THE LAND WHERE "It couldn't happen again"...COULD: **Cantor WIsnla's Reflections Upon His Recent Visit To Poland**

As many of you have heard or read recently in the Trenton Times, I have just recently returned from a trip to Poland, one of many I have made since the end of World War II. have always returned to my birthplace, Sochaczew (a Warsaw suburb) with mixed emotions. On the one hand, there is the memory of my warm Jewish upbringing, being a "child star" in the Theater, a soloist in the Nozhik Synagogue, tutored by the Famous Great Cantors of Warsaw, Helmer, Sirota, Kusevitsky ... and on the other, the dark side of the coin, my memory of the Catastrophe that befell our people, the annihilation of the best of Jewry in Europe, the Holocaust that claimed the lives of my entire family: Father, Mother, brothers, aunts, uncles and cousins.

Anti-Semitism has been a part of the Polish fabric, the body of Poland, since the year 966 C.E. when the first Polish King Mieszko I proclaimed Poland a Christian kingdom and named the city of Kalish after the first Jewish citizen who was the official minter of coins for the fledgling country.

My expectations, hopes, and prayers have always been that, after the tragedy that took place on Polish soil, the people of Poland, the survivors of the Nazi Occupation, their children and children's children, will have learned the lessons of the Church/Governmentsponsored hatred and what it leads to. Unfortunately, much to my consternation and disappointment, I must report to you that things have only gotten worse. The Anti-Jewishness in a country with fewer than 5,000 Jews out of a total population of 35,000,000 is an incredible phenomenon. The only place in the World where anti-Semitism is flourishing and growing without any Semites.

I had decided during my last visit two years ago ... when I led the service for the first "formal" Bar Mitzvah in the Nozhik Synagogue in fifty years...that I was never going to go back. However, after receiving an invitation and numerous phone calls from the Sochaczew organization in Jerusalem requesting me to return to officiate at the service of reclamation and rededication of its 600-year-old Jewish Cemetery, I could not refuse.

Being fully aware of the "Hunger" of the few remaining Jews for Jewish-Yiddish songs...folk as well as liturgical ..., I arranged with a well-known friend of mine, a music professor in Krakow and a most magnificent pianist, to accompany me at two concerts that were scheduled, the first in Krakow and the second in Warsaw two days later. The entire Jewish population of Krakow...approximately 200 people...showed up including some non-Jews who received me in grand fashion with tears of joy and the words, "You have awakened my Jewish soul". So far so good. The gathering included a bus load of Israels who were obviously Jews (they wore kipot) who arrived only to be pelted with stones by the "rough-neck" young Poles, hurling epitaphs at the group. You may rest assured that I did not react kindly to this, and my response in Polish was not very delicate ... or printable ... and was a shock to the rowdies.

On to Warsaw where I was greeted by the local Polish-born Israeli, chief Rabbi, and the only rabbi in Poland, Rabbi Joskowitz. I was struck by the fact that the front doors of the beautifully renovated Nozhik Synagogue (where I sang as a choirboy from the balcony some 50 years ago) were all boarded up; we had to enter through the rear side door. Imagine my shock when I was told by the Rabbi that just a few days before some windows were broken, outside walls defaced with swastikas and graffiti in addition to swastikas being carved into the beautiful wooden front doors.

On Sunday, July 2Ist ... very appropriately Tishah B'av ... I led the group to Auschwitz-Birkenau, a place very well known to me for I spent three years there. A government-supplied personal guide began to recount the horrors of the place, without once mentioning the word "Jew"...as though all the victims were Poles, Greeks, Hungarians,...

This was too painful for me so I politely grabbed the bus microphone and in Polish-Hebrew began to tell a detailed story of the barracks, ditches, and the story of Himmler's visit to our camp during Christmas 1942-43. We had to put on a show which turned into a massacre with over 100 prisoners beaten to death while running the gauntlet in front of the (Continued on page 3)

PRAYERBOOKS AVAILABLE FOR SIGHT-IMPAIRED PEOPLE

HIGH HOLY DAY HUNGER PROJECT

The Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism is coordinating the second annual High Holy Day Hunger Project. This program is a national effort by the Reform Movement to involve synagogues across the country in the fight against hunger. Last year, Jewish congregations donated over 200 tons of food to local food banks across the country, and the response this year is expected to be even stronger.

At Rosh Hashanah evening services each congregant will receive a paper grocery bag and a request to return to Yom Kippur (morning/evening) services with the bag filled with food for the poor in community. After Yom Kippur (morning/evening) services representatives from our local food banks will collect the donations and bring them to their local distribution site. The project is a strikingly simple plan for bold community action. Please make this year's fast a feast for the poor.

Reichsfuhrer. I further pointed out the fact that 95% of the camp's population was Jewish. All the non-Jews were overseers and kapos. The guide apologized claiming that he had been following his instructions.

I have finally come to the realization thatthere is no life for Jews in Poland...anv number, not even one. Jews have become an obsession with the Poles. Even their President, Lech Walesa, is now being vilified and ridiculed because he stood up in the Israeli Knesset and formally apologized for his Countrymen. Anarchy "rules" in Poland. There is fear in the eyes of the people, the decent people who have been left to fend for themselves because of lack of protection from the thugs who, having gained their freedom from Communism, are already abusing it. The Jews of America are the lucky ones, who by accident of geography do not have to live through this European horror. Thank God for the state of Israel. We must get these people out of Poland. Russia, Hungary, etc. We must all redouble our resolve to support the Jewish State, the only one that opened its doors to the thousands of refugees streaming in from the former Communist..now "free"...Eastern European hellholes. No country, including our own United States, is willing to open its gates to the Jews from Russia, Poland, Hungary, Rumania the remnants of our people...who survived the most horrible slaughter in history.
