# MORE THAN A CAN OF SOUP – The URJ's New MANNA PROGRAM CONFRONTS THE PROBLEM OF HUNGER...HERE

Many of the "facts" about hunger in our area are not "facts" at all, but myths based on guesswork, wishful thinking, and intuition. For example:

Myth - Residents of only the poorest and most urbanized communities in Bergen County are clients of the county's food pantries

**Fact** - Clients seeking hunger relief come from more than 90% of the 70 towns in Bergen County, including some of the wealthiest communities in the state.

Myth - Only the unemployed and the homeless are in need of relief from hunger.

Fact -Nearly 40% of people seeking aid are among the "working poor" - those who have jobs, and residences, but simply can't afford to buy food.

Myth - State-budgeted aid has always been available for hunger relief.

Fact - This year, for the first time ever in New Jersey, a modest amount of money has been allocated in the state budget for hunger relief. In the past that money has been privately raised.

Myth - The problem of community hunger is so great that there is little an individual can do to solve it - supporting the Temple food drive, and writing checks to hunger relief agencies is about the most that one person can do.

Fact – WE CAN EACH PLAY a significant role to combat hunger. HOW? Learn the extent of the problem and the Jewish ethics which compel us to "feed the hungry"; Speak out (advocate) for those in need; and volunteer at food pantries, soup kitchens, and shelters for the homeless. WE CAN EACH MAKE A MEASURABLE AND IMPORTANT DIFFERENCE.

Responding to the shocking increase in the incidence of hunger in the region, the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) has inaugurated its new, comprehensive "MANNA - We Share Our Portion" initiative. The measure was introduced in late October at the regional Biennial convention of the New Jersey-West Hudson Valley Council (NJ-WHVC). Governor Jon Corzine was there during Shabbat morning services when the initiative was unveiled. This multicomponent program of action, learning, and advocacy is aimed at fighting the problem of hunger wherever it appears in our region.

Materials are available for preschoolers through senior citizens, and are appropriate for informal educational settings, as well as the classroom, for use in meetings and at home - anywhere people gather.

"We anticipate that each congregation will create and/implement its own individual programming, acting upon Jewish values in their particular communal context," said Sharon Halper, Regional *Tikkun Olam* Fellow, and creator of the program.

All Temple leaders have received packets of materials guiding them in the establishment of significant MANNA activities. "We cannot and will not accept the existence of widespread hunger in this region - one of the wealthiest in the nation. Judaism demands that we take positive steps to meliorate this evil," said Ms. Halper.

# Message From the Rabbi

For decades, our Temple Emeth teenagers who have continued their Jewish educations through tenth grade have gone through a process and a ceremony called Confirmation. Confirmation has several requirements, including enrollment and attendance at the Bergen Academy of Reform Judaism (BARJ) or another eligible Hebrew high school program and submitting

an essay for the Wilford Weill Memorial Essay Contest. Last month, the Confirmands completed another important requirement: participation in a L'Taken Social Justice Seminar in Washington, D.C., hosted by the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism (RAC).

Over the course of the 4-day seminar, our teens learned about more than a dozen issues facing our nation on which the Reform Movement has passed policy resolutions. They - along

with Reform Jewish teens from Louisiana, California, North Carolina, and New York - participated in an interactive workshop on how various interest groups can influence public policy and also took in some of Washington's sites.


On Monday, the last day of the program, the kids put their knowledge into action. They made advocacy visits to the offices of Senator Frank Lautenberg and Congressmen Steven Rothman and Scott Garrett. The teens spoke to legislative aides in each office on behalf of themselves and the Reform Movement on Israel; reproductive rights; ending legal discrimination against gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender individuals; protecting the environment; and opposing school vouchers for parochial schools. I joined the group on Monday and was so impressed and proud of all they

had learned and accomplished.

This is the kind of hands-on experiential learning that makes the greatest impact on our youth, teaching them to put faith in action and giving them positive memories that they will carry into adulthood.

While this can happen in a classroom, it is much more successful in Israel, at Jewish summer camp, or on a RAC seminar (which, by the way are held for adults, too - the next one is April 15-17, 2007).

I'm glad that Temple Emeth and BARJ have prepared our kids to attend and appreciate a seminar like this one, and I'm fortunate that I was able to fulfill my role of "rabbinic cheerleader." Most of all, I am confident that these young people have the skills to be Jewish leaders for the next

# **Message From the President**

While the entire Temple Emeth membership is the essential governing authority, we as a congregation exercise its authority through our Board of Trustees. This body is elected in May at our annual meeting. The Board bears the overall responsibility for setting and achieving the synagogue's goals and bears fiduciary responsibility for the congregation. Our Board meetings are usually held the second Thursday of the month and every one of you is welcome to attend.

At our last meeting we began the process of evaluating the Board's function and purpose, as well as

the individual's responsibility. This dynamic discussion originated with our Strategic Planning Committee, now in its third year and headed by Karen Rappaport and Flip Bernard. The Governance subcommittee has been wrestling with this issue over the past year as well. Our Board is not the traditional corporate board - nor should it be. We must always keep in mind that the Board has ethical and moral as well as fiduciary responsibilities. It needs to run our "business" but always remembering we are a business, not in the traditional

Worship.

Over the past year we have begun our Board Meetings each month with "Opening Words." Each month I select a passage from the Torah, a prayer book reading, something from a current journal, or a wellknown author's writings. The following "Opening Words" entitled, Loggerhead Turtles written by Barbara Brown Taylor, was particularly intriguing to the Board, so I thought I'd share it with you:

## Query: Do we trust in God to act in all events of our lives, or only the ones that meet our approval?

"Several summers ago, I spent three days on a barrier island where loggerhead turtles were laying their eggs. One night while the tide was out, I watched a huge female heave herself up on the beach and dig her nest and empty her eggs into it. Afraid of disturbing her, I left before she had time to finish. The next morning I returned to see if I could find the spot where her eggs lay hidden in the sand. What I found were her tracks leading in the wrong direction. Instead of heading back out to sea, she had wandered into the dunes, which were already as hot as asphalt in the morning sun.

A little ways in I found her. Exhausted, all but baked, her head and flippers caked with dried sand. After pouring water on her and covering her with sea oats, I fetched a park ranger who returned with a Jeep to rescue her. He flipped her on her back, wrapped the chains around her front legs, and hooked the chains to a trailer hitch of his Jeep. Then I watched horrified as he took off, yanking her body forward so that her

> mouth filled with sand and her neck bent back so far that I thought it would break.

The ranger hauled her over the dunes and down the beach. At the ocean's edge, he unhooked her and turned her right side up. She lay motionless in the surf as the water lapped at her body, washed the sand from her eyes and making her skin shine again. A wave broke over her; she lifted her head slightly, moving her back legs. Other waves brought her further back to life until one of them made her light enough to find a foothold and push off

corporate sense but a Jewish business - a House of back into the ocean. Watching her swim away and remembering her nightmare ride through the dunes, I reflected that it is sometimes hard to tell whether you are being killed or saved... by the very hands that turn your life upside down.

> Our hope, through all our own terrors, is that we are being saved. But this does not mean we lie down before the terrors. For as long as we have strength to fight, it is both our nature and our privilege to do so. Sometimes God's blessing does not come until daybreak, after a full night of emptying ourselves and wandering in the wrong direction. Our job is to struggle with the terrors, neither surrendering nor stealing away until they have yielded their blessings."

vance to our daily lives. As a species, we have made amazing progress in the world of technology - computers, lasers, satellites and space travel, just to name a few. It is quite changed from the world of our ancestors. Yet, as different as our physical world has become, our developmental growth as people has not really changed.

In our family and school education, we deal on a daily basis with conflict, rivalry and different educational and parenting approaches. # A Very Special Scholar-in-Residence is Coming To Temple Emeth

In 2004, he was invited to offer the opening prayer for the House of Representatives. In 2005, as chair of the National Commission for Commemorating 350 Years of Jewish Life in America, he served as Guest Chaplain of the U.S. Senate. In 2006 he was named to the Abraham

Lincoln Bicentennial Commission to mark the 200th anniversary of Lincoln's birth. These are but a sample of the honors bestowed upon Rabbi Gary P. Zola, Ph.D., who will be Temple Emeth's visiting scholar during the weekend of April 20-22, 2007.

The high regard for Rabbi Zola is based upon a number of factors, including his positions as Director of the Jacob Rader Marcus Center of the American Jewish

Archives and Associate Professor of the American Jewish Experience at Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati, his numerous scholarly writings on American Jewish history, and his reputation as a dynamic speaker. We at Temple Emeth will have a wonderful opportunity to receive a goodly share of his knowledge and experiences. As part of Friday night services on April 20th, Rabbi Zola will speak of "American Jewry's Greatest Legacies" during which he will address such question as "Is there something unique and noteworthy about the American Jewish

experience?" and "What can we learn from the broad flow of American Jewish history?" The next morning he will join the Torah study group in a discussion of what the week's Torah portion can teach us about American Jewish history. Following a Shabbat lunch, he will conduct a seminar on "George Washington and

the Story of Religious Freedom in America," which will focus on Washington's remarkable letter to the Jews of Congregation Yeshuat Israel of Newport, Rhode Island. Finally, during a Sunday brunch, Rabbi Zola will speak on "Great Voices, Civil Rights, and American Reform Judaism." What did American Rabbis tell their congregants about topics such as the rise of Hitler, the outbreak of World War II, and the struggle

for Civil Rights? In answering these and other questions, he will enable us to hear the actual voices of some of the leading Rabbis of the twentieth century by employing vocal recordings from the American Jewish Archives, digitized with visuals added.

This year's Scholar-in-Residence weekend is bound to be a highlight of the Temple year. So, be sure to set aside the dates and come to as many of the events as you can along with family and friends. Further information will be forthcoming.

# Make Your Plans Now For the Tu B'Shevat Seder



How often do you get to drink pink wine?

Tradition returns to Temple Emeth in early February with the Tu B'Shevat Seder, a celebration of the New Year for trees. Although it may be snowy in New Jersey, custom tells us that in Israel the first buds of new growth are peeking out on the fifteenth day of Shevat. Perhaps no metaphor is more important to the Jewish people than the recurring symbolism of trees; the Torah itself, our most sacred text, is identified as the Tree of Life. And no holiday draws us more closely to the land of Israel - literally - than the celebration of Tu B'Shevat.

We celebrate with the holiday's own seder, and a trek through varieties of fruits and nuts "the yield of our trees," which represent symbolic views of the world and our place in it. The ceremony is punctuated by four cups of wine (well, maybe grape juice) in shades from white to dark red, as well as a festive meal. Plan to join Rabbi Sirbu and Cantor Tilem for a traditional Tu B'Shevat Seder at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday, February 4th. A contribution of \$2 per adult and \$1 per child is requested. New members are free. (The luncheon is subsidized by the generosity of the Temple Emeth Ritual Committee and Israel Committee.)



### Minutes from the Board of Trustees Meeting December 7, 2006

President Dan Firshein provided news on the impending resignation of Michael Baer, an injury to a congregant's child in the Youth Lounge, the installation of the new security system, and the purchase of first aid kits.

Rabbi talked about the confirmation class and how he had worked with all 15 on their B'nai Mitzvah. He traveled to Washington for the Religious Action Center visit by the students, where they present their issues on the floor of Congress.

The Financial Secretary and the Assistant Treasurer summarized membership status and ongoing financial issues. Most notable is the installation of new artificial turf for the ECC playground (see last month's minutes). An outside accountant will be engaged to examine TE's books, and to undertake a special project to study our processes and procedures.

The Capital Campaign has received \$750,000 in gifts and pledges. Annual giving has reached \$63,000 in gifts and pledges. There is a nice synergy in the solicitations for one and the other.
