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

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Prayer isn't meant to be easy. A look at our complex and imperfect world can make our prayers seem outdated, out of touch, or even offensive.

A good example comes from my student days when I taught a sixth-grade religious school class. Together we studied Birkat Hamazon, the blessing after the meal, the first paragraph of which concludes with, "Baruch atah Adonai, hazan et hakol Blessed are You, O God, who sustains everyone." I asked the kids how they



The south Asian tsunami in late December was another example. devastation was beyond words - and probably beyond prayers as well. traditional prayer for an earthquake, "she kocho ug'vurato malei olam - whose strength and power fill the world," falls remarkably flat. Prominent rabbis wrote prayers in response to the disaster and posted them online. I read one of them at services that weekend. It was important to pause in our sacred time and acknowledge the suffering, but I don't know if the prayer itself really moved those in atten-

dance. Prayer isn't easy.


Yet prayer remains one of the activities central to our congregational life. Shabbat prayers always include a prayer for freedom, even as slavery endures in parts of the world. Every service has a prayer for peace, praising God as the Source of peace, no matter how remote the

chances for peace seem in a given week.


We do this because prayer does not? reflect the world we have; prayer reflects the world we long for. Prayer is the instinct of the Jewish people, both in good times and in bad. I don't claim that prayer is the answer to all of our woes, nor do I even claim that prayers can necessarily be answered. Ideally, though, prayer is a process that enables us to look at the world in a new, more hopeful, light. Prayer can remind us that our Judaism impacts our perspective and the decisions we make.

I hope that, if you don't already, you will make prayer at Temple Emeth a regular part of your life. And I remind you that we have services both on Friday nights and on Saturday mornings. Each service has its own character, but any of our services can be a chance to reflect, to meditate, to sing, to recommit ourselves to the values we live by. It isn't easy, but it is always worthwhile.

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### **Complacency and Indifference**

"To give aid to every poor man is far beyond the reach and power of every man. Care of the poor is incumbent on society as a whole."

Baruch Spinoza

We are all acutely aware of the earthquake and tsunami that recently took place in the Indian Ocean. Their combined impact has caused a tragic loss of life in southern Asia and parts of Africa. It is a calamity so immense that people and countries all over the world have responded with record amounts of contributions and pledges totaling billions of dollars in financial aid. The world's citizenry has reason to be proud of this outpouring of generosity.

While applauding the enormous and immediate response however, it is unfortunately also true that as a general rule, initial responses to tragic headlines do not have much staying power. A related story I just read tells of \$2 billion in pledges to Afghanistan during 2002 for its first crucial year of rebuilding. But this aspect of the Afghanistan story has not been headline news for some time now. Afghanistan officials have stated that only \$90 million of the pledges have actually been received, and many Afghans have lost faith since then and now direct their bitterness at the relief workers who are there. Those agencies heavily involved with bringing relief to the tsunami stricken countries acknowledge that the humanitarian needs of these countries will take years to alleviate. The fear is that if the track record of other world tragedies is a proper indicator, we will become complacent with the initial response, and indifferent to the ongoing problems of the stricken areas way before their problems have been fully addressed.

On a more intimate level, if you read last month's Bulletin, you know that Temple Emeth, led by our Social Action Committee, is now a partner with the Interreligious Fellowship for the Homeless in its Turn a New Leaf Program. The project provides a private apartment for a homeless family to transition out of living in the Family Shelter and eventually moving to their own apartment. To date, over 40 congregants have been involved in finding the apartment, subsidizing it, donating all the furnishings and moving the furnishings in to the apartment. We are also on call to provide the family with resume writing, career counseling, tutoring and similar services, if needed.

We are proud of our involvement in this effort. But to get the project off the ground, one anonymous congregant has pledged the financing of the apartment rent for the first year. For this to be more than a one year project, we will need to find additional funds amongst the rest of us to continue to support this.

Will we be able to do this, or will we become complacent and indifferent? Will we have the staying power? It is human nature to become excited and energetic when a project is new and fresh in our minds. It takes work and a true commitment to sustain it. I hope that when the time comes later this year for us to renew our partnership with the Interreligious Fellowship for the Homeless, we will be generous with our hearts and with our pocketbooks.


Our madrichim and madrichot make it possible for us to create a fully participating learning environment. They add immeasurably to the "family feeling" and teaching team at Temple Emeth.

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
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## Trouble with Grandfathers

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
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# Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library Update: REFERENCE

#### ACCREDITED BY THE ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES

Precisely 350 years ago, in 1654, a band of 23 Dutch Jewish settlers from Recife, Brazil, set sail for New Amsterdam (now New York) on the ship Sainte Catherine to escape Portuguese rule and the Inquisition. Just their luck, waiting for them in the New World was Peter Stuyvesant, New Amsterdam's Governor, who labeled them "blasphemers of the name of Christ" and attempted to expel the new immigrants. But as you might expect, Jewish persistence paid off and they prevailed and settled anew.

Today, so many years after that voyage, America is awash in celebration of what has become the ever-expanding North American Jewish community. Through the forged efforts of the U.S. Library of Congress, the National Archives and Records Administration, the American Jewish Historical Society, and the Jacob Rader Marcus Center of the American Jewish Archives at Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati, Ohio, a major exhibition, "From Haven to Home: 350 Years of Jewish History in America," has been assembled.


The impressive display will grace New York City's Center for Jewish History (15 West 16th Street), from May 15th, through September 15th, 2005, with the likes of President George Washington's letter to the Newport, Rhode Island, Jewish community, pledging nationwide religious liberty; Emma Lazarus's handwritten sonnet, "The New Colossus," which adorns the Statue of Liberty; President Harry Truman's telegram recognizing Israeli statehood, and much more. The exhibit is currently on view at the Museum Center in Cincinnati, with a tour in Los Angeles's Skirball Museum after it wows New York City.

In the meantime, Jews from across the nation and around the world may avail themselves of lectures and concerts and plenty of additional hoopla highlighting our rich heritage in America for more than three-and-a-half centuries at New

York City's 92nd Street Y (www.92y.org). Such diverse attractions as the Tokyo String Quartet's performance of music by Jewish composers; a virtual tour of New York City's Lower East Side; a lecture on the status of the Bible in contemporary America; and an examination of the works of Philip Roth, Art Spiegelman, and Michael Chabon await you there.

And next time you're near Temple Emeth's Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library, check out the American Jewish Historical Society's timeline (www.ajhs.org) entitled "350 Years of the Jewish People in America" outside the door. It runs from the New Amsterdam arrival through Florida's David Levy Yulee's becoming the first Jewish U.S. senator and the first Jew in the U.S. Congress (1841). It continues with the founding of The Jewish Daily Forward (1897) through Albert Einstein's being among the early waves of German Jews to flee Nazi Germany and finding refuge in America, right into the 21st Century, when Connecticut Democratic Senator Joseph Lieberman became the first Jewish vice presidential candidate of a major political party.

Then, wend your way inside to peruse a number of books targeting American-Jewish history, including the following (They're yours, of course, for the borrowing.): American Judaism: A History, by Jonathan D. Sarna, explores the ways in which Judaism adapted during its 350 years in America. A Portion of the People: Three Hundred Years of Southern Jewish Life, edited by Theodore Rosengarten and Dale Rosengarten, shines the spotlight on Jewish life in Charleston, South Carolina. Coming to America: Jewish Americans, by Robert Stein, homes in on the three waves of Jewish persecution and immigration from South America, Germany, and Eastern Europe and Russia, and details the vibrant culture that each wave brought with it. The Jews in America, by Arthur Hertzberg, is a challenging revisionist history of the Jewish experience in America, with the author examining pervasive ethnic tensions in our nation.

Good News! The replacement of the roofs over the Sanctuary and Cantor's office has been completed after many years of repeated repairs. To all our generous members who came forward to help with this much-needed project, we extend grateful thanks.

The next major project in the building will be the solution to the moisture problem in the dead air space between the Sanctuary ceiling and the roof. This problem is not related to the previous roof problem but to the structural design of the Sanctuary when it was originally built. Venting this dead air space will be a complicated and expensive project, requiring several different contractors, each with his/her own area of expertise. The entire job will take several weeks to complete and will include replacement of the now-dam-Because of the aged ceiling area. extensive nature of this repair, the Sanctuary will need to be closed for part of the work time. Therefore, this project will be scheduled in the summer in order to cause the least amount of disruption within the building. David Paul has agreed to manage this project, for which we thank him.

The back driveway has been patched to fill in the worst potholes. The entire driveway needs to be re-paved but this is now on hold in light of the heavy expenditures on other projects. Many thanks go to Sy Lazar for his tremendous effort in getting estimates on replacement and for arranging for these temporary repairs to be made.

The Security/Safety Committee is moving forward under the able supervision of Steve Chaiken and Marc Chelemer. We'll keep you updated on their activities.

Solar Energy: We are investigating the possibility of solar panels to reduce our energy costs. A non-profit organization called GreenFaith, led by a Minister and a Rabbi, helps Houses of Worship procure grants that provide funds to install these panels. If we are eligible to receive one of these grants, there would be valuable savings on our utility bills. We are pursuing this possible remedy to our soaring and astronomical energy costs. Stay tuned.

Miracle of miracles: Pam Etzin has graciously offered to be our Plant Angel. She will, we're sure, nurse our plants back to good health from their present droopy state. If you would like to assist her in this, please let her know or put a note in the House Committee box.

The Beautification Fund is always in need of funds for various projects not covered under the House Committee budget. Recently completed projects include the installation of new exterior doors, new lighting throughout the building and several other necessary repairs. There are many things still needed. Please think of this Fund when you honor or memorialize someone, or consider making a donation, in any amount, to help with our continuing effort to create and maintain a beautiful Temple environment. We thank all those who have contributed in the past and we look forward to welcoming new "angels".

### What they did (and will do) on their Summer Vacation (and you can, too)





#### **News from Israel**

Once again the "conversion issue" is on the rocks

The Israel Religious Action Center (IRAC) has protested the latest move in what is a tug of war between Israel's Prime Minister and the Chief Rabbinate over procedures for conversions. Last year PM Ariel Sharon said he would seek to ease restrictions currently preventing hundreds of thousands of mostly Soviet-born immigrants from being recognized as Jews. He appointed a special task force and more recently announced that jurisdiction for the country's conversion courts would pass from the Chief Rabbinate to his own office.

However, just before the High Holy Days, the Ministry of Justice — which absorbed many of the mechanisms of the recently disbanded Ministry of Religious Affairs and seems to be involved in the tug of war — published an official "gazette" with rules for conversions that bypassed the task force. A statement by Rabbi Gilad Kariv, Director of IRAC's Public Policy and Social Action Department, called the incident "another link in the chain of attempts to sabotage conversion efforts. Israel's Liberal Movement views these rules as aimed against the Prime Minister's efforts to ease the immigrants' plight, and in direct contradiction to the High Court of Justice rulings on conversion.

This is an ongoing saga, with Orthodox institutions intent on retaining their strangle hold on the lives of candidates for conversion while holding at bay the Reform and Conservative organizations' attempts to offer alternative steps to conversion. Stay tuned!
