As a first year rabbinical student at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Jerusalem I witnessed the first ordination of a woman rabbi in the State of Israel. (There were already several women

rabbis serving in Israel, but until 1992, all of them had been ordained in the Diaspora.) That ceremony, more than any other in my experience, captured the importance and potential of Reform Judaism in Israel.

In a country that has had a woman prime minister and where women are integral to the efficiency

and preparedness of the armed forces, the only thing to wonder about the ordination of women rabbis in Israel is why it took so long. That ceremony was a powerful statement that Reform Judaism has a message for the vast majority of Israeli Jews: Judaism is modern and Judaism is meaningful.

The potential of Reform Judaism in Israel will be realized, however, only when there are enough rabbis to spread that message to every corner of the country. Currently when Israeli Reform rabbis are ordained, most of them serve as rabbis part time. This is because the Israeli government funds Orthodox synagogues with taxpayer money, but leaves Reform synagogues to operate solely on private donations. In many Reform synagogues, the funding is

not there to pay their rabbis a full-time livable salary, and so they must seek income elsewhere. In doing so these rabbis are unable to share all their talent with their congregations.

The only way the situation will change is with help from us.

In December, Temple Emeth's Board of Trustees adopted a new project to support Reform Judaism in Israel called Hineini: Embracing Our People, Building Our Future. Over the next two years, *Temple Emeth, together with other Reform,

congregations in North America that are participating in the project, will be raising money for the sponsorship of Israeli Reform rabbinical students. This will enable them to do what they have been trained to do — lead the Jewish people toward a modern understanding of Torah.

The scholarships, given to Israeli rabbinical students studying at Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem, will finance the last two years of the students' seminary tuition and provide the rabbis with seed money to create new Reform Judaism projects once they are ordained. Throughout the next two years we will have the opportunity to establish lasting


"TEACH YOUR CHILDREN WELL"

he title is a line I remember from a popular song entitled "Teach Your Children", written in the early 70s by Graham Nash and sung by the group Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young. Another line goes, "And feed them on your dreams."

In December, I asked in this column how many of us belong to Temple Emeth because it is required for our child to become a Bar or Bat Mitzvah here. We know that a number of our families discontinue their membership soon after their youngest child becomes a Bar or Bat Mitzvah. There are an even larger number of our families who, though they continue as members, allow their children to stop their Jewish education at that point.

Though there are many reasons that this happens, the message that often gets through to our children, intentional or not, is "We are Jewish! The Bar/Bat Mitzvah is important! The rest is not!" If a major reason we put our children through the B'nai Mitzvah process is so we can look our Jewish neighbor in the eye, this message will not be lost on our children. As they grow older, many of them will come to see it as cynical and hypocritical, and when their turn as parents come, they will be less likely to bother at all.

I say this as one whose Jewish educationended after my Bar Mitzvah, and for the longest time afterward, did not care. That attitude carried forward to my parenting years, and had it not been for the influence of my wife Carla, would have been passed on to my children. My point being that if you are a member of Temple Emeth, then assumedly there is at least a part of you that feels that Judaism and being Jewish is important



to you. But many of our children will not learn this or even care unless we set an example and encourage and even prod them.

This brings me to our own Religious School at Temple Emeth and the educational force behind it, our director Dora Geld Friedman, otherwise known as Morah Dora. All who meet Dora are charmed by her warm, nurturing personality and her dramatic flair as she works with our teachers and children. The Hebrew language literally becomes music to our children's ears as she speaks it to them in the context of a lesson.

Our children learn about our core Jewish principles: our belief in God; the study and engagement of Torah; how we can become a spiritual community through Avodah, the worship experience; that each of us, individually and as a community, are responsible for G'milut Chasadim – to do acts of loving

kindness and to repair and perfect the world: and that we have a special relationship with Eretz Yisrael - the land of Israel. Dora does this with the help of Rabbi Sirbu, our teachers, our school administrator Barbara Sabella, our adult and student volunteers and our volunteer Religious School committee, chaired this year by Paula Dillon and Ken Hoffman. It is done in the classroom, in the sanctuary, by connecting to the rest of the Temple community through Jewish holidays such as the upcoming Purim celebration and events such as Mitzvah day; and by involving us as parents through Family Education programs.

We entrust the Jewish education of our children to Temple Emeth, through Dora and her professional and administrative support staff. But like many other things, the message learned within the four walls of Temple Emeth can be enhanced or diminished, re-enforced or undermined, by the messages they receive from us, their parents, within the four walls of our homes.

So if Judaism is important to us, then we must teach our children. Teach them well! Teach them by our example and our attitude. "And feed them on our dreams."







PURIM: THE HIDDEN AND THE REVEALED

Our tradition, in its infinite wisdom, instructs us that when we come into the month of Adar, we need to "increase our happiness". As we approach the celebration of Purim, which falls in the month of Adar, how does this instruction challenge us? How does this mandate instruct us, students and families alike, to live a more meaningful, joyous, Jewish life?

On its simplest level, Purim celebrates the "hidden" Esther (masks) and "revealed" - Mordechai, the proud lew. The holiday of Purim inspires us to examine our faith and imbue it with meaning and personal dedication. In Temple Emeth Religious School, both parents and students are examining, struggling, and dedicating themselves to serious questions of lewish identity and practice. Our students are involved in learning through a variety of strategies: text, art, music, guest lecturers and artists - a variety of lewish experiences that will weave for them memories and connections to our lewish tradition. Here are some examples:

Grades 5 and 6 have led inspiring services demonstrating fluency and an



understanding of the importance of prayer in their lives and in our school community. I know that the 4th grade will also successfully lead us in meaningful "tfilah". Our 7th grade curriculum has been enriched immeasurably with a new concentration of Torah, as well as heritage arts reflecting holidays and life-cycle events. Our family education programs for grades K-7 are well attended and students, teachers, and parents enjoy learning, discussing, singing and dancing - in short, creating

a dynamic Jewish community.

The study of Torah, prayer and celebration of the holidays "with joy" add meaning and purpose to our lives. This poem by the famous Israeli poet, Leah Goldberg, challenges us to look at the "hidden" and "revealed" in our lives and commit ourselves to renewal and joy.

Teach me my God, a blessing, a prayer
On the mystery of a withered leaf
On ripened fruit so fair
On the freedom to see, to sense,
To breathe, to know, to hope, to despair.
Teach my lips a blessing, a hymn of praise
As each morning and night
You renew Your days,
Lest my days be as the one before

Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library Update: GREAT TIME

ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION

This month the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library showcases the "Great Jews" series. These books contain many biographical sketches of Jews who have attained fame in different fields. Great Moments in Jewish History is equally informative, but it focuses on events rather than individuals. So for a great time, come to the library!

Great Jewish Men by Elinor Slater & Robert Slater. The authors pay tribute to Jews who have achieved prominence worldwide by virtue of the excellence of the works they have produced, the discoveries they have made, and the ways they have improved the lot of humanity. Included are Abraham and Moses, Rashi and Maimonides, Theodor Herzl and Chaim Weitzmann, as well as Franz Kafka, Irvin Berlin, Albert Einstein, Sigmund Freud, and David Ben-Gurion.

Great Jewish Women by Elinor Slater & Robert Slater. The Slaters give special recognition to those Jewish women who have persevered and succeeded, sometimes against great odds. Among those profiled in this book are Golda Meir, Ruth Bader Ginsberg, Wendy Wasserstein, Estee Lauder, and Dianne Feinstein.

Great Moments in Jewish History by Elinor Slater & Robert Slater. This book brings to life events that have shaped the character and essence of the Jewish people. In iMoments of Courage,î we find Esther saving the Jews of Persia and the Jews in the Warsaw Ghetto fighting the Nazis. "Moments of Joy" include the discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls and the birth of the State of Israel. Jews have endured too many "Moments of Despair" such as mass suicide at Masada, expulsion from Spain, and Kristallnacht. In the final section, "Moments of Creativity," we learn about the beginning of mysticism the founding of the first kibbutz, and the first bat mitzvah.

Great Jews in the Performing Arts by Darryl Lyman. Throughout the ages Jewish actors, singers, dancers, and comics from all parts of the world have graced the stage and screen and delighted audiences. This book celebrates the lives of performers from Joey Adams to Efrem Zimbalist, Jr.







relationships with these rabbis (through online chats, video pen pal programs, and quarterly newsletters) and learn more about the traditions and challenges of Reform Judaism in Israel.

This project is part of a Reform Movement-wide initiative adopted by the General Assembly of the Union for Reform Judaism at the Biennial convention in November 2003 in order to strengthen the Movement's connection to Reform Jewish peoplehood and the State of Israel. The Board's resolution asks each of our members to contribute at least \$18 a year for two years to support the sponsorship of these rabbinical students. We hope that through our efforts and those of other Reform synagogues they will create innovative Progressive Jewish

programs that meet the spiritual needs of today's Israelis and enrich religious life in Israel for years to come.

I invite your feedback and questions on Israeli Reform Judaism in general and the Hineini project in particular. You may also direct your questions to Temple members Gloria Barsky and Vicky Farhi, who are coordinating Temple Emeth's participation in the Hineini initiative.

Theodor Herzl is quoted as saying, "If you will it, it is no dream." This statement became the slogan for the pioneers who laid the foundations for the State of Israel. I hope that we will provide the will so that a flourishing reform Judaism in Israel is no dream.
