Message From the Rabbi

There is no question in my mind that the center of Judaism is the home. It is at home where Jewish values are taught when blessings are said at the dinner table, when tzedakah is given as a family unit, and when the complexities of life are examined and family members discuss together what the best course of action is in a particular dilemma.

In addition to the importance of the home, we all know that the synagogue plays a vital function in the life of the Jewish people. The synagogue is where we worship together, where we gather for study, and where we engage in the needs of the community.

Jewish values and Jewish education, however, are not limited to home and synagogue. Some of the most positive and memorable experiences we American Jews have are on overnight programs away from home. The Reform movement alone offers countless opportunities for our young

people including summer camps; North American Federation of Temple Youth (NFTY) regional conclaves and national conventions; and summer and semester-long trips to Israel. This time away from home is an invaluable opportunity for Jewish study, self-exploration and the establishment of life-long friendships. When the kids return home from these programs they are reenergized for BARJ, youth group, and student teaching. They travel up and down the state to each other's B'nai Mitzvah and they keep in touch by email. Their Jewish souls have been nurtured and their Jewish networks expanded.


This phenomenon is not limited to kids. Jewish overnight programs for adults provide many of the same results. That is the reason why the students who are currently studying with me for adult B'nai Mitzvah have an overnight program requirement. It is why the Temple runs an Adult Study Kallah (retreat) at the Pearl River Hilton every February.

It's no secret, though, that most people have the time to get away in the summer. So before you go off and book your summer vacation, let me offer some Jewish options. The Union for Reform Judaism has three exciting programs this summer. Further information is available at www.urj.org.

For the musically inclined in the congregation,

there is the Mifgash Musicale Summer Institute for Synagogue Musicians. It will take place on the campus of the Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati on July 29-August 2. Designed specifically for synagogue musicians, the curriculum this year will focus on the High Holy Days.

Another opportunity is the Summer Kallah, scheduled for August 1-5 on the campus of Cal-Poly Pomona in Southern California. The Kallah is a chance for spiritual renewal through study, prayer and music with some of our movements most accomplished scholars.

Finally, for those who wish to stay a little closer to home, there is the Tzevet Mitzvot Adult Mitzvah Corps in Buffalo from July 8-14. The majority of the day will be spent building houses, but that leaves the evening for camaraderie with the other participants.

I know that these programs are not for everyone. Temple Emeth is also planning some overnight experiences of our own. Our next Adult Study Kallah will be February 15-17, 2008, and we have also scheduled a family retreat for March 28-30, 2008. Details to follow.

Toward the end of the Book of Numbers, the Torah records each location in the desert where the Israelites encamped at the will of God. I believe each stop is recorded because in many ways the journey shaped the way they would serve God when they arrived home. So too it is with modern Jews of every age. Our Jewish journeys enrich the time we spend at home and synagogue.

Mostly, I will always remember the deep satisfaction that came with the confidence, faith and trust that was given to me, by you, the Congregation

From the Religious School

"HAPPY BIRTHDAY, ISRAEL - 59 YEARS YOUNG"

When I arrive in Israel, I feel I have come home. For me, home means family. In Israel, I am with my family. I love that Israelis are so good at problem solving. Of course, they've had to be.

Example: the Western Galilee town of Nahariya has an underground hospital with 400 beds in a sheltered basement, with air and water purification systems, ready to be used in times of war. "Nitgaber" (we will overcome) many Israelis say.

Israel teaches us how to remember, how to celebrate and how to mourn. The Yad Vashem Holocaust Memorial complex, in Jerusalem, now has testimony and artifacts about 3.5 million of the 6 million victims and continues to search for ways to rescue the remainder from oblivion. "To each a name, a face, a history," Yad Vashem shows us how to honor the life story of one person, one family, one community, one heroic Christian rescuer, one at a time.

In Temple Emeth Religious School, we are connected to Israel as a "family". We sing Israeli songs, and we pray in Hebrew. Throughout the year, our student-led, *T'filot* articulate all our fervent

hopes for peace, shalom.

Our 7th grade learns about Israel through Torah while our 3rd and 4th grades learn about the "modern miracle" of the birth of the State of Israel. Our 4th-6th grades, under the leadership of Morah Nancy and Morah Wendy, have established a pen-pal connection to Nahariya – Bergen County's Sister City.

Israel infuses our curriculum in every grade. We study, celebrate, and are proud of our Israeli connection. We hope to cultivate in our students and our Religious School families an eternal bond to our culture and religion.

From the Early Childhood Center

As we clean up the last crumbs of matzah, the signs of spring are erupting before our eyes. In this season of the earth's rebirth comes the commemoration of Israel's independence. How can we, in the Early Childhood Center, make this holiday meaningful to young children? Our answer: if we can't all go to Israel, we will bring Israel to us!

On Monday, April 23, 2007, the 5th of Iyar 5767, we simulated a trip to Israel with the children. Each class began their preparations by making visors (it's hot and sunny over there!) and preparing passports. They came dressed in blue and white as they packed their sunglasses, boarding passes and some water to carry on the plane (less than 3 ounces now that the rules have changed.)


Everyone "boarded" the plane in their own classrooms, fastened their seatbelts and took off over the Atlantic Ocean. Arrival at Ben Gurion Airport was smooth and, amazingly, on time.

Tour guides waited for each group for the sightseeing tour that had been arranged. First stop was the Kotel (the wall outside the sanctuary) where paper and crayons were waiting. The children drew their prayers and wishes and put them in the cracks. Next stop was down the mountain from Jerusalem to the desert. After a bumpy ride on the camels, they stopped at the Dead Sea (Social Hall dance floor). There everyone floated in the salty water. Next they went up the snake path (an

obstacle course in the Youth Lounge which ended with a climb up the stairs in the hall) to the top of Masada. Boy was it hot! Finally on to the beach in Eilat where there was sand painting and fishing to be done. After all of this exhausting fun it was off to Tel Aviv to sit in outdoor cafes noshing on pita and hummus and listening to Israeli music. The day concluded with a special dessert – a blue and

white birthday cake for Israel – which the children made themselves.

Celebrating Yom HaAtzma'ut was great fun for all of us, and we can't wait for our visit again next year.

CONFIRMATION

Confirmation is a ceremony with deep roots in the Reform Movement. In the nine-teenth and early twentieth centuries, many Reform congregations did not offer Bar and Bat Mitzvah, instead opting for a group service during the teenage years. At this age, presumably, the young people involved in the ceremony had a better appreciation of what it meant to be committed to Judaism.

Today, of course, all Reform synagogues offer Bar and Bat Mitzvah, and almost all also offer Confirmation. While the age varies, most synagogues, including Temple Emeth, offer Confirmation at the end

of tenth grade, provided the young people have fulfilled a series of requirements. At Temple Emeth, these requirements include enrollment in BARJ or another approved Hebrew high school program, attending a teen advocacy seminar sponsored by the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism in Washington, attending a Saturday morning Torah study class, and submitting an essay for the Wilford Weill Memorial Essay Contest.

Confirmation always takes place on Shavuot, which is fitting for two reasons. It falls during "graduation season" and it is the holiday which marks when the Israelites confirmed their faith by accepting the covenant at Mount Sinai. This year, the Confirmation class has 15 students, the largest in recent memory, and their service will be Tuesday, May 22 at 7:30 p.m.

The entire congregation is invited to attend as these young people lead us in prayer and publicly confirm their faith.



Summary of Minutes from the April 12th Board Meeting

This was the final meeting of this year's Board of Trustees. The next, to be held on May 24th, will be the transitional meeting when the board will welcome new members and thank those who are leaving the board.

It has been a quiet month. Tree maintenance is currently going on around the Temple. A committee is being assembled to discuss dues and fees. Although dues may, when necessary, be negotiable, fees are not. Fees include Religious School tuition, B'nai Mitzvah fees, etc.

Marc Klausner has volunteered his services so often at Temple Emeth; to thank him the Board of Trustees and Cantor Tilem presented him with a gift of singing lessons with a prominent voice teacher who trains cantors. Many thanks to Marc for all he has done for Temple Emeth!

The Strategic Planning Committee met with members of the Religious School, the ECC and other committees to discuss future collaboration. Interrelated groups will begin meeting quarterly with Rabbi Sirbu to better coordinate Temple activities.

Rabbi Sirbu reported that Rabbi Nafshi has accepted the role of High Holiday Rabbi for this fall. She will coordinate the parallel programming for children and give a sermon on the second day of Rosh Hashanah. On May 4th, Temple Emeth will participate in "Shabbat Across America," which will be advertised outside of our temple community.

Financial Secretary Michael Robinson reported that 85% of dues are paid. We currently have 416 members. The Casino Night Gala is adding a live auction this year, along with a silent auction and "duty-free shops." All are welcome to attend and are encouraged to bring friends.

Treasurer Steve Packles presented the 2007-08 budget. The Board accepted the recommendation of the finance committee to bring the budget to the congregation for a vote. The Strategic Planning Committee applied for a leadership development

grant. If it is approved, the Board voted to commit matching funds.

The Capital Campaign has raised over \$1.1 million, and numbers continue to rise. A workshop will be held at the end of April to evaluate the way the Board currently works and to discuss the role of the executive committee.

Annual Giving raised over \$80,000 this year.

One third of the students at BARJ will be from Temple Emeth in the fall.

The Search Committee is widely advertising for the position of a new Youth Director.

The Annual Congregational Meeting will be held May 17th. The following night, Installation will be held at a music service. Dan Firshein closed the meeting detailing many accomplishments and activities of the Board and Temple during the past two years.

Temple members are always welcome to attend board meetings. Full copies of the minutes are available, as always, in the Temple office.


