

The Union for Reform Judaism's Department of Jewish Family Concerns has published a dozen bioethics study guides. It has also released publications on eating disorders, mental illness, sacred aging, and end-of-life issues. The man behind all of these publications is Rabbi Richard F. Address, the director of the Department of Jewish Family Concerns, Rabbi Address knows all the relevant lewish texts but, more importantly, he understands people and the anxiety involved in making a difficult medical decision.

I am pleased to welcome Rabbi Address to Temple Emeth on Friday night, October 8 at 8:00 p.m. to deliver this year's Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Lecture. Rabbi Address' lecture is certain to provide much food for thought. Sacred aging and end-of-life issues, especially, require us to discuss our views and our fears with our loved ones. This isn't easy, but Temple Emeth is offering a resource to help.

Beginning on Tuesday, October 12, our Adult Education Committee is

offering a class called "Life, Death and What's for Dinner?" The instructor, Stephen Sidorsky, is a social worker whose experience working with Jewish families makes him well-qualified for this program. Over three sessions he will talk about the values that define a family's character, how to communicate with your loved ones, and how to write an ethical will. In other words, he will help you take the ideas presented by Rabbi Address and incorporate them into your life and the life of your family.

The advances that science makes in the laboratory are at times nothing short of awesome. It is the responsibility of Judaism to ensure that these advances are for the ultimate good of society. Thanks to teachers like Richard Address and Stephen Sidorsky, we all can learn to comprehend the technology and its moral limits, and use it so that we always choose life, that we and our children may live.

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# Board Meeting Report September 9, 2004

This month, I am diverting from my usual style for the Bulletin Article because there were two agenda items discussed at our September 9 board meeting that I want to communicate to you. They include a report presented by the Cantorial Needs Assessment Committee and its recommendation which was adopted by the board; and a discussion regarding major repairs that must be made to our sanctuary roof.

### **Cantorial Needs Assessment Report**


Beginning in February, I charged Dan Firshein, our First Vice-President, and six other board members and non-board congregants to assess Temple Emeth's cantorial services needs and to balance that with our financial situation. In particular, they explored the viability of a part time vs. a full time position.

The committee, or members of the committee interviewed, spoke to or otherwise communicated with many people, including Rabbi Randi Musnitsky (the regional director of the Union for Reform Judaism), Rabbi Sirbu, Cantor Tilem, Jacqueline Guttman (our volunteer choir director) and Dora Geld Friedman (our religious school director). They developed a survey and conducted telephone interviews with approximately 15 New Jersey congregations of similar size to evaluate cantorial functions and responsibilities. A request for general congregation comments was made in the TE Bulletin.

The committee reviewed the various services performed by cantors in our region and came up with a list of 25 services which they felt are necessary to the spiritual life at Temple Emeth. It made the following recommendation

to the board, which was adopted after a lengthy discussion:

"The committee is aware that, ideally, the congregation would prefer a full time cantor. However, we have concluded that, given Temple Emeth's



current financial picture, it would be imprudent to recommend to the Board of Trustees the hiring of a full-time cantor at this time. We believe that, in general, the Cantorial duties suggested above can be accomplished with a part-time cantor at a cost to Temple Emeth comparable to our current expenditure for cantorial and b'nai mitzvah services. We would urge that, as is the case with the Rabbi, the performance of these responsibilities be quantifiable through regular performance reviews."

Copies of the full report will be available at the office.

### Sanctuary Roof Repairs

Some of you may be aware that during the summer, there was a significant leak in a portion of the sanctuary roof and that a few storms later, despite the leak being patched and repaired, there was a second leak in a different area. We have obtained a professional assessment, and the recommendation is that the sanctuary roof, plus a second smaller portion of the roof, be replaced before the winter at an estimated cost of \$50,000. We are in the process of securing additional assessments and estimates.

In addition, after the roof is replaced, we will need to repair/replace the sanctuary ceiling and solve a ventilation problem that exists between the roof and the ceiling. This work will probably take place over next summer. At the current time, we do not have a good estimate of what that will cost.

In response to this news at the board meeting, one of our board members made an offer to donate \$5,000 towards the roof if it was matched by other board members. Thirty people around the table immediately responded with additional donations of from \$50 to \$500. The total pledged to date is \$13,500. The finance committee, executive committee and the board will be reviewing funding and financing alternatives with respect to the remainder.

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# A....B....C....

As Parents and educators, we are all very attuned to the importance of the ABC's in education – the Academic,

Behavioral and Civic challenges our children face and deal with at school and at home. In the past few decades, it seems we have shied away from continuing onto the D for Discipline. For some reason, whether it is our own past experiences or the overwhelming nature of our present schedules, there seems to be an aversion to consistent discipline. Whether it be the exhaustion at the end of the day or the difficul-

ty of planning in advance, it is too often easier to "give in" resulting in minor pauses of quiet but ultimately allowing and actually reinforcing unacceptable traits.

In an article in Parents Magazine several years ago, psychiatrist Dr. Lawrence Kutner approached the challenge of effective and appropriate discipline for young children. He began by noting that the word discipline is derived from the Latin disciplina, which means instruction, and shares the same root as disciple, which means teaching and protecting. He emphasized the proactive nature of discipline as creating environments and schedules that are conducive to fostering positive learning experiences that will reinforce the values and behaviors that we want to help our children to develop.



This is quite different from punishment, which refers to a reaction to something which we view as bad. More often than not, punishment is meted out from emotion rather than logic.

We have once again arrived at the period in the Jewish year where we stop, take stock, and plan for the coming year. Perhaps it is also a good time to take a new look at Discipline and try to embrace it as the positive tool it can be to help

our children continue to grow into the marvelous menches they can be. This is a wonderful opportunity to look at and evaluate our routines as to how they do or do not help foster our children's developmental tendencies for growing independence in an emotionally safe, supportive environment.

# END OF LIFE ISSUES

## ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION

At some point in all of our lives, we m must deal with the illness and loss of loved ones. When we feel overwhelmed and emotionally spent, we can turn to the wisdom of a caring tradition for guidance and solace. Rabbi Sirbu has offered us workshops on preparing for the end of life, and at this year's Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Lecture on Friday, October 8th, Rabbi Richard Address speaks on "Making Sacred Decisions in Light of Emerging Medical Technology." The following books explore such themes and are all available in the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library.

A Time to Prepare edited by Richard Address. During difficult times, this is a helpful compassionate guide to making personal arrangements, establishing the limits of medical care, and embracing rituals a the end of life.

The Jewish Way in Death and Mourning by Maurice Lamm. "Judaism does teach the aching heart how to express its pain in love and respect, and how to achieve the eventual consolation which will restore us to humanity."

The Lord is My Shepherd by Michael Samuel. Rabbi Samuel examines God's presence as a partner in dialogue in the religious life of contemporary Jews.

Every Person's Guide to Death and Dying in the Jewish Tradition by Ronald H. Isaacs. What does Judaism say about life and death? Rabbi Isaacs talks about visiting the sick, ethical wills, funeral, burial, unveiling, yizkor, yahrzeit, the world to come, and various views of the soul. He gives advice on explaining death to children, as well as readings and comforting reflections.

The Lord is My Shepherd: Healing Wisdom of the Twenty Third Psalm by Harold S. Kushner. Each chapter focuses on one line of the psalm and illuminates the life lessons contained within it.


On Death and Dying by Elisabeth Kubler-Ross. This classic offers hope for the understanding of human strengths and weaknesses experienced at very trying times.

Saying Kaddish: How to Comfort the Dying, Bury the Dead & Mourn as a Jew by Anita Diamant. The author shows how to make Judaism's time-honored rituals into personal, meaningful source of comfort from the sickroom to the funeral to the week, month, and year that follow.

Kaddish by Leon Wieseltlier. When the author's father died, he recited Kaddish three times a day. Struck by its unexpected power, Wieseltier began to study the origin of the ancient ritual. This book records his journey of discovery.




Rabbi Richard F. Address will speak on "Making Sacred Decisions in Light of Emerging Medical Technology."



# To pray with sincerity...

At Temple Emeth we take pride in being a loving community. One of the most important ways we do this is by offering our presence to congregants in mourning. Anyone who has suffered loss knows how comforting it is to have Temple memberseven strangers-in one's home at precisely these times.

You can make a big difference in someone's life when support is most needed. Immediately following the death of a loved one, most of our members have at least one prayer service, known as a Shiva Minyan, in their home. Sometimes, though, the family lacks the ten adult Jews required to have a full service. At other times, a member of the congregation is needed to substitute for the rabbi and cantor in leading the service.

We need your help to perform both of these sacred duties, but we don't want you to walk into a stranger's house unprepared.

Rabbi Sirbu and Cantor Tilem will be offering Shiva Minyan training so that you know what to expect when you perform the mitzvot of visiting a house of mourning or leading a Shiva Minyan. 

# Last Chance to See Temple Emanuel of North Jersey

A Jewish architectural landmark in Paterson is on view for the last time. Built in 1929, Temple Emanuel will soon be closing its doors and, like many of its congregants, moving to Franklin Lakes. On Sunday, October 17<sup>th</sup>, from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m., Temple Emanuel will be open in conjunction with the 16<sup>th</sup> Annual House Tour of the Historic Eastside Neighborhood of Paterson. This impressive 1200seat Art Deco Temple is known for its pillar-less construction, magnificent stained glass windows and ceiling inserts. Inside, the Temple is enhanced with a marble pulpit and dramatic chandeliers.

Temple Emanuel was financed by Jacob Fabian of the Fabian Theatre chain and designed by renowned architect Henry Wentworth, who also designed many Art Deco theatres of the 1920's. It is located on Broadway in Paterson, just a few blocks west of the Passaic River and the Elmwood Park border. After visiting the Temple, tour the restored mansions of former congregants, several of which recently received state and national recognition as a designated Historic District. Tickets are \$20 and can be purchased at the pavilion in Eastside Park. All proceeds go to revitalizing the Historic District. 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# Among our Temple Emeth family... Harriet Hyams

Harriet Hyams, a member of Temple Emeth for many years, is known to long-time congregants as the person who designed and installed the vibrant stained glass windows in our sanctuary As a member of the building committee rat that time, she also coordinated the ark doors by Efrem Weitzman and the Ten Commandments, *ner tamid* (eternal light) and candelabra, all by Alvin Cooke; she later designed our sanctuary memorial walls and yartzeit light as well.

Harriet is an accomplished and widely recognized artist whose work can be seen at many locations including the Jewish Chapel at the United States Military Academy at West Point, for which she was commissioned to produce two three-story windows. The 32-foot-high windows, which depict David and Joshua in an expressionistic symbolic style, are constructed of antique glass that has been painted and sandblasted. Although the project dates back to 1998, it was dedicated just recently, on September 19<sup>th</sup>, when Harriet was honored for her work and invited to speak. Why did it take so long? As the artist puts it, "Life has a way of zigzagging, and it is one of its mysteries that the windows are just now being dedicated."

Harriet Hyams was also cited in a recently published book, *Women Working in Glass*, by Lucartha Kohler. It traces the history of glass design from ancient times to the present. For examples of Harriet's beautiful and extraordinary work, visit her website: www.harriethyams.com,

## Jack and Helen Lazar Educational Enrichment Fund

Virtually every member of Temple Emeth has benefited from a project funded by the Jack and Helen Lazar Educational Enrichment Fund since this endowed fund was established in 1990.

Religious School students have been enriched by programs such as the "Shofar Factory," a computer and Judaic software, a video library, and a resource room teacher. Early Childhood Center students have enjoyed toys, books, blocks, playground equipment and exciting special programs such as a visiting petting zoo. Adults have learned from additional classes and speakers. In addition, grants from the Lazar Fund have paid in part for Children's High Holy Day services, the cost of educating our students at the Bergen Academy of Reform Judaism (BARJ), the printing costs for our own prayerbook, *Siddur Emet*, new shelving and furniture in our library, and youth awards to our children attending Reform youth, camping and Israel programs.

Jack and Helen Lazar pledged \$100,000, payable over three years, in response to Temple's 1989 Annual Giving Campaign. In January of 1990, Jack Lazar passed away and, based upon the wishes of the Lazar family, these monies were used to endow an educational enrichment fund in their name. The principal of this Fund is held by the Temple Emeth Endowment Foundation (TEEF). Each year, 85% of the interest from this Fund is returned to the Temple for making educational grants and 15% of the interest is added

to the Lazar Fund's principal. The interest payment for the current year is \$4,218. Grants from the Lazar Fund are made by the Education Endowments Allocation Committee. This Committee consists of five members, three of whom are appointed by the respective chairs of the Adult Education, Early Childhood Center. and Religious School Committees; the other two members, one of whom serves as chair, are appointed by the President. The Committee meets at least twice a year, in the fall and spring, to review congregational grant proposals.

Helen Lazar passed away in 1997, but the wonderful projects made possible each year through the Lazar Fund are a living memorial to both Helen and Jack. Their generosity to Temple Emeth is also visible through their donation of the social hall, the bema and ark, and the administrative offices of our schools.

### House.... Committee Report

As I write, Summer's ending and we're all getting ready for new beginnings with the start of ECC and Religious School, Mini-University classes at Temple, committee meetings and other activities and, especially, the approach of the High Holy Days. The House Committee has been busy getting the building ready for all of these things.

You've probably noticed the carpet on the walls of the Youth Lounge, a common usage on walls to protect them. This carpeting of the walls serves the purpose for which it was intended — taking the abuse caused by the "wheelie toys" during ECC play time and reducing the amount of frequent wall patching and painting that had previously been necessary. This is a work in progress. Molding, similar to a chair rail, will be added where the carpet meets the wall and will be painted the wall color and there will also be a "saddle" placed where the floor and wall carpet meet. While our druthers would have been to replace the floor carpet to blend better with the wall carpet, we couldn't afford to do this now so we will live with this until we can afford replacement. We are working on placing art work in the room and will continue to make it more attractive. The committee thanks Teri Binder for her invaluable help on this project.

The Sanctuary roof continues to be a problem. It was repaired in late August with the expectation that this would carry us through the Holidays without incident. This was not to be. The severe post-Labor Day storm created another leak in the Sanctuary and the roofer had to be called in again to further patch the roof. As we reported in the September Bulletin, there is no question that we need to replace the roof and the Executive Committee and the Board are working on how to finance this necessary expenditure. Fortunately, no major damage has been done to the pews or carpet and we are continuing to monitor the situation.

Doors have been added in the Family Room to allow that room to be closed off when in use, and still allow access to the handicapped bathroom. This assures privacy when needed and also allows the room to be locked when necessary to store valuable items for families having events at Temple. The dressing room area also now has a door to insure privacy. The addition of doors has solved these issues.

Sy Lazar has been busy all summer investigating the resurfacing of the back driveway. We are hoping to be able to do this job before winter sets in. Stay tuned.

On behalf of the entire congregation, we thank Allan Gutfleish for his beautiful gift of a conference table and chairs for our Lower Conference Room.When using this room for classes or committee meetings, we'll definitely think of his kindness and generosity
