aggressor, is in the wrong by virtue of its power. This equation of morality with weakness and the reduction of moral concepts to power relationships simplifies moral judgments, allowing for the certitude and self-righteousness that many religions and ideologies, both right or left, thrive upon.

The world has turned upside down — a central motif of the Purim story. Jews in Persia discovered one morning that a

royal decree ordering their annihilation had been issued because of the thwarted ambitions of a man who desired absolute power and could not tolerate the existence of a people unwilling to bow down and submit unconditionally to any form of earthly power. Our collective mission as a people was, and is, to say "No" to the false gods of history. We said "No" to Haman not because of his political power but because of

Haman's need for unlimited power and control. Haman's inability to tolerate limits was transformed into his inability to tolerate our very existence. His obsession with our destruction was justified in his mind by our being an obstacle to his own personal fulfillment.



As long as the Jewish people persists, we shall continue saying "No" to those who view our disappearance as a condition for their flourishing. We shall say "No" not because of our adversaries' power or weakness but because of the timeless deceit linking our well-being with their impotence. Many Palestinians remain driven

by the belief that our nation's health and strength have a demoralizing, dehumanizing effect on their own development. If they and many of their Western apologists were to be believed, the entire Arab world would flourish if only there were no Jews in the Middle East. The illusion that our celebration of life is the root cause of their weakness is yet another form of the attempt by the weak to dominate and to control by demonically using their weakness as a weapon against a more powerful adversary.

I am convinced that were it not for America's dominance in the world today there would be chaos. The European countries that publicly proclaim their moral superiority over America — the "power-driven" "super-cop" of the world — are in fact driven by a desire for power and control, which they believe is being thwarted as long as the United States is the sole power preserving liberty and freedom.

I hope the spirit that pervades all of Israel and Jerusalem today will inspire all of you to celebrate life and to say *le'haim*. When you celebrate the Passover seder, and you say "Next year in Jerusalem," you should feel joy in your hearts because this is the symbol of our belief in the future, and of our hope for a new and better world.

We feel blessed to be the directors of the education programs here at Temple Emeth. In this season of Passover, we recognize that numbers and their significance give us points of reference throughout the Haggadah. We see the number four in the Four Questions, the Four Cups of Wine, the Four Kinds of People asking why this night is different, and the Four Tellings of Redemption. We have our own Four - the Four ways we are blessed to be part of Jewish education from "kinder" of two through confirmation.:

1. We are blessed to be working with a rich, wise tradition that allows us to begin from the smallest seed of knowledge that grows up and out as it provides not only many answers, but allows and encourages questions.

2. We are blessed that we are instructed, from the youngest babe to the oldest zede, to move from our "narrow spaces" that confine (habits, prejudices, negativity, etc. ) towards the "wide open spaces" of change, tolerance and positiveness.

3. We are blessed that our work connects us with children and parents who make our schools a family. Just as the seder is experienced and celebrated in the home among family and friends, so do our programs create an extended family for learning, growing, and celebrating together.

4. We are blessed with our staff who invests time, energy, and care beyond measure (much like the preparations for the seder) to create an environment where the children can blossom. In their routine interactions, they personify qualities that are found in the Haggadah - awe, kindness, compassion, and respect.

ג Which is the middle letter of the AlephBet

Which is the final letter in the AlephBet

Using this sequence, our tradition teaches us that truth is an all-encompassing and empowering value. When we seek EMET, we expand our souls as we journey from the narrow spaces to the wide open places.

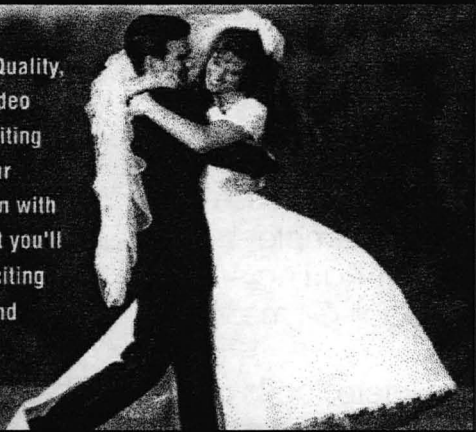

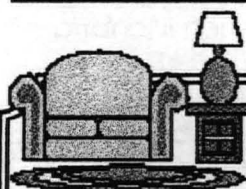

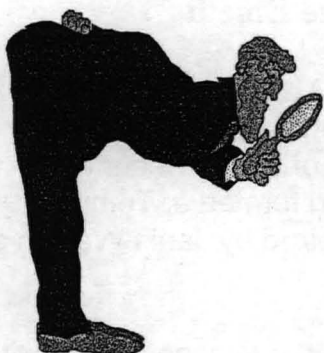
A new fund has been established to help defray the cost of security personnel and materials. This will be titled the Security Fund.

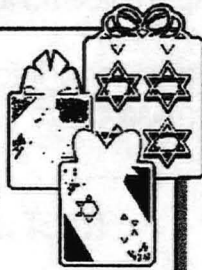

# Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library Update: NOBEL VALUES

We'd like to quote from a recent editorial in the English-language weekly *The Forward*. The October 18, 2002 issue announced that Imre Kertesz, a little-known Jewish Hungarian novelist, won the Nobel Prize for literature. This editorial detailed the rationale for this award in the context of the recent resurgence of anti-Semitism throughout Europe and tied the award with past Jewish Nobel Laureates.

*"If the selection of this year's Nobel laureates tells us anything, it's that the challenges and crises of the worldwide Jewish community are at the very top of the international agenda. The Jewish drama is now, so to speak, at the heart of the human drama..."*

*The message couldn't have been more blunt. By awarding the prize in literature to a chronicler of the Nazi death camps, Hungarian Jewish novelist Imre Kertesz, the foundation was broadcasting a clear-cut denunciation of the anti-Semitism resurfacing across Europe in recent months. Europeans have been dithering and debating the meaning of the new Jew-hatred, lamenting the attacks and synagogue burnings yet ... dismissing them ... as a form of understandable political violence ... from the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. By honoring Kertesz, the Nobel committee was reminding...the world that bigotry and Jew-hatred are not a point of view but a crime against humanity.*

*Kertesz is the first death-camp survivor to receive the literature prize, but he's hardly the first Jewish chronicler of the Holocaust to win a Nobel. ...he's the fourth. The first was...Nelly Sachs, ...in 1966. The second was Elias Canetti,...who won the prize in 1981 for his writings in German on mass movements and human evil. The third was Elie Wiesel, who won the peace prize in 1986. One might add S.Y. Agnon, ...in 1966, and Isaac Bashevis Singer, ...in 1978, both of them for writings that recreated the world Hitler destroyed. **The Nobel foundation has acknowledged the Holocaust amply in the past. It made the point again this year because it was necessary.**"*

## ***We Interrupt our Regular Friday Night Services for this Special Announcement .....***

The Ritual Committee is pleased to announce that, thanks to a generous grant from the Lazar Foundation, we have acquired a limited number of copies of the latest draft of the Reform movement's new prayerbook, *Mishkan T'filah*, for use on an experimental basis, as part of the movement's pilot project. We will be using the book on six Friday night services between now and the end of June, on the following dates: April 25, May 9, May 23, May 30, June 13, and June 27. Each of those services will start at the regular time of 8:30 p.m., and the dates were chosen so as not to interfere with the previously scheduled family and musical services.

The new prayerbook has been designed to provide a variety of worship options, and includes text, transliteration, creative translations, poetry and commentary. Some theological changes have been incorporated as well. A major thrust of the new prayerbook is towards allowing Reform

congregations to reflect their diverse worship styles, while allowing for individual expression by congregants during the course of the service.

We are urging as many members as possible to join us as we experiment with the new prayerbook. We would welcome comments from all congregants, both as to the prayerbook itself, and as to our usage of it in the coming weeks. Please bear in mind that because the book is still in draft form, there are a number of obvious "rough edges" that have to be smoothed out in the final version. Please also bear in mind that we may be using the book differently over the course of the experiment, so as to take advantage of the flexibility offered. Accordingly, no one service will necessarily be "typical" of what the future may hold.

After the six experimental services, we will meet to discuss our responses, and provide feedback to the editors. We would be pleased to include any written responses we receive from congregants in our feedback process, so that the final edition will reflect as broad a sampling as possible of the views of Temple Emeth. We look forward to seeing you at these services.
