### RABBINIC REFLECTIONS

I am not much of a bike rider. From time to time I do attempt to ride but, thankfully, not too often. After a long ride, which I define as half an hour, my legs begin to hurt and I get winded. Also, the bicycle seat seems to be a bit too small for my posterior. Yet, bicycle riding is probably one of the simplest motions in all of sports. Basically, all you have to do is pedal, steer and make sure you don't fall down.

Bike riding generally does not involve the same skill level as basketball, football, tennis, baseball, and other competitive sports, which require not only a simple motion, but also dexterity and some athletic ability. Even track and field events involve a certain amount of physical aptitude. In track and field, timing is important as well as the ability to precisely sense the movements of your body in juxtaposition to everyone else.

Bike riding not only involves the simplest of motions, but you also have the advantage of the bike to help you succeed, whereas in walking and running it is you against the world with nothing in between to negotiate gravity.

Even though competitive biking could be considered somewhat boring, tens of millions of people across the world took tremendous delight in Lance Armstrong's winning of his seventh Tour De France. This accomplishment is considered one of the greatest in all recorded sports... especially because Lance Armstrong's personal story is so compelling. This is a man who was afflicted with cancer; he was able to overcome so many difficult obstacles in order to achieve his singular lofty goal. His name has become synonymous with courage and superhuman effort.

So even though bicycle riding requires the simplest of movements, attaining simplicity in many of life's pursuits is often difficult. Lance Armstrong proved that simple is not so simple. With the simplest of movements, he was able to rivet the attention of the entire world to a sport that is often relegated to the back burner of the sports page. He overcame the complex vicissitudes of life by mastering the rudimentary rotation of his legs.

Judaism also encourages the simple path in life. Even though Judaism can be a highly intricate faith, especially when considering its dauntingly intellectual demands, still the actual practice of the tradition, and what the tradition demands of the adherent, can be quite simple. Two thousand years ago, Rabbi Tarfon stated that to teach someone a complex task might be easier than teaching someone simply how to relate to others. In the book of Deuteronomy, which we are reading this month, we find this quotation, "For this commandment which I command thee this day, it is not too hard for thee, neither is it far off. It is not in heaven that thou shouldest say, 'Who shall go up for us to heaven, and bring it unto us, and make us to hear it, that we may do it?' Neither is it beyond the sea, that thou shouldest say, 'Who shall go over the sea for us, and bring it unto us, and make us to hear it, that we may do it?' But the word is very nigh unto thee, in thy mouth, and in thy heart, that thou mayest do it."

# RABBINIC REFLECTIONS

We sometimes encounter people who are capable of solving a complex mathematical equation but who are incapable of simply appreciating the world around them.

In the famous story of Rabbi Hillel, when he was asked to summarize Judaism in one sentence, he simply said, "Love thy neighbor and all the rest is commentary." In other words, he distilled the essence of our tradition into the simplest of injunctions.

Sometimes we forget that the simplest path, the straightest path, is the most productive one. So we bask in Lance Armstrong's glory because he took the simplest of motions and raised it to an art form that we can all appreciate. And in this we learn that our humanness depends more on how we first master the basic rubrics of our existence rather than feeling that we need to become perfect in those aspects of life that are far beyond our control.

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE MARILYN WEINSTEIN president@harsinai.org

For many people August was a vacation month, filled with relaxation and renewal. I hope that you had a good summer and will take full advantage of the remaining warm days ahead. August was a special time for Har Sinai as well, but on vacation we were not! The summer here was filled with activity with membership renewals, planning the school year, committee meetings on all topics and continued work on our moving plans. We have exciting plans ahead for the coming year, some of which I'd like to share with you now.

We are making real progress on the Route 31 building project. Nancy LaPosta and her committee have engaged specialists to cover all aspects of the next phase of zoning approvals, which include a number of different environmental studies required by Hopewell Township. The Pre-Construction Committee includes some of Har Sinai's most dedicated members. When a meeting is called (and there are many of them!), everyone either attends or calls in with his or her updates and views on the current issues. The underlying message is that every member of the Committee cares very deeply about Har Sinai and its future. The Campaign Finance and Campaign Fund Raising Committees are also finalizing budget and financing plans as part of the moving/closing process. These committees are all making a concerted effort to insure that there is communication between each piece of this important endeavor, so that we all go forward together. We hope to be able to take the next step, getting site zoning approval (which includes the above environmental clearances), by the Fall of this year. If we make that timetable, we still expect to close on the Route 31 site in either late 2005 or early 2006. Our goal is to have the new school and multi-purpose room completed by Fall, 2006.

The Pre-Construction Committee has also begun coordinating the building programming phase, meaning the actual planning of the "insides" of the building that will become our religious school and worship space. This includes scoping out the number and size of future classrooms, offices, the structure of the multi-purpose room, a library, etc. This is being done with the help of various Committees and Temple staff who are involved in each of

these areas. When this task is completed, we will have architectural drawings that will actually show what the interiors of the building into which we are moving will actually look like. To say that the excitement is building is indeed an understatement!

Meanwhile, several other committees are hard at work, planning programs and events for the next several months at Har Sinai. The "Year of Shabbat" Committee is finalizing plans for the first of a series of innovative Friday night services which will encourage congregational participation. This service is scheduled for Friday, September 23, 2005. The Fund Raising Committee is arranging a terrific Fall event, namely a wine tasting dinner hosted by Spencer Christian, to take place on Saturday, November 12th at Tre Piani in Princeton. You will be receiving more information shortly about what should be a great evening. Sisterhood will be starting the year with a "How to Play Mah Jongg" session on September 15th, to be followed in October by a "Dinner and Bingo" evening. Steve Miller and the Men's Club are planning an event on September 22<sup>nd</sup>, a "Learn To Play Poker" evening which should be great fun (too bad it's only for men!).

I am also very excited by what I see happening with Har Sinai's Youth Groups. HSTY has already planned a full program with a lot of great events coming up which you'll be seeing in future mailings. This year, Har Sinai has a new Junior HSTY group, to bridge the gap between Shovavim and HSTY-what a great idea! You'll also be receiving information about Shovavim's future programs as well.

Our publicity effort is beginning to bear fruit: news about various aspects of Har Sinai life have appeared or will shortly be appearing in several area newspapers, including the <u>Yardley News</u>, <u>Pennington Post</u>, <u>Hopewell Valley News</u>, <u>Trenton Times</u>, <u>NJ Jewish State</u> and the <u>New Jersey Jewish News</u>. This is a work in progress, and we're aiming to be part of the calendar portion of some of these papers on a regular basis.

I hope to see you back at Har Sinai in September to take advantage of one or several of the great things that we have in store. And stay tuned for more news on our move and additional programming updates!


