



Message From the Rabbi

The story of Purim, as told in the Scroll of Esther, takes place in Shushan, which is in Persia. The Jews of the kingdom seem established and comfortable until one man bent on their destruction, Haman, gains enough power to actually implement a plan of mass murder.


Historically, the Jews of Persia have had

good relations with the ruling authorities. It was the ancient Persians, under King Cyrus, who liberated the Jews from the grip of the Babylonians and allowed them to return from exile and rebuild the Temple in Jerusalem in the Sixth Century BCE. The prophets Isaiah and Ezekiel foretold the redemption that Cyrus would bring, and since then he has had a revered place in Jewish history. Today Persia is called Iran, and any of the warm nostalgic feelings we used to have for the leadership of that country have evaporated since the ascension of President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad.

President Ahmadinejad has repeatedly said that Israel should be wiped off the map. We've certainly heard this call before from Arab extremists, but the Persian voice is a most unwelcome addition. Several months ago, in response to the cartoons lampooning the prophet Mohammed in Danish newspapers, he established a contest inviting submissions that made light of the Holocaust.

And two months ago, the Iranian president convened a Holocaust denial conference in Teheran. We have heard these canards about the Holocaust before, but usually from white anti-Semites in Europe. This time it is coming from the new power in the Middle East.

Holocaust denial, at its core, is not about history. It is about Israel's right to exist. Israel, so the theory goes, exists today because of the world's guilt

about what happened to the Jews during World War II. If the world can be convinced that the Holocaust didn't happen, then Israel's *raison d'etre* disappears. Never mind Herzl, the Balfour Declaration, or the waves of immigration prior to World War II.

It may surprise you, then, to learn that there

are 25,000 Jews living in Iran (the second highest Middle Eastern Jewish population after Israel) and that almost none of them want to leave. There are flights to the west daily and plenty of philanthropists willing to pay their way, but the emigration rate—already at a trickle—went down even further last year. How could this be?

Do Iranian Jews know something that we don't know? Or, like. Jews of other eras, does their love for their homes and their neighbors blinds them to the threats that are brewing in

their own back yard?

There's no way to know, but I tend to lean toward the former. President Ahmadinejad, to my knowledge, has never threatened Iranian Jews or taken concrete steps to make them feel unwanted. Moreover, there is a burgeoning protest movement among Iranians who are ashamed of how he represents their country to the rest of the world. It is clear that President Ahmadinejad does not speak for all Iranians and that the seeds for domestic regime change have been planted. I hope they sprout quickly.

Just like Haman, today's Persian tyrant will someday get his just reward, and I hope that day arrives long before Iran acquires a nuclear weapon. Just as Esther and Mordecai prayed and fasted for the safety of their people, so too we must we pray for the safety of Iran's Jews and the State of Israel.

BLESSINGS AND CURSES

The title of this article is one I have used for at least two others in my nearly thirteen years at Temple Emeth. This is probably because I am fascinated with the Torah portion, Re'eh. Re'eh

is read in the month of Av, just a few weeks before the High Holy Days, and discusses blessings and curses at length. The message of this portion has been exemplified in my own life time and time again. I have found that the hand of God is always present in our lives and that we are often completely unaware whether an event is a blessing or a curse until long after it happens.

I have been struggling with my vocal health since I came to Temple Emeth and I am no longer able to avoid a surgical solution to this problem. I am grateful to Rabbi Sirbu, Marc Klausner, Judith Bitterman and others who have supported me by singing with me or in my stead this past year. However, as long as my voice is not able to produce what it ought to, I cannot be the Cantor that this congregation needs, or the Cantor I want to be. So at the end of March, I will undergo surgery on my vocal chords.

The most difficult part of this surgery will be the recovery period. I will not be able to speak at all for nearly three weeks and I will not be able to sing for an additional three to four. However, with some months of voice therapy, I am told that I will, God willing, be able to sing in full voice

> within five months. While my otolaryngologist and surgeon would like me to have surgery as soon as possible, after weighing the needs of the congregation, we settled on a March 26th surgery date, which will have me back in full voice for the High Holy Days.

When I told my husband of my impending operation, I explained to

him that I saw it as a blessing. He reacted as anyone who has had major surgery would. For him, surgery was no blessing; it is a scary and painful remembrance of a difficult time in his life. For a Cantor, I explained, being able to sing for another ten or twenty years is a great blessing. I am sure that God brought me to this place for a reason.

I pray that I will be blessed to sing God's praises for years to come and I look forward to a future of helping each of you in some small way, to reach your full spiritual potential, bringing you closer to God through prayer and song.

In preparation for the job, I took a Synagogue Management course at the Hebrew Union College in New York, I attended the Scheidt Seminar for Temple Presidents in Atlanta, I attended the URJ Biennial in Houston and I read all I could about leadership in general and leadership in a Reform Jewish context. I have discovered that many of the classic thoughts on leadership may be myths:

Myth 1- Leaders must possess charismatic personalities

Myth 2- Leaders must be smarter than the people they lead

Myth 3- Leaders must be super popular

Myth 4-Behind every leader is a string of unqualified successes.

I have learned a few things that do seem to be important when leading others and have tried to embrace them:

My super mitzvah project was called Supplies for Success. My friends and I filled 150 backpacks with school supplies. These were delivered to School #1 in Paterson. I chose this project because, I wanted to help kids who were younger than me. Also if I was not able to afford all of my school supplies I would love for other people to help me so I could enjoy school just as they would. Something that surprised me very much was how fast my friends and I got the packing part of the project done. I thought it would take a while after seeing all of the backpacks and school supplies. I think my super mitzvah project could partially connect to my Torah portion. The kids



had a little connection to the slaves because the kids didn't have the money to get school supplies, and the slaves didn't have money or freedom to live the way they wanted. Also Moses worked in partnership with God to help free the slaves, just as I worked with my friends, family to help the kids with getting them school supplies.

There are some gifts you automatically bring back for store credit, others you hide away in the back of your closet and some that even Hallmark doesn't make a big enough thank you card to ever show your gratitude. The latter doesn't even begin to describe the appreciation I have for all of those who make **Taglit Birthright Israel** trip possible!

Taglit, which means **discover**, is the best possible word to describe this trip on so many different levels.

First and foremost, you get a chance to <u>discover Israel</u>. All of the unforgettable places you've learned about (not only in Religious School), but in regular school too. I got to hike Masada and make it to the top just in time for sunrise. I got to pray with Jews from all over the world at the Western Wall. I even got to float in the Dead Sea. I didn't know so much sightseeing was possible in ten days. But no matter which **Birthright** trip you go on, it's sure to have a packed schedule. In addition to the obvious sites, such as the Old City and the Negev, we went to a Bedouin community, the Naot factory (great shoes), and even parts of the West Bank.

The next **discovery** is of your peers. I had an opportunity to get to know 80 people around my age from all over the U.S. and Canada. I became friends with some amazing people I otherwise would never have met. To be able to experience your homeland and feel so connected to complete strangers after ten days is a beautiful thing. I now have friends in two countries that I have a rare and priceless connection to – being Jewish!

I was able to **discover** my Judaism. In addition to Shabbat services and Havdalah, there were plenty of conversations regarding G-d and asking for a clear definition of what is a "Reform" Jew? I learned that I wasn't the only one my age completely unsure about where I stand religiously, and I began to feel comfortable with that. I now no longer feel pushed for time or feel that I'm a fraud for praying when I don't exactly know what I'm praying for. I feel more comfortable with myself as a whole religiously.

Lastly, and most importantly, on **Birthright** you are able to **discover yourself**. I learned so much about myself in 10 days it's astonishing. I learned to appreciate the Cheerios I have for breakfast at home. I learned to appreciate having at least one shower a day. And I learned to push myself, and the satisfaction I can gain from doing it.

One day without warning, my bus pulled up to a canyon near the Nahal Peres River. We were expected to climb all the way to the top completely unharnessed. Had I not been in Israel I would have laughed at this as if it were a joke. Four and half hours, and a few thousand feet later, I had done something that I could proudly tell others about. Despite how scared I was, and how much I wanted to give up at times, I continued pushing. I will never forget the outcome; being able to look at one of the most beautiful views of Jordan you could imagine. There isn't a person I would discourage from going on Birthright. It's an amazing learning experience. And even if somehow (and I don't know how this is possible), you don't discover anything...then hey, it's a free trip to Israel!

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Summary of Minutes from the February 8th Board Meeting

Dan Firshein discussed a second break-in, Temple Emeth's BARJ commitments (\$11K this year), TEEF appointments, and dues - Temple Emeth is now at or BELOW most other congregations of our size.

Cantor Tilem discussed her upcoming surgery and leave. She will be out for approximately seven weeks having required surgery on her larynx. Coverage for all services, Bar and Bat Mitzvah are all being arranged.

Committing to the Future, the Sixtieth Anniversary Capital Campaign, has received \$925,000 in gifts and pledges; \$256,000 has been received in cash. Campaign Briefings—informal, non-solicitation meetings in people's homes and at the synagogue—are underway. The Board voted to continue retaining Mersky/Jaffe, our consultants, at an 87.5% discount to the original rate.

The Board discussed the search for a Youth Director. Rabbi Sirbu presented a Job Description. A key point is need to ultimately have "junior" youth groups starting in the 4th or 5th grade. The Board approved the position description and authorized a specific dollar limit for salary.

The Finance Committee reported that Lakeland Bank has agreed to allow Temple Emeth to pay down its mortgage principal on an annual or biannual basis, with concomitant recalculation of the monthly payment, thereby allowing us to reduce our cash obligation as we collect monies in the Campaign.

The Board determined to hold a workshop to discuss and clarify the relationship between the Board and the Executive Committee, as the Constitution does not specify this relationship.


