RABBI'S COLUMN

Dear Friends,

I write this column to you, having just finished the first day of Religious School. And what an exciting day it was! Our school is growing each week. This is the first year our school has grown to such a large size, that we now require a "double session" on Sunday mornings. Our Religious Education Committee struggled for many months last year to find the best possible solution for our growing school, and I can now tell you that they made a wise decision. If our opening day is any indication, we are off to a great start. It was so exciting to see so many new faces, and to watch our students, old and new, arrive, ready to learn about our traditions, and have fun.

I have no doubt that one of the main reasons people initially join any synagogue is to educate their children. I think the reason more and more young families are joining Har Sinai is because our religious school has earned such a fine reputation within our community. We have a superb staff of dedicated professional teachers, who are led by our wonderful new educator, Ann Kanarek. If you have not yet had a chance to meet Ann, I hope you will stop by Temple soon and introduce yourself.

But the education of our young people cannot be the responsibility of the Temple staff alone. We need your help. We need you to practice what we teach at home. Nor is the quality of the educational program, or the needed support of our school only the responsibility of families with children in the school. If we are truly to be a "Temple Family," (and I hope we are), then all of us, young and old, need to care about what happens on Sunday mornings at Temple.

Several years ago, Rabbi Leonard Schoolman wrote the following article, which first appeared in Welcome to Reform Judaism. It is appropriate to quote as we all begin another year of Religious School. "There was once a time when the primary reason most people joined a congregation was to provide a Jewish education for their children. All too often, once their children had reached confirmation, these men and women disappeared from synagogue life along with their teenagers."

Happily, synagogue affiliation today reflects the needs, aspirations, and commitments of the entire family. Living alone in the modern world is increasingly difficult. Being Jewish alone is nearly impossible. The values of human caring and mutual support that have characterized Judaism through the centuries are even more important today. People increasingly need around them a secure network of caring and concerned individuals.

The synagogue can be that caring community, and for increasing numbers of Jewish adults, Reform Temples are fulfilling that function.....

Is Jewish education for our children still important? Of course it is, so important in fact, that growing numbers of adults are themselves pursuing Jewish studies in order to better influence and inspire their children as well as to enrich their own lives. The synagogue cannot carry the burden of Jewish education alone. Your participation is essential.

 Broaden your own Jewish education. Enroll in adult education classes at the Temple. Read Jewish books, build a Jewish home library. Reclaim the heritage that is yours by right. Become a model of Jewish living for your children.

- There are some things you can do to affirm your partnership with the Temple: seek out programs, services, and festivals which you can participate in as a family, or join others in. There are scores of such events and activities every year at Temple.

— Extend the Temple into your home. Jewish tradition speaks of the home as a mikdash me'at, a small sanctuary. Begin to observe Jewish rituals and practices in your home. Why not invite a friend over to do Shabbat with, and then come together to Services.

- Ask your children what they do and learn each week. Encourage discussions about Jewish values....while the Religious School does help children to develop an ethical sense, ongoing moral development requires your invaluable contribution.

- Share your concerns with your child's teacher, with our educator, our cantor, and with me. All of us appreciate your interest and concern, and by reaching out to us, you help us to serve you and your family more effectively.

I look forward to seeing many of you soon, and I hope often.

OPENING DOORS: AN INTERFAITH COUPLES WORKSHOP TO MEET ON THURSDAY EVENINGS

Har Sinai Temple invites you to participate in Opening Doors, an innovative program of open and frank discussion about the concerns and issues in interfaith marriage.

Participants will come together with other couples in a supportive, comfortable and non-judgmental setting to share their personal ideas about family, holidays, raising children, and other interfaith issues.

Every couple must deal with many issues as they build their lives together. In a marriage between a Jew and one who is of another faith, such concerns as separating from family, establishing a home, working out a balance between the need for closeness and the need for individuation are often complicated by real differences in background and experience. Whether or not both partners consider themselves religious, strong feelings often arise for both members of the couple as well as their extended families.

Some questions that will be discussed include: how do we raise the children? What faith should our children practice? How do I deal with my in-laws? I do not want to convert to Judaism, can my home still be Jewish?

The program is open to affiliated and unaffiliated couples, and those contemplating marriage. This is not a conversion class. The 6 week program is co-sponsored by the Jewish Family Services of the Delaware Valley and the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (UAHC), and will be led by Linda Levy, a member of the professional staff of the JFS.

"No, no," shout the guests, "we want to see your protectors!" "We have brought you our military leaders and our elected officers, and you say these are not our protectors?" ask the townspeople. "Who then are the protectors of our community?'

In one voice the strangers shout, "THE TEACHERS!"

Three New Special Programs for Children in Our Religious School

We are delighted to be able to offer three new programs to meet specific needs of children in our Religious School this year. All three programs will take place on Sunday mornings.

We have many students who are new to our school this year in grades four, five and six who have never been in religious school before. These students are in classes where children have learned Hebrew in past years, and they come to us with no Hebrew background, or a very weak Hebrew background. For these students, we are now able to offer a special intensive Hebrew remedial program which we hope will help them "catch up" to their classmates.

Several of our students currently attend the Abrams Hebrew Academy, or have studied at the day school for many years. Their Hebrew skills tend to be much more advanced that the Hebrew skills of their classmates in our school. For these students, we are now able to offer an advanced supplementary Hebrew Program on Sunday mornings.

For too many years, parents of children with special educational needs have had to struggle with the decision of whether or not to enroll their children in religious school. They have had to look for programs that would be able to meet their children's needs, and be sensitive to them as young people who want to have a religious identity. We are delighted to now have on staff Bonnie Cusak, a teacher certified in special education, who will be available to work with any child with special needs. Resettlement of Russian Jews in our community - By law, some furnishings (like bedding) which we provide must be newly purchased. Your contribution would allow us to assist Jewish Family Service in helping our people.

<u>Social Action Fund</u> - Funds are used to purchase supplies for current projects (monthly meals for the homeless and TASK holiday meals). Funds are also used to allow the Temple to support a variety of ongoing programs in our area, and special programs as the need arises.

CATEGORY B - DONATION OF SPECIFIC ITEMS

<u>Donations of Prepared Foods</u> - Specific prepared foods are needed for both the <u>monthly meals</u> we serve the homeless and special <u>holiday meals</u> we donate to the Trenton Area Soup Kitchen.

<u>Donations of Newly Purchased Goods</u> - We collect and distribute school/art supplies and packaged "unmentionables" to the area needy.

CATEGORY C - "HANDS ON"

Holiday volunteers (Mercer Medical Center) - Dick Nitzberg has coordinated this Christmas Day effort for 20 years!

Monthly meals for the homeless - Helpers are needed to heat, pack, and deliver the meals.

TASK holiday meals - Volunteers are needed to prepare and package the food.

<u>Tutoring</u> - "Route 1 Readers" provides the Children (3-14 years) of the homeless currently housed in Rte 1 motels extra stimulation. Tutors read or draw with preschoolers, provide assistance with schoolwork to older children.

Route 1 Reader Supplies - The donation of children's books and used art or office supplies would be appreciated!

Coat drive - Gently used coats will be collected at the Temple for distribution to the area needy again this fall.

Resettlement of Russian Jews - Household items (in good condition) are needed to facilitate the establishment of their new homes. Moving help, including the usage of a van or pickup, is also needed.

<u>Habitat for the Humanities</u> - We will join the Trenton-area organization in the rehabilitation of defective housing to provide low-cost residences.
