Message From the Rabbi

The past generation of American religious life has seen a transformation in two significant ways. First is that the relationship between religion and politics—kept for decades at arm's length by contemporary interpretations of the First Amendment—became more interconnected and even interdependent. The second is that the most passionate religious voices

preaching for social change went from advocating liberal causes such as civil rights to more conservative causes such as prayer in public schools and restrictions on abortion.

These phenomena are the results of many social forces, not the least of which was the impact of the Rev. Jerry Falwell, who died on May 15th. Falwell used the power of television to spread his evangelical theology. He founded the Moral Majority, the first organization of its kind to

advocate a conservative Christian agenda in the halls of government. And he founded Liberty University so that he could train the next generation of leaders shaped in the same mold.

We Reform Jews, as individuals and as a movement, found much to disagree with in Falwell's preaching and teaching. His belief that America is a Christian nation threatened to marginalize our community, undoing decades of progress. His emphasis on prayer in public schools had the potential of alienating Jewish (and other non-Christian students) in the very classrooms which were built to give equal opportunity to all.

There has also been great debate in the Jewish community about whether Falwell's zealous support for Israel is really a good thing in the long run. Israel "Christian Zionism" that Falwell preached, it often seems shortsighted to ally ourselves with someone whose support for Israel is based on such a starkly different philosophy.

There is no question that the religious America

that Falwell worked to shape will endure for some time. The only question is how we as Jews will navigate the new religious landscape in a way that we and our values will also have a voice.

Many in our community have demonized Jerry Falwell for his various statements and beliefs. (He made some well-known inflammatory gaffes which, since he later apolo-* gized for them, I will not repeat here.) I find that demonization rarely, if* ever, leads to decreased friction or

greater understanding.

Like many others, there is much I disagree with about Falwell's religious and political views. Nonetheless, I believe that there is much to admire and emulate about him. He brought great passion to the pulpit while at the same time maintaining a sense of personal kindness and humility to those who met him. He understood the power of bringing like-minded people together to accomplish specific goals, even if those same people disagreed about other important issues. And he used the power of mass media to help shape his vision of a better world.

Rabbi Eric Yoffie, president of the Union for Reform Judaism, remembered Falwell this way: "Rev. Falwell's influence will be felt for years, even generations, to come." I agree.

New Books

The Library has acquired a wide variety of new books just in time for summer reading. Our additions include fiction; poetry; biographies; and an interesting mix of non-fiction. Brief summaries of some of these books are listed below.

<u>A Woman in Jerusalem</u>, by A. Yehoshua, seems at first to be a simple story of identifying the victim of suicide bombing. The author's skill converts this story into a moving tale of caring, grief, and wit.

What do four scientists who helped develop the atom bomb; the first photographer to go ashore on D-Day; the director of the movie *Casablanca*; the producer of *The Third Man*; a famous anti-Communist author; and an artistic photographer have in common? Find out in Kati Marton's book <u>The Great Escape</u>: <u>Nine Jews who Fled Hitler and Changed the World</u>. Here you will find previously untold stories of these nine Hungarians who got out of the wrong place at the right time.

How does a seventeenth century German Jewish widow guide the financial and personal futures of her fourteen children? In <u>Memoirs of Gluckel of Hamelin</u>, translator Marvin Lowenthal presents this amazing woman's story of pirates and war; weddings and births; mass hysteria and plagues; and her determination to save and advance her family, business, and faith during these turbulent times. This is a truly captivating book.

<u>Why the Jews Rejected Jesus: the Turning Point in Western History</u> presents the concept that Jews reject Jesus because Jesus rejected the oral Torah. The author, David Klinghoffer, explains how Paul promoted Jesus' role to become the basis for Christianity. This is a very interesting perspective on a very important topic.

In her book <u>Emma Lazarus</u>, Esther Schor offers an intimate portrait of the poet whose famous words are inscribed on the Statue of Liberty. Using personal letters that were discovered in 1980, the author allows us to see Emma Lazarus as not only a poet, but as an activist, a feminist, and a Zionist. This book helps us to attain a deeper understanding of her written words.

We have many other new books. Please come to our Library and discover the perfect book for your summer reading pleasure.

Highlights of the Annual Congregational Meeting May 17, 2007

President Dan Firshein had the Mission Statement read. He thanked all who have contributed the past year, and emphasized the Honors List distributed to attendees. Finally, he thanked the outgoing Trustees and Executive Committee members for their efforts.

Rabbi Sirbu discussed three upcoming events: Erev Shavuot / Confirmation service (15 confirmands this year!), the fall Trachtenberg Lecture, featuring Cantor Ellen Dreskin, and a Family Retreat to Camp Harlem on March 28— 30, 2008.

The Strategic Planning Committee's third year was summarized by Karen Rappaport, cochair. Accomplishments included obtaining succinct financial reports, organizing inter-committee meetings, and spearheading a second Board workshop on governance.

Committing to the Future, the Sixtieth Anniversary Campaign, has exceeded 50% of its \$2.2 million goal. Gifts or pledges have come from 115 families.

The Social Action Committee displayed a solar cooker intended for women in Darfur...an inexpensive tool to help women in that region, especially to reduce their risk of assault. A Jewish agency helps deliver the cookers and train women in Darfur.

Board activities for the year were reviewed. There were discussions on ensuring that the 60th anniversary of the synagogue is properly celebrated, means of encouraging sponsorship of onegs, and the timeline for repairing the Sanctuary ceiling.

Larry Silver of the Nominating Committee made a report. A motion to accept the slate of Officers and Trustees was duly made, seconded, and unanimously approved.

Steve Packles and Jeff Etzin reviewed this year's and next year's budgets. For next year, an approximate five percent increase in dues, a \$50 reduction in the Capital Assessment, and flat membership were key assumptions. A motion was made to accept the Budget as presented, was duly seconded and unanimously approved.
