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s Jews we advocate in countless ways for Tikkun Olam, the repair of the world, by fighting for social justice, protecting our environment, and ensuring

that the powerful do not exploit the weak. One aspect of Tikkun Olam is Shlom Bayit, or peace in the home. There are all kinds of elements that contribute to Shlom Bayit, including good communication, a proper balance between work and family, and healthy finances. But more fundamental to healthy family relationships is a home where there literally is peace, where no

individual fears violence or abuse from another member of the family.

It is sadly ironic that our community, which speaks out for the oppressed in every corner of the globe, sometimes ignores the problem of domestic abuse within our own population.

By now I think we have moved beyond the myth that Jews are immune to alcoholism and drug abuse, and we are slowly coming to understand that Jews are not immune to domestic violence either. Jewish text and tradition have consistently forbidden spousal and child abuse, but practice has not always followed theory.

It's true that the temptation to look the other way is stronger in the Orthodox community, where neighborhoods are closely knit and the stigma of divorce stronger. (In fact the mitzvah of Shlom Bayit is sometimes interpreted as forcing the victim to keep silent in order to maintain peace in the home.) But Reform Jews must also confront the fact that abuse can exist in our community. The Central Conference of American Rabbis passed a resolution against domestic violence in 1990 and the Union for Reform Judaism passed a resolution against violence towards women in 1991.

While it is important for these entities of

Reform Judaism to be on record, the resolutions don't tell us anything we don't know. Domestic violence is wrong, and as Jews we are forbidden from standing idly by while our neighbor bleeds.


There is no easy solution to offer a victim of domestic abuse. Leaving an abusive spouse may mean instantly becoming homeless and

penniless. Calling the police might make things worse once the police leave. But doing nothing to help someone who lives in fear is not an option.

One of the Jewish community's most valuable resources when it comes to preventing domestic abuse is Project S.A.R.A.H., which stands for Stop Abusive Relationships at Home. Project S.A.R.A.H. offers counseling, access to a kosher safe house, and other services. If you are living in abusive an situation, please call Project S.A.R.A.H. at 973-777-7638 or contact me at the Temple. The only shame is not asking for help.

As we return the Torah to the ark, we read from the prayerbook, "Honoring one another, doing acts of kindness, and making peace: these are our highest duties. But the study of Torah is equal to them all, because it leads to them all." Confronting domestic abuse and working for true Shlom Bayit is definitely Torah in action.

How did we get to where we are, and where do we go from here?

I recently read about a new book by Philip Roth, entitled "The Plot Against America", in which the author imagines an alternate history. In it he imagines that an isolationist, white supremacist and pro-German Charles Lindbergh defeats Franklin Roosevelt in the 1940 election. Lindbergh soon signs nonaggression pacts with the Nazis and Japan. The book explores the impact of this alternate history on Jews in Europe and America.

This book review set me to thinking about a recurring mind game I play with myself. I examine where I am in my life, and think back to decisions made and events that

occurred many years ago that somehow led me to where I find myself today. Sometimes you recognize the decision as an important one at the time but often, a seemingly unimportant decision made decades ago has great impact on one's life. For example, a decision to go to a college weekend leads to your meeting the love of your life. You marry and then a decision by both of you to buy a certain

house in a certain community, among many houses and communities that you could have chosen, leads you to meet a new neighbor who prompts you to join a particular Temple in Teaneck, New Jersey where you eventually meet many other new people and, some 25 years later, you find that you are the Temple's President. And then you wonder, "What if I had never gone to that college weekend? Where would I be and what would I be doing now?

I find this mind game fun and fascinating, but ultimately it leads to your present, wondering about your next decisions and where they will lead. Just as you and . I can reflect on how we wound up where we are and where we are going, so too can and must Temple Emeth. Many years ago, our predecessors chose Rabbis Joshua

Trachtenberg and Louis Sigel as our spiritual leaders, and chose to locate our sanctuary at its present location in Teaneck, New Jersey. Those were important decisions that laid the foundation for the vibrant Jewish institution we are today. In more recent years, we decided to expand our home to better serve the spiritual, educational and programming needs of our community. We accomplished that goal, albeit not without its ongoing financial challenges. Most recently, we chose Rabbi Steven Sirbu to build on the legacies inherited from Rabbis Trachtenberg and Sigel and help lead us through whatev-

er our future may have in store for us.

Where would we be without our past and present Rabbinic leadership and our current home? We can speculate on that or on how those decisions impacted where we are today. But ultimately, we must focus on where we will be tomorrow, and the decisions we must make to get there. As your President, these are thoughts that occupy much of my time. It is why we

have 25 Board and non-Board congregants actively engaged in the beginnings of a 2 to 3 year strategic planning process to envision where we want to be and how to get there over the next 3 to 5 years. Periodically you may follow our progress in the Temple Emeth Bulletin. I encourage you to react and share your own ideas along the way.



This is a fascinating portrait of an evil genius, who was the model for The Great Gatsby's Meyer Wolfsheim and Nathan Detroit in Guys and Dolls. Arnold Rothstein was a loan shark, bookmaker, thief, political fixer, labor racketeer, mastermind of the modern drug trade, and more. His story is set in a Roaring Twenties universe of crime and corrution, violence and greed.


If you are in good health between the ages of 17 (with your parents consent) and 70 and weigh at least 110 pounds, you can resister to be part of this Temple Emeth program.
